Nothing left of Pickin' Shack

A Lefors landmark is in ruin after fire completely destroyed it over the weekend.

The Pickin' Shack caught fire early Saturday morning, according to fire officials in Lefors. Owner Eudell Gifford, who lives next door, was not injured.

"The Pickin' Shack burned to the ground," said Bill Hulsey, a Pampa barber and long time friend of Gifford's.

Hulsey said there is nothing left.

"I feel terrible for Eudell," said Lindy Forsyth with the City of Lefors.

"We got the call at 5:35 in the morning," said Lefors Fire Chief Floyd Lott. "When we got to the fire the house was totally engulfed in flames."

The Pickin' Shack was long a home to bluegrass pickers and fiddle players.

Musicians from the area would gather there on Friday nights in impromptu jam sessions. Visitors would bring food.

Blaze damages northside home

An unoccupied home owned by Pampa businessman Dennis Caldwell sustained about \$11,000 in fire damage Tuesday afternoon

A neighbor reported the fire at 2518 Duncan at 4:29 p.m. When Pampa fire-fighters arrived there was smoke coming from the rear of the property, but no flames were showing.

Suddenly, according to Fire Chief Kim Powell, the fire flashed in dry land-scape material and immediately caught trees and the fence on fire. Flames shot up to 20 feet in the air and threatened the property across the alley. Firefighters quickly extin-

guished the flames, saving both structures.

About 30 feet of fence and part of a pool house in the back of the property sustained the heaviest damage.

On January 16, firefighters battled a fire at Caldwell Production, west of Pampa for more than 11 hours. The two properties are owned by the same person, but Fire Marshall Michael Ryan reported from the Duncan Street property this morning that he has no evidence at this time that the fires are connected in any way.

Ryan said the fire at the home seems to have started in the pool house, but it is still under investigation.

Tuesday's Texas legislature highlights

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Voting along strict party lines, the Republican-led Senate passed legislation Tuesday that would require Texans to produce a valid photo ID — or two alternatives — before

being allowed to vote.

The measure was tentatively approved 19-12 after three hours of emotional debate, with Republicans saying the legislation was needed to combat voter fraud and Democrats warning it would rob eligible citizens

of the right to vote.

Given the GOP's 19-12 majority, the bill's passage was a foregone conclusion in the Senate. But it did undergo slight changes Tuesday. Though the



financial impact of the bill was estimated at zero going into the debate, Republicans agreed to put at least \$2 million in funding behind a statewide voter education campaign. Democrats say costs could climb because of provisions requiring the state to give out free IDs and because the law will trigger lawsuits from

opponents.
In another last-minute change, author Sen. Troy Fraser, R-Horseshoe Bay, agreed to make it clear that a voter registration card can serve as one of the two pieces of alternative identification for voters who don't show a valid photo ID.

Under the new legislation, a driver's license, passport or military ID are among the most common forms of photo ID that would allow citizens to


Semi-Truck preparing to turn left onto CR21. The semi was driven by

Patrick Foster, of Pampa.
"I tried to avoid it, but it was in the middle of the road and it hit the rear passanger side," Roby explained.

Villegas was transported to North West Texas Hospital in Amarillo, and died from injuries sustained in the accident at 8:45 on Thursday, March 12. His funeral was held Monday.

Ellwanger is still on life support at NWTH. Roby was treated with minor injuries and released.

Anti-child abuse group member faces porn charges

ANAHUAC, Texas (AP) — A former member of Bikers Against Child Abuse, a child abuse prevention organization, has been arrested for possessing child

David Wayne Garvey, 50, was arrested Tuesday morning at a Baytown, Texas garage where he worked as a mechanic, according to the Texas Attorney General's office. Garvey faces third-degree felony charges, which each carry between two and 10-year prison sentences.

The arrest followed a March 12 indictment by a Chambers County grand jury and an 18-month investigation by the Attorney General's Cyber Crimes Unit.

The investigation started with a tip from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, which warned that an AOL user attempted to e-mail child pornography to another AOL customer on Sept. 16. 2007. That tip led investigators to Garvey's residence in Beach City, where a May 29, 2008 search turned up 83 images of child pornography on Garvey's computer, a CD and in e-mails.

During the search, investigators also found a vest indicating that Garvey was a member of Bikers Against Child Abuse, which works to prevent child abuse. The Cyber Crimes Unit notified BACA, which then revoked Garvey's membership.

Garvey is being held in the Chambers County Jail on a \$35,000 bond.

Dallas judge criticized for racially charged quote

DALLAS (AP) — The first black DA. top judge in Dallas' municipal court system is receiving criticism for writing allowing the Innocence that "black folks have been cleaning up white folks' messes for hundreds of years" in his column in a weekly newspaper with a







Analysis: White House, Dems backpedaling on AIG

WASHINGTON (AP) - For the first time since last fall's election, Democrats and the Obama administration are backpedaling furiously on an issue easily understood by financially strapped taxpayers: \$165 million in bonuses paid out at bailed-out

Republicans, struggling to regain their political footing, are content to let Democrats try to dig their way out of this mess on their own.

Professing shock at the bonus payments, Democrats have embarked on a hurry-up effort to impose what amounts to confiscatory taxes on the bonuses, a maneuver that almost surely will be tested in the courts.

Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner won a strong vote of confidence Wednesday from President Barack Obama, whose administration has been struggling with the controversy since the weekend.

But the mood is less charitable among congressional Democrats. And Republicans have made Geithner their top target, not surprising given Obama's continued high approval ratings.

'It's shocking that they would, the administration would come to us now and act surprised about these contracts," said Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., the Senate GOP leader. "This administration could have and should have ... prevented this from happening. They had a lot of leverage two weeks ago."

That would be when the Treasury Department decided to make an additional \$30 billion available to American International Group Inc., the huge insurance conglomerate deemed too big to fail by two administrations.

Which goes to the crux of the Democrats' current political prob-

Gone are the days when they could merely bludgeon the Bush administration and promise to seek bipartisan solutions to the nation's economic problems. Now, in control of the White

House and Congress, they are struggling to come up with an explanation for what no one in either party seems moved to defend.

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., said AIG stands as a symbol of "greed and perhaps corruption.'

Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., scoffed at AIG's claim that the money represents retention pay. There are enough bright people in

this country that would do the job for an honest salary, and enough honest taxpayers demanding that we put an end to this stuff. You can bet I'll make sure justice is served," he said. But the bonus payments occurred

on the Democrats' watch, and for Republicans, AIG seems politically providential.

Their overwhelming opposition to last month's stimulus bill appeared to be gaining little traction as Democrats showcase every shovelful of dirt that is turned ,Aî all in the name of economic recovery.

Criticism that Obama and Democrats are embarking on a new era of tax-and-spend is undercut by the lack of a budget alternative from Republicans ,Aî the party that presided over a historic run-up in the federal debt earlier this decade when it controlled both the White House and Congress.

Less than 100 days into the Obama administration, polls have brought little good news to

Republicans.

While a recent Pew survey found some slippage in Obama's support, it also registered only 28 percent approval for the job being done by GOP congressional leaders, the lowest in nearly 14 years. And a separate survey by CNN and Opinion Research Corp. put support for the president's handling of the economy at nearly 60 percent.

Against this backdrop, White House press secretary Robert Gibbs sought to explain AIG.

He told reporters that Geithner "last week engaged with the CEO of AIG to communicate what we thought were outrageous and unacceptable bonuses," and "received a commitment to lessen some of the bonuses for senior executives."

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Asked directly if Obama is satisfied that he found out about the bonuses in a timely fashion, Gibbs said: "Yes, the president is satisfied."

The president "has complete confidence" in his Treasury secretary, Gibbs added, although Geithner's early tenure has been anything but smooth. The Cabinet official's introduction of a new plan to bail out the financial industry was widely panned, and his confirmation was held up earlier when it was disclosed he had paid \$34,000 in back taxes.

Obama himself has been vocal on the need to do everything possible to recoup the money paid out in bonuses, and so far, no Democrats in Congress have tried to hold him to account.

But the Treasury Department isn't immune, even from Democrats.

"I'm outraged by this," said Baucus in a statement. "At one point the Treasury was in a position to stop these bonuses. Those were the terms of TARP, terms that I helped draft." But talk of legislation only leads

to more uncomfortable questions for Democrats.

Sen. Olympia Snowe, R-Maine, and Ron Wyden, D-Ore., won passage of a provision earlier this year that they said would have prevented the type of payments now at the center of a storm.

It was dropped without explanation in the final compromise on the measure, economic stimulus replaced by a less restrictive set of conditions backed by Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., and accepted by the White House. "The president goes out and says

this is not acceptable and then some backroom deal gets cut to let these things get paid out anyway," said Wyden.



Lawmaker sees fight in tanning bill

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A proposal that would make it harder for Texas teenagers to enter the tanning bed was compared to legislation against Big Tobacco in testimony before a House panel Tuesday.

"In the United states and Texas, we don't allow our teens to purchase cigarettes until after they are 18 because it is a carcinogen," said Rep. Burt Solomons, R-Carrollton. "Yet we don't do that for tanning beds, which can expose teens to the same risk for cancer.

The bill would require anyone under 18 years old to get a doctor's note before using a tanning bed and would require a parent be with them in the salon.

Dermatologists and melanoma survivors pressed that tanning beds are a proven risk for skin cancer including melanoma, and teens are at particularly high risk for such


Annual book review slated


