Arrest yields 233 pounds of pot

A woman was arrested Friday (March 20) near McLean for possession of 233 pounds of marijuana, which carries a value of \$897,750.

According to local Department of Public Safety officials, the arrest occurred Friday afternoon

at 1:39 p.m. during a traffic stop.

Bonnie Lynn Demille, 47, of North Las Vegas, Nev., was driving a 2009 Chrysler van.

Demille was stopped for

driving on an improved shoulder, travelling eastbound on I-40 at mile marker 141.

The arresting trooper noticed a strong odor of marijuana coming from the vehicle. The driver had what was considered to be an implausible story to account for the source of the odor.

The trooper asked for consent to search the vehicle, which was granted.

A K-9 officer was brought in and alerted to the presence of narcotics in the vehicle. Upon further inspection, the trooper found 233 pounds of marijuana in the vehicle.

Demille was released from Gray County Jail on Sunday (March 22) on \$25,000 bond.

Dyers open new Hoagies location

AMARILLO -- What started out as lunch place for Pampa High School students has grown and spread across the Texas Panhandle.

"My parents and aunt opened Harvester Barbecue in 1964 in Pampa," Shane Dyer said, sitting in a booth at the family's newest operation in Amarillo.

Tanner Dyer, PHS Class of 2002, opened Hoagies in the Western Crossing Shopping Center this month.

While the Dyer name is synonymous with barbecue in the panhandle, Tanner said his favorite has always been the deli.

Shane Dyer, Tanner's father, opened the original Hoagies 14 years ago in Pampa.

Tanner started his career at Hoagies.

"I started washing dishes when I was 13 or 14," Tanner said. "I'd ride my bike up there."

He worked at Hoagies in Pampa on nights and weekends while he was in high school.

"That's kind of been my niche in the family," Tanner said. "I've always been partial to the deli."

Tanner grew up in Pampa and played football at Pampa High School.

A PHS 2002 graduate, he went to school at the University of Oklahoma for a couple of years where he majored in marketing and finance.

"I tried to get out of the business," he laughed, "but it didn't work. They reeled me back in."

Ten years ago, Shane took the Hoagies concept to Amarillo, opening at a location on Georgia near Interstate 40, but Tanner has upgraded the concept and made it younger, moving the location to the hot, new Western Street side of the shopping center at I-40 and Western.

Both Tanner and his father said they're extremely happy with the crowds they've gotten the first few days they've been open.

Shane said they had developed a very loyal following at their old location and those people have followed them.


McLean native to be inducted into PPA Hall of Fame

Mike Haynes, a 1969 McLean High School graduate, will be inducted into the Panhandle Press Association Hall of Fame Friday, March 27.

Haynes was editor and publisher of The McLean News in 1978 and 1979 and has worked for newspapers in Lubbock, Amarillo, Humble and Galveston. He has been a journalism instructor and publications adviser at Amarillo College for 18 years and at Texas Tech University for seven years. He was on the PPA board for six years, serving as president in 2003-2004. He was president of the Texas Community College Journalism Association in 2003-2005.

Haynes has written a column for the Amarillo Globe-News since 1990, focusing on religion topics since 1997. He won national Amy Awards in 2000 and 2002 for Christian writing.

He earned a bachelor's degree in journalism at Texas Tech in 1973 and a master's in mass communications at Tech in 1991. His master's thesis was a biography of Wes Izzard, longtime editor of the Globe-News. Haynes wrote his first newspaper stories for The McLean

News in 1968, covering Tiger football games under the byline, "High School Reporter." He was the Gray County Spelling Bee champion in 1965.

While editor of The McLean News in 1978, his photos of the McLean 66 Roundup and Rodeo took first place in sports photography in the PPA contest.

In 1986 while working at

Tech, he received the Honor Roll Award from the national College Media Advisers. While at Amarillo College in 2002, he was named statewide Adviser of the Year by the Texas Intercollegiate Press Association.

He was on the advisory board of Plains Faith magazine from 2003 to 2005.

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

Stanford receiver working "as fast as he can"

HOUSTON (AP) — A court-appointed receiver says he is working as fast as he can to sort through the financial mess that has resulted from the alleged \$8 billion fraud by Texan R. Allen Stanford.

Since he was appointed by a federal judge in February, Dallas attorney Ralph Janvey, 58, has not been a favorite of investors who had money in Stanford's various financial institutions. Some investors have bounced checks for mortgages and other personal expenses as they have waited for Janvey to release their money, which was frozen right after the financial scandal broke.

"We want them to know that we are aware of their hardship. We know that in many cases their needs are urgent, and we are trying to address them as quickly and completely as we can," Janvey wrote in response to a series of written questions from the Houston Chronicle.

Some investors are still upset with Janvey.

"My family and I have

suffered the pain, stress, and hardship only you have caused. I have had bounced checks for my mortgage, semiannual car insurance, heating bill, and various medical bills while you have been protecting me," North Carolina investor William Allen wrote in an e-mail.

Janvey also fired 1,000 workers — 85 percent of Stanford's U.S. work force — with no severance or grace period for benefits.

U.S. District Judge David Godbey, of Dallas, appointed Janvey and froze Stanford's assets on Feb. 17. At the same time, the Securities and Exchange Commission filed a civil complaint alleging fraud, mostly involving certificates of deposit at Stanford International Bank on the Caribbean island of Antigua.

The SEC has accused Stanford and his finance chief James M. Davis of conducting a "massive Ponzi scheme" through companies they controlled, including the Antigua-based bank. In a Ponzi

scheme, early investors are

paid returns from money put in by later investors.

At Janvey's request more than 85 percent of the 32,000 Stanford client accounts that were frozen have been released.

But accounts containing CDs, or those held by investors who also held CDs, remain frozen as Janvey's team works to find what's left.

They've only found a fraction of more than \$7 billion purportedly in Stanford CDs, Janvey said.

"We are still looking for money. The defendants worked long and hard to hide it, and we are having to work long and hard to find it," he said.

As receiver, Janvey controls all of Stanford Financial's assets, including all documents, computers, yachts and six corporate jets.

Janvey has conducted four other receiverships in Dallas, though none as large as Stanford Financial.

Eventually, Janvey will distribute whatever assets he can recover to investors and others with claims.

lowed them to their new location.

"They are back," he said.

In addition to their old customers, Tanner said they're also beginning to see new customers and with the new retail stores opening up at Western Crossing, he said there's a lot more opportunity to grow.

"A big part of our business," Shane said, "is going to be Tascosa High School."

"The first store will be in Pampa," Shane said.

It's expected to open this summer.

Shane said that when he and Tanner sat down and started planning the Amarillo store, they wanted something new and different, but it had to be based on what they knew would work.

"Our deli's have always been the more traditional type," Shane said. "What we tried to do is make the concept much younger. It has a much younger look, a much younger feel."

The menu is much younger, but it's been thoroughly tested. It's evolved more than changed since the first Hoagies opened in Pampa, but the changes were first tried in Pampa before being exported to the Amarillo restaurant.

"We've been making changes slowly," Tanner said.

"We've got 22 new items," Shane said. "We've added these five new Panini sandwiches to the menu."

"They've really taken off," Tanner said.

There are a couple of new potatoes on the menu.

"Another thing that we're doing," Tanner said, "is coffee."

Of course, gourmet coffee wouldn't be special without the pastries.

"We have cinnamon rolls and turnovers," Tanner said.

The Philly cheese steak, however, is still their number one seller, Shane said.

at the response to that item," he said. "It's done very, very well."

The core menu is the same, Shane said.

"The core items that we've made our living on all these years are the same," Shane said, "but we really came in and tried to reinvent the whole concept."

It's not quite as traditional as in the past, he said.

Shane laughed and said the Hoagies in Coronado Center is his wife's baby. Shelley Dyer likes Pampa and the Pampa deli.

"I tried to get her to move into here, but she didn't want to do it," Shane said.

Depending upon the success of this location in Amarillo, Tanner said he might open another Amarillo location and perhaps one in Plainview or Lubbock.

"We're just waiting for the next great opportunity," Tanner grinned.

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Bill would make postpartum disorder legal defense

DALLAS (AP) — Postpartum mental disorder could be used as a legal defense for women who kill their children under a bill introduced in the Texas Legislature.

The bill was filed this month by Rep. Jessica Farrar, D-Houston, and it applies to women who commit the crime within a year of giving birth, The Dallas Morning News reported in Sunday editions. If jurors find a mother guilty of murder, they could take testimony about postpartum issues into consideration during the trial's punishment phase.

If jurors find that the woman's judgment was impaired because of child-birth or lactation, they could judge her guilty of infanticide, a state jail felony that would carry a maximum punishment of two years in jail.

If lawmakers approve the measure, Texas would become the first state to have an infanticide law, said George Parnham, the Houston attorney who defended Andrea Yates.

"It's something every civilized country has on its books," said Parnham, who supports the legislation. "The only thing that will change public attitude is education about postpartum issues."

McKinney attorney David Haynes, who defended Dena Schlosser, said Farrar's bill "recognizes the great stress that some mothers are under when they suffer from postpartum depression."

Yates drowned her five children — ranging in age from 7 years to 6 months — in June 2001 at her family's home in Houston. She was convicted of capital murder and sentenced to life in prison in 2002.

An appeals court in 2005 overturned her conviction because of some erroneous testimony. Yates was found innocent by reason of insanity in July 2006 and sent to a state mental hospital.

Schlosser, who killed her 10-month-

old daughter in 2004 by cutting off her arms with a kitchen knife, was recently released from the state mental hospital where she'd been sent after being found not guilty by reason of insanity.

Schlosser was released into outpatient treatment because her doctors believe she's mentally stable, a Collin County prosecutor has said. She is required to see a psychiatrist once a week, take medication, be on a physician-approved birth control and not have any unsupervised contact with children.

Shannon Edmonds, legislative liaison for the Texas District & County Attorneys Association, said the legislative proposal would have to be thoroughly reviewed.

"Anytime something novel like this is proposed," he said, "it needs to be fully vetted so that legislators can make informed decisions and be sure there are no unintended consequences."

Postpartum depression is recognized as a legal defense in at least 29 nations, including Britain, which has had an infanticide law since 1922.

"These countries have accepted the reality of postpartum mood disorders," said Susan Dowd Stone, chair of the President's Advisory Council for Postpartum Support International, a California-based advocacy group.

Postpartum psychosis is a rare condition that generally affects women with extreme sensitivity to hormonal fluctuations and a history of mental illness, Stone said.

"We do not want women who abuse children to use this defense," Stone said. "There are very clear guidelines for postpartum psychosis."

Even though Stone believes that women who suffer from postpartum disorder need treatment, not imprisonment, she recognizes that "infanticide with no jail time would not fly. Our country is not ready for that."

Dr. Barney Clark, recipient of a Jarvik permanent artificial heart, died at the University of Utah Medical Center after 112 days with the device.

Man killed in parking spot argument

DALLAS (AP)—Police are looking for the man who shot and killed an Irving man after an argument over a parking spot at a North Dallas park.

Wilmar Alexander Chavez, of Irving, died Saturday night after he got into an argument over a parking space at Anderson-Bonner Park in north Dallas, where he had gone to play soccer.

Chavez arrived at the park with his three nephews about 5 p.m. After he parked, he got out of his car and walked toward four men in a white sport utility vehicle who were angry at him for taking their space, police said. As he approached, someone fired a gun from inside at close range, striking Chavez. He was taken to nearby Medical City

Dallas Hospital, where he died. Officers were looking for a gunman and three others who left the crime scene in the SUV. Officers found the vehicle abandoned late Saturday near the intersection of Arapaho and Coit roads in far north Dallas, a few miles north of the shooting.

Dallas homicide Lt. Craig Miller told The Dallas Morning News on Sunday that witnesses gave detectives enough details to help locate the vehicle and identify a person of interest who had not yet been found.

"Right now, we know

who we are looking for," Miller said.

Family members said Chavez worked nearly every day on cars and wanted to start his own body shop. He hoped to get a start in America, then move his wife, Karina, and their 3-year-old daughter, also named Karina, from El Salvador to North Texas.

"His dream was to bring them here at the end of this year," said Walter Rivas, Chavez' uncle. "He had good plans for the rest of his life."

Fire near UT displaces students

AUSTIN, Texas (AP)—Investigators were trying to find out what caused a fire at a condominium complex that temporarily displaced about 60 University of Texas students.

The blaze caused about \$500,000 in damage but no residents were injured at the Heritage Condominiums, which is located near the university and has many students living in it, Austin Fire Department spokesman Don Smith said Sunday.

Smith said temporary living arrangements were found for the 60 displaced students.

The fire started on a second-floor balcony and spread to the third floor and attic area.

chamber members at relatively low cost. The chambers do not sell the insurance or collect premiums, but chamber membership is required. We will keep you posted as the program develops.

The fourth inning was scoreless.


Doughty scored once more in the fifth inning, but Plainview exploded in the fifth, driving home five runs to take the lead 5-4.


