## Highlights from the Texas Legislature

AUSTIN, Texas (AP)-The Texas Senate voted Tuesday to repeal a \$5-per-person admission fee on strip clubs that has been ruled unconstitutional and agreed to replace it with a new tax on sexually oriented business.

The bill now goes to Gov. Rick Perry for his consideration even as House members were poised to debate a competing bill favored by sexual assault victim advocates.

Passed in 2007, the strip club admission fee has been ruled unconstitutional by a judge and is currently under appeal. Money collected under that fee was sent to a fund to aid sex assault victims and a pool for uninsured Texans.

The new tax proposed by Rep. Senfronia Thompson, D-Houston, would apply to adult movie theaters, adult video stores, adult bookstores and other sexually oriented businesses that charge admission fees. It would total 10 percent of gross admissions receipts.

According to a legislative analysis, the new plan would send 25 percent of the new fee to a state school fund and the rest to a sexual assault victims fund.

But some advocates for victims say the new bill is a ruse put forth by strip club owners, who would not be required to charge admission to their clubs, and would sharply reduce the money collected to help assault victims.

The Texas Association Against Sexual Assault instead supports a separate House bill by Rep. Ellen Cohen, a Houston Democrat who pushed the original \$5 fee. Cohen's bill would reduce the club entry fee to \$3 and dedicate all the money to the sexual assault

STEROID TESTING

Lawmakers have reached a deal to slash steroid testing of public high school athletes to less than half of the current program, but still leave it big enough to test thousands of athletes over the next two years.

The deal was struck by House and Senate members negotiating the 2010-2011 budget, lawmakers said

The current \$6 million program was designed to test up to 50,000 students by the end of the current school year. The tentative deal for the new program would slash funding to \$2 million over the next two

The House and Senate are still negotiating a final state budget. The legislative ends June 1.

Texas, New Jersey and Illinois are the only states testing high school athletes for steroids and the Texas program is by far the largest. But the first 29,000 tests produced only 11 confirmed cases of steroid use, causing some critics to say the program was a waste of time and money.

Sen. Florence Shapiro, R-Plano, one of the Senate budget negotiators, told The Associated Press those numbers persuaded lawmakers to reduce the funding and number of tests, but they didn't want to stop testing after only two

#### DISABLED PROTEST

Some two dozen activists unfurled banners in the state Capitol rotunda and staged a vocal protest Tuesday over what they say is the Legislature's failure to fund services for disabled Texans.

Members of Community Now! and Adapt of Texas shouted "Equal Pay for Equal Work!" They said workers in state institutions make more money and have better benefits than attendants in homes for the disabled. And, they said, there are long waiting lists for services and that residents of state schools need better treatment.

The groups gave lawmakers a grade of "D" on several issues.

Capitol security removed the big handmade banners after about 10 minutes. The rally broke up peacefully, and activists roamed the building to hand out their report card to lawmakers and Gov. Rick Perry.

### SAFE SLEEPING

A state pamphlet given to new parents would include information on Sudden Infant Death Syndrome and recommendations for infant safe sleeping conditions under a bill passed by the Senate and sent to Gov. Rick Perry.

According to the state Department of Family and Protective Services, SIDS is a leading cause of death for infants in Texas. Although the cause of

SIDS remains unknown, the agency makes several recommendations for parents, including placing babies on their back for sleep on a firm, flat surface with no soft bedding, pillows or stuffed toys in the crib, avoid overheating the baby and not allowing anyone to smoke near the child.

#### **PUPPY MILLS**

Dog and cat owners who keep and breed many animals would be subject to regulation under legislation the House approved Tuesday. Advocates of the legislation say the measure would crack down on poor conditions in so-called puppy mills.

Those behind the legislation say it's not intended to affect people who breed dogs as a hobby.

Society The Humane and other animal welfare groups backed the bill. Several dog clubs testified against it in a House committee. The measure next goes to the Senate.

#### CATTLE RUSTLING

The Texas House on Tuesday unanimously voted to enhance penalties for theft of livestock.

Current law punishes cattle thieves with a thirddegree felony, punishable by up to 10 years in prison and a fine of up to \$10,000, if they steal more than 10 head of cattle, horses or exotic livestock. Under the bill, a third-degree felony would be handed out for any theft of cattle, horses or exotic livestock.

The bill would also make it a third-degree felony to steal more than 10 head of smaller livestock such as sheep, goats and pigs. Current law requires a theft of more than 100 head of sheep, goats or swine before it is a third-degree felony.

The Texas Cattle Southwestern Association Raisers applauded the House vote, saying that though Texas is the largest cattle producer in the nation, it is more lenient on cattle theft than neighboring states. They say rustling is on the rise and cattle raisers reported 6,404 thefts to the association in 2008, more than twice as many as in 2007.

The Senate has already passed the bill. It now heads to the governor for consideration.

During the debate, Sen. John Carona, R-Dallas, blasted telecommunications giant AT&T, saying the company's Austin lobbyists were blocking his own pre-paid phone proposal, to make the purchasers provide identifying information that law enforcement agencies can access when suspected crimes are committed using the devices.

Carona made a symbolic attempt to amend the prepaid fee legislation, then withdrew it.

"Shame on AT&T." Carona said. "That is a big corporate giant in this state ... AT&T has been in here with its substantial lobby interests keeping this bill from getting a public hearing.

Afterward, Carona said AT&T was fighting against the legislation because "they don't want anything that will impede the

Responding to questions about a video of staged fights at the Corpus Christi State School for people with mental and developmental disabilities, Gov. Rick Perry called the incident "reprehensible."

"I think it's been described enough times to pretty well know what it is," he said Tuesday. "I think it's certainly reprehensible. Those that were engaged in that conduct will have the test of our law put upon them and appropriately so. That is not acceptable behavior in any environment but particularly in a place where you're supposed to be protecting citizens of this state, regardless of what reasons they may be in there. It's just not appropriate."

### Father: Army 'broke' soldier accused of killing 5


SHERMAN, Texas (AP) — The father of a U.S. soldier accused of killing five fellow troops in Iraq said his son "forfeited his life" but the military bears some responsibility for the rampage.

Wilburn Russell said Tuesday that 44-year-old Army Sgt. John M. Russell wasn't typically a violent person, but counselors "broke" him before gunfire erupted in a military stress center Monday in Baghdad.

"John has forfeited his life. Apparently, he said (to his wife), 'My life is over. To hell with it. I'm going to get even with 'em," said the elder Russell, 73 His father said the younger Russell, an electronics

technician, was at the stress center to transfer out of active duty. He said his son was undergoing stressful mental tests that he didn't understand were merely tests, "so they broke him."

"I hate what that boy did," said the elder Russell, speaking in front of the two-story house his son was buying with his German wife in a new subdivision. "We're sorry for the families, too. It shouldn't have happened."

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## **Texas Newspapers Editorial Roundup**

A sampling of editorial opinion around Texas:

Houston Chronicle on Texans' right to know:

In these days of wellfounded public nervousness over the possibility of terrorist attacks, few would dispute the need for security personnel details to keep public officials with a certain level of visibility safe as they go about their daily duties.

Fewer still would likely argue with the notion that the governor of Texas is among the select group deserving of such protection.

That's common sense in post-9/11 America.

But it's taking things too far to claim, as the Texas Department of Public Safety and a state senator from San Antonio do, that the specifics of how the tax dollars involved are spent have to be kept a big secret in the name of security. That's

self-serving nonsense. A bill by state Sen. Jeff Wentworth, a San Antonio Republican, would prevent Texans from knowing how their dollars are being used to protect their governor how many officers were involved, where they stayed

and for how long. Wentworth and the DPS say making such details public would jeopardize the officeholder's security.

Wentworth's bill would make moot a state district court opinion opening such records to public access. The lawsuit was filed by Hearst Newspapers LLC and Cox Texas Newspapers LP. Hearst owns the Chronicle and the San Antonio Express-News. Cox Texas

owns the Austin American-Statesman.

Ruling in the newspapers' favor last summer, the district judge found that the vouchers sought don't contain information that is highly intimate or embarrassing, and that they are newsworthy. Reporters had sought the records in connection with stories about Gov. Rick Perry's foreign travels and an out-of-state trip campaigning for former New York City Mayor Rudy Giuliani for president.

The district court decision is on appeal. Wentworth is bill is flawed in concept. It wrongly mixes up security with something utterly unrelated the public's right to know how its dollars are

Gov. Perry has made several trips abroad that deserve public scrutiny. He's campaigned out of state. The security bills for those trips were paid with Texans i tax dollars. We deserve to know how they were spent and if that use was proper or not.

Beaumont Enterprise on the Texas State Board of Education:

The State Board of Education has forgotten the word "education" in its title and deserves the sanctions it is receiving from the Legislature. Regrettably, our region's representative, David Bradley, has been one of the prime reasons for this reaction.

So far in this session: •The Senate has refused to confirm member Don McLeroy as chairman.

 The House has approved. a constitutional amendment that would shift authority over investment decisions about the \$17.5 billion Permanent School Fund from the State Board to financial professionals.

•The Senate is considering a bill that would take away the board's authority over curriculum and text-

All of this is unfortunate, but necessary.

There was a time in the 1980s when the public education establishment needed

a wakeup call, and conservatives on the State Board helped pull it in the right direction. In recent years, however, the board has gone too far in the other extreme. For example, earlier this year hard-line conservatives embarrassed the state with another effort to weaken the teaching of evolution in science classes.

Now, even Republicans in Legislature are disgusted with the State Board's pettiness and meddling. Keep in mind that these sanctions are happening even though Republicans control the House and Senate and the State Board has a GOP majority too.

Until the State Board gets its act together, the Legislature should shift more of its educational responsibilities to the Texas Education Agency and its financial duties to nonpartisan experts.

If the State Board has fewer opportunities to mess up, it might be able to focus better on its core mission of strengthening public educa-



## Texas museum acquires Michelangelo's first painting

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP), The Kimbell Art Museum will soon be the only U.S. museum to display a Michelangelo painting after acquiring his earliest known work, a rare treasure that was tucked away and doubted as authentic for more than a century

The museum declined to disclose how much it paid for "The Torment of Saint Anthony," a 15th-century oil and tempera painting on a wood panel that depicts scaly, horned, winged demons trying to pull the saint out of the sky. Experts believe he painted it when he was only 12 or 13 years

And only four such works, including this one, by the artist exist, and two of them are unfinished. Most of his paintings are frescos, the famous scenes on the ceiling and wall of Rome's Sistine Chapel.

"This is one of the greatest rediscoveries in the history of art," Eric M. Lee, the Fort Worth museum's director, told The Associated Press on Tuesday. "The evidence could not be stronger. It's like a detective story, like a mystery, and it involves one of the greatest artists of all time.

The painting was exhibited as late as 1874 in Paris. But some questions about its authenticity had surfaced through the years, and after a London family acquired it in the 1900s, the painting was kept privately and largely forgotten in the art world, Lee said.

Last summer an art dealer bought it for nearly \$2 million at a Sotheby's auction and then took it to New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art, where one department chairman shared his hunch that it was the work of the Renaissance artist, Lee said.

### Medical officials seek trauma money
