Houston transit officer kills assault suspect

HOUSTON (AP) — A Houston transit police officer shot and killed a knife-wielding man who authorities said lunged at the officer during efforts to take the man into custody for questioning about an alleged assault.

The Houston Chronicle reported Tuesday's fatal shooting was the first involving the Metro's law enforcement division since its creation in 1982. A bystander was wounded.

Houston police said a woman flagged down an officer mid-morning and said she had been assaulted. Two officers used Tasers on the man after he failed to comply with instructions and acted threateningly. Authorities said motorcycle officer R.L. Harrington shot and killed the man when he started swinging his knife.

Metro Police Chief Thomas Lambert said Harrington would be reassigned to administrative duties while the shooting is investigated.

No Mega Millions

ATLANTA (AP) — There has been a rollover in the grand prize for the multistate Mega Millions lottery — to \$17 million.

The rollover occurred because no player matched all the winning numbers from Tuesday night's \$12 million drawing.

The next Mega Millions drawing will be Friday night. Although there was no grand prize winner, three players won second prizes of \$250,000 apiece. Another 20 players, including two who bought tickets in Illinois, won third prizes of \$10,000 apiece.

The winning numbers from Tuesday night's drawing were: five, 23, 38, 39, 54. The Mega Ball number was three.

Majaunta Jo Sloan Hills

Majaunta Jo Sloan Hills, matriarch of the Family Hills and woman of God, passed into her eternal reward in Heaven on April 26, 2009. Although a Texan by choice and by heart, she had been in North Carolina since 2002 in the loving care of her daughter GERALYN KLEFFMAN and her family and of many wonderful people.

Mom, as she will always be known by her children and their families, was born in Stratford, Oklahoma, July 26, 1920. When she was two years old, her mother, the late Patsy Villines Sloan McKnerney, took her from Oklahoma to Southern California where she grew up as child of the roaring '20's.

In her teen years, Mom received a gift from God in the form of a truly miraculous cure through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This healing led her to become a faithful Catholic and started Mom into a life of honoring Mary the Mother of God.

In 1939, while Mom as in nurses training at Mercy Hospital in San Diego, California, Mom met "Tex". Mom stole the blue-eyed man of her dreams from her best friend and married him in Las Vegas, Nevada on August 31, 1941. He was Forrest Nelson Hills, son

of the late A. D. and Olive Hills of Pampa. The rest as they say was history.

The first three of Mom and Dad's eleven children were born in San Diego, California, during WWII. As soon after the war as possible, Mom and Dad packed up the kids (Patty, Denny and Shaun) and moved to Texas. Dad was going back to the oil fields and would take up a partnership with his father in Hills and Hills Drilling Company. Mom began her life in the High Plains.

During the early post-war oil field years, Mom and the family went wherever Dad was drilling. While they were living in Guymon, Oklahoma, Patty and Denny and several other children from the neighborhood died in a tragic accident. Soon after that, they moved back to Pampa which was home for two sons and seven daughters who were "the Family".

Majaunta was a woman blessed with many talents. She was a wife, a mom, a nurse, a teacher, a singer, a lecturer, a volunteer, a political conservative, a patriot, a grandmother, a committed Catholic Christian. She made sure her children and friends knew they were loved. Mom hugged well and smiled often and liked crowds in the house. It

was common for Mom to invite foreign students, airmen from Amarillo Air Force base, children from St. Anne's orphanage in Panhandle, boyfriends, cousins and friends of the family in for Thanksgiving, Christmas, and other occasions. Many of the guests became part of the family.

Mom touched many lives through her skill, compassion, generosity and faith. She was honored by both Beta Sigma Phi and the Women's Council at St. Vincent de Paul parish in Pampa as Woman of the Year. Mom will continue to touch lives through her children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren. One of her grandchildren made this comment: "She was a force of nature... an amazing teacher who was willing to impart her knowledge of right from wrong and guide you in manners along the way. She was an example of how to be a strong woman."

Mom was preceded in death by her parents Patsy McKnerney and our Grandpa John McKnerney, by our father Forrest Nelson Hills, and by our siblings Patricia (Patty), Dennis Arthur (Denny), and Shannon Maureen King. She will be missed and remembered by her children and their spouses: Shaun Hills and wife Carla of Houston Texas,

South Texas students harness winds for power

McALLEN, Texas (AP) — A group of high school students watched intently as one of their peers spun the rotors round and round.

Dean Schneider carefully watched the voltmeter another student held against the wires of what was still a hand-powered turbine.

"Guys, congratulations," the Texas A&M researcher told the Science Academy of South Texas seniors as the reading hit 19 volts. "We just made power."

They're words the class hopes are repeated across the Rio Grande Valley.

An independent study class of 15 seniors, operating entirely from instructions in a technical manual written by a Scottish engineer, constructed two small wind turbines capable of powering a light bulb and a laptop.

The turbines, built with \$1,500 each, are part of an ambitious plan by several state partners to design turbines that can be used to power colonia homes for as little as \$5,000 each.

The students erected the 30-foot turbines in a weekend outside their school and in a park operated by Hidalgo County Precinct 2. The one in the park will power a greenhouse; the school's turbine will provide enough electricity to run security lights.

Although the two wind turbines functioned as planned, it was only half of their assignment. Now the students must develop a set of plans — down to a list of what materials are needed at the hardware store — that a person with no engineering background could follow to build a wind turbine in a back yard

with minimal assistance.

The students are refining a wind turbine prototype that can operate off the electrical grid to power homes in South Texas, said Schneider, an extension agent with Texas A&M's Texas Engineering Experiment Station in San Antonio.

"It's become the right time for renewable energies," Schneider said. "(Public officials are) looking at renewable energy as a way to offset the costs, but overall you can reap a savings. The renewable energy is basically free once you build a system to harvest it."

They received instruction on the science behind the technology and were supervised when they constructed parts, teacher Dale Coalson said. But most work was left to the students, from selecting "Turbinators" as a name for the project to rectifying the mistakes they made along the way.

The class gave the students — many of whom intend to study engineering in college — a learning experience they typically won't get until their last year in college or their first job.

Darla Hollander, who will attend the University of Texas at Austin this fall, said the class gave her a better understanding of how the physics and calculus they learned in high school is applicable in real projects. With more jobs turning into green careers, she said, a wind turbine was a good place to start.

"Everybody is going green now," she said. "Engineers are focused on sustainable energy and this is a good place for us to learn."

"It's good experience because it's what the real world is like," said Cesar Riojas, 18, who intends to study human behavior or space operations at the Air Force Academy. "You're not dealing with the abstract. It's all concrete." And the project may have concrete results.

Two University of Texas-Pan American professors believe the students' work could be the basis for a plan to provide power to poor families in colonias.

The wind turbines — part of a two-year grant from the State Energy Conservation Office — designed by the students can operate in South Texas' low wind speeds, said Kamal Sarkar, a professor in the mechanical engineering department.

The \$5 million grant, possibly coming from the economic stimulus package, would allow them to build 400 wind turbines to power colonia homes, he said. If the plan is successful, he anticipates creating a viable business in selling wind turbine parts.

For a \$5,000 investment, a homeowner can build a wind turbine that can lower or eliminates electricity costs for the home.

For people who can't afford electricity in the first place, he said, it gives groups another avenue to help them by building wind turbines — much like the students did — to power their homes.

He said it offers a benefit to colonias where electricity is a luxury most don't have.

"That's what engineers do: they solve problems," Sarkar said. "(The wind turbines) could drastically improve their quality of life" in colonias.

Judge rejects request to toss lawsuit

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A judge has denied requests by Gov. Rick Perry's campaign committee and the Republican Governors Association to toss out a lawsuit brought by former Democratic gubernatorial candidate Chris Bell over \$1 million in contributions Perry received in the 2006 election.

Bell, who lost to Perry

in that election, alleges that reporting errors made by the Perry campaign on campaign-finance reports kept the public from fully seeing the source of the money. Bell argues that the governors' group did not follow proper state procedures in making the donation in the late stage of the race.

The defendants wanted

state district Judge John Dietz to dismiss the lawsuit without a trial, but Dietz rejected those requests Tuesday.

Bell's attorney, Buck Wood, said Dietz's ruling did not address Bell's own effort to have a summary judgment in the case. If that effort is also denied, the case will move closer to a trial.

Indictments

On June 27, 2008 Chase allegedly intentionally or knowingly possessed a controlled substance, cocaine, in an amount over one gram but less than four grams.

Jaime Garcia, 21, was indicted for tampering with government school record license/sealed/certification/permit. Bond was set on the third-degree felony at \$10,000.

On October 13, 2008 Garcia allegedly possessed a governmental record,

a social security card, with intent that it be used unlawfully.

Kevin Wayne Jacoby, 41, was indicted for driving while intoxicated, third or more. Bond was set on the third-degree felony at \$20,000.

On July 11, 2008 Jacoby allegedly operated a motor vehicle in a public place while being intoxicated from alcohol. Jacoby was convicted of an offense relating to operating of a motor vehicle while intoxicated on March 24, 1989 and October 2, 1998.

Matthew Chico Jeffries, 19, was indicted for theft of a firearm. Bond was set on the state jail felony at \$7,500.

On August 12, 2008, Jeffries allegedly unlawfully appropriate, by acquiring or otherwise exercising control over, property, a firearm, from Justin Isbell, the owner, without the effective consent of Isbell.

Joseph Dagan Jones, 25, was indicted for forgery of a financial instrument. Bond was set on the state jail felony for \$7,500.

On July 5, 2008 Jones allegedly passed a forged writing, a check for the

amount of \$150, to Sandra Russel, Jones purported to writing to be an act of Rosie Johnson, a deceased person, who did not authorize the act.

Caroline Thomas Smith, 56, was indicted for possession of a controlled substance, less than one gram. Bond was set for the state jail felony at \$7,500.

On July 5, 2008 Smith allegedly intentionally or knowingly possessed a controlled substance, cocaine, in an amount less than one gram.
