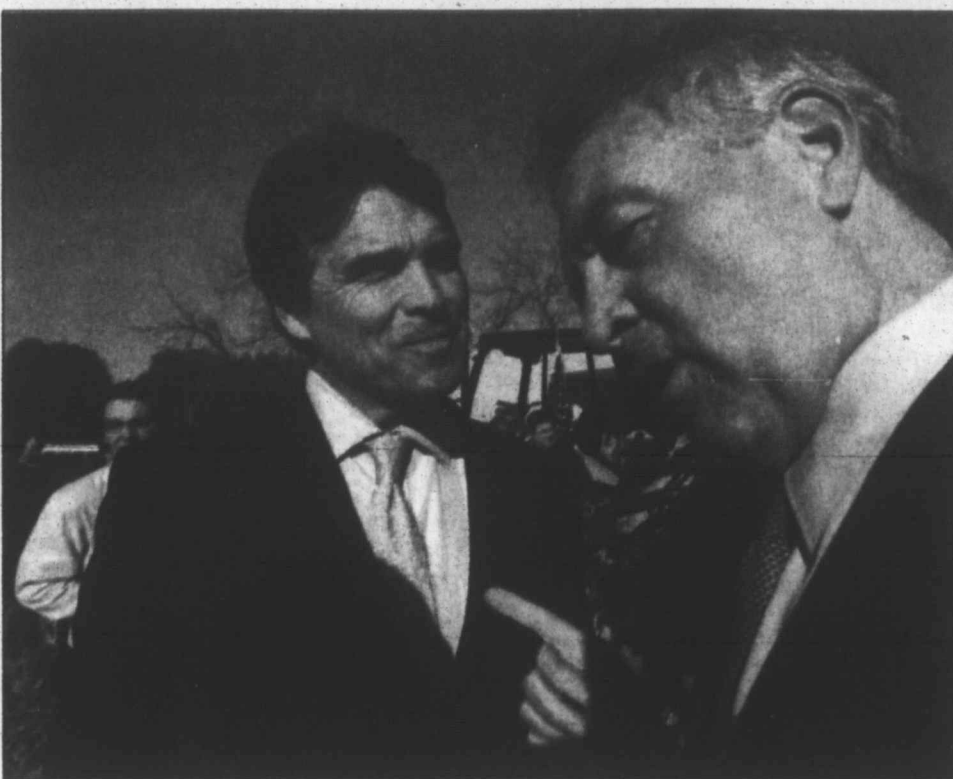

Governor: Replenish state's job-creating Enterprise fund

SEGUIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry heralded the 1,400 new Caterpillar Inc. jobs soon coming to the state and said Wednesday the company's expansion here shows why the Legislature should replenish the job-creating Texas

Enterprise Fund. Caterpillar is receiving \$10 million from the fund for its Texas expansion. Perry oversees the fund along with the

Boards disagree on aquifer's 'desired future condition'

WHITE DEER — The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District board indicated it may join three other groundwater districts in a proposed desired future condition for the Ogallala Aquifer, but it may be a matter of agreeing to disagree.

The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, the North Plains Groundwater Conservation District and the Hemphill County Underground Water Conservation District form Groundwater Management Area 1, which covers the Texas Panhandle from about Amarillo north.

Like other Groundwater Management Areas across the state, GMA1 is required to submit a desired future condition for aquifers in their area to the Texas Water Development Board in 2010.

Groundwater Management Areas were initially established by the state in an effort to get new groundwater conservation districts down state to cooperate. Few thought

there would be any controversy among the three oldest groundwater conservation districts in Texas, High Plains, Panhandle and North Plains, but disagreements have arisen.

The disagreement is one of extremes, according to C.E. Williams, the general manager of the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District, of which Gray County is a part.

The Dumas-based North Plains Groundwater Conservation District wants to have a goal of 40 percent of the water stored in the aquifer in 50 years for four of its eight counties. Those counties would be Dallam, Sherman, Hartley and Moore Counties, areas of highly irrigated farmland. The other four counties of the North Plains district, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Hansford and part of Hutchinson Counties would have a 50 to 60 percent goal.

At the other end of the spectrum, Canadian-based Hemphill County Underground Water Conservation District wants a goal of 90 percent of the water in storage at the end of 50 years. Hemphill County, a rela-

Attorney has roots in local area, local culture

Steve N. Hall could easily be called a man who wears many hats, including bilingual speaker, traveler, rancher, and most recently, attorney at law.

Hall opened his doors for the first time as an attorney on Monday (Jan. 19) but he is not new to Pampa, just the business. Hall is one of many who could be called a Pampan since moving to Pampa in 1958 when he was seven years old. Since that time, Hall graduated from Pampa High School in 1970 and has a wife that taught there and has a daughter who also graduated from there.

Hall has been through many challenges since that time, including overcoming serious health obstacles, but his greatest triumph was in passing the bar exam in November.

"It was the most difficult thing I have done in life" Hall said about his completion of law school and the exam.

Hall's journey to taking the bar could be termed unconventional. When hall graduated from PHS 1970 he immediately went to college, not for the sake of education, but for the hope to avoid the existing draft from the Vietnam War. And, true to form, when the draft was over, so was his desire

to remain in college as he "never really was fond of school," Hall said.

Without much of a choice, Hall was enlisted into his father's ranching business, a ranch that still functions and is between Gray County and Wheeler county. Although the ranching business wasn't quite his ultimate ambition, it was the doorway he needed to get to where he is at now, licensed attorney with intention to help with communication barriers and immigration issues in Gray County.

"I hope to be an asset in the community," Hall said. Mostly, Hall feels he will serve Gray County and Pampa in ways that other attorneys cannot with his ability to speak Spanish. "I want to do my part to make this a better place."

Hall was sworn into office on Dec. 31 with other county officials in the 223rd District Court by Judge Lee Waters, the very man with whom he attended PHS some years ago.

As a rancher for 25 years in the panhandle, Hall became fluent in Spanish by communicating with his Hispanic employees. The more Hall learned through his employees, the more he became interested in the language and the culture, which was the seed of his desire to use this knowledge in law, a "life-long ambition," he

said. "The Hispanic culture fascinates me," Hall said. "They have an incredible emphasis on family values... I'm just as interested in their culture as I am in ours."

Hall said he learned to speak a "Tex-Mex" dialect of Spanish, which needed to be refined through formal education and some time spent in Mexico. He

went to the Clarendon College campus in Pampa and West Texas A&M in Amarillo for his undergraduate work, where he received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Spanish in 2004. Hall and his daughter Sarah actually were studying in college at the same time.

lieutenant governor and Texas House speaker. The account is used to close deals with companies considering relocating to or adding jobs in the state.

Caterpillar, which already has an operation in Seguin, will generate nearly \$170 million in capital investment with its new facility, the governor's office said.

Perry's office has said he is seeking another

\$260 million for the enterprise fund over the coming two-year state budget cycle. Perry said he will formally unveil his proposed state budget on Tuesday, including his plan for the enterprise fund.

"It's hard to argue that it's not working," Perry said after a ceremonial groundbreaking for the new plant in Seguin. "I can assure you the Legislature understands the importance of that

tool." Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, also attending the event, said there's even more interest in supplying the emerging technology fund, used to spur cutting-edge businesses ventures in the state.

Job creation is a cornerstone of Perry's administration and already is a platform for his 2010 run for re-election. He is seeking a third full term. U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, a fel-

low Republican, also plans to run for governor.

Caterpillar previously announced it is consolidating and relocating its assembly, paint and testing operations from Illinois and South Carolina to Seguin. Around the same time, the company announced layoffs at a plant in Illinois, the state where Caterpillar is based.

"Although there's tight financial times, companies still are coming to

Texas. We're still creating jobs here," Perry said.

The state's December unemployment figures are due to be released Friday. The latest figures available, for November, show that the state added 7,300 non-agricultural jobs in the month but that the unemployment rate had increased from 5.6 percent to 5.7 percent statewide in a month. For the same month in 2007, the statewide unemployment rate was 4.2 per-

cent. From January through November of 2008, the state added jobs in every month but September.

The enterprise fund was created in 2003 with \$295 million allocated by the Republican-controlled Legislature. Lawmakers added another \$182 million in 2005 and \$200 million in 2007. The Legislature began its 2009 session Jan. 13 and will approve a new budget for the next two years.

tively new single county district, is mostly rangeland with little irrigation.

Sitting in the middle, White Deer-based Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District has what they have adopted a goal of having 50 percent of the water in storage at the end of 50 years.

Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District, which includes all or part of Gray, Roberts, Hutchinson, Potter, Armstrong,

Carson, Donley and Wheeler Counties, has a mixture of uses. There is some irrigation in several counties, but other counties are rolling rangeland.

The Lubbock-based High Plains Underground Water Conservation District has signed on to the 50-50 goal, but they are involved in only a small part of the Groundwater Management Area. Most of their district lies in the Groundwater Management Area to the south.

While the rules requiring the desired future condition of the aquifers in the state are vague, water officials worry that failing to reach a consensus across a Groundwater Management Area may invite state control rather than local control.

Williams told the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District at their meeting here Wednesday, that he thinks the North Plains proposal doesn't go far enough to conserve water while the Hemphill

County is too restrictive and may invite lawsuits from landowners wishing to sell water rights to water marketers. Mesa Water, Inc., for example holds about 12,000 acres of water rights in Hemphill County. Mesa Water was formed to sell water from the Texas Panhandle to urban areas down state.

Gray County farmer and PGWCD board member Charles Bowers said those decisions will have to be made by those districts. A strong supporter of local

control, Bowers suggested approving the proposed desired future condition as approved by GMA1 board members in their December meeting, but attaching a letter to the PGWCD approval noting the district's concerns.

The PGWCD board deferred taking action on the proposal until a Texas Water Development Board computer model could be run to determine whether the Hemphill County goal is feasible with the adjoining counties having a 50

percent goal. That model is supposed to be completed in February.

The next PGWCD board meeting is scheduled for Feb. 18.

The next GMA1 meeting is scheduled for later in February, according to Kyle Ingham, local government service director for the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, which coordinates the GMA1 meetings.

Testimony begins on science standards, evolution

AUSTIN (AP) — The State Board of Education got an earful Wednesday from experts and activists concerned about the way evolution is taught in public schools.

Dozens of people, including a six-member expert review panel, lined up to testify as the board considers new science curriculum standards that

will be in place for the next decade. The standards adopted also will dictate how publishers handle the topic in textbooks.

The crowd — as well as the review panel — was sharply split on the proposal to drop language in the current curriculum that requires teachers to address "strengths and weaknesses" of scientific theory.

Critics say the wording

has been used to undermine the theory of evolution.

"In science education, 'weaknesses' has become a code word in the culture wars to attack evolution and promote creationism," said Kathy Miller, president of the watchdog group Texas Freedom Network. "If it weren't, we wouldn't see this crusade by some of the board members and outside pressure groups to keep this single word in the science standards."

Critics of dropping the weaknesses mandate

blame "left-wing ideology," for trying to stifle free speech. The review panel, which was appointed by the education board, has suggested putting similar language back in.

"The board is being asked to choose between free and open scientific inquiry and censorship," said Jonathan Saenz, a lobbyist for the Free Market Foundation. "That's an easy choice."

A tentative vote is expected later this week, but the board is not expected to make a final decision on the curricu-

lum proposal until March. Much of Wednesday's testimony focused on the scientific evidence of evolution.

"I hope you understand now that there are good reasons to think that yes, evolution has weaknesses that reasonable people can see, that yes, those weaknesses do really influence the theory," said Ralph Seelke, a biology professor at the University of Wisconsin-Superior, who served on the review panel.

Eugenie Scott, execu-

California-based National Center for Science Education, said the proposal to drop the inclusion of weaknesses is a "superior critical thinking standard."

"Abandoning the inaccurate strengths and weaknesses language does not encourage the singling out of evolution for special treatment," Scott said.

A majority of members have said they are in favor of retaining the current mandate to cover both strengths and weaknesses of major scientific theories.

Texas jobless fund to face \$447M deficit

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas is projected to have a \$447 million shortfall in its unemployment compensation trust fund on Oct. 1 following the temporary suspension of the unemployment replenishment tax at the behest of Gov. Rick Perry, according to officials.

The unemployment fund, which pays jobless claims, was flush with \$90 million in savings nearly a year ago when Perry temporarily halted the replenishment tax, one part of the unemployment insurance tax.

The suspended tax was reinstated this month, but officials said it won't be enough to cover the shortfall between the \$414 million the state expects to be in the fund Oct. 1 and the \$861 million it's supposed

to have. Meanwhile, jobless claims have skyrocketed because people are having a hard time finding jobs.

Perry spokeswoman Allison Castle said the governor stands by his decision: "At the time, the fund had excessive balance and the right thing to do was to return that to the taxpayers," according to an online story Thursday for the Houston Chronicle and the San Antonio-Express News.

Ed Sills of the Texas AFL-CIO said of Perry's action: "I think what this goes to show is that the unemployment insurance system shouldn't be politicized."

By law, the fund must keep an amount equal to 1 percent of all taxable wages in Texas.

As a result of the deficit, the Texas Workforce Commission must consider raising the tax, review issuing bonds to meet the shortfall or wait to see if the state could use an interest-free federal loan, said commission Chairman Tom Pauken, a Perry appointee who took office after the tax was suspended by the commission last year.

Pauken said jobless claims will be paid, and that last year's suspension of the tax didn't cause the problem.

"We will have the money to pay for the claims," Pauken said. "Here would be my concern: You don't want to raise taxes substantially on employers at a time when it's really tough to keep the doors open and keep people employed."

If the October shortfall

occurs as officials expect, bonds could be issued in 2010. The commission could raise the unemployment replenishment tax rate this year or wait until next year to levy a so-called deficit assessment on employers.

Last March, Perry directed the state to "bring that (replenishment) tax to a screeching halt for this year" when the fund stood at \$1.6 billion. By the end of 2008, the trust fund balance had fallen to \$1.3 billion, Pauken said.

There were 133,000 unemployment compensation claims — including initial and continuing claims — as of Jan. 12, 2008. Not quite a year later, as of this Jan. 3, the total was 218,000, Pauken said.

Washington, DC - The weather was cold but clear. As I looked out into the crowd, searching for a familiar Texas face, I worried whether those who had traveled from our area to Washington were prepared for the cold and the crowds. Tight security and long lines were everywhere amid a sea of people that was the largest crowd ever gathered on our national mall.

But there is something about inaugurations and new beginnings that causes us to forget our discomforts and frustrations and to remember how fortunate we are to be Americans. The long campaign seemed far in the past. Next week differences over what to do about the economy will take center stage. At least for this day, though, we can marvel at the greatness of our democracy and the smooth transition from one administration to another. And we can all hope that the new President will navigate the nation successfully through the challenges ahead.

The challenges are daunting, starting with the economy. Nearly every-

one agrees that some sort of action is needed to help spur economic growth, but there is considerable doubt about a single bill that borrows and spends close to a trillion dollars on a laundry list of programs. The new President and the Congress should remember that part of a doctor's oath that says "first, do no harm."

Beyond the economy, there were many promises made in the campaign about health care, education, and energy. Now President Obama says he is also going to tackle entitlement reform, acknowledging that we are eight short years away from not collecting enough money in Social Security taxes to pay the benefits that older Americans are expecting. Solving this problem, like many others, will require maturity and thoughtfulness with an eye toward the longer view and what we will leave our children and grandchildren.

On the national security front, terrorists have not let up in their plotting against us, yet there are those who will push the new President to give up some of the tools that have prevented a successful attack

on American soil since 2001. He will be tested by those demanding an immediate withdrawal from Iraq, regardless of whether it undermines the hard-won gains there, as well as by the escalating violence in Afghanistan. The tense situation between Pakistan and India, a newly assertive Russia, the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and the North Korean and Iranian nuclear programs all present tremendous challenges.

Of course, there will be unexpected problems and crises that arise. To deal with all of these issues will require the new President's best -- and the best from all the rest of us, too.

Throughout the campaign, President Obama promised to set a new tone in our national political debates, and in his Inaugural Address, he referenced the Bible saying that "the time has come to set aside childish things." Amen. To do so, he must lead us in that direction, and the rest of us must agree when we can and disagree respectfully when necessary.

But with all of the policy challenges and the



debates ahead, the thing that sticks out in my mind is the people. Several hundred people traveled from northern Texas to Washington, D.C. to be a part of this historic event. I got to talk with many of them. Their excitement and hopefulness were infectious. They believe America is the greatest nation on earth, but it can be even greater. So do I.

And as presidents come and go, I am reminded, once again, that the strength of America lies not in its government but in its people -- those who go to work each day, who raise their families, and who hope -- hope for an even better America.

Austin American-Statesman on high school steroids testing:

Along with voter fraud, another nonexistent problem the state Legislature has focused time and money on is steroid use by high school athletes. Texas spent \$6 million to discover that few high school athletes abuse steroids, drugs that build muscles and enhance athletic performance.

After more than 10,000 student athletes around the state had been tested for steroid use, only four came up positive. There were a handful of ambiguous results and refusals, but the outcome was far less than predicted.

When the testing, pushed by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, was approved by the Legislature in 2007, it was thought that 1 percent would test positive. That would be 100 student athletes testing positive in the first round of tests, not the four that actually were found to have used steroids.

Texas has the largest steroid testing program in the country, and it's expensive, costing about \$122 per test. Surely there is a better use for that money in our schools.

Lawmakers should abandon or severely cut back on this expensive program. Even Gov. Rick Perry, who signed the bill into law, says the testing proves Texas doesn't have a serious steroid problem in its high schools and the project should be adjusted.

Texas pays the National Center for Drug Free Sport to criss-cross the state testing high school athletes in 12 different sports for steroid use. Athletes were tested at 195 schools, with football players (3,380) and girl volleyball players (835) tested the most.

It isn't just the results from Texas that show steroids aren't a serious problem in high school sports. Other states that have testing procedures or have done pilot testing programs came to the same conclusion. Florida aban-

doned its \$100,000 testing program after finding only one student using steroids among the 600 tested.

Texas has more than 750,000 high school students playing sports each year, and to continue the testing is money spent unwisely. It makes more sense to test student athletes who show signs of steroid abuse than random testing of kids running cross country and playing team tennis.

The millions spent on steroid testing could be put

to better use helping teens stay away from alcohol and recreational drugs, which are far more prevalent in Texas high schools and ruin far more lives than steroids.

Legislators are facing a \$9 billion revenue drop over the next couple of years and are looking for places to save millions of dollars. The steroid testing program is an easy place to start cutting costs.

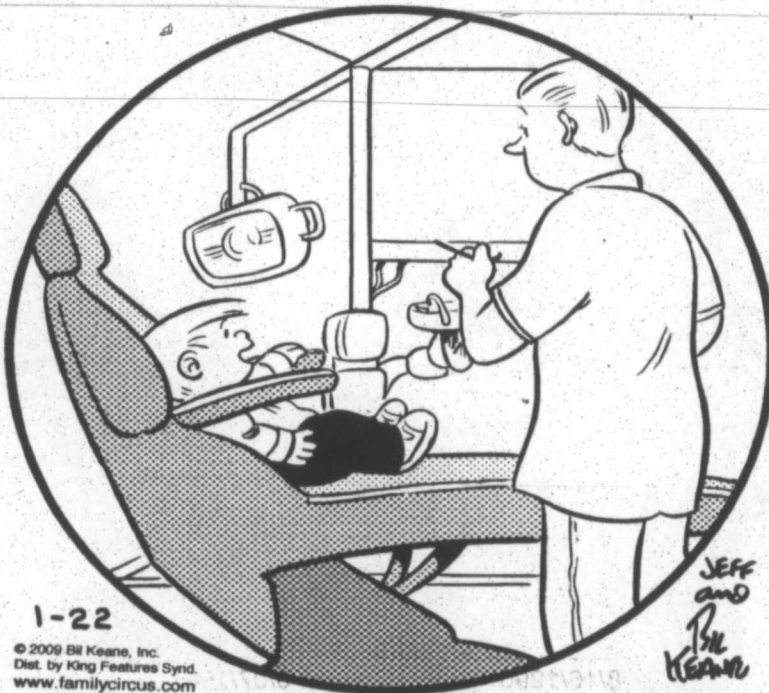

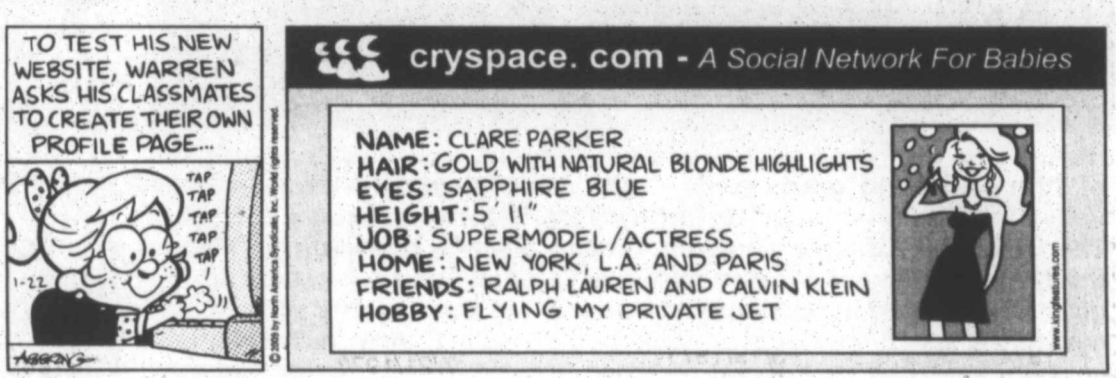

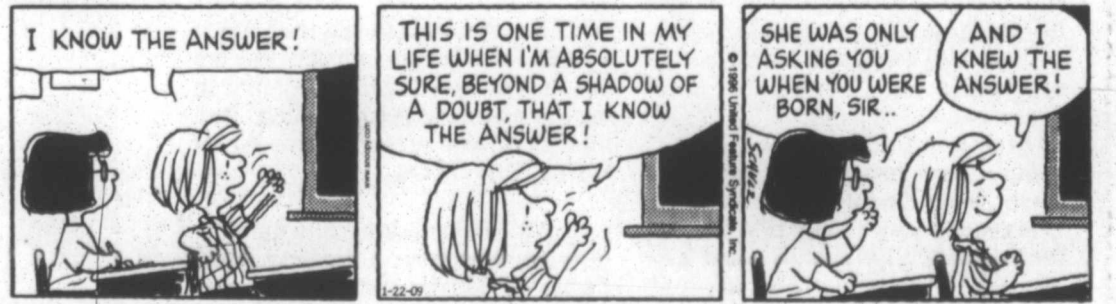

Records fall when Pampa boys swim

On January 16-17, thirteen of your Swimming Harvesters traveled to Lubbock for a fierce competition with 4A and 5A teams from around West Texas. The Pete Ragus Aquatic Center was the venue for the Lubbock Invitational 2009 in which only qualifiers were invited to compete.

Harvester seniors Cole Guyer, Dustin Neef and Colby Dennis and junior Kelly Stoffle advanced to the final races on Saturday.

Senior Abby West won an alternate spot in the 100 breaststroke. The girls 200 medley relay team of Abby West, sophomore Jessica Gutierrez and freshmen Kendle Ramey and Jessica Covil also secured an alternate spot; as did the boys 200 medley relay team of juniors Ethan Addy and Christian Hinkle and sophomores Cody Hudson and Jaden Payne. In addition, senior Ana Saucedo and freshman Spencer Estes qualified for the meet.

Pampa boys impressed the crowd with a sixth place win in a field of twenty six teams by scoring points with only four swimmers, as opposed to the nine to twelve competitors on the larger 5A teams.

More impressive yet were the number of school records shattered by these four swimmers.

After three years of hard work, Neef's goal of breaking the Pampa record for the

50 freestyle was realized with a time of 22.68 beating Bobby Venal's old record of 23.29. This time earned Neef a third place finish overall.

Stoffle brought home a second place finish in the 100 butterfly, narrowly missing setting a new school record in that race. Dennis' fifth place finish in the 100 freestyle was just six hundredths of a second away from the school record at 51.48. Guyer also was a fraction of a second away from the record in the 100 backstroke with a time of 59.87.

These four swimmers make up a very strong freestyle relay team that broke a school record on January 10 in the 200 free relay. On Friday, during preliminaries, they broke this record again with a new time of 1:32.88, nearly five seconds faster than the old record. On Saturday, in a very close race, they brought home a second place finish only 37 hundredths of a second behind San Angelo Central Blue. The boys also set a new record in the 400 free relay with a time of 3:28.92 and a fifth place finish.

January 30-31, the Harvesters will travel to the Pete Ragus Aquatic Center again for their district swim competition. From there, Coach Ed Garvin hopes to advance the entire team to the regional competition in Andrews on February 13-14. Garvin added that if the team's times continued to improve, wins at district and regional are very possible.

"Middle Child" is not alone. I believe many parents with three kids act this way, although not consciously. Don't resent your family members for this because they do love and care about you. DEAR HAPPY: You are a thoughtful, wise and mature 20-year-old, and I thank you for your letter. I advised "Middle Child" that she should also turn her frustration into an effort to excel at something -- to find validation from within her family and outside it. Read on for comments from other middle children:

DEAR ABBY: Some parents do favor one child over another, but most try hard not to let it affect how they treat their children. That girl's parents may not realize they are acting differently. I think she should have a non-confrontational private talk with her parents and express her feelings to them. They may be shocked to hear she feels this way.

As a child, I often felt disregarded. This was news to my parents, and we all learned to readjust how we dealt with each other. That was almost 30

years ago, and it made a huge difference. -- SIBLING IN LAUREL, MD.

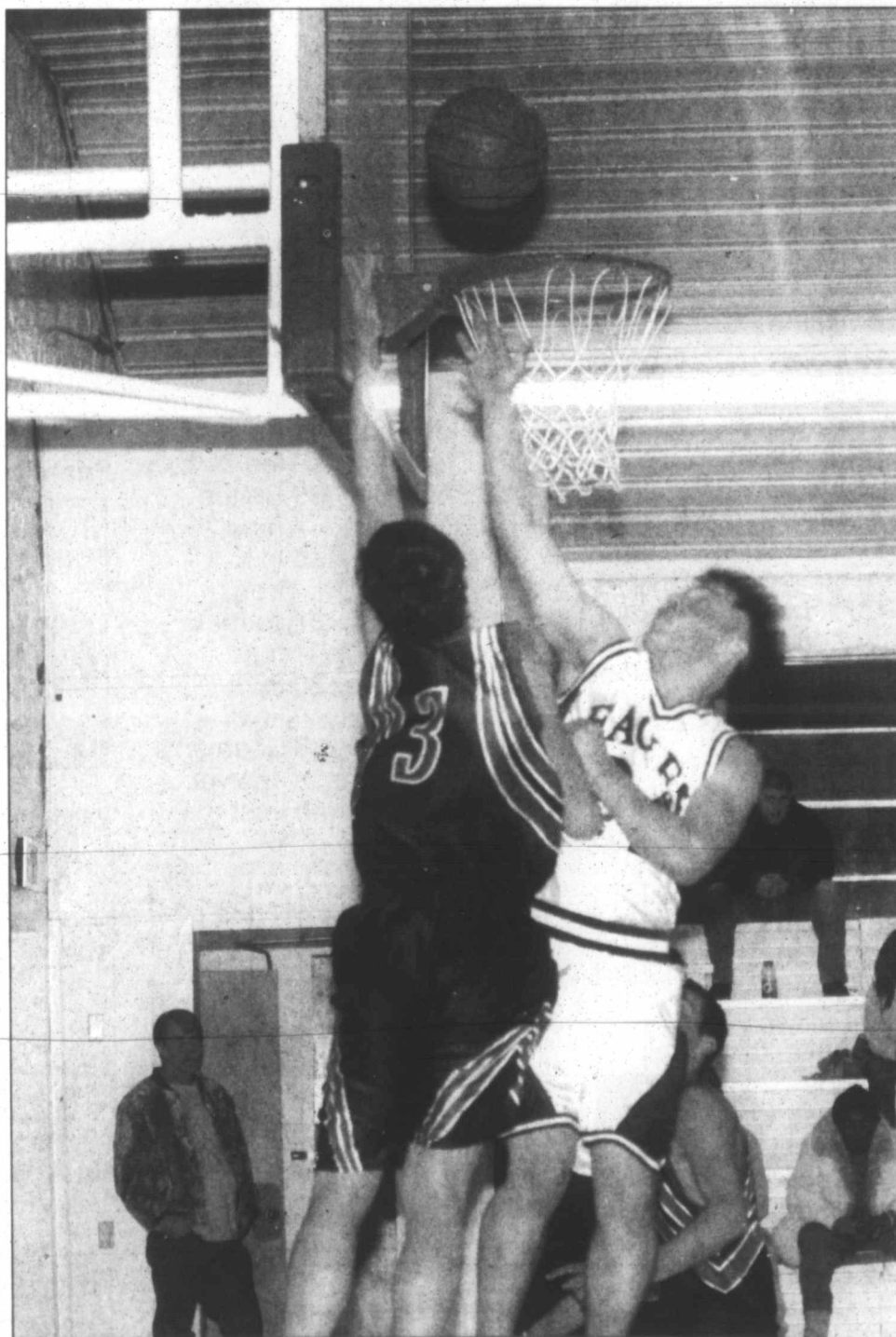

Too many young girls already believe that they must constantly earn the approval of others in order to succeed, and it can easily become a recipe for lifelong low self-esteem. 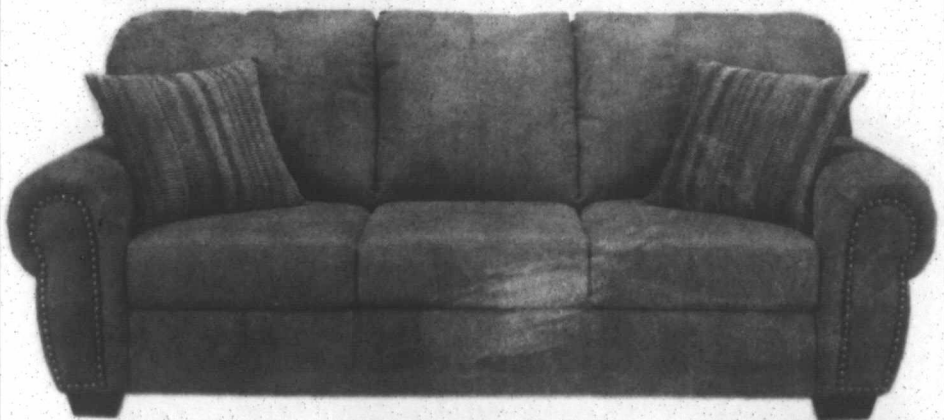
