County to consider new

Every five hours someone is killed in an alcohol-related traffic crash in Texas.

Shattered Dreams was played out on the street in front to Pampa High School this morning to illustrate to students the horror that can result from drinking and driving.

The program is presented once every three years, just before prom and graduation, to enhance student awareness of driving while intoxicated, without having to learn through real personal tragedies.

Students played the roles of the dead and injured in the Shattered Dreams program, which started with a mock alcohol-related crash. Pampa police, firefighters, LifeStar, Guardian EMS, Texas Department of Public Safety, and the officials from the Gray County Sheriff's Office participated in the event.

The car wreck was only the first part of the Shattered Dreams program, which Pampa High School puts on for the students, mostly seniors, every third year. The goal of the program is for students to understand the real effects that drinking and driving can have on a life,

Seniors from Pampa High School stood on the lawn as they watched one of their classmates stage a very real look-DRILL cont. on page 3

PRMC best in panhandle in preventing surgical infections

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Pampa Regional Medical ranks the best at preventing surgical infections among the three highest volume hospitals in the Panhandle, according to a new Consumers Union report.

At least 100,000 patients were at risk of developing an infection after surgery because they did not receive the appropriate prevention interventions, according to the report, Cutting Surgical Infections published on their website www. stophospitalinfections.org/infection_prevention/. The data cover surgeries between July 1, 2007 and June 30, 2008.

The consumer advocacy group studied hospital performance on three process measures—as reported by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services through its Hospital Compare web site. The report said that performance standards are judged by the following three categories: patients are given an antibiotic one hour before surgery, the right drug is used, and the antibiotic is discontinued within 24 hours after surgery.

According to medical professionals, giving patients antibiotics right before surgery helps to boost the patient's ability to fight off contamination during surgery that could lead to infection. Studies show that patients given antibiotics either more than one hour before or after the first surgical incision is made experience higher rates of infection compared to those who are given antibiotics within one hour before surgery begins. Pampa Regional Medical Center successfully performed this procedure 99 percent of the time according to the report. Two Amarillo hospitals performed at 85 percent and 87 percent compliance. The national average is 90.8 percent.

PRMC ranked in the 97 percent for compliance in the area of using an appropriate antibiotic to fight protection during surgery. Choosing the appropriate antibiotic is critical because it must be effective in preventing infections caused by bacteria likely to be present around the surgical site. Antibiotic selection var-*PRMC* cont. on page 3





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

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3 dead in apparent double murder-suicide

LEAGUE CITY, Texas (AP) — Police say a couple and their son are dead after an apparent double murdersuicide

Authorities on Wednesday night found the bodies of Lewis Cantrell III, his father, Lewis Cantrell II, and stepmother, Gayle Cantrell.

Sgt. John Jordan with the League City Police Department told the Houston Chronicle that a .38 caliber pistol was found near the younger man's body.

Jordan said two other siblings were in the house when they heard gunfire, prompting them to run to a neighbor's house and call 911.

League City is located between Houston and Galveston.

Neis and the other "passengers" in her car, Victoria Campbell, Madison Wilson, and Jeremy Busse were all pretending to be drinking at the time of the accident.

As the mock incident progressed, Campbell was transported to Pampa Regional Medical Center by Guardian EMS, and Covalt was airlifted from the scene to a hospital by LifeStar. The crash launches the

Shattered Dreams two-day long program. Other components of the program include mock obituaries, a mock memorial/assembly for students, and student/parent retreats. The program emphasizes the results of alcohol-related crashes in the United States and ultimately, what life can be like for those who drive after drinking,

whose actions effect innocent victims, their friends and families.

Throughout the rest of the school day, "The Living Dead" portion of the program will continue in many classrooms. A group of pre-selected students will be contacted in class every 15 minutes and pulled out by another student dressed as the Grim Reaper. The student returns to class with white face paint, and a Shattered Dreams T-shirt and is not allowed to speak the rest of the day.

The program will continue through the evening with retreats for parents and students involved in the program. Students write letters about their experiences and involvement in Shattered Dreams, some of which will be read tomorrow at the mock memorial and assembly.

Glo-Valve got one of the runs back in the bottom of the third.




What are we supposed to do with the money? We don't know if there is a particular custom involving monetary donations. If you know, please advise. -- PERPLEXED IN WASHINGTON



Analysis: Pope faced high bar to please Israelis

JERUSALEM (AP) — Even if he had said all the right things about the Nazi genocide of 6 million Jews, the German-born Pope Benedict XVI would have had a hard time winning over Israelis on his visit to the Jewish state.

His background as a German who served under the Nazis, the Roman Catholic Church's history of anti-Semitism, his predecessor's extraordinary outreach to Jews and a series of public relations gaffes - not to mention a long-standing dispute over the conduct of the Holocaust-era pope - created formidable obstacles for Benedict to overcome in his relations with the Jews.

So, it was not surprising that Israelis criticized the pope for failing to apologize for Catholic wrongdoings during a speech Monday at the country's national Holocaust memorial.

"The thorough preparations for his visit to Israel, the complex traffic and security arrangements, and the millions of shekels that were earmarked for his hospitality evaporated as if they did not exist thanks to a speech that was missing one word — 'sorry," said the lead editorial of the Israeli daily Haaretz on Wednesday. Regardless of whether Benedict deserves the criticism, it's clear he miscalculated the impact of what

he chose to say and not say at the memorial. The apology Israeli critics said was so sorely missing from Benedict's speech Monday at Israel's Yad Vashem memorial has actually been made by the pontiff in the past.

In an audience with Jewish leaders at the Vatican earlier this year, Benedict recalled a prayer by his predecessor, Pope John Paul II, at the Western Wall in Jerusalem asking for God's forgiveness for the treatment of Jews and said "I now make his prayer my own."

Benedict's speech at Yad Vashem contained a powerful pledge to never

forget the victims' names and a poignant allusion to the "joyful expectation" of victims' parents anxiously awaiting the birth of their children.

"What name shall we give this child? What is to become of him or her? Who could have imagined that they would be condemned to such a horrible fate," the pope said.

Shortly after he said all this, however, the top two officials at Yad Vashem said they found the speech lacking because it failed to specifically mention the words "murder" or "Nazis" and left out the exact figure of 6 million Jews killed in addition to the absence of a John Paul-like apology.

The speaker of Israel's parliament, Reuven Rivlin, criticized Benedict for coming off as detached, "as somebody observing from the sidelines." Tom Segev, a prominent columnist and Holocaust historian, characterized the pope as "restrained, almost cold."

Even Rabbi Arthur Schneier, a Holocaust survivor and a leader in interfaith relations, saw the speech as problematic despite his overall praise for Benedict.

"We should not be focusing just on an omission that took place at Yad Vashem, as painful as it might be," said Schneier, who joined the pope on his visit to the Western Wall on Tuesday.

Benedict has been warmly welcomed at every stop in Israel and the Palestinian territories and has been praised for his unequivocal calls for unity among religions.

Judge Phil Vanderpool, who hears child abuse and neglect cases in 8 judicial districts and 21 counties in the Panhandle, added, "CASA volunteers are the most independent persons in child abuse and neglect cases. They are invaluable in keeping the focus in the best interests of the children for which they advocate. Their focus on the child is invaluable and enables judges to make better decisions which lead to better outcomes for the child. CASA of the High Plains provides excellent support for volunteers. I urge any person who desires to make a positive difference in the life of a child to contact CASA of the High Plains."

Last year, CASA of the High Plains served 149 children in the eastern Texas Panhandle.

AUSTIN, Texas - In Campos said. "First, wear 2008, 61 boaters died on Texas waters. It was the highest number in more than a decade, tying the tragic 2002 boating season. Even more alarming, in 2002 there were more than 620,000 registered vessels in the state; six years later that number had fallen to just slightly more than 591,000.

It's a trend that troubles state, federal and local officials, and one they're sure to be talking about in a series of National Safe Boating Week events beginning May 16 at Lewisville Lake.

"Clearly the accident trend in Texas is going in the wrong direction," said Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Game Warden Maj. Alfonso Campos, the state's marine safety chief. "The real tragedy here is that almost every one of the fatalities we saw last year could have been prevented."

Campos pointed out that 59 of the 61 fatality accidents in 2008 were singlevessel accidents. In other words, those deaths resulted from boats capsizing, colliding with something, or passengers falling over-

"There are three things we encourage boaters to do to prevent serious injuries and fatalities on the water,"

a life jacket. The new inflatable life jackets are lightweight and comfortable, and they save lives. Second, don't drink and boat. If you do have alcohol on the boat, designate a sober driver, just as you would for your automobile. Third, take a boater education course. Studies show that boater ed can cut accident rates in half, and even seasoned boaters can benefit from the 6-hour basic course."

Over Memorial Day Weekend, a Montgomery County-wide "no-refusal" weekend will focus on Lake Conroe. "No refusal" weekends employ on-site judges, search warrants and blood draws to gather evidence from individuals suspected of Boating While Intoxicated or Driving While Intoxicated and will involve roving, mobile DWI/BWI intoxilyzer units around the lake. The Lake Conroe effort is the first in Texas to focus on a public water body.

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Enforcement of boating safety laws is just one aspect of a coordinated statewide campaign over the coming summer that will include multiple Nobody's Waterproof education and outreach events across the state.
