## Court finds BNSF

 responsible for Montana cleanupHELENA, Mont. (AP) - BNSF Railway is respon-
sible for cleaning up pollution at the Kalispell site of a former oil refinery, a state judge ruled in a decision that could hit the company with a cleanup bill estimated at $\$ 32.5$ million.
The decision by District Judge Jeffrey Sherlock of
Helena came in the first Helena came in the first Superfund hazardous-waste
case that the Montana Deparen Quality had taken to trial.
The ruling Thursday defines how Fort Worth Texas based BNSF or other parties with stakes in Superfund
sites are sites are responsible for cleanup, DEQ lawyer Cynthia "I'd hope this (ruling) means responsible parties like BNSF will recognize the liability, and rather than up the site quickly and not draw the process out," she said.
BNSF on Thursday indicated strong disagreement
with the ruling. The company said it already has spent with the ruling. The company said it already has spent
$\$ 5$ million on cleanup at the Kalispell site and "never owned or leased the refinery property."
In a statement, railroad spokesman Gus Melonas
said that "BNSF is reviewing the said that "BNSF is reviewing the decision and is con-
sidering its options in light of the (Montana) cout's reliance on a (related) case presently pending before the U.S. Supreme Court. BNSF is committed to being a good corporate citizen. It has worked and will continue to work closely with Montana Department of
Environmental Quality to perform remediation." The state and BNSF went to trial last March over whether the railroad is responsible for cleanup of the property used for an oil refinery from the 1920s to 1963. Soil and groundwater are polluted from the
dumping of petroleum products, dioxin and other hazardous material, according to court records.
der haz The polluted area includes the Reliance Refinery site, the former Kalispell Post and Timber Co. yard
and the former Yale oil yard, which has been cleaned and the former Yale oin yara, whicch has been cleaned
up by Exxon Mobil under a setilement agreement. The court already has ruled that BNSF is liable for cleanup at the timber yard site, which is near the Stillwater River in Evergreen, a comraunity next to Kalispell.
Sherlock said that BNSF shares at least some of the Sherlock said that BNSF shares at least some of the
responsibility for the poilution at the Reliance Refinery site because its rail cars transported oil within the site to where it was dumped on the ground. The railroad also "owned or operated part of the facility
where the disposed of," he wrote.
Under Superfund law, a "responsible party" such as BNSF can be found liable for the entire cleanup at a site, even if it only shared in the ownership or actions
that contributed to the pollution that contributed to the pollution.

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 Valentine's Day started in the time of the Roman Empire. In ancient Rome, February 14th was a holiday to honor Juno. Juno was the Queen of the Roman Gods and Goddesses. The Romans also knew her as the Goddess of women and marriage. The following day, February 15th, began the Feast of Lupercalia.

The lives of young boys and girls were strictly separate. However, one of the customs of the young people was name drawing. On the eve of the festival of Lupercalia the names of Roman girls were written on slips of paper and placed into jars. Each young man would draw a girl's name from the jar and would then be partners for the duration of the festival with the girl whom he chose. Sometimes the pairing of the children lasted an entire year, and often, they would fall in love and would later marry.

Under the rule of Emperor Claudius II Rome was involved in many bloody and unpopular campaigns. Claudius the Cruel was having a difficult time getting soldiers to join his military leagues. He believed that the reason was that roman men did not want to leave their loves or families. As a result, Claudius cancelled all marriages and engagements in Rome. The good Saint Valentine was a priest at Rome in the days of Claudius II. He and Saint Marius aided the Christian martyrs and secretly married couples, and for this kind deed Saint Valentine was apprehended and dragged before the Prefect of Rome, who condemned him to be beaten to death with clubs and to have his head cut off. He suffered martyrdom on the 14th day of February, about the year 270. At that time it was the custom in Rome, a very ancient custom, indeed, to celebrate in the month of February the Lupercalia, feasts in honor of a heathen god. On these occasions, amidst a variety of pagan ceremonies, the names of young women were placed in a box, from which they were drawn by the men as chance directed.

The pastors of the early Christian Church in Rome endeavored to do away with the pagan element in these feasts by substituting the names of saints for those of maidens. And as the Lupercalia began about the middle of February, the pastors appear to have chosen Saint Valentine's Day for the celebration of this new feast. So it seems that the custom of young men choosing maidens for valentines, or saints as patrons for the coming year, arose in this way.

Gradually, February 14 became the date for exchanging love messages and St. Valentine became the patron saint of lovers. The date was marked by sending poems and simple gifts such as flowers. There was often a social gathering or a ball.

In the United States, Miss Esther Howland is given credit for sending the first valentine cards. The town of Loveland, Colorado, does a large post office business around February 14. The spirit of good continues as valentines are sent out with sentimental verses and children exchange valentine cards at school.

## Wild horse <br> funds drying up

Cathy Barcomb, who heads the commission, said that what began as a $\$ 500,000$ bequest from Heil, who died in 1972, will be gone by mid-2010. The budget proposed
by Gov. Jim Gibbons provides no new funding to keep the protection effort going.
"We all knew this day was coming. The Heil trust fund would not last forever," Barcomb said. But she added the horses will be helped by groups such as the Mustang
Heritage Foundation, which was started with Heil funds, and by individuals such as Madeleine Pickens, wife of billionaire Texas oilman T. Boone Pickens.
Heil's will stated his $\$ 500,000$ bequest, which generat-
ed far more tin interest dar more in interest earnings over time, was "for the preservation of wild horses in Nevada.
Legislators were told that Pickens is
Legislators were told that Pickens is looking for about 1 million acres of land, possibly in eastern Nevada, where most or all of the horses and burros now being
kept at the federal holding areas could be turned loose. kept at the federal holding areas could be turned loose.
Pickens, who says she's always had a love for the West and for wild horses, came up with the idea after hearing hat the U.S. Bureau of Land Management was consider ing euthanizing some

last month last month compared to the previous year, suggest-
ing that many children ing that many children are going without their
favorite sandwiches even though leading brands of jarred peanut butter have not been recalled. Other parents are taking a more moderate
approach, sticking with the jarred stuff and avoiding everything else, or carefully combing through the recall lists before shopping.
