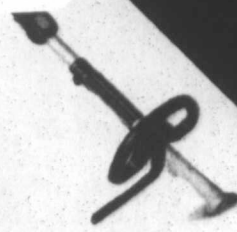

Warrant list a wake-up for many

The list of outstanding warrants, which ran in The Pampa News last week, has already caused the "phones to ring off the walls," according to personnel at the municipal court, with people paying for warrants and debt owed to the city.

Since January 5, the Municipal Court has cleared 253 warrants from the list. Multiple people

cleared more than one warrant at a time and a total of 162 people have cleared warrants so far, amounting to a total of \$28,478 dues paid to the city.

According to Sergeant Colby Brown, \$11,000 of fees owed from warrants were cleared on Monday. Brown said that before the list was ran, many people didn't know they had existing warrants, including a man from Amarillo who had a warrant dating back

to 1997 that he took care of.

"People are calling and making arrangements everyday," Brown said. "It is working just great."

The Municipal Court continues issuing new warrants every Thursday, including 30 warrants issued this week. The warrant list of names with people ran in The Pampa News on Thursday, Jan. 22 (A-L), Friday, Jan. 23 (M-O) and Jan. 24 and 25 (P-

Z). The list of names included all people who had warrants as of Jan. 10. If warrants were settled after that date, it would not be reflected in the list.

An official warrant round up will begin on March 3, with over 120 law enforcement agencies participating. At that time, if you have a warrant, you may be arrested. At the end of December, the residents of the city of Pampa owed almost \$1 million in fines.

In order to null the warrant with Pampa Municipal Court and Pampa Police Department and Gray County, appear in person at the Municipal Court in Pampa Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. or mail payment to Pampa Municipal Court, P.O. Box 2499, Pampa TX 79066. If sending payment, no personal checks or accepted. Pay in person, mail with cash or money order. Call

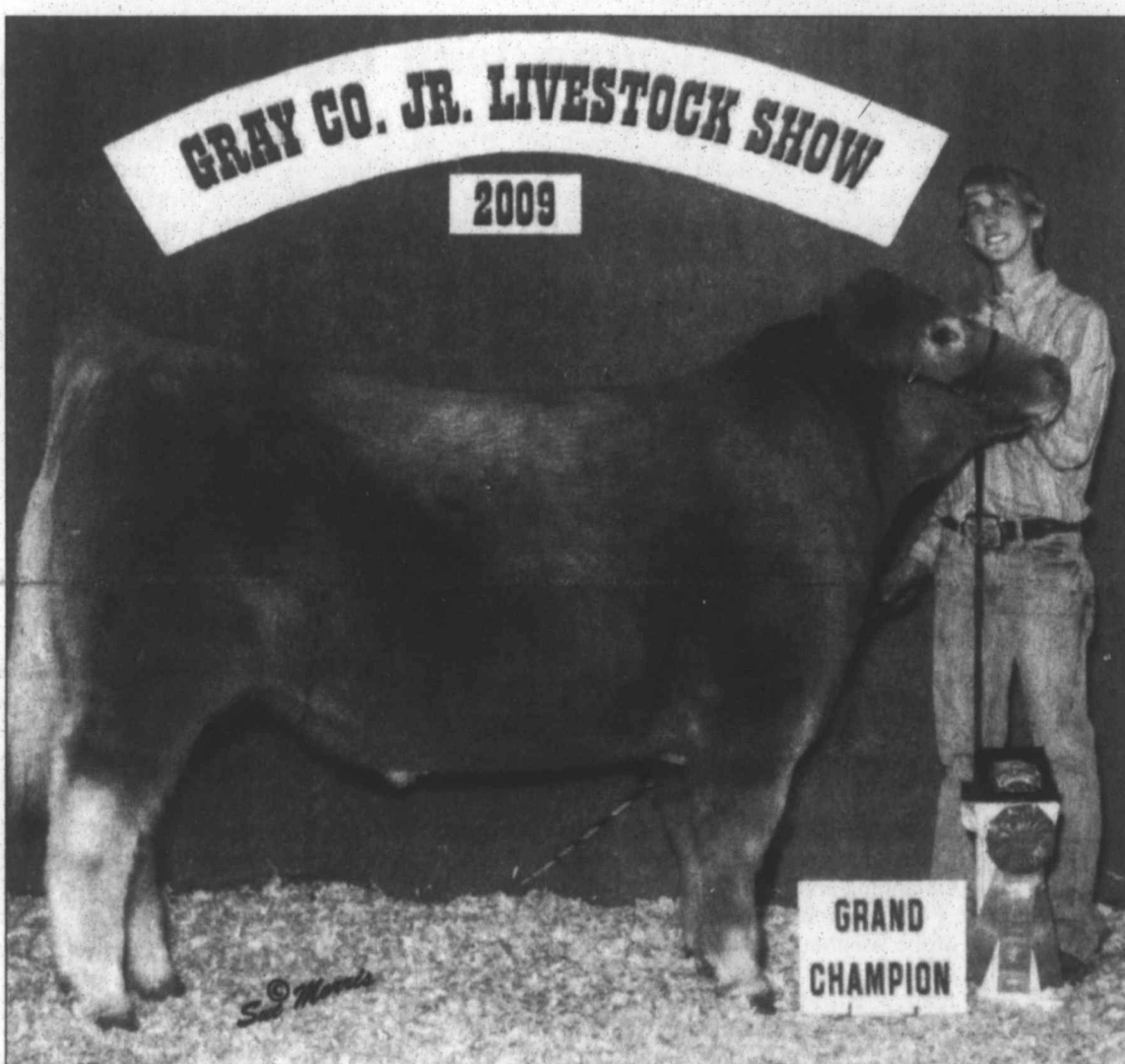

County officials reconsider bids

Vehicles will be the major topic of concern at the Gray County Commission meeting Monday morning.

The commissioners court will meet beginning at 9 a.m. in the Gray County Courtroom at the court house. The commissioners court will reconsider bids for a pickup for the Sheriff's Office. The bid that was opened at the last commission meeting was deemed unacceptable because it didn't give enough value for the two cars the Sheriff plans on trading in.

The county commission will also consider going out for bids to replace a tank tractor truck for Precinct 2 and financing a motorgrader through Welsh State Bank.

The commission will consider declaring an old Ford tractor at Perry Lefors Airport surplus property.

They will also consider a request for water usage at the airport. Several new hangers are being built at Perry Lefors Airport and the tenants at the airport had requested a new well and water lines two weeks ago, but the commission tabled the request until they could gather information on the costs involved. The county owns the airport and leases space for hangers.

They will also hear the 2008 racial profile report from the Precinct 2 Constable.

The County Clerk and District Clerk will be recognized for completing continuing education hours and several individuals will be recognized for completing academic requirements for emergency management.

**Longtime Oklahoma
 newsman Gittings**

WEATHERFORD, Okla. (AP) — Longtime newsman Larry Gittings, who worked at several newspapers in Oklahoma and north Texas, has died. He was 57. Gittings most recently worked as the managing editor of the Weatherford Daily News. Gittings was in the newspaper's office Thursday morning when he began to feel faint, publisher Phillip Reid said. Gittings was taken to a hospital in Weatherford, where doctors thought they had him stabilized before he suffered a massive heart attack, Reid said. Gittings, from Grandfield in southwestern Oklahoma, graduated from Oklahoma State University in 1972. His career included stops at the Wichita Falls (Texas) Record News, the Frederick Daily Leader, the Graham (Texas) Leader and the Gainesville (Texas) Daily Register before he became the managing editor of the Duncan Banner in August 1981. Gittings had been the managing editor at the Weatherford newspaper for eight years, Reid said. Gittings also was a former member of the Associated Press Oklahoma News Executives board.



Texas' Amber Alert policy too narrow, some say

DALLAS (AP) — A state agency's refusal to issue an Amber Alert for a missing 11-year-old girl believed to have run off with a convicted felon was questioned Friday by advocates for missing children and a Texas lawmaker.

They said the Department of Public Safety should reconsider its policy of issuing the alerts only when children are abducted by strangers or taken unwillingly.

"People who prey on children more often use seduction rather than ropes," said Rep. Garnett Coleman, a Houston legislator who has focused on children's issues.

Police in Tyler, about 100 miles east of Dallas, requested the Amber Alert after the girl's mother reported her missing.

Late Friday night, police said the girl's mother, Maira Macias, was at police headquarters when she received a call from her daughter. The girl told Macias she is in Mexico with 23-year-old Enrique Vasquez, who was convicted of burglary in 2006.

Police have issued an arrest warrant for Vasquez on charges of kidnapping and violating probation. There was no information on the girl's condition or whether she was in the custody of Mexican officials.

Police told Tyler TV station KLTU that they are working with the U.S. State Department and Mexican authorities to make sure the girl can be reunited with family members in Mexico.

DPS spokeswoman Tela Mange said the Amber Alert was created in response to the 1996 kidnapping and murder of 9-year-old Amber Hagerman in Arlington, and was primarily intended for use in stranger abduction cases.

If overused, the system could become less effective, Mange said, adding that about 7,000 people are reported missing in Texas each year, most of them runaways.

"This guy is not a stranger," said Mange. "As horrible as it is, he's not a stranger."

Although the Amber Alert program is coordinated by the U.S. Department of Justice, states are allowed to set their own procedures on how and when it should be used.

Texas' Amber Alert criteria is similar to those recommended by the Justice Department, but adds a provision requiring that the child be "unwillingly taken from their environment without permission" of a parent or guardian.

But child advocates wonder if the state's policy is too narrow.

Marilyn Ward, executive director of Houston-based National Missing Children's Center, said the DPS should also allow alerts for runaways aged 14 and younger.

"In this case, even if she went willingly, she's 11 years," Ward said. "An 11-year-old can be coerced to do all kinds of things, especially with an older man like that. I'd like them not to adhere so tightly to the rules."

Cathy Crabtree, executive director of the Children's Advocacy Centers of Texas, Inc. in Austin, agreed.

"There's no question the way the penal code is written, that a child 14 and under cannot give consent," Crabtree said.

"If they pick this guy up and find out he's had a sexual relationship with this child, regardless of whether she went with him willingly, there's no way they can't press charges," Crabtree said. "What harm can there be in running it versus the potential harm of not finding this child?"

Of the 236 requests to DPS for Amber Alerts since 2002, only 42 were activated — or about 18 percent, according to agency records. Two alerts have been requested so far this year and both were denied.



Stimulus bill not all that stimulating

WASHINGTON (AP) - They call it "stimulus" legislation, but the economic measures racing through Congress would devote tens of billions of dollars to causes that have little to do with jolting the country out of recession.

There's \$345 million for Agriculture Department computers, \$650 million for TV converter boxes, \$15 billion for college scholarships — worthy, perhaps, but not likely to put many Americans back to work quickly.

Yes, there are many billions of dollars in "ready-to-go" job-creating projects in President Barack Obama's economic stimulus bill. But there are also plenty of items that are just unfinished business for Congress' old bulls.

An \$800 billion-plus package, it turns out, gives lawmakers plenty of opportunities to rid themselves of nagging headaches left over from the days when running up the government's \$10 trillion-plus debt was a bigger concern.

There's \$1 billion to deal with Census problems and \$88 million to help move the Public Health Service into a new building next year. The Senate would devote \$2.1 billion to pay off a looming shortfall in public housing accounts,

\$870 million to combat the flu and \$400 million to slow the spread of HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases such as chlamydia.

"I have communicated to the administration that there are parts of this package that don't meet the test that they themselves established of temporary, timely and targeted," said Senate Budget Committee Chairman Kent Conrad, D-N.D. He wants Obama to weigh in to knock out the clunkers during House-Senate negotiations.

But nothing is in the legislation by accident. By including in the Senate stimulus bill such far-ranging ideas as \$40 million to convert the way health statistics are collected - from paper to an electronic system - lawmakers are able to thin out their in-boxes, even if they aren't doing much to create jobs.

There's also \$380 million in the Senate bill for a rainy day fund for the Women, Infants and Children program that delivers healthful food to the poor. WIC got the equivalent of a \$1 billion infusion last fall.

At the same time, putting items in the stimulus bill that really should be handled in annual appropriations bills creates more room in the latter for pet

projects and other programs.

It creates "headroom," a top Senate GOP budget aide said, for things senators didn't have room for in the regular process but still want to do.

Some lawmakers are sounding warnings.

"I suggested ... less spending and especially less spending for those items that are not stimulus and should be funded through the regular appropriations process," said Rep. Jerry Lewis of California, top Republican on the Appropriations Committee.

Part of the reason so much non-stimulus spending has made it into the stimulus bill is that there are only so many traditional jobs-heavy public works projects that can get started quickly. As it is, most of the money in the bill for road building, water projects and mass transit probably won't be spent until the economy has turned around and is back on a recovery path.

For example, just one-third of \$30 billion proposed by the House for highway construction would reach the economy in the next year and a half, according to the Congressional Budget Office.

Democrats are going

ahead with Obama's \$500 tax credit for most workers and \$1,000 for couples even though there's wide agreement that last year's rebate checks weren't effective in sparking recovery.

Defenders of the package said that once experts determined it would take \$800 billion to start to pull the country out of recession and emphasized the urgency, details took on less importance.

"If the house is burning, you're not going to worry about which hose you grab, so long as you get water on the fire," said Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., one of the chief authors of the House package as chairman of its appropriations committee.

But some Democrats, like Sen. Ben Nelson of Nebraska, think the \$3.5 billion in the stimulus package devoted to health research, or the \$14 billion-\$15 billion for boosting Pell Grant college scholarships by \$400 to \$500 would be better spent on additional brick and mortar infrastructure projects.

"You don't want to be against Pell Grants," Nelson said. "But the question is, how many people go to work on Pell Grants? Should it be in this legislation if it's about jobs?"

Dear Abby...

Mom has been with Milton ever since, first at her home and now at his winter home down south. My siblings and I are aghast at her behavior. She phones and sends cheery e-mails as if she were on an extended holiday and having the time of her life. Meanwhile, we are still mourning our father's loss.

We have tried to share our feelings with her, but she refuses to acknowledge them. She says she "understands," but we don't think she does. Otherwise, why would she move away from her children at this sad time? -- LOST OUR MOTHER, TOO

DEAR LOST: Your mother may have done it because she went through much of the grieving process long before your father actually passed away. She does understand your feelings, but in an emotional -- and now physical -- sense she has moved on. I don't know the circumstances of your parents' marriage, but if she made your father happy while he was alive, then try to be happy for her now.

DEAR ABBY: I am only 24, but consider myself an old-fashioned parent. My wife and I have three daughters who are the center of our lives. Everywhere we go, we are complimented on how well-behaved our children are. When asked for our "secret," we tell the truth -- we use the belt to keep our children in line. When I was a child, my mom did the same with me, and I know it's more help than harm.

The problem is, as soon as

people hear it they assume we simply beat our kids into submission. How can I help people understand that discipline and abuse are two different things? -- JOHN IN SAVANNAH

DEAR JOHN: Abuse and discipline ARE two different things. Abuse is punishment. Discipline teaches -- and helps a child to eventually become self-disciplined. Using a belt on your little girls shows them that violence is acceptable -- and that they can expect it from you, just as you learned it was acceptable from your parents.

There are more effective ways to communicate with children than by hitting them with belts. Grounding them, taking away toys, cell phone and television privileges are effective, nonviolent and preferable means of letting a child know that certain behaviors are unacceptable.

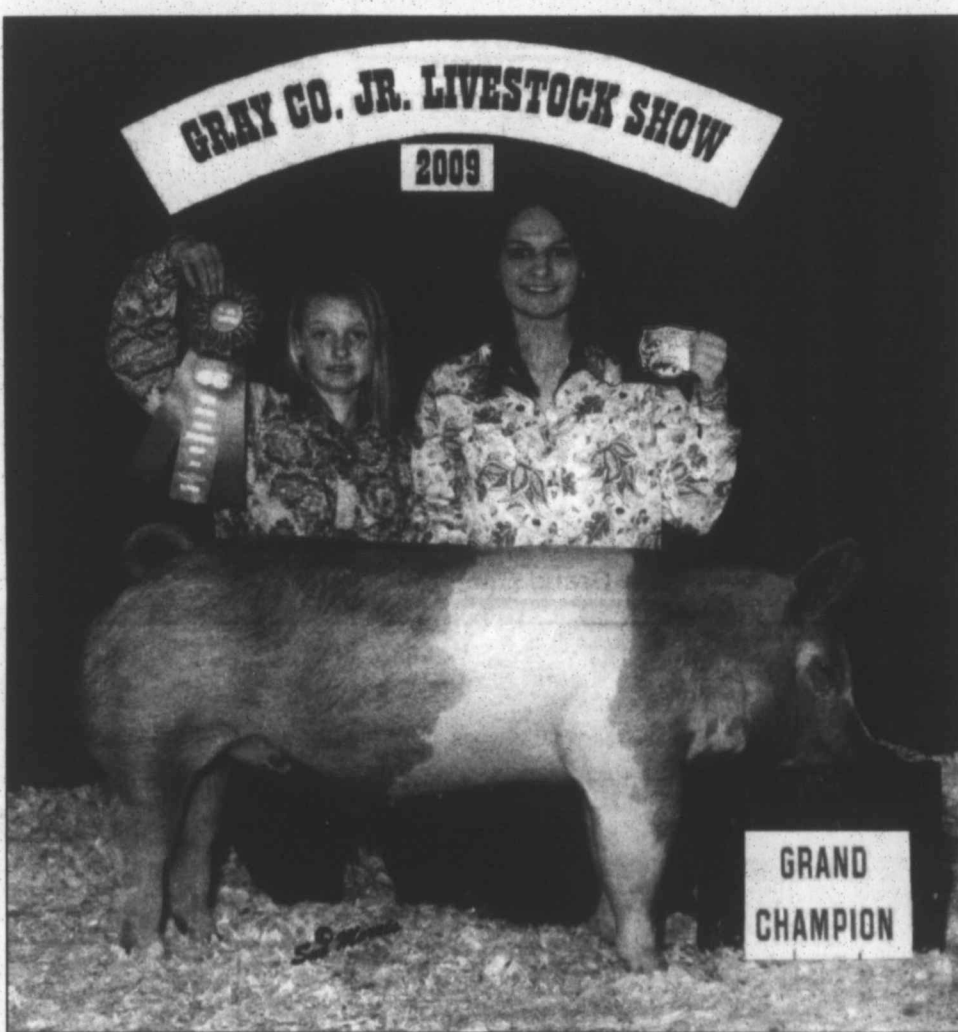

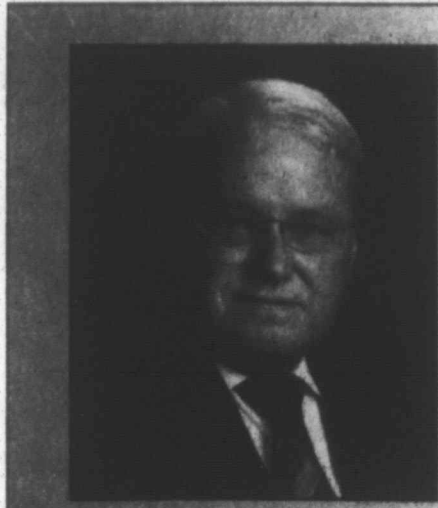

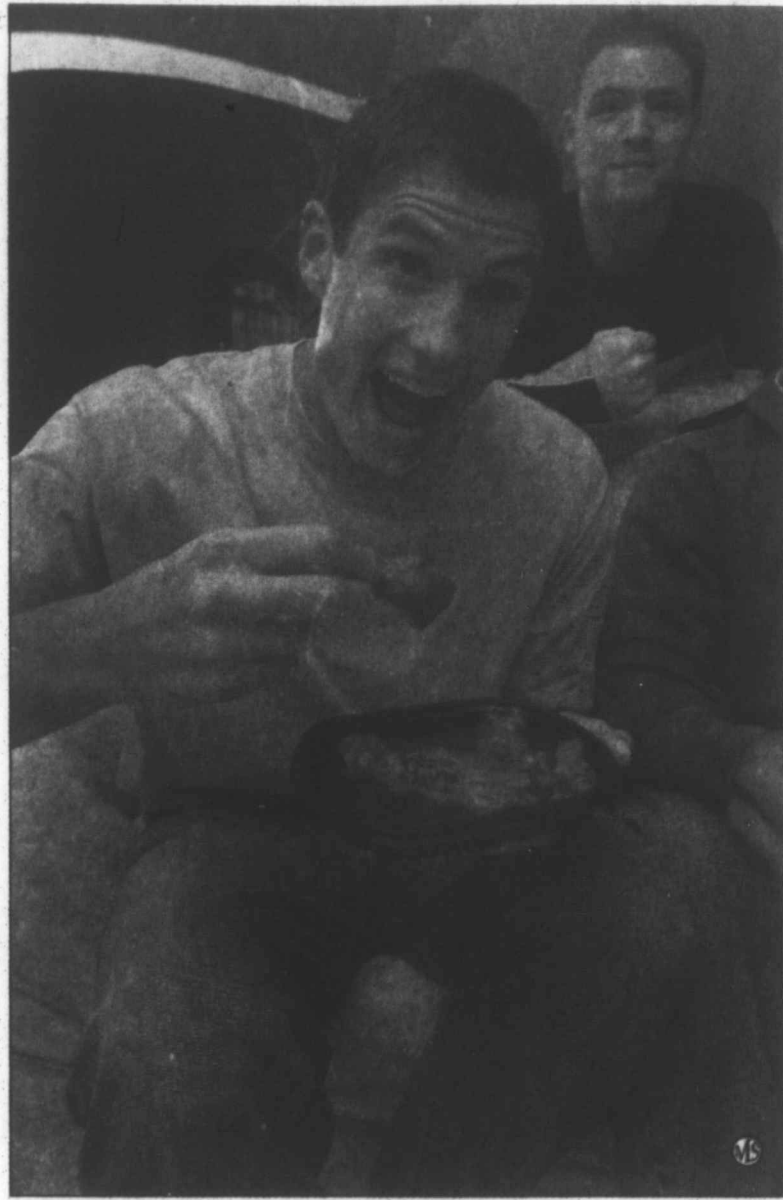

The *really* important Super Bowl stuff: Food, halftime and commercials



Lots of chicken to chow

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — Buffalo's football team won't have a place in this year's Super Bowl hoopla, but don't worry, its chicken wings will.

Amid unnerving media reports that spread from here to New York City and even Seattle about a potential shortage of the Buffalo-born appetizer heading into the big game, authorities say yes, production is down and yes, prices are up.

"But there's plenty of wings," assured Richard Lobb, spokesman for the National Chicken Council in Washington.

For those scoring at home, that'll mean about 1 billion wings scarfed down over the Super Bowl weekend.

In the last week or so, some fretted that the spicy snack would be scarce for a number of reasons: the highest wholesale and retail prices in recent memory; an industrywide, economy-driven drop in production of 5 to 6 percent; a bankruptcy protection filing from the nation's largest chicken producer, Pittsburg, Texas-based Pilgrim's Pride, though it remains in business; and a push to sell wings by restaurant chains like Pizza Hut and KFC. Taken together, connoisseurs worried that demand would outstrip supply.

And chicken wings were indeed missing for a day from the kitchen of one Niagara Falls restaurateur, but that was by design. Owner Sam Musolino refused to serve wings at Sammy's Pizzeria Monday to protest the annual price increases that arrive every year just in time for the big football weekend.

"They're basically just taking advantage of the pizzerias," said Musolino, who said he was paying \$46 per 40-pound box of wings before the price jumped to \$78 for the same case.

Lobb said the price is up because feed prices have gone through the roof and chicken producers have had to cut production as consumers have cut spending at casual dining restaurants that favor chicken dishes.

There has also been an oversupply of meat on the market, due to slumping demand, which had been hurting pricing — further crimping margins. It all boiled down to production cuts.

Now that supply is smaller and prices are up, Musolino said he can't pass along the temporary spike to customers — not that they'd pay anyway. "Everyone's so tapped out these days, there's no way you can raise the prices."

It's no trivial thing in this city that gave the world Buffalo wings. Anchor Bar owner Teresa Bellissimo first deep fried the wings and dunked them in hot sauce on a Friday night in 1964 when her son Dominic's hungry friends dropped in while he was tending bar. Until then, the wings were usually used for the stock pot.

Wholesale prices for fresh wings are up to \$1.51 a pound this week, compared to \$1.24 last year. But as of Jan. 1, the poultry industry had 38.3 million pounds of chicken wings on hand, down slightly from about 40 million pounds a year earlier, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"It's America's number one appetizer," said Drew Cerza, founder of Buffalo's annual chicken wing festival, who, incidentally, won't be frying up any wings on Sunday.

"It's my day off," he said.

Super Bowl ads promise glitz, guffaws, groans

It's time for that annual winter ritual where people gather before their TV screens to whoop and holler as they gobble down unhealthy treats.

Yes, it's Super Bowl time. And Sunday's NFL championship wouldn't be complete without a look at its uber-expensive advertising, which is priced at an all-time high.

On Friday, NBC, a unit of General Electric Co., said it was in talks to sell the last two of the 67 spots for the game, which have gone for between \$2.4 million and \$3 million per 30-second slot.

"Considering the state of the economy in the United States, we couldn't be any more thrilled," said Dick Ebersol, chairman of NBC Universal Sports & Olympics.

The Super Bowl remains the premier advertising event: It boasts a U.S. audience of 100 million, the biggest of any American telecast. It's also a marketer's dream: Viewers actually like watching the commercials.

This year, a few commercials will reflect the weak economy, but by and large, the ads aim to deliver glitz, guffaws and groans. "I like they do every year."

There will be celebrity appearances in ads, including Conan O'Brien for Bud Light, John Turturro for Heineken USA Inc. and Jason Statham for Audi of America Inc.

Animals will figure prominently again, with Anheuser-Busch's Clydesdales expected to appear in three of seven commercials from the Budweiser brewer. One is a tearjerker about a horse that joins the circus.

Internet domain registrar The Go Daddy Group Inc., will air a somewhat risqué spot, as it has done in the past. While its less-than-slick ads that the company made itself, featuring racer Danica Patrick, are bound to make viewers groan, Go Daddy doesn't care. At least Go Daddy got approved. People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals got steamed because NBC rejected its ad for vegetarianism that featured half-naked women playing with vegetables.

To be sure, such tempests are part of the

marketing shenanigans surrounding the game. At the very least, it drives people online to watch the banned ad.

John Gerzema, chief insights officer at Y&R, a unit of advertising giant WPP Group PLC, said keeping the brand top of mind after the Super Bowl gets advertisers the most bang for the small fortune spent to buy air time.

A 30-second Super Bowl spot is about 20 times more expensive than the average commercial time on prime time network programs this time of year, according to TNS Media.

As such, "the Super Bowl is a colossal waste of money if you can't integrate your events around it," Gerzema said. The key is to "quickly move from the TV screen to the Internet."

Anheuser-Busch gets it. It created a social media Web site at AB-extras.com that features the stories behind its Super Bowl ads with pictures, videos and interviews.

Monster Worldwide Inc., a job-search company, is linking with the NFL to hire a "Director of Fandemonium" from a base of regular fans. It has a signing bonus of \$100,000 and the new hire has one year to appear in promotional events. Monster also started marketing through social networking sites and bought search engine keywords like "fandemonium" for the ad campaign. It bought two ad spots on the Super Bowl.

"At the end of the day, we want to drive traffic to the site," said Ted Gilvar, Monster's global marketing officer. "It's not just airing the spots and waiting."

Here are some Super Bowl advertising highlights.

—The old reliables: Marquee names that return year after year include Anheuser-Busch. This year, the brewer's ads will play up its American identity. That's timely given that the company was bought last year by Belgium's InBev SA for \$52 billion. In a Clydesdale ad, one of the horses looks back at its ancestry. The ad with O'Brien depicts the late-night host reluctantly signing up to star in a commercial touting Bud Light in Sweden, with hilarious results.


Do Your Trees Need Watering?

During the winter, trees and shrubs need watering at least once a month. There is a preferred way to do this, its called **DEEP ROOT WATERING**.

This does not mean watering with a probe forced down into the root zone. Hydraulic pressure from probe watering damages roots.

DEEP ROOT WATERING is a way to get the water to the tree roots below the grass roots. Using this method also saves water and keeps your water bill as low a possible while keeping your tree in good condition.

Illustrated below is the proper way to **DEEP ROOT WATER**



Turn the water on and fill hose, then remove hose from faucet and adjust flow until it is a little larger than a match stem. Watch the flow for a minute or so to be sure it continues at this rate, if not readjust. when flow remains constant reattach hose and place end under tree.

Water each area until the ground is saturated from the tree trunk out to the drip line. Then move hose to the next area until the entire area to the drip line is watered. Watering time can take from one to four hours depending on the size of each area under the plant.

Halftime show: Its the Boss

TAMPA, Fla. (AP)— Anybody who thinks it's tough playing the halftime show at the Super Bowl with 150 million people watching should try serenading Barack Obama with the majestic granite visage of Abraham Lincoln staring over your shoulder.

Bruce Springsteen did. "It kind of was a good warm-up for this," Springsteen joked Thursday after arriving in Tampa with the E Street Band. "That takes some of the pressure off, you know."

In his first news conference in more than 20 years, The Boss was as cool as ever.

Wearing black jeans, a black crewneck sweater and black boots, Springsteen and his band charmed a standing-room-only crowd by joking about his lack of football knowledge, that the group is still together, and its members still alive, and the tremendous year he's having personally and professionally.

"Is there anybody from New Jersey? Don't give them the microphone!" the Garden State native called out before taking questions in his first large forum since a 1987 news conference for Amnesty International.

But Springsteen has reason to celebrate.

His song, "The Wrestler," from the movie of the same name, won a Golden Globe earlier this month, and he followed it with a performance at the National Mall to honor Obama two days before the inauguration. Springsteen was a huge Obama booster during the campaign.

His latest CD, "Working on a Dream," was released Tuesday, and he'll kick off a world tour in San Jose, Calif., on April 1.

"Good times," the 59-year-old rocker smiled. "You just have years where things happen, or years where it's quieter. But what's special for me right now is I really believe our band is going through sort

of a golden age. We've made three of what I think are some of our best records in a row, which is really one of the reasons we're here. And the band, on the last tour, played the best it's ever played.

"We've been on the road awhile. We're some old soldiers. But the band is still really burning, and I really want people to know about the record. Good year, you know? It's been great."

So now the band plays Sunday's halftime show of the Super Bowl, which is enjoying a run of booking major talent for the roughly 15-minute slot before the largest television event in the nation. Acts have recently included the Rolling Stones, U2, Paul McCartney, Prince and Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers.

The NFL said last year's halftime show with Petty was watched by more than 148 million viewers in the U.S.

Springsteen, for years, had turned down invitations to play the Super Bowl, unsure of the legitimacy of such a performance. After all, for many years the halftime show was made up of local and college marching bands

and drill teams.

But Springsteen said the opportunity to promote the album, and the upgraded production team that has given the invitation a prestige factor, changed his mind.

"Initially, it was sort of a novelty and so it didn't quite feel right," he explained. "But it was just like, this is the year. ... Bands of our generation, you can sort of be seen on a stage like this or, like, not seen. There's not a lot of middle places. It is a tremendous venue."

The performance is expected to be a teaser for the upcoming tour, and scores of Las Vegas sports books are taking bets on the set list. Asked who ultimately decides what songs will be played, Springsteen staked his claim as leader of the band.

"I'm the Boss! The Boss decides what we play!" he yelled. "Nobody else decides. People suggest. Hint. Beg. Cajole. But I decide."

Pittsburgh receiver Hines Ward said he was looking forward to the performance, and even had a song

request.

"I love Bruce. I hope he plays 'Born in the USA.' He has a great voice when he says, 'Boorrrrr,'" Ward said. "He has a lot of swagger about himself. He's very confident. When he's up there performing, it's all about him."

Springsteen only offered one slight teaser, vowing to pack the bands' usual emotion and energy into their brief performance.

"We want it to be a 12-minute party," he said. "The idea of the show is, you are going to the Meadowlands, you get lost on the way. You are watching your clock, 'Damn, the show is starting right now.' You stop at a bar to get some directions, and the bar gets held up while you are there. So that takes another 45 minutes to get out of there."

"You come back and you miss your exit on the turnpike, and you are driving to get back around. And so you make it into the stadium 2 hours and 48 minutes into the show, that's what you are going to see: the last 12 minutes."

The company's SoBe Life Water division will have a 60-second commercial in 3-D, featuring its ultra-hip lizards. SoBe also is partnering with DreamWorks Animation SKG Inc. to give away more than 125 million 3-D glasses for a 90-second sneak preview of "Monsters vs. Aliens," which hits theaters March 27. (Glasses are available at SoBe displays in retail stores.)

Coca-Cola Co. will put Troy Polamalu of the Pittsburgh Steelers in an ad touting Coke Zero called "Mean Troy," reprising a 1979 classic that starred another Steeler, "Mean" Joe Greene. The company's other spots include "Avatar," in which people morph to resemble their digital alter egos, and "Heist," in which insects steal a sleeping man's Coke.

—Economy-related advertisers:

Ads from job-listings companies CareerBuilder.com and Monster, which has redesigned its Web site for the first time in more than a decade, are appropriate given the high unemployment rate. One Monster ad shows folks working in jobs for which they're not particularly suited. CareerBuilder.com's ad features a koala bear and a co-worker in a Speedo.

H&R Block is returning to the Super Bowl after five years, and this time, it's got Abe Vigoda. The "Barney Miller" actor will play the character of Death, along the lines that nothing is certain except death and taxes.
