Crow received a check for disabili ty for the month of April, but after that he is on his own, although he will be seeking an appeal for the
decision. decision.

According to the Social Security
Administration website, applicant can appeal the decision in writing or through their website. Someone may be chosen to represent the applicant,
like a lawyer or person knowledge able in the procedure. The reconsideration is a complete review of applicant's claim, by some one who had no part in the first deci-
sion. That person will then look at all the evidence used to make the original decision, plus any new evidence. In his application for appeal, Crow said that the judgement of his condiwork. "I am certainly unable to maintain

be inappropriate due to my difficulty
with sitting for extended periods of
time. Please reconsider your decision."

go through all of this," Crow said about the appeal process. His disability was disrupted due to incarceration, but he had been placed back on temporary disability after his
release, pending examination, since late December.
Crow was raised in Amarillo and said he moved to Pampa for a fresh start. "I was trying to do something with
the remainder of my life. I was starting from scratch, just trying to build
a new life". new life."
Crow had recently signed up for a two-year phone plan agreement to
establish credit. He said after this estabilish credit. He said after this
month, without disability, he will not me able to afford it and will have to cancel the contract. Crow had also bought a car for $\$ 500$ and agreed to
nake $\$ 100$ payments every month until paid off.
"I was expecting to carry my share,
now I don't know how I can do that."

Doctor in baby murder case stands by autopsy
BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) - The doctor charge that was dropped this week against an Alabama mother maintains the findings were cor rect, the medical examiner's lawyer said Friday. Six different experts disagreed with the autopsy report by Dr. Corinne Stern, who ruled that a new
born was suffocated in 2006. The experts' opinio that the baby boy was stillborn led a judge to dismiss the charge Thursday against Bridget Lee, 34 who spent nine months in jail after being charged with capital murder.
Jay Lewis, who represented Stern in a lawsuil she filed after leaving Alabama to work in Laredo, Texas, said Stern believes her original autopsy report was correct.

## Pirates put Obama in 21st-century bind

## Sage grouse suit targets grazing, drilling

| SCOTT SONNER Associated Press Writer RENO, Nev. (AP) Conservationists say federal rules that allow livestock grazing and oil and gas development across 25 million acres of public land in the West are illegal because they fail to acknowledge the harm being done to sage grouse. <br> A lawsuit recently filed in federal court accuses the Bureau of Land Management of violating two major environmental laws and its own regulations by allowing commercial activities to continue on those lands in Nevada, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Utah and California. <br> But in a switch in strategy, the environmentalists aren't asking a judge to immediately halt those operations. They want to talk, and they think they may have a willing listener in the new Obama administration. <br> "What we are after is finding a way to do things differently than in the past and better manage these public lands into the future," said Laird Lucas, a lawyer for the Western Watersheds Project, which filed the suit. <br> "The next 20 years are going to be really critical, not just for sage grouse, but for the whole sagebrush ecosystem," he said. "Getting an injunction that creates a crisis in the short term doesn't really serve that role." <br> Since taking office, President Obama has distanced himself from several Bush administration policies on the environment and suspended orders Bush signed in the waning days of his term that could lead to the easing of protections for threatened wildlife on federal land. <br> The change in administrations prompted the new approach from the Idaho-based environmental group that has spent much of the past eight years in court battling land use rules adopted by the BLM and Forest Service under the Bush administration. <br> "The Obama White House has a very strong | and public commitment to applying science-based decision-making for natural resource issues," said Jon Marvel, the group's director. <br> "We want to show the Obama administration the misdeeds of , the Bush administration in the hope they will understand and be interested in correcting those," he said. <br> Kendra Barkoff, press secretary for Interior Secretary Ken Salazar, said Friday "we are in the preliminary stages of litigation and as ", result can't comment." <br> Ranchers and drillers said the suit is part of an effort to keep livestock, energy development and other commercial activities off an area of the West bigger than the state of Indiana. <br> The Wyoming Stock Growers Association and the Petroleum Association of Wyoming have joined the govern- ment in seeking to dismiss the suit. A hearing on one of those motions is scheduled in Boise on April 16. <br> "They are trying to tie up 25 million acres and close it down to livestock operators altogether," said Ronald Opsahl, a lawyer for the Mountain States Legal Foundation, which represents the two Wyoming groups. <br> "As far as the scope of this case, it has to be unprecedented," he said. "I've never seen one lawsuit challenge 18 resource management plans in six states." <br> So far, Justice Department lawyers representing the BLM, have restricted their legal arguments primarily to matters of jurisdiction. Deborah Ferguson, assistant U.S. attorney for Idaho, said each of the 18 plans being challenged should be handled separately in U.S. courts in each of the six states. <br> The focus of the lawsuit is a chicken-sized game bird, mottled brown, black and white, found on sagebrush plains and high desert from Colorado to California and into southern Canada. The government Canada. The government estimates as many as 16 million sage grouse inhabited the West in the inhabited the West in the | early 1800 s when they were first observed by Lewis and Clark. Today their numbers have dwin dled as low as 100,000 according to a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service cen sus in 2005. <br> Wildfires, developmen and industry have cu steadily into their habitat now estimated to b about half of what it once was when the birds ranged from Kansas to Washington and into the Dakotas. <br> North Dakota's sage grouse population is limited to the far southwest ern corner of the state, in Golden Valley, Slope and Bowman counties. record-low number of male sage grouse in breeding grounds prompted biologists to close last fall's hunting season. <br> At issue in the lawsui is the BLM's National Sage Grouse Habitat Conservation Strategy The agency adopted it in 2004 as an interim plan to help protect the bird and guide management of federal rangeland while the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service considered whether to protec the sage grouse under the Endangered Species Act a move ex-Interior Secretary Gale Norton predicted would have more significant economthan did the listing of the northern spotted owl in the early 1990 s. <br> The wildlife service determined in 2005 not to list the sage grouse as an endangered or threatened species, but a federal judge overturned the decision. <br> Responding to a suit filed by the Western Watersheds Project, U.S District Judge B. cally minute, and they vary among different types of fish. And unless you're eating catch from polluted waters, you usually have to eat an awful lot of fish
for quite a while before showing signs of mercury poisoning.
"For the vast majority of people, it's not a real issue, because the vast majority of people don't eat

Mercury occurs naturally in the atmosphere and humans pump even more of it into the air through pollution. When it lands on lakes, rivers and oceans, mercury can be transformed by microorganisms into a more toxic form called $n$
danger for seafood eaters.
Trace amounts of methylmercury can build up in fish and shellfish. And it can build up in the animals fish and shelfish. And it can build up in the fish, including humans, who then can experience neurological problems. Symptoms can include tingling sensations around fingertips, toes
and lips, a lack of coordination, vision problems and trouble articulating words. In extreme cases, mercury poisoning can cripple, kill and cause birth defects. Health officials are most concerned about the dan-
ger to developing brains and nervous systems and ger to dreveloping brains and nervous systems and dren, pregnant women and women of childbearing age. But all adults are advised to watch their seafood consumption.
