Pampa chosen for next gen 9-1-1

Beginning in June, The Pampa Police Department will be one of two facilities in the panhandle with a Internet Protocol capable 9-1-1 call system.

The Next Generation 9-1-1 or NG9-1-1 call system will be installed as part of a state-wide effort to update the 9-1-1 call systems that have been in place since the 1966, when the first 9-1-1 call was received.

According to Greg Green, Program director Regional 911 network for the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, Pampa was chosen as the location because of it's call volume, superior facility and professional department.

"There is a culture of professionalism throughout that agency that gives us a lot of confidence that we can put equipment there," Green explained about the Pampa Police Department. "The department has a good environment, and they were willing to provide a lot of room for the special conditions the system requires. The Pampa PD has a very nice facility and overall culture."


"We are ready and excited," said Debbie McDonald, dispatch supervisor for the Pampa Police Department. McDonald said she as been with dispatch for eight years, and served the city 12 years before that She said the IP system and other improvements make this an exciting time for Pampa dispatchers.

The new system is a significant upgrade, which will eventually allow 9-1-1 dispatchers to receive emergency transmissions through text messages, digital images, On Star automatic crash notifications and other forms of

City, county sharing grant

Gray County Sheriff's Office and the Pampa Police Department are working together to get significant upgrades to both facilities, through federal stimulus

Upgrades are anticipated to take place in August. Although the grant has not been approved, both departments are optimistic about receiving the helpful funds.

"There is no guarantee," PPD Chief Donny Hooper explained, "but there is a good chance because we have shown that we are spending the money responsibly."

Both departments would share, split halfway, a grant for \$58,567. Each department would receive \$29,283.53. GCSO will use the money to update and acquire new cameras for security in the Gray County Jail. The cameras will be placed throughout the facility to provide superior surveillance, something that is much needed according to Sheriff Don Copeland.

Copeland said in a recent meeting with the County Commission that the cameras will help monitor activity in parts of the facility which are not currently monitored, like the booking area.

Hooper said that the PPD will use the funds to update technical features in the patrol cars, including wireless modems for laptops, digital video equipment, radar equipment, eight new portable radios, shelving instal-

House OKs efforts to grow research universities

Seven universities in Texas may soon be competing for money to help them become major research centers under a bill approved by the House Friday.

The measure would create three potential funding pools for "emerging research universities" but only if the Legislature puts the money into the program.

The House unanimously voted to send the measure to the Senate.

Dallas Republican Rep. Dan Branch, the author of the measure, said 10,000 students a year go out of state because there aren't enough major research universities in Texas.

"We're losing \$2.7 billion a year, and we're running some of our best and brightest out of the state," Branch said, adding that Texas needs to catch up to other large states like California, which has nine Tier One research universi-

Texas currently has three nationally recognized Tier One schools the University of

Texas at Austin, Texas A&M University and Rice University

Under the bill, seven schools identified as emerging research centers by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board — including Texas Tech University and the University of Houston could compete for research funding.

In the past, schools struggling to gain a national research reputation had individually sought funding without much luck.

"Once you try to do that, then the other people say "Hey what about us?" Branch said. "So this is a way to set up a competition for everyone to participate.

The bill creates three possible ways for schools to compete. One of the pools would distribute money based on the amount of research a school does.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) Another would partially or fully match private donations to the schools with state money.

Funding will not automatically bring the schools up to a nationally recognized level but the competition aspect allows the schools to prove themselves, officials said.

"It will give the seven institutions an opportunity to break away from the pack," said Raymund Paredes, commissioner of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Paredes said each of the seven universities is likely to need heavy funding as high as \$100 million per year - for 20 to 30 years before they can become Tier One schools.

"(The bill) is a good start — particularly in tough economic times but nobody believes that we're not going to have to increase funding and sustain it for a good long time before we can get these schools where they need to be," Paredes said.





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Leadership style of new speaker taking shape

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -The role of Texas House speaker isn't defined by the state Constitution, but rather by the individual holding the office. From reformminded Price Daniel Jr. to the iron-fisted rule of Tom Craddick, circumstances and personalities have dictated each leader's power and prestige.

Three months into his first term leading the 150-member chamber, Republican Speaker Joe Straus is emerging as a bipartisan compromiseseeker, rejecting much of the power that his predecessor so coveted.

Straus still faces some tough tests, but just four years after Craddick was anointed as the most powerful Texan by Texas Monthly magazine, observers say the young GOP leader has shifted power back to the House.

"Not some, probably all," said Rep. Tommy Merritt, a Longview Republican when asked if the speaker has given up some of the office's power. "He's doing exactly what a good speaker should do. He's wielding the gavel and trying to make fair rulings to make the will of the House work for Texas."

Straus' first big victory normally raucous House unanimously approved the \$178 billion budget. It was the first time in a decade that the usually thorny state budget came out with 149-0 approval.

In a rare sit-down, onthe-record interview with The Associated Press, Straus said the unanimous vote was the result of weeks of negotiations and compromise.

"No one, right or left, Republican or Democrat, urban or rural, is going to crush somebody by sheer force this session," said Straus, the state's first Jewish speaker.

Though he prefers to shun the spotlight, Straus is well liked around the Capitol. With a thick head of salt-and-pepper hair, his distinguished and polished looks convey his wealthy San Antonio pedigree. He spoke on a wide number of subjects during the nearly hourlong AP interview.

He said he could see both together," King said. sides of the argument over whether the state should oppose Gov. Rick Perry to accept federal unemployment money, criticized his counterpart in the Senate for hastily taking up a divisive political bill and said Perry has gotten a little overly enthusiastic in suggesting Texans might at some point want to secede.

"I think it's hyperbole," he said. "It's getting the governor so enthusiastic that sometimes I think he gets a little over enthusiastic. I'm the opposite. I'm boring and slow. I'm surehe didn't mean it."

As speaker, Straus sets the agenda in the Texas House and, in terms of political influence, is on par with the governor and lieutenant governor.

His surprise rise to power this year ended an era of bitter partisan division. Craddick's six-year reign yielded the successful passage of an aggressive GOP agenda including curbs on personal injury lawsuits, congressional redistricting and school property tax reductions. But his winat-all-costs style inspired a House uprising that led to his eventual defeat.

"This is a period of transition," said Michael Phillips, a historian working on a book about the came last week when the history of Texas speakers. "Straus is not able to, in this period, to really wield the power that that leadership has had, that's been developing for 20 years. His humble objective is to make sure the House functions more smoothly ... but not at the risk of alienating the Democrats that put him into office."

> The new decentralized power structure "puts a lot more burden on the" committee chairmen, said Rep. Phil King, a Republican from Weatherford. "Chairs are taking a lot more Tylenol and Advil than in previous sessions.'

Still, Straus' role in brokering the newfound harmony remains to be seen. With Republicans holding a narrow 76-74 edge over Democrats, compromise would be necessary under any speaker.

"Anyone can assemble enough members to kill almost anything ... so everyone's having to work Moreover, the House

has been off to a slow start and many of the session's most important votes have only taken place in the "There are a bunch of

bills that have yet to come up in the House that are going to show us more," said Ross Ramsey, editor of the online newsletter Texas Weekly. "We don't have a complete picture

Lately, Straus has been working to forge a compromise on an effort to strengthen voter identification requirements, a measure so divisive it sparked partisan meltdown in the Senate and triggered threats of lawsuits.

The legislation is expected to be debated by

the House within the next couple of weeks. But by many accounts, a House compromise is on the horizon. Unlike the Senate, Straus said, the House wasn't going to "pull the pin on the grenade and be irresponsible, which I think they were.'

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"They just didn't care about the consequences of the emotional side of it," he said. "And we're trying to be deliberate and slow ... we're trying to find solutions, not just talking points for somebody's political agenda.'

Add to that immigration issues, transportation funding and looming fights over higher education admissions and funding, and it's certain Straus will be tested plenty before the session ends on June 1.

Texas DA in office 36 years dies of lung cancer

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Tarrant County District Attorney Tim Curry, whose 36 years in office make him one of the state's longest-serving top prosecutors, died early Friday at his home after battling lung cancer. He was 70.

Curry, who had undergone chemotherapy treatments since his diagnosis last summer, had been at home since the first of the year, Assistant District Attorney Joe Shannon told The Associated Press on Friday. He said he and others will remember Curry for his integrity

"He would always tell you, 'Do what you think is right,' especially when you had a tough call to make," Shannon said. "And once you made a deal, you stuck with it.'

Curry is likely among the longest serving criminal district attorneys in Texas history, according to incomplete records from the Texas District & County Attorneys Association, spokeswoman Sarah Wolf said.


Born in the tiny West Texas town of Tulia, Curry joined his father and older brother at their Fort Worth law firm after graduating from Texas Christian University and Baylor Law School.

He and some colleagues recruited someone to run for district attorney because they felt the office was rife with corruption, but when their first choice backed out at the last minute, Curry ran and was elected in 1972.

for copper-wire phone systems of the 1960s. Through the years, Green explained, the technology for the system has been gone through "a great deal of tweaking" in order to receive wireless calls, and computer phone calls.

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"The public expect their 911 calls to be answered, and they aren't concerned with what it texts to make it happen, they just expect it to be there.'

Green said that this can become a serious problem in wide-scale emergency situations, like the shootings at Virginia Tech on April 16, 2007 which left 33 people dead.

"There is a younger generation who rely on text message and they thought they could text a call center. The students came out saying, "I was texting 9-1-1 all the time."

Green said there is not a call center today that will receive a 9-1-1 text transmission, even centers that have been updated for IP capability.

Green predicts another 3-5 years before any system can accept these transmissions.

In the meantime however, IP systems like the one in Pampa will be used to help dispatchers access a greater base of information to help responders and

the system is designed school and tell responders exactly how to access the

person in need. Green said that in addition to superior facilities at the Pampa Police Department, Pampa was a good location for the NG9-1-1 system because of the

receives. Pampa is one of the two busiest call centers outside Potter and Randall counties in the Panhandle, which is a main reason it was chosen first to get the new IP equipment.

Eventually, IP capable equipment will be installed at all the 23 call centers in the Panhandle. The Pampa and Amarillo call centers will each service 11 counties using the new equip-

Nationwide, Green said that 9-1-1 administrators are trying to address the biggest problem that 9-1-1 coordinators face, keeping up with the way people communicate today. With the dawning of new forms of technology every day, 9-1-1 coordinators face a certain nightmare of knowing the Legacy System can't keep up with the changes.

Green said that the Legacy System has been "shoe horned" many times since the '60s to adapt to teletype/telecommunications devices for the wireless/cellular voice, VoIP, and Public Safety Answering

Sue's mom and dad stopped by for a couple of weeks on their way from "snowbirding" in Arizona back to Missouri. Our good friend and former next door Missouri neighbor, Ivan, was also here for a few days. My daughter, Rachel, had already moved from Indiana, bringing along her bloodhound and her cat, Hitch.

Combine all that with our menagerie of a dog and two cats and it was like Grand Central Station at our house last week

Secure borders necessary for safe and prosperous Texas

Over 1,200 miles of international border snakes along the Rio Grande through Texas, giving our state the distinction of holding more international boundary than all other states on the Mexican border combined. While this position grants Texas unmatched access to the economic benefits of international commerce and has deeply enriched our state's culture and heritage, our shared border also leaves us particularly vulnerable to the challenges associated with illegal immigration and Mexican drug trafficking organizations.

On a typical day, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) officials arrest 73 criminals at ports of entry, seize 7,621 pounds of narcotics, and apprehend roughly 2,796 individuals who have illegally entered the U.S. Compounding these challenges are the increasingly brazen and sophisticated threats from Mexican drug trafficking organizations. Mexican drug gangs have extended their operations into all areas of Texas and the nation. They control most of the U.S. drug market and have established ties with street gangs in American cities, including Atlanta, Chicago, and New York. And as crime and violence surge along the Mexican border, Texas communities are on the front

lines of this escalating threat.

More must be done at every level of government to secure our borders and ensure the continued safety and prosperity of communities in Texas and across the nation. This can only be accomplished through a balanced strategy that includes expansive and well-trained border patrol forces, substantial infrastructure, and adequate resources for local law enforcement officials. This has been an important legislative priority for me, and our efforts on this front have improved exponentially over the past 15 years. But we must continue to emphasize border security to keep up with mounting challenges.

Our agents along the border are most effective when they have the resources and equipment they need to do their jobs. This year, Congress increased funding for CBP over \$10.5 billion, including \$875 million for border security fencing, infrastructure, and technology. We have also worked to increase funding for Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) investigators, and detention officers. Additionally, \$1 billion has been dedicated to removing deportable criminal aliens, and we have increased our capacity to detain up to 33,400 individuals daily.

As well as providing for federal law enforcement activities, we must

also support the important efforts led by state and local law enforcement agencies in southern border states. I recently secured resources to aid local law enforcement in their struggle to combat criminal narcotics activity stemming from the border.

The defense provided by wellequipped border forces must be bolstered by infrastructure, which can provide an additional deterrent to breaking the law by entering our country illegally. I have consistently supported legislation to require and to fund the construction of 700 miles of fencing along the southern border. Although most of the fence is now constructed, I recently supported an amendment to the Fiscal Year 2010 Budget to ensure that future appropriations bills will fully fund construction of the remaining portions of the fence.

To help address the problem of violence in Mexico and along the border, I am a strong proponent of specialized initiatives, like Project Gunrunner, that target criminal arms smuggling organizations who are directing the illegal flow of weapons from the U.S. into the hands of the cartels in Mexico.

We must vigilantly secure our borders, while working with our international partners toward the common good of our citizens.

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



It's the second round of layoffs at the Tyler plant this year. Carrier — which makes air conditioner parts — laid off 150 employees at the plant in February.



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

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Homeland secretary apologizes to veterans group

Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano met with the American Legion on Friday to apologize for a right-wing extremism report written by her agency, and the veterans group walked away from the meeting mollified.

Napolitano blamed one of her agency's analysts for prematurely sending out the intelligence assessment to law enforcement, according to Craig Roberts, an American Legion member who attended the meeting. The report says veterans returning from Iraq or Afghanistan could be susceptible to right-wing recruiters or commit lone acts of violence.

"She essentially admitted fault within her office," Roberts said.

Legion National Commander David Rehbein said, "I think the session in Secretary

Napolitano's office will go a long way to help our returning veterans in the future."

After the meeting, Napolitano issued a statement saying the department "has fixed the internal process that allowed this document to be released before it was ready."

The report, one of Homeland Security's periodic assessments, warned that right-wing extremists could use the bad state of the U.S. economy and the election of the country's first black president to recruit members. The analysis said veterans of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars could be targeted by the groups.

It drew angry reactions from Rehbein, conservative bloggers and Republican members of Congress who took to the House floor this week to criticize Napolitano, confirmed to her Cabinet posi-





Delta Air to return to Dallas

DALLAS (AP) — Delta Air Lines Inc. said Friday it will begin flights to and from Dallas Love Field this summer

The move will put Delta, the world's largest airline operator, head-to-head against Southwest Airlines Co., the dominant carrier at close-in Love Field.

To meet with legal restrictions at Love Field, Delta will operate three daily nonstop flights between Dallas and Memphis, Tenn., with 50-seat regional jets. Federal law limits nonstop flights from Love Field to states far from Texas, including Tennessee, but there is an exception for planes with 56 or fewer seats.

Atlanta-based Delta said the service would begin July 6 and be operated by Pinnacle Airlines under the Delta Connection name. Delta affiliates already offer three daily flights to Memphis from Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

Executive Vice President Glen Hauenstein said Delta's customers wanted convenience of flying in and out of Love Field, which is closer than DFW to downtown Dallas. From Delta's Memphis hub, passengers could connect to flights to about 90 other locations.

Delta offered flights on subsidiary Atlantic Southeast at Love Field several years ago but pulled out in 2003. It also greatly reduced the number of flights at DFW Airport, where AMR Corp.'s American Airlines is the

dominant carrier.

Besides Southwest, Continental Express also operates flights at Love Field. AMR's American Eagle has said it will halt its last service at Love Field, to Chicago, in

Delta also operates Northwest Airlines.

Texans could get more time in foreclosures

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texans who fall behind on their mortgage payments would get more time to try to save their homes under legislation approved by the Texas

Under current law, Texas homeowners have just 20 days to cure a loan default before lenders foreclose on them. It is one of the shortest foreclosure notice periods in country

The bill approved Friday, a top priority of Attorney General Greg Abbott, would extend that period to 45 days. The bill passed unanimously and now moves to the

House sends teacher protections to Senate

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A measure pulling some identifying information about Texas school teachers and employees from public records is headed to the Senate.

The House voted 107-18 in favor of the bill Friday. Education groups say the measure will protect school employees from identity theft. Journalists and open records advocates object to the bill because it would remove employee birth dates from public records. Reporters use full birth dates to identify people with common names when cross checking against criminal records.

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The bill requires school districts to release the information if they know employees were convicted of crimes such as sex offenses or violent crimes. They would not have to release other criminal information.

University student charged in homeless man's death

HOUSTON (AP) — Authorities say a University of Houston student fatally shot a homeless man on the school campus because he believes homeless people are a blight on society.



TRAVERSE CITY, Mich. (AP) — Meredith Bowen was getting tired of requests from Facebook friends to exchange makebelieve pansies, daffodils and tiny cartoon characters for her "(Lil) Green Patch," a virtual garden that sprouted on her socialnetworking page about a year ago.

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She was ready to delete it, until she learned The Nature Conservancy was getting a portion of the ad revenue generated by the game.

"I've saved like 133 square feet of rainforest," the 31-year-old Holt resident said.

Bowen illustrates both the potential upside and downside for charitable causes hoping to cash in on the popularity of socialnetworking sites such as Facebook News and Corp.'s MySpace.

With millions of users worldwide, the sites would seem fertile ground for fundraising experiments - especially ones where users aren't asked to make direct contributions.

But it's far from certain that social networking will prove as effective as more traditional fundraising methods such as direct mail, telephone solicitation and even e-mails to past donors.

One hurdle to overcome is the sheer deluge of information online.

As Facebook users are bombarded with invitations to send and receive virtual beers, throw snowballs, sign petitions and take quizzes, applications benefiting charities can seem like just another silly

"I get so many of those requests," said Nicole Marble, 23, who works at Michigan State University. "Sometimes I pay attention to them, but with a lot of them I'm just clicking 'Ignore, Ignore, Ignore

She took only minor interest in (Lil) Green Patch until learning recently from a reporter that the game's promise to help save rainforests and fight global warming was genu-

"I'll probably look into it a little more now," Marble said. "I just finished tending my garden, whatever that really means."

Many appeals on social networks have drawn lots of attention but few dol-

"You often see where 20,000 people have joined a cause and it's raised \$200," said Jim Tobin. president of Ignite Social Media, a promotional company in Cary, N.C.

The (Lil) Green Patch game has done better than most, generating \$162,150 in little more than a year, said Sue Citro, digital membership director for The Nature Conservancy.

It is among the most popular applications that Facebook can add to their profiles, with nearly 6 million active users monthly, according to Facebook.

Players plant virtual "gardens" with flowers and fruits sent by friends and send plants to them in return. Ads are shown alongside the game. Green Patch Inc., the Mountain View, Calif., developer of ities to past donors who cannot afford to give cash because of the bad economy but still want to help, she said.

Even if social-networking sites draw relatively little money now, it's imperative for nonprofits to explore them, said Melissa Brown, associate director of research for the Center on Philanthropy at Indiana University.

poverty group CARE using another rapidly growing site, Twitter.

For every "tweet," or short message, supporting the campaign, Fathom Events made a pledge. The "tweet-a-thon" raised \$5,000 for CARE, said Tobin, whose company promoted it.



As people's time and wallets are stretched ever thinner, they could decide that installing an application is their "charitable good deed for the day," leaving them less inclined to write a check or volunteer at the soup kitchen, Rainie said.

This is making the battle for people's contributions and charity endeavors and volunteer time all the more competitive and brutal," he said.

Marble, one of the (Lil) Green Patch players, said she appreciates that the game is simple to use and doesn't badger her to send cash. She just hopes the requests to swap plants don't get out of hand.

"If it gets too much, I might consider uninstalling or just clicking the 'ignore button on all of them," she said. "But that hasn't happened yet, so I'm still playing."

It's yet another avenue for raising money and awareness, supplementing direct online contributions generated by running ads and sending e-mail to past donors. Social networks can potentially be more effective because they are cheaper and involve referrals from friends.

"A lot of the world is transitioning to using not just the Internet, but the socially connected Internet," said David King, Green Patch's founder. "We see this as the beginning of a whole movement where people are able to connect with each other and with foundations representing the causes that are important to them."

Despite being among the more lucrative Facebook applications, (Lil) Green Patch accounts for less than 3 percent of The Nature Conservancy's online fundraising — which itself generates just 10 percent of all individual donations to the group, Citro said.

Yet the conservancy is less concerned with raising big bucks than with planting seeds for future support from the younger generation active on social networks.

"It's really a great branding tool," Citro said. "It's helping spread the word, educating people about our organization and its mission."

The group recommends its social-networking activ-

Surveys by the center show that direct mail and phone solicitation have become less successful in recent years, while Internet fundraising has risen steadily. As more users gravitate to social networks, it makes sense for nonprofit groups to follow.

"This is a time for experimenting with the social networking, figuring out how it can work for your organization," Brown said.

The Humane Society of the United States used a Facebook application to promote this year's "Spay Day" drive in support of spaying and neutering.


The campaign invited people to upload photos of their pets to a Humane Society Web site and solicit contributions from family, friends and others. A Facebook application and other interactive "widgets," or small programs for blogs and MySpace pages - helped participants reach more potential donors.

The "Spay Day" drive raised \$600,000 from about 40,000 participants, said Carie Lewis, the Humane Society's Internet marketing manager. It's uncertain how much was generated through Facebook. But this year's campaign, the first to use the application and other widgets, was more successful than previous ones. In 2008, the 31,000 participants raised only \$72,000.

NCM Fathom Events, an entertainment company based in Centennial, Colo., sponsored a four-day fundraiser in March for the antiits an inexpensive way to reach mass audiences,

Tobin said. "Before, you had to have a budget for advertising space," he said. "What you need to have now is a really good idea that people gravitate toward. If you have that and make it fun or pull at the right heartstrings, you can get a lot of activity going.'

One potential pitfall: "Donor fatigue" might set in as social-networking sites become increasingly cluttered with pleas for help from do-gooders, said Lee Rainie, director of the Pew Internet and American Life Project.



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
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Johnson's announcing gives Derby English flavor

commentary of it. Four decades later, the chessboard has turned into Churchill Downs and the four knights have become the 20 top 3-year-olds in the world, all bidding for a slice of racing immortality.

Johnson will make his debut as the race caller in the Run for the Roses on May 2 as the new track announcer at racing's old Kentucky home, 40 years and an ocean removed from the chessboard in Skagness, the English seaside town where he grew up and first fell in love with the sport and its pag-

Calling the Derby is a job that he calls "a dream beyond my dreams," one that may take some getting used to for the 150,000 fans that will cram under the twin spires on the first Saturday in May.

Johnson is the track's first foreign-born announcer, and even though he won the job following a weeklong tryout at Churchill's fall meet, he knows his English accent will come as a surprise to some.

"I'm sure it'll be a bit of a different thing for them," he said.

Then again, things could be worse. He remembers watching the races on British television as a kid practically offended at how

stuffy the announcers were. "They were all very

posh," Johnson said. He is decidedly not. Johnson carries a couple

dozen markers in a bag with him, color-coding the program using a method that helps him have immediate recall of a horse's name, bio and other tidbits.

Sounds typical. A lot of announcers use a similar process.

None of them, however, carry the markers in a bag honoring Cartman, the foul-mouthed elementary schooler on the popular cartoon "South Park."

Tertainly it is a piece of theater and I'm there to entertain as well.

The bag was a gift from his wife, and a sign that he knows not to take his work too seriously.

"You're there to help the game flow and help the enjoyment of the game," he said. "Certainly it is a piece of theater and I'm there to entertain as well. But first and foremost the entertainment comes from the horses and the really brave guys and girls who ride the horses. If I can add to that, then I'm doing my job."

Johnson isn't the first foreigner to call a Triple Crown race. South African Trevor Denman called his first Triple Crown event at the 1989 Preakness while serving as the announcer at Pimlico, a gig it took him six years to land after coming to the states.

The transition to calling

American races, Denman admits, took awhile. He spent 15-20 hours with an elocutionist to take some of the edge out of his accent.

Denman, now announcer at several California tracks, doesn't think Johnson's adjustment will take as long but does expect a little blowback.

"I would be surprised if there's not some people who won't give it a very good reception because it's so different and they're used to hearing an American voice," Denman said. "The vast majority of people do not like change. I'm sure he'll be well-received, but it will be more that people don't like the change than don't like him."

It didn't seem to be a problem during Johnson's tryout, when he beat out four other callers to replace Luke Kruytbosch, who died last summer.

"In our eyes, Mark Johnson is the complete package when it comes to track announcer," Churchill Downs official Steve Sexton said when Johnson was hired in January. "He is a unique, polished and passionate talent with an absolutely infectious personality."

That became evident during his tryout. While calling a relatively anonymous claiming race on a chilly Wednesday, he watched as a filly pulled away from the field and decided to have a little fun with it.

"And they're strung out like Monday washing behind the leader," he said as they came to the wire.

It was a throwaway line in a relatively boring race, but one that seemed to resonate with the railbirds on the dreary day. He had four people approach him earlier this week - a good five months later — and tell him how much they



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

dous climax," he said. "It's just about the same as the Derby, isn't it?"

Perry courts party'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) An homage to states' rights, a fleeting reference to secession and a private gathering with evangelicals place Texas Gov. Rick Perry at the far right edge of the Republican Party.

And it seems that's exactly where he wants to

The two-term governor is lately offering fiery remarks that appeal to highly conservative voters as he gears up for a rough, expensive re-election race against U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison for the GOP nomination.

"There certainly is a strategy there, and one that he's run before," said Cal Jillson, a political science professor at Southern Methodist University. Perry, who has never lost an election, is working to nail down the support of social and economic conservatives who tend to dominate Texas' GOP primary voting before he even thinks about moving toward the middle to appeal to a larger group of Texans, Jillson said.

Recent history shows pleasing those conservative voters is the key to winning GOP primaries in Texas. No more than about 650,000 of Texas' 13 million registered voters typically vote in a Republican gubernatorial primary, but there usually aren't two heavyweight contenders on the ballot.

Whoever survives that contest for governor in March 2010 is the favorite to win the November general election in the stillreliably Republican state.

The challenge for Hutchison, who's more moderate than Perry on social issues like abortion and embryonic stem cell research, is to attract middle-of-the-road voters and suburban women to the party, where some in the

GOP primary, Jillson said. By doing that, he said, she could form a foundation for Texas Republicans' future as the state's demographics change and voters become less conservative.

"I think that argument is there to be made because Perry does amaze and offend regularly," Jillson

Despite late-night comedy jokes about his secession remark and low-key criticism from Hutchison that he's not providing leadership, Perry appears to be relishing the lime-

Perry campaign workers insist he's simply continuing to talk to the same groups about the same conservative principles of finance and faith he has championed for eight years as governor.

"Business as usual," said Perry spokesman Mark Miner. "These are issues that he believes in and he has been talking about throughout his career."

Perry refused to accept \$555 million in stimulus unemployment fund money because he says it would leave Texas paying the tab later on. On Monday, Perry will moderate a conservative panel in Garland taking aim at President Barack Obama's first 100 days in office.

Two weeks ago, Perry made a stand against what he sees as encroaching federal regulation and for a Texas House resolution praising the 10th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, which provides for states' rights. Video of that news conference swept the Internet and attracted the attention of conservative commentators and radio hosts. It was a prelude to Perry's appearances at anti-tax tea parties around the state on April 15.

After an Austin tea

crowd shouted "Secede!" a pumped-up Perry suggested Texans might get so fed up they would want to secede from the United States if Washington, D.C., didn't start listening to average Americans. He added he didn't think the state should pull out of the

That earned him another round of attention across the country.

On Wednesday, Perry attended a fundraiser in Austin for fellow Republican Gov. Bobby Jindal of Louisiana, another anti-stimulus money governor and a potential presidential candidate. Earlier this spring, 2008 vice presidential nominee and Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin endorsed Perry.

Perry met this week with the Texas Pastor Council, a group of conservative ministers

"People of faith have an obligation and a duty to be involved in the public arena," Perry said. "They need to be engaged."

Hutchison's camp seems confident there's a long road to go - and many more issues to explore before the 2010 voting. Her spokesman brushes aside any boost Perry may be getting at the moment.

"Texas Republicans are looking for a governor who provides leadership, vision and represents the best_ in our state; they do not want political theatrics to be a substitute," Hutchison spokesman Hans Klingler

Hutchison has considered running against Perry twice before, but didn't. In 2006, Perry warned that if Hutchison entered it would be a bruising, divisive race. This time she says she won't be dissuaded.

Another Republican who sized up Perry and opted not to run against him in a GOP primary is former Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn, who ran

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FAA: bird strikes more than double at big airports

WASHINGTON (AP) Airplane collisions with birds have more than doubled at 13 major U.S. airports since 2000, and New York's Kennedy airport and Sacramento International report the most incidents with serious damage, according to Federal Aviation Administration data released for the first time Friday.

The FAA list of wildlife strikes, published on the Internet, details more than 89,000 incidents since 1990, including 28 cases since 2000 when a collision with a bird or other animal such as a deer on a runway was so severe that the aircraft was considered destroyed.

But even the FAA estimates that its voluntary reporting system captures only about 20 percent of all wildlife strikes and some airports and airlines do a better job of reporting than others.

Eleven people have died in airplane collisions with birds or deer since 1990, the data also show.

The data revealed one positive trend: strikes that caused major damage dropped noticeably in 2007 and 2008. In 2000, pilots reported 178 strikes that caused major damage to airplanes; in 2008, there were only 85 such reports. There was no immediate explanation from the FAA, although the agency tightened engine design standards in 2004 to better withstand bird strikes.

Topping the list of airports where planes were either substantially damaged or destroyed by birds since 2000 were John F. Kennedy International Airport in New York with at least 30 such accidents and Sacramento International Airport in California with at least 28 accidents. Kennedy, the nation's 6th busiest airport, is located amid wetlands that attract birds, and Sacramento International, the nation's 40th busiest, abuts farms whose crops draw birds and sits along the Pacific Flyway used by migratory birds.

The first disclosure of the entire FAA bird strike database, including the firstever release of the locations of strikes, occurred largely due to pressure after the dramatic ditch-

ing of a US Airways jet in the Hudson River after bird strikes knocked out both of its engines on Jan. 15. Days later, The Associated Press requested release of the database under the Freedom of Information

All 155 people aboard survived when pilot Chesley "Sully" Sullenberger ditched the powerless jet into the Hudson without breaking it up. The most recent fatal bird-strike incident came in October 2007: A student and instructor pilot died when their small, twin-engine business plane crashed in Browerville, Minn., after it struck a Canada goose during a night training flight. That plane's left engine had been damaged by a bird strike the day before and was repaired the day of the fatal crash.

Reports doubled at some of the nation's busiest airports, including New Orleans, Houston's Hobby, Kansas City, Orlando and Salt Lake City. Lovell Field, in Chattanooga, Tenn., registered the greatest increase in wildlife strikes, going from four reported incidents in 2000 to 55 in 2008 — a 1,275 percent increase.

Wildlife experts have said the population of some birds, particularly large ones like Canada geese, has been growing as more and more birds find the food to live near cities and airports year round rather than migrating.

All told, pilots reported striking at least 59,776 birds since 2000. The most common strike involved mourning doves; pilots reported hitting 2,291 between 2000 and 2008. Other airborne victims included gulls (2,186), European starlings (1,427) and American kestrels (1,422).

A single United Airlines 737 passenger jet suffered at least 29 minor collisions with birds and one accident involving a small deer more than any other plane since 2000. In only one case was damage significant, when the jet climbed out of Philadelphia International Airport into a flock of gulls flying at 1,000 feet the night of Jan. 30, 2006. The pilot declared an emergency after at least one engine sucked in a large gull and

began vibrating badly. No one was hurt, but the airline spent about \$37,000 in repairs.

That same plane has experienced incidents in San Francisco; Salt Lake City; San Jose, Calif.; Houston; Denver; Toronto; New Orleans; Chicago and Spokane, Wash. Its most recent incident was weeks before Thanksgiving when it struck a single small bird during takeoff in Denver.

Since 2000, reported bird strikes have resulted in five fatalities and 93 injuries. The cost of repairs was estimated at more than \$267 million in inflationadjusted dollars, but many of the incident reports contained no estimate of the repair cost.

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
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
