# PHS swim team captures 10th straight district title

Pampa was strongly favored to win both the Girls and Boys district titles for the tenth year in a row. Pampa boys did not disappoint as they took 10 first places, 5 seconds and 5 thirds in their 11 events. Pampa girls took 9 firsts, 2 seconds and 4 thirds in their 11 events. The Swimming Harvesters traveled to the Pete Ragus Aquatic Center in Lubbock on January 30-31 for the UIL District 2-5A/3-4A Swimming and Diving 2009 meet.

The excitement began on Friday in the preliminary competition as district records began to fall. In the 100-yard backstroke, senior Cole Guyer swam a 1:00.05, which is over 3.5 seconds faster than his own record set in 2008. Guyer said of the race, "I just tried to get as far ahead of everyone as possible." He credits his success in breaking the record to perseverance.

On Saturday, the crowd was treated to quite a show as twelve 5A records and five 4A records fell. The Swimming Harvesters were responsible for all five new records in the 4A competition.

In the boys 200-yard individual medley, junior Kelly Stoffle set a new record of

2:07.53 breaking the 2:12.31 record set in Friday's preliminary competition. Senior David Matlock of Caprock who was favored to win the race set that record. Stoffle has been striving to beat Matlock in the IM for three years. About the race, Stoffle said, "I knew when I finished the breaststroke leg and was ahead going into the freestyle that I had him. He's (Matlock) not a sprinter."

Senior Dustin Neef had an incredible finish of 22.30 in the 50-yard freestyle. He beat the previous day's record of 23.23. Neef said, "It felt amazing to break the record. I felt I was going to break it in prelims." When asked what he

## Texas Legislature highlights

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — State leaders have authorized the payment of millions of dollars in bills that had been stacking up from companies that helped with emergency services after September's Hurricane Ike.

Jack Colley, the state's emergency management director, told lawmakers this week that the state has \$134 million in unpaid bills and that vendors have been calling demanding payment. Gov. Rick Perry's office blamed the Federal Emergency Management Agency for the delay.

the delay.

But in a letter to agencies involved that was released Thursday, Perry directed \$145 million be transferred to the state's Division of Emergency Management to pay the bills from the Sept. 13 hurricane.

"This approval is contin-



gent on the conditions that the money be used only to reimburse Hurricane Ikerelated expenses and that reimbursements be made in a manner consistent with maximum federal reimbursement," according to the letter signed by Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, House Speaker Joe Straus and Sen. Steve Ogden, chairman of the Senate Finance

Committee.

The Associated Press has requested a list of the vendors from Perry's office but one has not yet been made available. Though the letter announcing the state payment arrangements was dated Wednesday, it was released to the AP Thursday afternoon, shortly before the governor's office said it would provide the list of owed vendors. Later, the governor's office said it didn't yet have that vendor information from the Department of Public Safety.

The \$145 million is to be transferred from the state Health and Human Services Commission and the Department of Public Safety. Perry spokeswoman Katherine Cesinger said replacement of the funds would be

# PISD approves bus purchase

Construction of the new junior high school is on
schedule—more or less.

Richard Self, a superintendent with Western Builders, said they were building the access road from Texas Highway 70 to the school site north of town and that they were proceeding with the dirt work at the school.

The curbs and gutters should be poured next week, he said.

"We're just trucking right along," Self told the Pampa Independent School District board of trustees Thursday night at their school board meeting.

Other representatives of Western Builders, however, said there have been some delays with the engineering drawings and they were slightly behind.

The board elected to use colored concrete for the floors of the junior high classrooms.

In the initial design, the classrooms were to be carpeted, but the board had decided to seal and polish the concrete floor instead. The architectural firm, however, questioned whether that would make the classrooms look too gray.

Colored concrete is being used in the high traffic areas of the school halls. The board elected to extend the colored concrete to the classrooms as well although it would cost an estimated four to five dollars a square foot more.

The board saved some \$96,000 at the high school, however, in a previous decision not to move the south entrance, but much of that money will likely go to renovations on the third floor that



Houston Chronicle on video surveillance at the U.S.-Mexico border:

Texas Gov. Rick Perry's passion for an audience participation video surveillance system on the border with Mexico has always seemed rooted more in conservative politics than fiscal practicality.

He's tried it once, he's tried it twice, and the bottom line looks worse than ever. The latest scorecard on the cost effectiveness of what amounts to a \$2 million Internet "catch an alien" computer game comes courtesy of the El Paso Times, which obtained law enforcement reports via open records requests.

It reveals that the surveillance cameras that went online last November were popular with viewers and drew nearly 2 million hits. However, the tips to law enforcement resulting from those visits resulted in only three arrests over the period far fewer than the 1 200 the governor's staff had projected for the program's first year. Of 4,500 immigration violations that the project was expected to document, only six were reported.

Although the surveillance system was initially supposed to include 200 video cameras along the border, the group in charge of the project, the Texas Border Sheriff's Coalition, installed just 13 and will likely not put in more than 15. That's one camera for every 80 miles of border.

This isn't Gov. Perry's first attempt to make a border camera system work. Three years ago he launched a \$200,000 pilot program for what would be a projected \$5 million virtual border wall that could be patrolled by Internet surfers. Like the current effort, it was hugely popular with Web users but resulted in only a few arrests and one drug bust. When the governor sought to expand the program, state lawmakers refused to appropriate funds, and the pilot project died. Instead of learning from the debacle, Perry then used federal grant money to restart it with the sheriff's coalition as the

Although a spokesperson for the governor claimed the low arrest figures showed that the cameras were effective deterrents to smugglers and illegal aliens, border lawmakers had a different take. State Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, told the Associated Press that the cameras were a waste of time and money.

El Paso Mayor John Cook criticized the initial border cam program as a poor investment, telling the Chronicle that most people had better things to do than spend their time playing virtual border patrolman.

Pilot programs are supposed to rve as reality checks. In the case of the border cams, it only seems to have stimulated Perry's determination to keep throwing good money after bad.

San Antonio Express-News on college tuition relief:

Higher education funding should be a priority during this year's legislative session.

Lawmakers cannot continue to expect the universities to balance their budgets on the backs of the students and their families by way of tuition and fees.

In recent years, the amount of funding doled out to universities has been steadily reduced. The universities are feeling the pinch.

The Legislature deregulated tuition in 2003 when it faced a \$10 billion budget shortfall. The move

has shifted the burden of finding new revenue to universities, forcing higher tuition and fees to cover their men cons Legi

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Gov. Rick Perry in his State of the State speech last week suggested freezing tuition for incoming freshmen at Texas universities so they pay the same amount for at least the first four years of their college education.

This may not be the ideal approach, but it is a step in the right

Between 2003 and 2007, tuition and fees went up 53 percent at the state's universities, according to the Higher Education Texas Coordinating Board.

That is a tremendous increase even in the best of economic times.

A freeze or tuition stabilization would allow parents to better plan for their children's college education, and the four-year plan proposed by Perry would encourage students to complete their degrees faster if they know the tuition freeze is only good for a limited time.

Four-year completion rates at the university level, like the state's high school graduation rates, are lower than they should be if the state is to meet its goal of increasing the number of college graduates.

There are many reasons students drop out of college; one is econom-

Freezing tuition is not a long-term solution by any means, but it would help many families until the economy rebounds.

And lawmakers should find the funds to invest in continued quality higher education while providing relief for families.

The state's long-term economic prospects depend on a better-educated workforce.

are proving to be more expensive than originally thought.

The school board also approved buying three used school buses for \$86,700.

Sam Haynes, the district's transportation director, said the buses were needed to replace three older buses.

Haynes said that the older buses had become a safety issue.

"It's basically comes down to the safety of the kids we're hauling,'

Haynes said. The district routinely carries some 450 students on their bus routes daily, although they have as

many as 600 on the routes.

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One of the buses, all of which had been used in New Mexico, is a 2001 model. The other two are 2002 models.

They will replace a 1981 bus and two 1985 buses.

District mechanic Bill Hieronymus said parts for the old buses were difficult to get. He told the school board he had inspected the used buses.

"I think they're good buses," Hieronymus said.

"They are in good shape," Haynes told the school board.

Haynes said he expected them to last eight to 10 years, perhaps longer.

In other business, PISD Supt. Barry Haenisch told the board that a committee that had been appointed to study the use of the portable buildings the district has been using at different campuses would have their report ready next week, and it would be presented to the board at their Feb. 19 meeting. Haenisch said the board

basically had three options. They could move the buildings to Lamar, where more space is needed for pre-kindergarten and head start classes. They could move the buildings at Travis to Wilson for more classroom space, or they could use the portables for science classrooms at each campus.

The superintendent said questions had arisen about equipment from the district's technology department, but the inventory had been reconciled. The questions involved the location of some small computer accessories that would not normally be tagged.

The board recognized five campuses for receiving 11 Gold Performance


Awards from the Texas Education Agency. They were Austin, Pampa Junior High, Travis, Lamar and Pampa Learning Center.
