



Mega Millions jackpot now \$16 million

ATLANTA (AP) — There has been another rollover in the grand prize for the Mega Millions multistate lottery — to \$16 million.

The rollover occurred because no player matched all the winning numbers from Friday night's \$12 million drawing.

The next Mega Millions drawing will be Tuesday night.

Three players, including two in Michigan, won second prizes of \$250,000 apiece. Another 17 players, two in Michigan, won third prizes of \$10,000 apiece.

The winning numbers were: two, four, 21, 39, and 51. The Mega Ball number was 29.

The Detroit Free Press reports Saturday that a Mega Millions ticket worth \$250,000 bought at the Joslyn Market in Pontiac for the Jan. 18, 2008, drawing has not been claimed. It expires Sunday unless it's claimed.

Girl, 3, dies after attack

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Authorities say a 3-year-old girl died after being attacked by her neighbor's Rottweiler.

Fort Worth police said Friday the 17-year-old dog attacked the toddler after she climbed through a hole in the fence of her backyard and into an enclosure with the animal.

The dog's owner turned the pet over to the city and was cooperating with authorities, said Keane Menefee, manager of the city's Animal Care and Control Division.

Menefee told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram the animal's vaccinations were not current, and that the dog will likely be euthanized.

Texas lab picks up tremor from Asian quake

GIDDINGS, Texas (AP) — A state lab near Austin felt tremors Friday from a 7.3 magnitude earthquake nearly half a world away.

Supersensitive scales at the Texas Department of Agriculture's metrology lab picked up shockwaves 45 minutes after the quake struck the Kuril Islands, a chain of Russian islands found northeast of Japan in the Pacific Ocean.

The Giddings lab is about 50 miles east of Austin — and nearly 6,000 miles from Russia.

"I always knew our state-of-the-art equipment was in great working order and sensitive to the slightest weights, but I had no idea it was so powerful it could pick up tremors from an earthquake thousands of miles away," Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples said.

The United States Geological Survey Center confirmed the tremors in Giddings were from the quake in Asia. The quake happened in a sparsely populated area, and no injuries were reported.

The lab in Giddings calibrates equipment used for the ordinary — such as weighing tomatoes at a grocery store or pumping fuel at a gas tank — and the not-so-ordinary, such as keeping time on an atomic clock.

Court asked to take child off life support

DALLAS (AP) — A court could decide by next week whether to end life support for a 6-month-old Dallas baby who has suffered severe brain damage, dozens of bone fractures and numerous scars, allegedly at the hands of his parents.

Besides severe brain and spinal cord injuries, a physician noted that David Coronado Jr. had 42 skeletal injuries. His hands and feet appeared to have been pulled, twisted and crushed. His skin injuries include bruises and human bite marks, The Dallas Morning News reported in Saturday editions.

The only child of David Cesar Coronado Sr., 23, and Ruthy Marie Chabolla, 22, wasn't breathing when they took him to Methodist Dallas Medical Center one evening last month.

Hospital staff revived the infant with CPR and rushed him to Children's Medical Center of Dallas, where doctors were appalled by his injuries, including a bite wound to the bone of one of his fingers.

It appeared that abuse lasted a month. Many of the fractures had healed to some extent, indicating they were a few weeks old.

"Neurologically, David is exhibiting minimal movement," a doctor wrote. "If he survives his injuries, he will have severe and permanent disability as a result of these injuries."

Police on Dec. 23 arrested Coronado and Chabolla on charges of injury to a child. Each was being held in the Dallas County jail in lieu of \$500,000 bail. Interview requests sent to the jail by the Dallas newspaper drew no immediate response Friday.

Both parents told detectives that their son sometimes had trouble breathing and was given to blank stares. They denied deliberately causing any of his injuries.

"I would never hurt my child," Chabolla told police, according to a Child Protective Services report.

Coronado, who stands 6-3 and weighs 260 pounds, said he may have picked his son up "too hard" in the middle of the night, but that he never hurt David intentionally.

"Both parents are responsible for long-term, extensive physical abuse to their only infant son," a CPS report says. "Neither parent is able to provide a safe, nurturing environment for this or any other child, given the magnitude of the physical abuse and life-threatening physical neglect this infant has sustained while in their care."

This week, the infant's court-appointed guardian filed a motion in Dallas County juvenile court asking that doctors at Children's be permitted to remove David Jr. from life support. The motion notes that the parents have not consented to withdrawing the support but argues that it is in his best interests.

Several other women leaders will take part in the event.

They include Ingrid Mattson, the first woman president of the Islamic Society of North America; the Rev. Cynthia Hale,

senior pastor of Ray of Hope Christian Church in Atlanta; the Rev. Suzan Johnson-Cook of the Bronx Christian Fellowship in New York; and Dr. Uma Mysorekar, president of the Hindu Temple Society of North America.

Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts-Schori of The Episcopal Church, which includes the National Cathedral, will give a closing prayer. The cathedral dean, the Rev. Samuel T. Lloyd, cathedral Canon Carol Wade and Episcopal Bishop John Chane of Washington also will participate.

The Jewish community will be represented in the service by Reform Rabbi David Saperstein, Conservative Rabbi Jerome Epstein and Orthodox Rabbi Haskel Lookstein of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun in New York.

Greek Orthodox Archbishop Demetrios and Auxiliary Catholic Bishop Francisco Gonzalez of Washington will also take part. The Rev. Wesley Granberg-Michaelson, general secretary of the Reformed Church in America, will give the benediction.

Fort Worth madam finally gets a headstone

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — An Irish-born woman once a well-known Fort Worth madam has finally gotten her own headstone, more than a century after she was buried in an unmarked plot.

Some Fort Worth historians placed a granite stone with the inscription "Call Me Madam" on Friday at the resting place of Mary Porter, who operated a brothel — or what was then euphemized as a downtown "female boardinghouse."

In his book "Hell's Half Acre," author Richard Selcer wrote that Porter probably knew most of Fort Worth's prominent businessmen on a first-name basis. In 1893-97, she had 130 offenses on record with the Tarrant County court but never spent one night in jail.

"Back then madams weren't rounded up, except maybe at election time," Selcer said. "They were back in business before the day was done."

Porter reportedly paid proportionately larger fines, which reflected her status in the city's vice operations.

Donna Donnell, a member of the North Fort Worth Historical Society, began digging into archives and records two years ago in search of information about Porter, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported for a story in Saturday editions. She is fascinated with the notorious personalities from Fort Worth's colorful history, women in particular.

Donnell discovered a one-paragraph newspaper obituary that said Porter died in 1905 at age 75 and had lived in Fort Worth

for 18 years. Her funeral was held at a Catholic church. According to the death certificate, she was buried in Oakwood Cemetery.

A cemetery official confirmed that Porter was interred in a plot deeded to another local madam. Porter was the fourth and last person placed in a 10-by-25-foot plot in the tree-shaded cemetery founded in 1879.

"Mary was a fascinating person," said Selcer, whose new book with a chapter about Porter, "Fort Worth Characters," is to be published this fall. "Even if her lifestyle wasn't admirable, everyone deserves to be remembered. Having her grave marked among all of the city's founding fathers and mothers and Confederate veterans appealed to my twisted sense of humor."

Selcer and Donnell were among those who contributed to engrave the headstone, which was donated by a Fort Worth police sergeant.

Mrs Baird's Bakery to shut down its Waco plant

WACO, Texas (AP) — Mrs Baird's Bakery announced that it will close its Waco plant, ending 90 years of making fresh-baked bread and sweet rolls in Central Texas.

Up to 90 production jobs will be eliminated by mid-April. The weekly production of 200,000 packages of bread and buns in Waco will be transferred to Fort Worth, San Antonio and Abilene.

The Waco facility will be used as a distribution depot with 20 to 30 employees.

"To increase productivity, we need to add new equipment, and we just don't have the room in Waco," company spokeswoman Elizabeth Watters said. "In Waco, we have wonderful people turning out a wonderful product."

DALLAS (AP) — A Dallas police officer fired in May over his account of a shooting got his job back.

An administrative law judge reinstated Senior Cpl. Stanley McDaniel on Wednesday, concluding that he did not violate department rules or make any misleading statements.

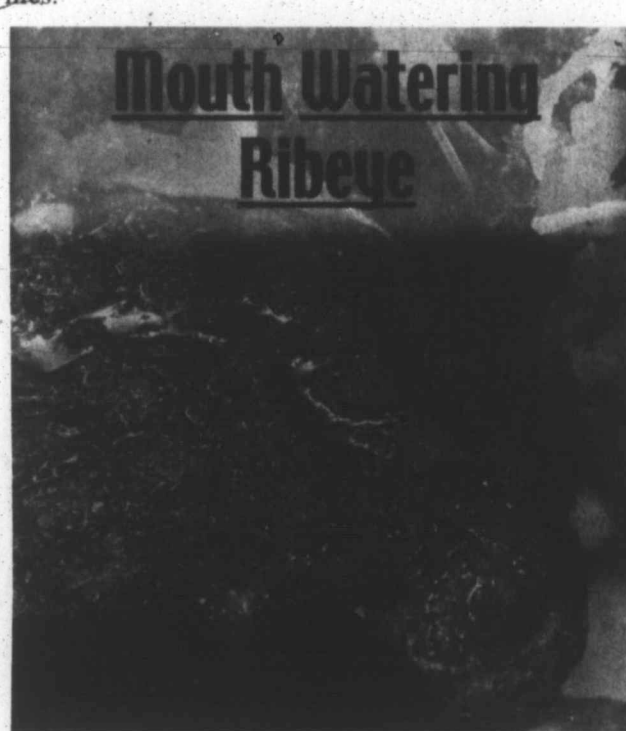
Built in 1919, the 43,000-square-foot plant was purchased by Fort Worth-based Mrs Baird's in 1960.

Today is Saturday, Jan. 17, the 17th day of 2009. There are 348 days left in the year.

Highlights in history on this date:

1595 - France's King Henry IV declares war on Spain.

1759 - Holy Roman Empire declares war on Prussia.

1893 - Hawaii's monarchy is overthrown as a group of businessmen and sugar planters force Queen Liliuokalani to abdicate.

1945 - Soviet troops and Polish forces liberate Warsaw, more than five years after it fell to Nazi Germany; Swedish diplomat Raoul Wallenberg, credited with saving tens of thousands of Jews, disappears in Hungary while in Soviet custody.

1959 - Federal State of Mali is formed by Union of Republics of Senegal and French Sudan.

1961 - In his farewell address, U.S. President Dwight Eisenhower warns against the rise of "the military-industrial complex."

1991 - Second and third airstrikes against targets in Iraq and Kuwait are launched. At least six Iraqi Scud missiles are launched at Tel Aviv, Israel. Three hit civilian areas, slightly injuring 12 people.

1992 - Israel begins enforcing a sweeping curfew on Palestinians from the West Bank to the Gaza Strip. 1993 - The United States unleashes a shower of Tomahawk cruise missiles against a nuclear fabricating plant 13 kilometers (8 miles) from Baghdad, delivering the point that Iraq must comply with U.N. resolutions.

1994 - An earthquake devastates suburbs in the San Fernando Valley, California, killing 61 people and injuring over 10,000.

1996 - Sheik Omar Abdel-Rahman, the spiritual leader of Egypt's main Muslim radical faction, is sentenced to life in prison by a U.S. court for plotting to blow up the United Nations and other New York-area landmarks.

1997 - In Dublin, with little fanfare, a court grants the first divorce in Ireland's history.

1999 - Fighting erupts near a village in Kosovo, Yugoslavia, where 45 ethnic Albanians were massacred a few days earlier, forcing mourners to halt funeral services for the slain and flee.

2005 - Palestinian leader Mahmoud Abbas orders his security forces to prevent attacks against Israel and investigate the most recent deadly shooting of Israelis.

2006 - In his first statement since becoming Israel's acting prime minister, Ehud Olmert says he wants to resume final peace talks with the Palestinians and take harsh action against Israeli squatters in the West Bank.

2007 - Jinal Antel Sali Jr., a top leader of the al-Qaida-linked Abu Sayyaf rebel group in the Philippines who was accused of kidnapping three Americans in 2001 and of masterminding one of Southeast Asia's worst terror attacks three years later, is killed by Filipino army forces.

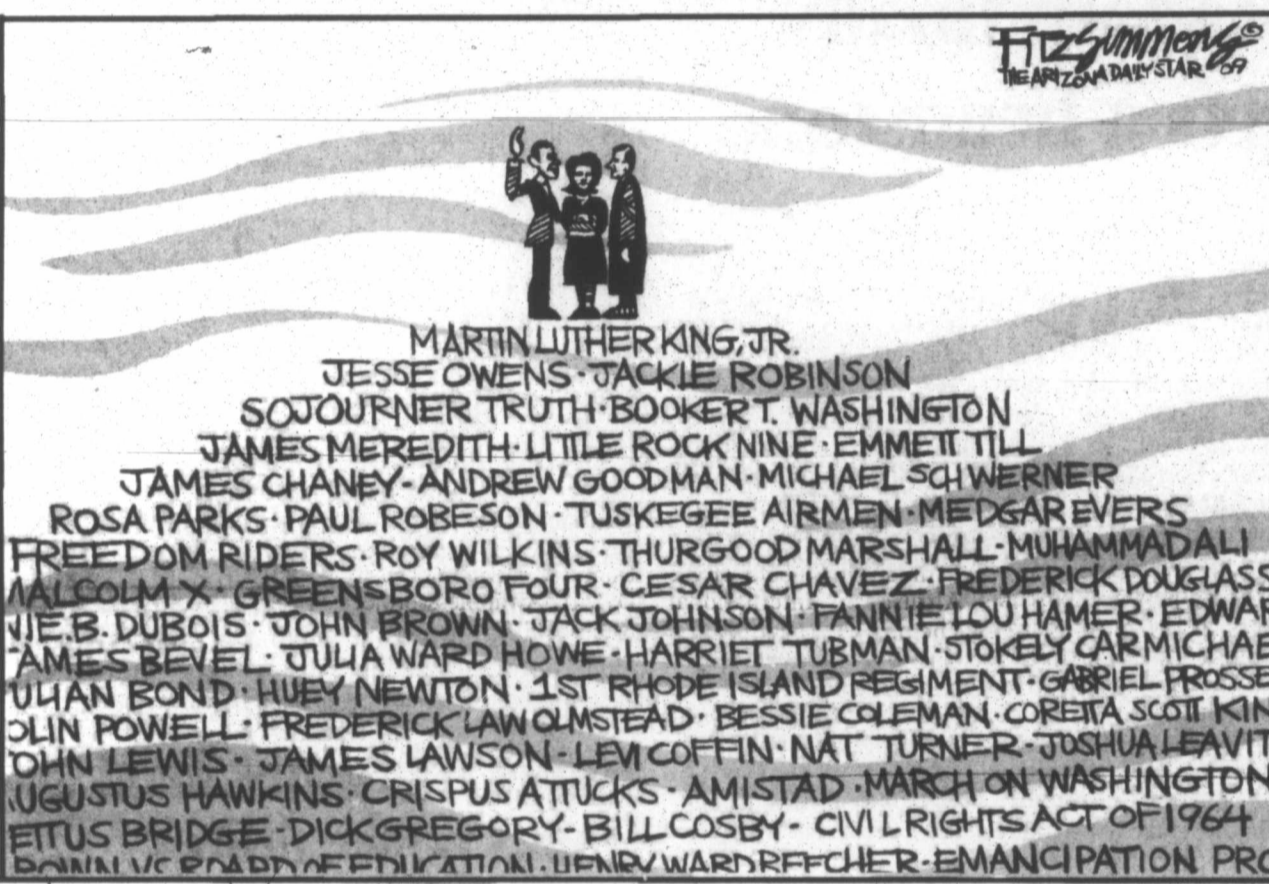

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Analysis: The Obama stimulus plan. What if they're wrong?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Barack Obama and his congressional allies are gambling that the largest public spending program since World War II and a new round of tax cuts will pry the economy from the recession's iron grip and avert another Depression.

But what if they're wrong? Some conservative economists say that additional stimulus may only prolong the grief at best, triggering runaway inflation down the road and resulting in an even more bloated federal bureaucracy.

"I think the economy will recover regardless of what Washington does. But the long-term effect here will be to reduce the standard of living of the next generation because they will be saddled with all this debt," said Chris Edwards of the libertarian-leaning Cato Institute.

Even without the new spending proposed by Obama, the U.S. has a \$1.2 trillion budget deficit this year, he noted. "If that isn't already enough of a Keynesian stimulus, what is?"

Early 20th-century British economist John Maynard Keynes argued that the government should intervene to avoid depressions by increasing its own spending and controlling interest rates. President Franklin D. Roosevelt based many of his New Deal spending initia-

tives on Keynesian theory. But not all economists and politicians subscribe to that world view.

While there is broad support for some kind of major stimulus, the skeptics offer this as Exhibit A: The trillions hurled at the problem last year by Congress, the Bush administration and the Federal Reserve have yet to yield many tangible results.

Unemployment continues to climb, reaching a 16-year high of 7.2 percent in December and is expected to keep on rising through 2009. U.S. manufacturing remains in a serious slump. The decline in consumer spending in late 2008 is expected to continue.

Home values keep eroding. For many people, loans are hard or impossible to obtain. Millions of retirement accounts have been slammed by sharp stock market losses. Financial collapses, bailouts, the rescue plans, foreclosures and profit reversals litter the landscape.

"What in September began as an emergency response to stabilize our financial markets has morphed before our very eyes into a string of taxpayer funded bailouts," said Rep. Spencer Bachus of Alabama, the senior Republican on the House Financial Services Committee. "Trillions of dollars in taxpayer backed guarantees and loans have been extended."

In short order last week,

Congress cleared the way for a new \$350 billion installment of bailout cash for the financial industry while House Democrats rolled out details of a \$825 billion two-year stimulus package incorporating most of Obama's priorities. About one-third of it would go to tax breaks, with the rest to government spending. The plan could reach \$1 trillion by the time Congress sends it to Obama's desk.

Allen Sinai, president of Decision Economics, a Boston-area financial consulting firm, said that even with Obama's aggressive spending program, the economy seems unlikely to show a true recovery this year in terms of sustainable gains by consumers and businesses.

"There are forces going on that are 1930s-like," Sinai said. "There is incredible asset deflation, a huge loss in wealth by households. In the '30s, even when funds became available from the financial system to borrow, the pessimism by consumers and businesses was so great that no one wanted to spend." Sinai wouldn't rule out a repeat of that mind-set.

Some economists who are not fans of Keynesian economics or stimulus packages argue that FDR's vaunted New Deal programs, highly touted today as a model for job creation, did little to spur a U.S. recovery.

"It was finally World War II that finally ended the Great

Depression," said Bruce Bartlett, a White House economist in the Reagan administration and a top Treasury official in the first Bush administration. Bartlett is author of a study showing that nearly all postwar stimulus packages passed by Congress came too late to be of much help, and just increased the deficit and fueled inflation.

Obama shrugs off expressions of skepticism and casts his stimulus package as the right formula for creating long-lasting, well-paying jobs, despite its big cost.

"It's not too late to change course — but only if we take dramatic action as soon as possible," Obama said in Ohio on Friday just days before taking office.

Mark Zandi, chief economist of Moody's Economy.com, said the economy could stabilize by year's end under a big stimulus package, government steps to reduce the number of foreclosures and continued monetary easing by the Fed.

"But many things could go wrong," Zandi added. "The financial system is still obviously under extreme pressure. It's not too hard to paint a dark picture. Global investors could panic and stop buying the bonds we issue and send interest rates higher. Oil prices could spike again for whatever reason. It's not hard at all to be pessimistic."

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Texas drought worsens, cattle dying

LUBBOCK, Texas
(AP)— Drought conditions in Texas are so bad cattle are keeling over in parched pastures and dying.

Drought conditions worsened significantly in the past week, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor map released Thursday. Seventy-one percent of the state is now in some stage of drought, up from 58.3 percent last week.

A week ago the two worst drought designations, extreme and exceptional, covered 9.1 percent

of the state. This week the two categories cover 15.1 percent of the state, with a circle near San Antonio and Austin widening in all directions. Only the eastern and southeastern parts of Texas are without any drought status.

It all results in death for dozens of cows in Bastrop, south of Austin. At Dr. Lee Davis' veterinarian clinic, up to 10 cows a week have been brought in for treatment over the past month. They fell in pastures from weakness due to lack of grazing forage, and most didn't survive, Davis said. "The problem is they're

not getting enough energy because the grass is dead," Davis said. "Everywhere you go there's no grass. It's nothing but dirt."

Once a cow falls, blood-flow to muscles is diminished and chances of survival go down with time.

"It's hard to bring back a cow after it's been down for a couple of days," Davis said.

Even when given supplemental feed, some animals are left weak.

Lack of rainfall this past fall and into 2009 has left pastures barren. Cattle producers are instead feeding animals hay.

But there is a shortage of protein in some hay because some hay producers don't pay the high cost of fertilizer, which aids in building protein. Fertilizer prices are tied to natural gas prices.

Rachel Bauer, Texas AgriLife Extension agent for Bastrop County and a part-time rancher, has lost seven cows in the past six weeks.

"There is no outlook for any rainfall coming," she said.

The cause is a La Nina weather pattern settling over the central Pacific Ocean, bringing with it the

likelihood of below normal rainfall and above normal temperatures.

Some cattle have gotten hurt trying to get water from drying stock ponds.

They seek out the ponds despite water troughs being set out, said Troy Tiner, who ranches in counties that include Bastrop, Travis, Fayette and Hays. He also puts out protein cubes to ensure his cattle get the proper nutrition.

"We keep them fed, but the killer is when they get stuck in mud holes," he said. "That's the biggest problem of everything."

Cattle producers are culling their animals and pulling cattle off pastures and arranging for supplemental feed. Those planting crops this time of year are waiting for moisture.

The state has been drying out for several months. In late October, 71.3 percent of the state had no drought designation.

The parched land will respond if Mother Nature comes through.

"It's just amazing what a little rain will do," Tiner said. "Just a little bit of rain."

Man charged with injuring four children with acid

GAINESVILLE, Texas (AP) — The boyfriend of a woman whose four kids were burned with sulfuric acid faces charges after his girlfriend told investigators he aimed to throw it on her but missed, authorities said Friday.

Tracy Lynn Escobedo, 27, has been charged with four counts of injury to a child, Cooke County Sheriff Michael Compton said. Escobedo was not yet in custody late Friday afternoon.

Authorities say the children's mother, Cynthia Darlene Stout, told them Escobedo tried throwing the substance on her during an argument in a pickup truck but splashed the kids instead.

The children, who range in age from a 14-year-old boy to an 18-month-old girl, remained hospitalized Friday but their conditions were not made public.

Stout, 43, remained in jail Friday on \$100,000 bond on a charge of child endangerment. Compton has said Stout was apprehended trying to leave without the three older children after they were

burned. A judge Friday granted Child Protective Services temporary custody of the children, who will be placed in foster care once they are released, agency spokes-

woman Marissa Gonzales said.

Compton said it's believed that Escobedo is the father of the 18-month-old.

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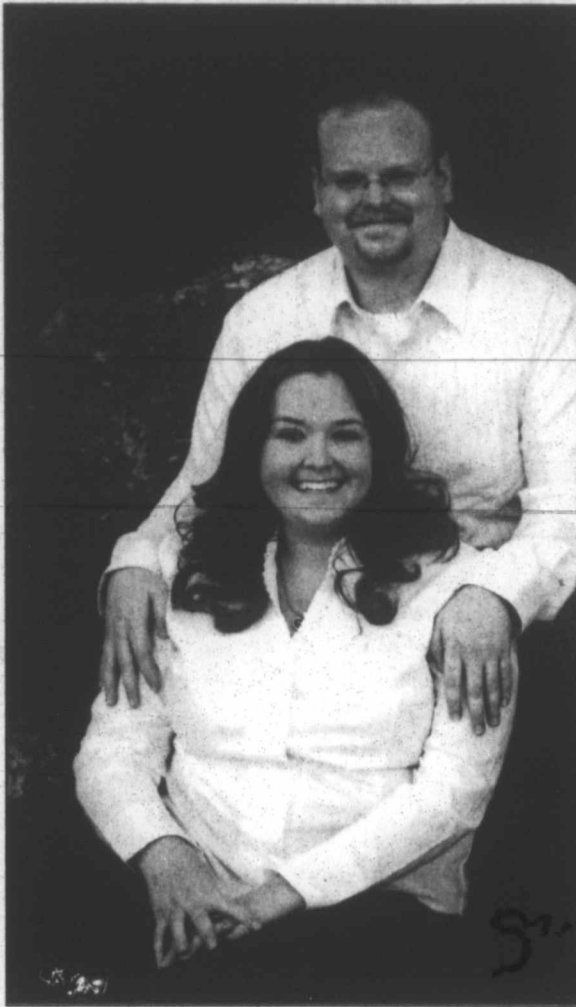

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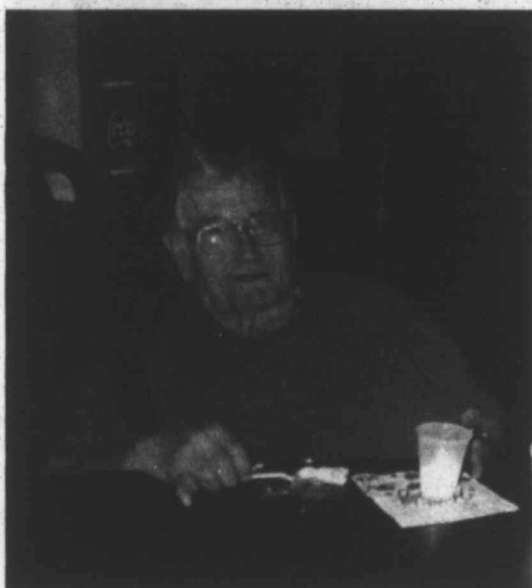

Painter Andrew Wyeth dies

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Artist Andrew Wyeth, who portrayed the hidden melancholy of the people and landscapes of Pennsylvania's Brandywine Valley and coastal Maine in works such as "Christina's World," died early Friday. He was 91.

Wyeth died in his sleep at his home in the Philadelphia suburb of Chadds Ford, according to Hillary Holland, a spokeswoman for the Brandywine River Museum.

The son of famed painter

and book illustrator N.C. Wyeth, Andrew Wyeth gained wealth, acclaim and tremendous popularity. But he chafed under criticism from some experts who regarded him as a facile realist, not an artist but merely an illustrator.

A Wyeth retrospective at the Philadelphia Museum of Art in 2006 drew more than 175,000 visitors in 15- Ω weeks, the highest-ever attendance at the museum for a living artist. The Brandywine River Museum in Chadds Ford, a converted 19th-century

grist mill, includes hundreds of works by three generations of Wyeths.

It was in Maine that Wyeth found the subject for "Christina's World," his best-known painting. And it was in Pennsylvania that he met Helga Testorf, a neighbor in his native Chadds Ford who became the subject of the intimate portraits that brought him millions of dollars and a wave of public attention in 1986.

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Eliminating freshman athletics wouldn't save money

Pampa Athletic Director Stuart Smith said there would be no cost savings to the school district by eliminating ninth grade athletics. Reporting to the Pampa Independent School District board of trustees Thursday night, Smith said eliminating freshman athletics would increase the number of athletes on junior varsity teams.

That, he explained, would lessen the time the coaches would have to spend working with the younger players.

Presently, Smith said, freshmen athletics meet during periods set aside for them during the school day so coaches can focus on them. Eliminating ninth grade athletics would increase the number of students in first and eighth

athletic periods and reduce the amount of attention coaches could give them in the weight room and in their sports.

"Head coaches would have little to no interaction with the freshmen athletes," Smith said.

With the freshman athletic program, coaches are able to focus on the needs of the ninth graders.

School board member Derrell DeLoach had requested the information with an eye toward reducing district costs.

Smith said freshmen athletics include football, basketball, softball and baseball.

"Combining these athletics with upper classes," Smith said, "there would be no cost savings."

The freshman sports, Smith said, are important in preparing athletes for varsity

sports. Without the freshman sports program, he said it would reduce the varsity's ability to compete. The freshman program is key to the district's athletic development.

Smith pointed out that study after study indicates that students involved in extracurricular activities achieve more academically.

The athletic director said his department goes to great lengths to accommodate students who want to play sports, but who are also in band and choir and school plays.

Of the 245 freshman students in the district, Smith said 120, or about 49 percent, participate in athletics.

That drops to 40 percent in grades 10 through 12.

He said 65 of the freshman students are boys and 55 are girls.

Smith said that maintaining a healthy ninth grade athletic program is critical in developing a cultural connection to the school and community.

School board member Mark McVay said he thinks freshman athletics come during important developmental years for students.

While participation in sports drops as students move through high school, Smith said his goal is to get 70 to 75 percent of the students throughout the district involved in athletics.

"Research shows that drop out rates are dramatically higher for students not involved in extra-curricular activities," Smith said.

Eliminating the ninth grade athletics program would also negatively impact the district's goal of becoming exemplary.

"I don't want us to not achieve excellence in any of our programs, particularly the sports program," DeLoach said.

DeLoach said the district will face some unpopular choices soon, but he agreed that eliminating freshmen athletics could be detrimental.

Athletics has had a no growth budget for the last seven years, Smith said.

Smith said the athletic department does not provide meals for any sub-var-

sity team unless it is traveling with the varsity team.

The freshman and junior varsity teams use last year's soft goods and supplies.

"Supply budgets have been cut to re-allocate fund into contracted services and travel," Smith said.

McVay said booster clubs have picked up the cost of many supplies.

Booster clubs make up more than \$10,000 a year in travel and meal costs just for the varsity, Smith said.

NBA fines Cuban \$25,000 for actions

NEW YORK (AP) — Mark Cuban is in trouble with the NBA again.

The league fined the Dallas Mavericks owner \$25,000 Friday for "improper interactions with Denver Nuggets players" at halftime and his conduct immediately following the Mavericks' 99-97 loss on Tuesday.

The penalty was the 14th the league has announced against Cuban, who has been penalized about \$1.5 million over the years and suspended from three games.

Cuban went onto the court at halftime to complain to J.R. Smith about an elbow he saw the Nuggets player throw at the Mavs' Antoine Wright. Denver coach George Karl criticized Cuban following the game, then again the next day at practice, for

coming onto the court and yelling at one of his players.

The league informed teams before the 2006-07 season that club personnel other than coaches was prevented from going into huddles or the floor — a ruling Cuban felt was aimed at him.

There was no action against Smith.

Cuban was then angered at the end after a disputed foul called on Jason Terry led to the go-ahead free throws by Chauncey Billups with 2.2 seconds left. The Mavericks felt that Billups created the contact.

A frequent critic of the officiating, Cuban was fined twice during the 2006 playoffs, including after Game 5 of the NBA finals, for his conduct.

Cowboys fire defensive coordinator Brian Stewart

IRVING, Texas (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys have fired defensive coordinator Brian Stewart after two seasons.

Stewart coached the San Diego Chargers' secondary for three seasons before following coach Wade Phillips to the Cowboys. Stewart also spent two seasons as a defensive assistant with the Houston Texans.

Though Stewart had the

title of defensive coordinator with the Cowboys, his actual responsibilities were unclear. Phillips, a former defensive coordinator, sometimes took over play-calling duties, and other times left it unclear who was making the defensive decisions.

The Cowboys gave up 22.8 points per game, which was 20th in the league.

Gilmer horse rescue group pleads for feed

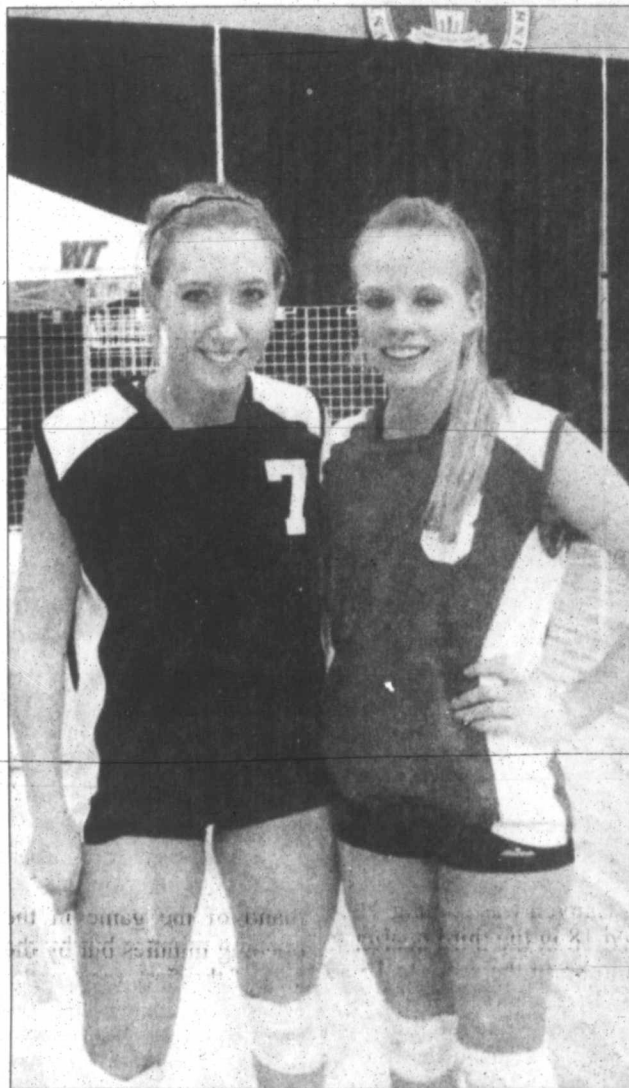
GILMER, Texas (AP) — Tough economic times can be hard on animals, too.

The deal includes Youkilis' last two years of arbitration eligibility and delays his chance to become a free agent by at least two years. Boston has a club option for 2013.

Youkilis holds the major league record of 238 straight games at first base without an error, a streak that ended last June.

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Houston sculptor preparing massive Obama bust

HOUSTON (AP) — As Barack Obama considers the pantheon of larger-than-life presidents who came before him, David Adickes pauses to consider Barack Obama.

The Houston sculptor carefully examines the president-elect's profile: his slightly furrowed brow, the firm mouth pursed somewhere between smile and frown, the expressive eyes. Adickes squints. Something is not quite right.

"Looking at him, I see that his ears have to go back about a quarter of an inch," Adickes says, then reaches to gently tweak the features on a life-size model of the president-elect's head.

The bust is the first step in plans for a replica of Obama's head to join dozens of other presidential busts the size of two-story buildings sitting behind a chain-link fence in the parking lot and camped in rows inside the vast studio space in an industrial part of Houston.

They are the faces of American history past and present. On the table, the unfolding countenance of the 44th president. In the lot outside, looming 18 to 20-feet tall, the supersized sculptures of Teddy Roosevelt, Ronald Reagan, Bill Clinton, Harry Truman, Andrew Jackson, Abraham Lincoln.

The enormous statues, created by Adickes using a painstaking technique of layered concrete and steel, will line a winding waterway at the planned Presidential Park and Gardens at Waterlights, an 18-acre mixed-use development in Pearland, a suburb just south of Houston.

Six statues — George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, John F. Kennedy, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Thomas Jefferson and George Herbert Walker Bush — are already in place at the site.

Soon, a Barack Obama statue — sculpted using the model resting on Adickes' studio table — will join them.

Adickes, who began fashioning the Obama piece last week, is pushing to finish the statue by Presidents' Day, Feb. 16. The enormous sculptures normally take two to three months to complete, but Adickes says he is being driven by the intense interest in the president-elect.

"The whole Obama thing, I've never seen anything like it," said Adickes, who has created two other Presidents' Parks (one in the Black Hills of South Dakota, another in Williamsburg, Virginia). Only the Houston-area park will feature an Obama statue.

The Obama piece also marks the first time Adickes has started a statue before the president depicted has been sworn in. His George W. Bush piece was produced just after the 43rd president's first inauguration day.

In contrast to the public fascination with Obama, "there was no interest in W," says Adickes, as he leads a visitor through the rows of presidential sculptures inside his studio. It is a surreal sight.

Adickes, a slight man who turns 82 the day before Obama is inaugurated, is dwarfed by his own creations. He walks past an oversized set of shoulders adorned by giant epaulets. They belong to Andrew Jackson. Another set of

shoulders featuring a finely detailed tie will be joined to FDR's head.

Adickes stops in front of the statue of "41" (George H.W. Bush) — the only president who has posed for the artist. The other pieces were conceived using photographs, paintings and historical depictions for inspiration.

For the Obama statue, Adickes is working from photographs of Obama pinned to an easel in front of the evolving model on his work table.

"I'm trying to make it recognizable, to fit everyone's idea of what he should look like," said Adickes, who is guided more by the spirit of his subject's personality than their historical legacy. "I did George W. before he got into trouble, and with Nixon, I already knew about his troubles, so I just have to make it look like them and let the viewer decide."

Adickes, a native of Huntsville, Texas, has built a reputation carving towering statues, including a 67-foot-tall rendering of Sam Houston, the president of the Republic of Texas. The giant statue has become an iconic symbol of the Lone Star State.

Another of Adickes' sculptures — a 36-foot-tall cellist — sits outside the Lyric Centre skyscraper in downtown Houston.

But Adickes' biggest undertakings — the creation of his Presidents' Parks — was motivated by a trip to Mount Rushmore. There, he says, he was disappointed that the famous faces were so far away and unapproachable. He wanted to build a place where visitors could get up close to the presidents and learn more about their historical accomplishments.

"I wanted people to be able to look them in the eye and be interactive with them," said Adickes.

For the developers of the Houston-area Presidential Gardens, the keen interest in Barack Obama and renewed curiosity about the office of the president could not be more well-timed. The attraction is set to open this September.

"We were hoping for something dramatic with the next president, but we could not have scripted something as dramatic as this," said David Goswick, executive director of Historic Real Estate, which is developing the project. "It sends chills down my spine to think about the importance and the timing of the Obama statue."

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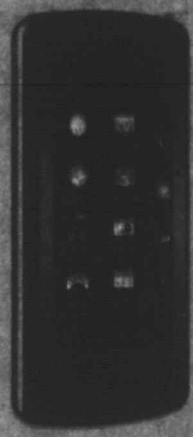

Don't worry if you aren't brave, or lucky, enough to attend the historic presidential inauguration.

There will be plenty of media coverage for those at home. Here's a guide to making the most of watching the big event, and those leading up to it:

THE THEME

"Renewing America's Promise." Full details on the history of inaugurations and this year's events can be found at the Inaugural committee's Web site, www.pic2009.org.

SATURDAY

CNN's Wolf Blitzer will follow President-elect Barack Obama's train ride from Pennsylvania to Washington. The train will stop in Wilmington, Delaware to pick up vice-president-elect Joe Biden and his family. Obama will give a speech in Baltimore before heading south.

SUNDAY

"We Are One: The Obama Inaugural Celebration at the Lincoln Memorial."

The free concert features top performers, such as Bruce Springsteen, Stevie Wonder and Garth Brooks. Obama and his family are due to attend, with Obama expected to speak. The special will air later that night on HBO at 7 p.m. Cable and satellite subscribers who don't have HBO will be able to watch for free.

MONDAY

The Disney Channel will air a concert honoring military families, "Kids' Inaugural: We Are the Future," expected to be hosted by Michelle Obama. Entertainers include the Jonas Brothers and Miley Cyrus.

During the day, Obama, Vice President-elect Joe Biden and their families, joined by Americans across the country, will participate in activities dedicated to serving others in community service activities.

THE BIG DAY

On Inauguration Day, if tradition holds, the Obamas will visit the White House in the morning before Bush and Obama ride to Capitol Hill together for the swearing-in ceremony.

Festivities begin at 10 a.m. and include musical selections. Aretha Franklin is slated to perform. An invocation, swearing-in of the president and vice-president, the inaugural address, a benediction and the playing of the national anthem, according to the Presidential Inaugural Committee Web site. Obama will be sworn in at noon. He will take the Oath of Office, using President Lincoln's Inaugural Bible, administered by Chief Justice John Roberts. Scheduled around noon.

Obama will then escort Bush to a departure ceremony and go to a luncheon in the Capitol's Statuary Hall.

THE DEPARTURE

Bush and his wife will leave the Capitol in a helicopter. Look for the wave.

THE INAUGURAL PARADE

Down Pennsylvania Avenue from the Capitol to the White House. The parade will begin after Obama's lunch.

THE WEATHER

The current Weather Service forecast is morning clouds giving way to afternoon sun with highs in the upper 30s and a 10 percent chance of precipitation.

THE BALLS

There are 10 official inaugural balls. The Obamas are expected to attend all of them.

THE TELEVISION COVERAGE

Expect coverage all day Tuesday on the major networks.

At night, many are planning specials, including: NBC's Brian Williams will anchor a one-hour special at 10 p.m. that visits several inaugural balls. ABC will be on site at the "Neighborhood Inaugural Ball," covering musical performances and the new president and first lady's first dance of the night. At 10 p.m. EST, ABC will track the other inaugural balls.

CBS' Katie Couric will anchor a 9 p.m. EST special on Obama's journey to the White House, then do a live Webcast reviewing the day's events on CBSNews.com and CNET.com.

TV One is reporting from the scenes of Obama's inaugural balls from 10 p.m. EST to midnight.

MTV will be broadcasting from the "Youth Inaugural Ball."

Nick Cannon hosts "Yes We Will!: BET's Inauguration Celebration." The one-hour special that was taped earlier premieres at 8 p.m. and includes live shots from BET's first inaugural ball.

On Fox News Channel, the inauguration will be the first big political event in years not anchored by Brit Hume, who has taken on a part-time role. Chris Wallace and Shepard Smith will be the main anchors, with Hume replacement Bret Baier getting both morning and evening duty.

WEDNESDAY

The president, vice president and their families will participate in a prayer service at the Washington National Cathedral.

NAMES TO KNOW

Bishop V. Gene Robinson: The first openly gay Episcopal bishop. He will say a prayer at the welcome event on Sunday.

The Rev. Rick Warren: His selection to give the invocation on Inauguration Day sparked protests from the gay community and even the National Organization for Women. Warren backed a recent ballot measure banning same-sex marriage in his home state of California. Obama has said his selection reflected a desire for diversity at the event and insisted he remained a "fierce advocate" of equal rights for gays.

Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-California: Feinstein is the incoming chairwoman of the Senate Intelligence Committee. She is the first woman to hold the post. She has served in the Senate since 1992. She will do the call to order and welcoming remarks on Inauguration Day.

John G. Roberts Jr.: Chief Justice of the Supreme Court who will administer the oath to Obama.

John Paul Stevens: Supreme Court Justice who will administer the oath to Biden.

The Rev. Sharon Watkins: Pastor of a Protestant denomination with about 700,000 members in the United

States and Canada. She will deliver the sermon at the National Prayer Service on Wednesday that caps the inauguration activities. Watkins will be the first woman to give the sermon at the traditional event.

Elizabeth Alexander: A professor of African-American Studies and English literature at Yale and the author of four books of poems. She is America's fourth inaugural poet. She will read an original poem at the inauguration.

The Rev. Joseph E. Lowery: A black Methodist civil rights leader. He will give the benediction on Inauguration Day.

PAY ATTENTION TO

The crowd size: The number has been as high as 5 million. Estimates have since been scaled down to 2 million. Still more than the 400,000 who attended the 2005 inauguration of President Bush.

The inaugural address: Obama's speech probably won't come near the length of William Henry Harrison, who spoke for about an hour, 45 minutes. (He caught a cold and one month later he died of pneumonia.) Watch to see what he says and how he says it. Top inaugural speeches include John F. Kennedy, Abraham Lincoln and Franklin Delano Roosevelt.

The crowd reaction: Bush navigated the largest inaugural protests since Richard Nixon in his 2001 inauguration. Most were upset about the Florida election controversy. Four years later, thousands of people in dozens of cities across the nation protested, motivated by the war in Iraq.

"I can't imagine demonstrations this time," said Robert E. Gilbert, professor of political science at Northeastern University. "Bush was a very unpopular president and the

polls show it."

The trip from the Capitol to the White House: Jimmy Carter was the first president to walk all the way from the Capitol to the White House after the ceremony. What will Obama do? What will the Secret Service allow him to do? asks Gilbert.

Michelle Obama: Whether she wears a full-on ballgown or a sparse sheath, which seems to be her favorite silhouette, it's sure to influence what the rest of us will wear. She's the darling of the fashion world right now and the color, style and designer she chooses will probably enjoy a surge of popularity.

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HOLLYWOOD ON THE POTOMAC: WHERE THE STARS WILL BE

NEW YORK (AP) — If you thought the Golden Globes was a party, just wait until you see Barack Obama's inauguration. Next week, Washington will look a lot like a colder version of Hollywood.

Here's a roundup of who will be where, keeping in mind that in the mad rush to D.C., schedule changes may occur.

THE BIG SHOW — On Sunday, tradition will be upheld with a free star-

Jesse Jackson Jr., Cornel West and Henry Louis Gates. Lee will also host an after-party Tuesday evening.

OTHER CONCERTS — BET will hold an awards ceremony, the BET Honors, Saturday at the Warner Theater to honor Mary J. Blige, filmmaker Tyler Perry, Earvin "Magic" Johnson and others. Gabrielle Union will host and performers include Queen Latifah, Ne-Yo, Anita Baker and Joss Stone.

The Hip-hop Caucus will host a concert Saturday at Ibiza with Common, Blige and Nelly.

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Obama-mania offers armloads of books for kids

Books to inspire and inform young people about President-elect Barack Obama and his historic inauguration include an artist's celebration of the American spirit, the life of the first lady to be and a look at our 44th commander in chief for preschoolers.

Obama-mania has generated junior biographies and fresh presidential encyclopedias by the armload in time for the big swearing-in Tuesday, but parents beware: Splashy Obama covers or promised post-election updates may not pay off, so check inside.

In addition to the pre-inaugural fare, look for a comic book biography of Michelle Obama in April from Bluewater Productions. She's the latest to join the company's "Female Force" series with Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin and Hillary Rodham Clinton. Bluewater, based in Bellingham, Wash., plans to add Caroline Kennedy in June.

With a little help from a grown-up, there's "my first presidential board book" from Michaelson Entertainment in Santa Monica, Calif., "Barack Obama 101" by Brad M. Epstein (\$10.95). It includes full-color photos of the smiling first family, Obama grinning at the wheel of a bumper car with daughter Sasha and Obama the boy, college guy and community organizer.

There's even a photo spread on the presidential wheels, Air Force One, the helicopter Marine One and the sleek black limos of many a motorcade to come. Little Obama watchers can trace where he's lived on a world map, slip their own photos into a frame as possible presidential contenders of the future and make a list of their heroes.

Other standouts:

— "Yes We Can!" (Scholastic, \$4.99, ages 4-8) with numerous photo credits.

This quick and simple picture book companion to the biography of the same name pairs colorful news photos of Obama, his family and young supporters with text from his victory speech. The borderless images and his plea for help are a powerful match for kids.

— "Don't Know Much About the Presidents" (HarperCollins, \$6.99, ages 6-9) by Kenneth C. Davis.

In Q-and-A format, this update appeals with kid-friendly facts: While Obama is about 6-feet-3, another famous lanky lawyer from Illinois (Abraham Lincoln) remains the tallest president at 6-4. Is Obama the youngest president at 47? Nope. Theodore Roosevelt was 42 when he took over after McKinley's assassination and Presidents Ulysses S. Grant, John F. Kennedy and Bill Clinton were all younger than Obama when elected.

— "Change Has Come" (Simon & Schuster, \$12.99, 9-12) illustrated by Kadir Nelson with the words of Obama.

Kadir captures Obama's messages of community, hope and change in black-and-white drawings in this small celebration of the American spirit for young people. Spontaneously drawn portraits of the president, everyday voters and Martin Luther King Jr. on the march reinforce Obama's message: "What began as a whisper has now swelled to a chorus that cannot be ignored."

— "Barack Obama, People We Should Know" (Gareth Stevens Publishing, ages 9-12) by Geoffrey M. Horn.

Out in paperback this month, this slim volume from Weekly Reader offers the victorious highs but also details the tough stuff from Obama's childhood and young adult years: his mother's marital and financial struggles, his early election defeats and the bad impression he left on Michelle Obama when he was late for their first date. Latest in the "People We Should Know" series.

— "Barack Obama, Our 44th President" (Simon & Schuster, \$5.99, ages 9-12) By Beatrice Gormley.

Among the better biographies for young people recently updated with Obama's victory. Gormley describes the "Guess Who Coming to Dinner" moment when Barack's white American mother brought home his black Kenyan father to meet her parents for the first time. At Occidental College in well-to-do suburban Los Angeles, Obama transforms from Barry to Barack and his interest in politics surfaces out of the anti-apartheid movement on campus.

— "Michelle Obama, Meet the First Lady" (HarperCollins, \$16.99, ages 8-12) by David Bergen Brophy.

Drawing strength from the struggles of her disabled father and hard-working mother on Chicago's South Side, Michelle Obama's life away from home as a student at predominantly white Princeton is described with a steady hand, as is her first look at her husband-to-be in "bad sport jacket and a cigarette dangling from his mouth." Brophy relies nicely on the soon-to-be first lady's own words.

— "Michelle Obama, An American Story" (Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, \$6.99, ages 8-12) by David Colbert.

Feels a bit like an instant but includes 16 pages of color photos and fun facts for kids: She was the first lawyer to Barney the dinosaur. When she first met Obama, she tried to set him up on dates with her friends. One of her favorite toys as a girl was her Easy-Bake oven. She was athletic growing up but shied away from sports so as not to compete with her star athlete of a big brother.

DPS seeks new tips in mansion fire case

AUSTIN (AP) — As construction and fundraising to repair the fire-damaged Texas Governor's Mansion continue, an investigation into who started the blaze more than half a year ago drags on with no arrest despite \$50,000 in reward money.

So the Texas Department of Public Safety, whose Texas Rangers are leading the arson investigation, is making another plea for members of the public to come forward with any useful tips.

"We are continuing to pursue leads but there's been nothing fruitful thus far," DPS spokeswoman Tela Mange said in an interview about the mansion arson case this week. "It just takes one good piece of information to turn it

around, and the question is when we're going to get that."

Though few solid leads are coming in, there are no plans to increase the \$50,000 reward money that has been in place since last summer shortly after the June 8 fire, Mange said. She said there is no reason to believe someone close to the arsonist would turn that person in for an additional amount of cash.

Arson investigators are asking that anyone with information about the crime call DPS or the Crimestoppers tip line at 1-800-252-TIPS. Mange said anyone who was near the Governor's Mansion at the time of the fire or who may have had conversations later that produced information about it should call in.

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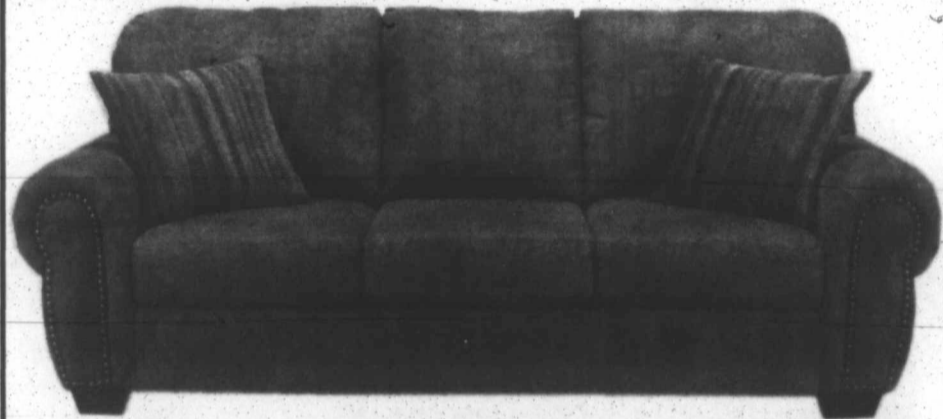

Dear Abby...

DEAR MOM: There is, but it will require you and your husband to become proactive. Tell your parents that you do not have enough room to accommodate their generosity and request that they limit themselves to one gift per couple. To avoid duplication, ask them to coordinate with each other when buying gifts for their grandchild.

As to your parents, explain that you love them, but once a gift is given it is the recipient's to do with as she wishes (right now, that's you). And explain that if you give everyone else's gifts away and not some of theirs, the others will be offended -- so it's not gonna happen. Period.

DEAR ABBY: My 15-year-old daughter, "Miranda," and I have always been close. We have talked about sex and about how it's
