Two qualify for **National Merit** competition

Two Pampa High School students were honored Thursday night at the school district's Teachers of the Year banquet.

Jonathan L. Murray and Alexander M. Clendening were invited to participate in the 2010 National Merit Scholarship Program's College Plans Reporting Service, said PHS Principal Tanya Larkin.

Murray and Clendening each scored 201 or above on the 2008 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, Larkin said, putting them among the 50,000 highest scoring participants of some 1.5 million program entrants.

Of the 50,000 students being offered the service, about 16,000 will be named National Merit Program Semifinalists, according to Else-Britt DeLong, director of educational services for the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Semifinalists will have an opportunity to compete for about 8,200 National Merit Scholarships in

As the Pampa High School renovation and expansion project nears completion, the Pampa Independent School District board of trustees is ordering the district's maintenance department to eliminate safety hazards on the concrete fence in front of the school while

they decide what will be done with tion of the fence was to be moved the fence.

There had been plans to move the fence, thought to have been erected in the 1930s by the WPA, Works Progress Administration, but there is concern about whether the fence can be moved and there are Pampa residents who don't want it moved.

In the renovation plans, a por-

to the high school's new main entrance on the north side of the main building from its present location on Harvester.

School board member Lee Porter said during Thursday night's board meeting that the district had tried to repair the concrete fence but with little success. He noted that there were several places where

steel rebar was sticking through the concrete, and he said he was concerned that some student might get impaled on it.

"It is a safety issue, no doubt," said Derrell DeLoach, vice president of the school board, "It has to be addressed. It's needed to be addressed for a long time."

Amendment would change commission

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) The Texas Department of Transportation, widely criticized as dysfunctional, would be governed by one statewide elected commissioner rather than the current five-member appointed board under a proposal being debated in the Texas House Thursday.


The sweeping TxDOT overhaul would also call for the election of 14 regional commissioners and would ban any future red light camera systems from being implemented. Just before midnight, the House cut off debate on the bill without a vote and planned to return early Friday morning.

The House is debating a bill in response to a scathing state "sunset" report, which called for a revamp of the department's governing board and its dealings with lawmakers and the public.

The bill by Rep. Carl Isett, R-Lubbock, removes some duties from the agency, including driver's license oversight. It also would establish a legislative oversight committee, made up of six members, to study and make recommendations for the operation and needs of the state transportation system.

"No longer will the public be in the dark about construction projects in their own towns," Isett said, as he introduced the legislation. "No longer will the public trust be disregarded."







Electrical fire major cause of home fires

Quincy, Mass. -The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) is reminding the public to be aware of the risks associated with the use of electricity, and providing safety tips to reduce the risk of experiencing a home electrical fire.

One of every seven home fires was an electrical fire. Any type of equipment that uses electricity may be involved in an electrical fire. NFPA offers the following

- Replace or repair loose or damaged cords on all electrical devices.
- · Avoid running extension cords across doorways or under carpets.
- In homes with small children, unused wall sockets and extension-cord recep-

tacles should have plastic safety covers.

- · Consider having additional circuits or outlets added by a qualified electrician so vou do not have to use extension cords. · Avoid overloading outlets. Plug only
- one high-wattage appliance into each receptacle outlet at a time. · If outlets or switches feel warm, shut
- off the circuit and have them checked by an electrician. · Place lamps on level surfaces, away
- from things that can burn and use bulbs that match the lamp's recommended watt-Electrical fires tend to happen more fre-

quently in older homes.

East Texan Named to Texas Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame

Paul Hinton of Hemphill has been selected as the 2009 inductee into the Texas Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame.

Hinton was honored for his contributions as a communicator and educator due to 20 years of service as the Texas founder and director of East Texas Get Hooked on Fishing, Not Drugs.

Following retirement from the insurance industry, Hinton began a new career as an outdoor writer and educator, concentrating his efforts on introducing kids to fishing as an alternative to drugs. "He was driven to make children aware of the beauty and value of fishing as a good choice to make in life rather than a bad choice like drugs," wrote nomina-tor Kathy Magers, who was herself inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2002.

Hinton's nomination was supported by a host of wellwishers, including Sharon Rushton, founding executive director of the Future Fisherman Foundation; pro that question was simple:

angler and television host Jimmy Houston; two-time women's world champion angler Judy Wong; and pro angler Jay Yelas.

Hinton introduced thousands of children to fishing while partnering with Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to also teach boating and water safety and fish identification. He involved fishing industry manufacturers, state and local officials and sports figures. His home became a warehouse for supplies, and his life revolved around putting on events to get kids involved in fishingall without pay and often with the expenditure of his own retirement income.

Hinton received many honors from governors and presidents for his efforts, but the ones he valued most came from children. One wrote, "Thanks for keeping a lot of people drug free in the U.S. . . . I've always wondered why you do this when you could be at home?"

After 33 years of teaching fulltime, Beth Shannon is finally getting the thanks she deserves through her Teacher of the Year award for Pampa High School.



Critics upset about bill on deadly agents

GALVESTON. Texas (AP) — Open government advocates are decrying a bill passed by the Texas Senate that would curtail the public's access to state laboratories' information on "select agents" such as the Ebola virus, anthrax and other deadly substanc-

But supporters say the measure protects the security of the University of Texas Medical Branch-Galveston's National Lab and the privacy of researchers.

Researchers develop drugs and vaccines to battle infectious diseases at the biodefense laboratory, which has received an open records request.

Under the proposal approved Wednesday, the Texas Public Information Act would be amended to keep that information off limits, as the federal law does. The legislation now goes to the House.

The Texas Association, the Texas Newspaper Association and the Freedom of Information Foundation of Texas

oppose the bill authored by state Sen. Joan Huffman, a Republican representing part of Galveston County.

At issue are material transfer agreements, used to document the transfer of select agents and other samples to institutions that have permission to use the research material, UTMB officials said.

"We've been very Press open and transparent, and I certainly don't see this changing," said Dr. James LeDuc, deputy director of the national laboratory, The Galveston County

Daily News reported.

Although the names of principal investigators are in the public domain, medical branch officials say they are concerned about the privacy of other classifications of their own employees and the privacy of researchers at outof-state institutions with which they are seeking to collaborate.

Federal law, which the bill is supposed to mirror, protects the names of employees, officials say.

A request to keep the names of researchers and others private on material transfer documents was denied by the Texas attorney general in April. The denial cost the medical branch an important collaboration with the University of Pittsburg, officials said.

6 indicted for state school fight club

Stephanie Garza, 21, faces the same charge but as a state jail felony. Garza was accused of failing to intervene.
