Early voting begins today

Early voting begins today in city and school district elections around the county. For Pampa's mayor, incumbent Lonny Robbins faces challenger Monty Danner. Commissioner from Ward 1 Brad Pingel and Ward 2 Commissioner Robert Dixon are unopposed. For Pampa Independent School District, Board President Charles Smith faces challeng-

er David Teichmann. School Board Trustee Lee Porter is unopposed. In Lefors, David Boyd, Billy McMinn, Dana Davis, Roy Clark Reedy and Susan Oldham are running for three openings on the city council. Mecca McBee, Sam O'Brien and Kathy Tinney are running for two openings on the Lefors school board. Pat McBee is running for an unexpired term on the Lefors school board. In the McLean city election, Mayor Peggy

Sharp Baer is unopposed. Molly McDowell, Daniel D. Gallaway and Lynn Reeves are running for two alderman positions. Chet Bohlar, Carey Richardson and Jeremiah J. Soto are running for two three-year term places on the McLean school board. Randy Eddleman is running unopposed for a two-year unexpired term. Early voting begins April 27 and ends May 5 at 5 p.m. Election Day is Saturday, May 9.

Swine flu investigation closes 1 school district

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A South Texas school district was closed and residents of Guadalupe County were asked to avoid public gatherings and stay home if they are ill — all efforts to prevent the spread of a new strain of swine flu that has killed more than 100 people in Mexico. Two cases have been confirmed in Texas and samples from eight other possible cases have been sent to the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for testing. Texas Department of State Health Services spokesman Doug McBride said no more cases had been confirmed as of Monday. Emily Palmer, a spokeswoman for the Texas Department of State Health Services, said five of the cases being tested were in the Guadalupe County area where the two confirmed cases involving students at a high school in Cibolo

have been found. The other three possible cases are in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. All the Texas cases have been mild. Dallas County health officials passed out fliers to travelers getting off buses from Mexico on Sunday, urging them to seek medical attention if they become ill. Mexico's federal health secretary says the disease has killed 103 people and likely sickened more than 1,600 since April 13. U.S. officials say the virus has been found in New York, California, Texas, Kansas and Ohio, but no fatalities have been reported. Palmer said Texas officials were asking hospitals and doctors to do preliminary onsite tests to determine if patients with flu-like symptoms have the virus and to forward the samples of flu patients to a state lab. From there, any samples of unidentifiable

flu viruses will be sent to the CDC, she said. Because of the aggressive survey, officials expect more cases to be identified in Texas. Typically, mild cases of the flu might otherwise go unnoticed. "We expect we probably will find more cases because we are into actively looking for cases," Palmer said. The two boys who had the first confirmed Texas cases of the swine flu recovered and returned to school last week. A plan to close the high school this week was expanded to include all 14 schools in the Schertz-Cibolo-Universal City Independent School District and two district facilities. The district also canceled extracurricular activities for at least a week as a precaution. Dr. Sandra Guerra, the

Perry asks CDC for antiviral medication

AUSTIN — Gov. Rick Perry today in a precautionary measure requested the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) provide 37,430 courses of antiviral medications from the Strategic National Stockpile to Texas to prevent the spread of swine flu. Currently, three cases of swine flu have been confirmed in Texas. "As a precautionary measure, I have requested that medication be on hand in Texas to help curb the spread of swine flu by helping those with both confirmed and suspected cases of this swine flu virus, as well as healthcare providers who may have come in contact with these patients," said Gov. Perry. "We will continue to work with our local, state and federal health officials to ensure public safety is protected." All three Texas cases are high school students from the same school in Guadalupe County. The first two students became ill in early April. Test results confirmed swine flu in both students on April 23. The third student did not become ill until this past week; lab results are still pending. Based on interviews, there is no direct connection between the first two students and the third. Two of the three cases in Texas have recovered well without the need for further medical intervention. The length of time between the known cases and the lack of connection leads the Department of State Health Services (DSHS) to conclude that other cases may have occurred and gone undiagnosed. DSHS

Ex-soldier's Ky. trial for Iraq crime begins

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP) — Opening arguments are under way in Kentucky in the trial of a former soldier charged with raping and killing a 14-year-old girl in Iraq and killing her family.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Brian Skaret outlined the prosecution's case to a jury Monday. Defense arguments were to follow in the trial of former Army soldier Steven Dale Green in federal court in Paducah.

Green is a former member of the Fort Campbell, Ky.-based 101st Airborne Division. Other soldiers have been prosecuted in military court for their involvement in the March 2006 attack.

Green, of Midland, Texas, has pleaded not guilty. He is being tried in civilian court because he was discharged from the Army before he was charged.

He could face the death penalty if convicted.

health official leading the Texas investigation, asked residents of Guadalupe County to avoid public gatherings and to stay home if they or a family member are ill.

The mayor of Cibolo closed city parks and asked churches to postpone activities. The mayor of Schertz, meanwhile, asked residents to, "if possible, refrain from public gatherings." Bexar County Judge Nelson Wolff asked county employees who live in Guadalupe County and feel ill with flu-like systems to not report to work. Bexar includes the city of San Antonio.

Meanwhile, Gov. Rick Perry asked that 850,000 more courses of antiviral medication be placed in Texas as a precaution. The number is 25 percent of the CDC's Texas allotment from the strategic national stockpile. Texas already has 840,000 courses of antiviral medication on hand following a purchase authorized by the Legislature and Perry in 2007.

Health officials have begun interviews to help determine how the boys with the two confirmed cases contracted the illness, Palmer said. Neither of the boys, a pair of close friends, had been to Mexico or had contact with someone who did, according to them and their families, she said.

Because tests are still being done to determine the incubation period for the illness, it's not clear how long the school will need to be closed or wheth-

er other nearby communities might also advise people to stay away from public gatherings, she said.

Meanwhile, public health officials along the border were carefully monitoring reports and asking health care providers to take respiratory samples from patients who appear to have the flu.

Dr. Hector Gonzalez, director of the Laredo city health department, said staff members were at hospitals and clinics in Laredo all weekend looking for any possible flu cases. He also talked to his counterpart in Nuevo Laredo on Sunday to ensure they could share any information on possible outbreaks.

With the thousands of people who pass daily between the U.S. and Mexico in his community, Gonzalez said the border region had to be considered a high-risk area. But by Sunday, no suspect cases had been reported.

"This is a perfect instance when we need to have immediate communication with our counterparts," Gonzalez said. "This virus is not going to respect any border."

Roger Maier, a U.S. Customs and Border Protection spokesman, said agents are looking for signs of travelers who may be infected with swine flu, though there are no specific health screenings at the ports of entry in El Paso. If agents suspect someone might be infected, Maier said agents can quarantine that person and refer the case to health officials.

Suspected swine flu deaths in Mexico top 100

MEXICO CITY (AP)

— Mexico's government tried Monday to stem the spread of a deadly strain of swine flu as the work week began by urging people to stay home if they have any symptoms of the virus believed to have killed more than 100 people.

Officials already closed schools in five states and canceled hundreds of public events. But as the number of suspected cases and deaths rose again — and millions returning to work — they looked to other measures to control the outbreak.

Labor Secretary Javier Lozano Alarcon said employers should isolate anyone showing up for work with fever, cough, sore throat or other signs of the flu.

The Mexico City government is considering a complete shutdown if the death toll keeps rising, including all public transport. Mayor Marcelo Ebrard said surgical masks were being distributed at subway and bus stops across the city.

The disease has hit hardest in the capital, but life was disrupted from Tijuana to Acapulco, a lucrative Pacific resort town where

night clubs and bars were ordered closed until further notice. Acapulco Mayor Manuel Anorve Banos said he was worried about tourists from Mexico City spreading the disease.

Some city dwellers headed to the beach, taking advantage of the closed schools. But those who live day-to-day worried about making ends meet if the city completely shuts down.

"We're going to have to stop working," said Raul Alvarez Torres, who relies on the subway to get from his gritty suburb to his shoe shining stand in an upscale Mexico city neighborhood each day. "If people have no transport, getting around is impossible."

For the first time in 300 years, the cathedral in Mexico City's main plaza has pulled an icon of the Lord of Health from storage, and worshippers placed it on the principal altar.

The Rev. Cuauhtemoc Islas said it would remain there until the medical emergency is over, Mexico's government news agency Notimex reported.

But the bad news kept coming. Health Secretary Jose Angel Cordova said

late Sunday the number of suspected swine flu cases in Mexico had climbed to 1,614, including 103 deaths.

Authorities were trying to confirm how many new cases were caused by the virus, which has been confirmed or suspected in at least a half-dozen other countries and has caused the U.S. to declare a health emergency.

But even as Mexican officials urged those with flu symptoms to seek medical help, some complained of being turned away.

In Toluca, a city west of the capital, one family said health authorities refused to treat a relative Sunday who had full-blown flu symptoms and could barely stand. The man, 31-year-old truck driver Elias Camacho, was even ordered out of a government ambulance, his father-in-law told The Associated Press.

Paramedics complained that Camacho — who had a fever, was coughing and had body aches — was contagious, Jorge Martinez Cruz said.

Family members took him by taxi to a public hospital, but a doctor there denied Camacho was sick and told the trio to leave,

Martinez said.

"The government told us that if we have these symptoms, we should go to these places, but look how they treat us," Martinez said. Camacho was finally admitted to the hospital — and placed in an area marked "restricted" — after a doctor at a private clinic notified state health authorities, Martinez said.

Jose Isaac Cepeda, who has had fever, diarrhea and joint pains since Friday, said he was turned away from two hospitals — the first because he isn't registered in the public health system, and the second "because they say they're too busy."

Mexico City's two main chains of movie theaters announced they were closing. The government suspended nearly all events at a national juvenile Olympics taking place in Tijuana, across the border from San Diego. Only swimming meets continued, without spectators.

"I worked so hard for this competition. I've been training for nearly a year and I would have liked to have an audience," said 13-year-old swimmer Jacqueline Sainz.

has contacted other students that have been absent from the school since April 11; eight students were absent due to flu-like illness. DSHS is currently investigating these cases.

"There is a reasonable chance that the current swine flu situation will not expand," DSHS Commissioner David Lakey said. "However, we must take prudent steps to ensure the state is prepared if it does. In addition to the antiviral medications previously purchased by the state, these additional medications will be available for the state as appropriate to prevent further spread of the virus."

The state is coordinating with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), as well as local and state health officials. Officials are closely monitoring the situation and investigating

any possible links to confirmed cases in California and Mexico. Perry also informed DHS Secretary Napolitano in a phone call today of his request to the CDC.

Symptoms of swine flu in people are similar to those of regular or seasonal flu and include fever, fatigue, lack of appetite and coughing. Some with swine flu also have reported runny nose, sore throat, nausea, vomiting and diarrhea.

Health officials say everyone should follow standard precautions to reduce the spread of any respiratory illness.

"Stay home when you are sick to avoid spreading illness to others.

"Cough or sneeze into the crook of your elbow or a tissue and properly dispose of used tissues.

"Wash hands frequently and thoroughly with soap and warm water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

'Dallas DNA' documentary series follows exonerees

DALLAS (AP) — For nearly 26 years, Johnnie Lindsey was in prison, a wrongly convicted man waiting for someone on the outside to believe in his innocence.

Last year, a DNA test from a rape kit proved Lindsey innocent, and he was released.

The 56-year-old man's sweetly subdued reaction upon hearing he will be freed is the dramatic high point in the opening episode of the six-part documentary series "Dallas DNA," premiering Tuesday at 10 p.m. EDT on Investigation Discovery. Relief floods across Lindsey's smooth face, his pursed lips showing the barest hint of a smile.

"On the inside, it was the feeling of experiencing a dream come true," Lindsey said in a recent interview with The Associated Press.

Lindsey's case is one of several profiled in "Dallas DNA," a series chronicling trailblazing Dallas County District Attorney Craig Watkins and his team's efforts to use DNA evidence to clear the innocent and confirm the convictions of the guilty.

A 2001 Texas law allowed inmates to request post-conviction DNA testing. But Dallas prosecutors routinely denied those requests until Watkins, the

state's first black district attorney, took office in 2007.

Watkins took a different tack, throwing open his office's files and allowing the Innocence Project of Texas to review cases where DNA testing could prove someone was wrongly convicted.

The results have been astounding.

Dallas County's 20 DNA exonerations are the most of any county in the nation and more than all but two states, according to The Innocence Project, a New York-based legal center. (In one of the 20 cases, however, the DA's office believes the exonerated man is guilty of a related crime and will retry him.)

Lindsey wrote six letters to a Dallas County court to get post-conviction DNA testing but never got a response until Watkins took office.

"It was a changing of the guard," Lindsey said. "When Craig Watkins took over, that's when things started to change."


Watkins said too many district attorneys are concerned about getting convictions or protecting the decision of the jury, rather than seeking justice. He said he hopes the show will "give other DAs the courage to do the same thing."

The "Dallas DNA" crew

spent three months embedded with Watkins and his Conviction Integrity Unit. Nothing was staged, and the show's producers did not know how the cases would play out. DNA testing confirms the original guilty verdict of some of the cases featured in the series.

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Supreme Court refuses Texas death row

HOUSTON (AP) — A Dallas-area man condemned for an attack that left three people dead during the robbery of their home in San Antonio more than 15 years ago has moved a step closer to execution with the U.S. Supreme Court's refusal to review his case.

Arnold Prieto, 35, is one of three men convicted in the fatal stabbings of Rudolfo Rodriguez, 72, his wife, Virginia, 62, and Paula Moran, 90, a family friend of the San Antonio couple.

In another Texas death row case, the high court has refused to review the case of Yosvanis Valle, 33, a Cuban native and alleged gang member. He was condemned for the fatal shooting 10 years ago of a drug dealer in Pasadena, just outside Houston.

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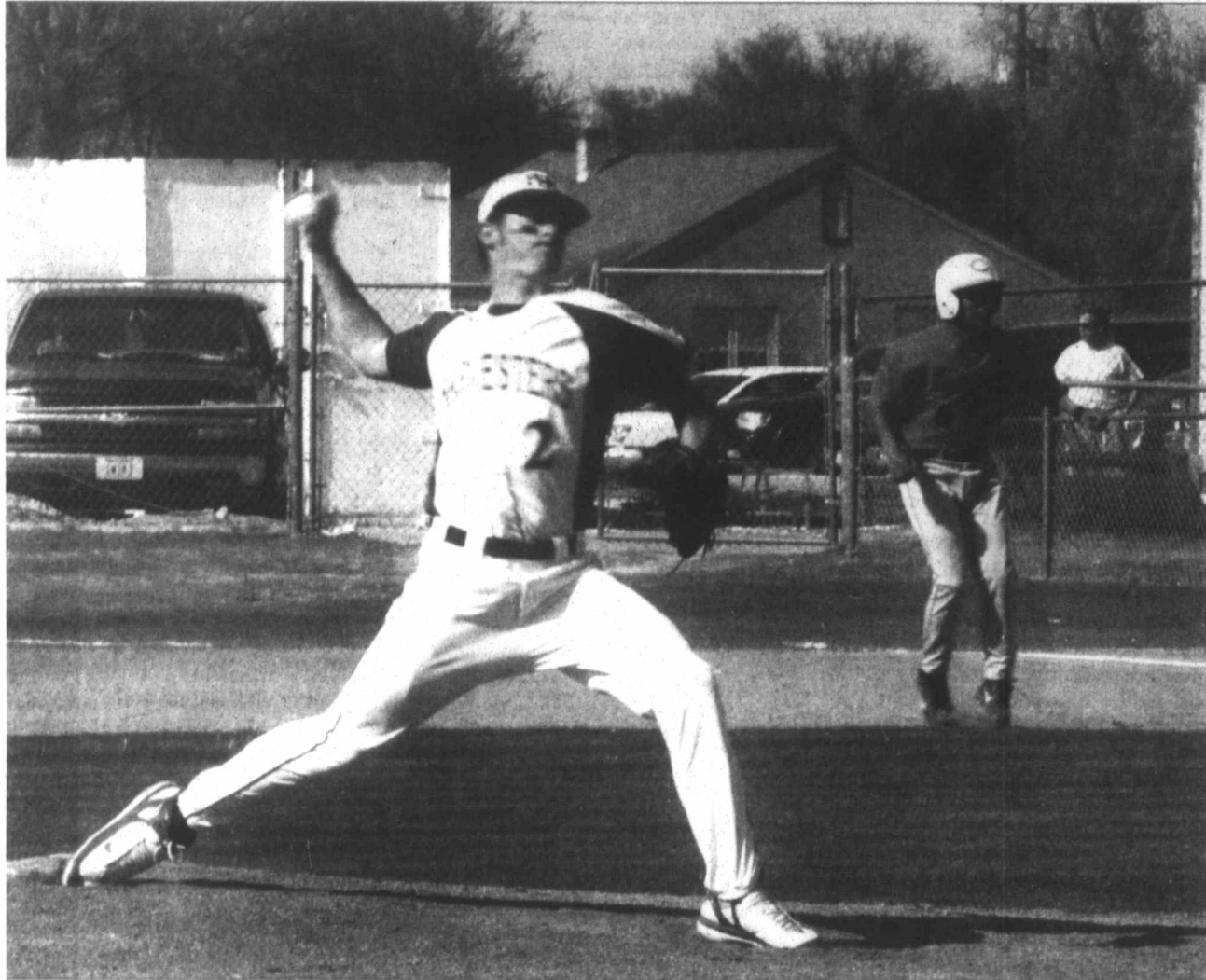

1. Collect gently used children's clothing and donate the garments to a homeless shelter.

2. Volunteer some time each month to befriend a developmentally disabled child. The special education department at your school might be able to help you with this.

3. Collect signatures for a petition to increase the penalties for those who commit crimes against mentally ill and homeless people. Talk about your feelings at school and at your place of worship and see if friends would be interested in joining you in your efforts. Remember,

one small spark can start a prairie fire.
