

## McLean man arrested for burglary

Shawne Dwayne Murray, 37, of McLean arrested early Thursday morning for attempting to burglarize a local store.

Deputy Robert Baker of the Gray county Sheriff's Office was notified of two suspicious persons standing outside of a building near First and Commerce streets in McLean Thursday at 12:17 a.m.

Upon arrival, Baker observed Murray enter a building through the front door of the location,

according to Lt. Joe B. Hoard of the GCSO.

A few minutes later, the owner of the shop and another person approached Baker and said that Murray had assaulted them and kicked in the front door of the building in an attempt to burglarize the store.

Baker found evidence that the door had been kicked in and arrested Murray for burglary of a building with intent to commit assault.

Bond was set for Murray at \$10,000. He remained in jail as of Thursday afternoon.

## More than 3,500 House bills left to whither

Texas House adjourned shortly after a midnight deadline Thursday, leaving thousands of bills to wither away in the final stretch of the legislative session.

As the clock struck 12, lawmakers playfully acknowledged the expiration of almost 4,000 bills by playing Taps, the military bugle

A few minutes earlier, several marked the passing with an impromptu "memorial service."

Bill authors stood in a receiving line at the front of the chamber, dabbing at their eyes with tissue and sympathetically hugging each other over the loss of their legisla-

The deadline means that House legislation not already adopted has expired. Unless they can be revived in another format, bills that die will most likely have to wait two more years for another chance to become law.

Of almost 5,000 bills filed at the beginning of the session, the House had passed more than 1,100 by Thursday. During the day's 15-hour session, lawmakers seemed in no rush, making it to the eighth page of a 25-page list of bills eligible for consideration.

Measures to expand casino gambling and an effort to prohibit colleges from banning concealed weapons license holders from carrying their weapons on campus were among the pieces of legislation that expired Thursday.

"For some people and their legislation, it's the end of the line," said Rep. Garnet Coleman, D-Houston. "For this session, they have no

other options or alternatives to have it become law other than the House bill that will die on the calendar.'

But, with more than two weeks left in the 140-day, biennial session, the House still has much work to do.

That's because several major Senate bills, already debated and approved in that chamber, have yet to be considered in the House and are still eligible.

Those include an effort to

Pampa, 86, died May 7, 2009 in Amarillo, Texas

Reece Field was born November 13, 1922 in Wheeler County to Rev. L.T. and Eva Bell Field. He enlisted in the Army Air Force in July of 1942 and volunteered as a Marine Deep-Sea Diver.

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# Chrysler moves to eliminate 50 Texas dealerships

Green never dreamed his family's ties with Chrysler might end so abruptly.

His grandfather started selling the cars more than 70 years ago. So Green was more than a little surprised Thursday to learn the family's dealership on Corpus Christi's fringe was among the 789 U.S. dealerships Chrysler LLC wants to close.

"In the American Dream you're supposed to have the chance to succeed," Green said. "Yet we don't get a chance to go forward because they decided they needed someone bigger and prettier than we are."

"It's a form of discrimination," Green added. "It's a shame.

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E.H. Green Motors Inc., in Odem is one of 50 dealerships in Texas that Chrysler is targeting for elimination by June 9. The automaker plans to shut down more dealerships in Texas than in any other state, according to a bankruptcy court filing in New York on Thursday.

The Detroit automaker said that sales of many of the targeted dealers are too low, and that its network is outdated and has too many stores competing with each other.

On Thursday, dealers received letters from Chrysler stating whether they would remain or be closed.

Green, whose grandfather started selling Chrysler products in 1936, said they have satisfied customers, they're profitable and consistently outsell larger Chrysler dealers.

"But they're getting to stay and we aren't," Green said, adding that there wouldn't be another dealer from Victoria to Corpus Christi — a distance of about 80 miles - if they close.

He said during Chrysler's difficult days, his dealership stepped up and bought more inventory than they normally would and now they're stuck with it.

"Being here so many years and being that loyal to Chrysler, it certainly wasn't reciprocated, Green said.

Although dealers can appeal, Green said he wouldn't stand a chance before a New York judge

He's considering joining an alliance of the National Auto Dealers Association that can better leverage the concerns of the 789 dealerships to be terminated.

Green said his dealership sold at least 300 cars last

That puts him within the average number of vehicles sold per Chrysler dealer in 2008, according to the automaker's filing.

Honda Motor Co., in comparison, sold about 1,200 vehicles per dealer. Toyota Motor Corp. sold nearly 1,300 per dealer.

Seaton Higginbotham, co-owner of Arrow Chrysler Jeep in Abilene, which sells about 30 vehicles a month, said he's joined the national group of rejected dealers seeking justice in court.

mad!" "We're Higginbotham said. "We didn't see it coming."

Dodge dealership will remain in Abilene and Higginbotham said Chrysler probably wants to give his business to it.

'We don't feel it's fair but fairness doesn't always win out in bankruptcy," Higginbotham said. "It's disheartening."

"The automotive industry is taking on the chin a lot of the repercussions of the mortgage and banking problems," Higginbotham said. "They're Wall Street. We're Main Street. We're where the rubber meets the road.'

In its motion, Chrysler said it has many dealerships that sell one or two of its brands, with Chrysler-Jeep dealerships competing against Dodge dealers as well as other automakers' stores across the country.

A hearing is scheduled for June 3 in U.S. Bankruptcy Court in New York to determine whether to approve Chrysler's motion.

If approved, the move is expected to devastate some communities across the state and nation as thousands of jobs are lost and taxes go unpaid.

Russell Whatley III in Mineral Wells said Chrysler might not want to do business with his family's dealership anymore but that doesn't mean they're calling it quits after 90 years in business.

Russell Whatley Motors Co., which claims to be the oldest car dealership in Texas, said Thursday they're not yet sure what being targeted for elimination will really mean.

"It doesn't mean anything to us yet," Whatley told the Mineral Wells Index. "We are independent and debt free. I don't care what they do, to tell you the truth. I'll know more in a few days."

The local dealership carries new Dodge cars and trucks, Jeeps and Chrysler products from its downtown business location and operates a used car lot.

In its motion, Chrysler said that as suburbs grew and the interstate system evolved, long-standing dealerships were no longer in the best or growing loca-

"Some dealership facilities became outdated," the company said in its filing. "Other locations faced declining traffic count and declining populations."

Chrysler said its dealer network needs to be reduced to strengthen its network and make the remaining dealers more profitable.

Chrysler, which has 3,200 U.S. dealerships, been under bankruptcy protection since April 30 and has received \$4 billion in federal loans.

Its sales are down 46 percent this year compared with the first four months of last year. It reported a \$16.8 billion net loss for

### House to teen drivers: stay off the phone

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas teens may soon have to drop the cell phone and keep their hands on the wheel while driving.

The Texas House on Thursday tentatively approved a measure that would ban teens under the age of 18 from using a cell phone while driving, even if it is a hands-free device. The bill includes an exception for calls made in emergencies.

Drivers under the age of 18 could be fined for an offense, but the penalty would not go on their record. According to a House analysis of the bill, supporters say the goal is to foster good driving habits, not damage driving records.



## Timing everything in ending stimulus

Analysis by Associated Press - The federal government has committed trillions of dollars to domestic bailouts and propping up the recessionary economy, much of it borrowed, much created out of thin air by the Federal Reserve.

How much longer can all this go on? That's the pressing question facing policymakers, and one without a clear answer.

At some point, "You have to take away the punchbowl, as someone once said, in order to avoid the inflation risk," said Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke.

But change course too soon, and it could nip a fragile recovery in the bud. Wait too long, and runaway inflation and gargantuan federal debt could be the sequel to the worst downturn since the 1930s. While nobody thinks the current combination of near-zero interest rates, bank and auto bailouts and trillion-dollar annual deficits is a sustainable economic model, knowing just when to take away the punchbowl is the problem.

For now, the Bernanke Fed is still filling the punchbowl. And President Barack Obama and the Democraticcontrolled Congress are doing the same with government spending.

One reason the Fed has been so aggressive in slashing rates and taking unconventional recession-fighting steps is because "we are trying to avoid another form of price instability, which is deflation," Bernanke told a Fed financial conference in Jekyll Island, Ga., earlier this week

The risk of deflation - a widespread and prolonged decline in retail pric-

the es, wages and real estate and other asset values - is "receding, but it certainly needs not to be ignored,' Bernanke said.

Despite some recent glimmers of hope, evidence is mixed on whether things are getting better or still worse. Disappointing reports Wednesday on falling retail sales and a jump in foreclosures fueled continuing uncertainties and helped push stocks down.

"You've got to take the stimulus off at some point. I don't think that point is this year," said David Wyss, chief economist at Standard & Poor's in New York. He said Wednesday's economic reports point to a continuing recession, despite some recent signs of encouragement.

Government and most private economists expect the recession, which began in December 2007, to end later this year, although they expect high levels of joblessness to continue beyond.

In the meantime, recent developments are complicating efforts to tame the deficit once the recession does end:

·White House budget officials said this week that the deficit would widen to a record \$1.8 trillion this year, \$89 billion more than their estimate in February. They blamed the recession.

•With nearly 80 million baby boomers nearing retirement, the government reported that Medicare and Social Security will face insolvency sooner than previously projected because of the recession - for Medicare in 2017 and for Social Security in 2037.

•A potential \$90 billion shortfall opened up in paying for Obama's health care

proposal. The gap comes from congressional reluctance to go along with his proposal to help pay for the plan by limiting highincome families' charitablegiving and other tax deductions. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said the health care bill will be on the House floor before the August recess.

·The administration asked Congress on Tuesday to add \$100 billion in new U.S. contributions to the International Monetary Fund as part of a war-spend-

Obama proposed just \$17 billion in new spending cuts last week, representing savings of less than one-half of 1 percent in his \$3.4 trillion budget. Republicans scoffed and even some top Democrats criticized him for targeting popular programs in recessionary times.

By some accounts, the im of all the U.S. grants. loans, guarantees and new money created electronically by the Fed since the financial crisis began totals some \$11 trillion, Aî roughly equal to the country's national debt.

That sum does include loan guarantees that might not be needed, money that hasn't been spent, various revolving accounts and U.S. investments in bad mortgages and other toxic, hard-tovalue securities that could someday return money to taxpayers. Still, staggering amounts are involved.

"We are creating a government debt bubble that we're going to have to deal with in a massive way," suggested Rep. Kevin Brady of Texas, the senior Republican on the Congressional Joint

Economic Committee. History shows the dangers of calling the end of economic downturns too

DON'T BLAME US WITH

President Franklin D. Roosevelt made this mistake in 1936 when, believing the Depression largely over, he sought to pare back public spending and to balance the federal budget. It torpedoed a fragile recovery and pushed the economy back under water in 1937.

Japanese leaders made a similar mistake in the 1990s. when they prematurely - and temporarily - withdrew government stimulus spending, helping to prolong Japan's recession to one that lasted a full decade.

At the White House, presidential spokesman Robert Gibbs dismissed suggestions by some analysts, including Liz Ann Sonders, chief investment strategist for brokerage Charles Schwab. that the recession may have already ended.

"I can report has intoned that message" at daily White House economic briefings, Gibbs said. "There's much work to be done."

Veteran budget analyst Stanley Collender said increases in public spending are an important fiscal tool and that "a bigger deficit is justified in the current economic environment."

Furthermore, Collender added, if Obama doesn't push his agenda for more health care, energy and education spending now, when will he?

"He's got a 60-percentplus approval rating. And Democrats are willing to work with him. He should go for it now. He's never going to get a better chance," Collender said.

Dear Editor,

I am concerned for Texas and Texans now that General Motors and Chrysler Corporation intend to shutter thousands of new car and truck dealerships in this country. Not only are these dealerships not part of the financial problem for their manufacturer, but they are a critical component in the recovery of the automotive industry

The most important question is not the number of dealers but whether the dealers are a cost center for their respective manufacturers and they clearly are not. A study by the Casesa Shapiro Group found that franchised automobile dealers provide a vast distribution channel "at virtually no cost" to their manufacturers.

Dealers:

·pay for vehicles for customers and inventory before the vehicles ever leave the

•pay for parts before ever receiving them;

·pay all their employees' costs (ie: wages, benefits, payroll taxes, training costs,

•pay all their own real estate costs (ie: land, buildings, insurance, taxes, etc.); •pay all their own IT and computer costs;

·pay all their equipment costs (ie: service department lifts, tools, diagnostic equipment). The list goes

Keep in mind, dealers add revenue to manufacturers, not costs. Dealers generate more that 90% of manufacturer revenue. A rapid reduction in dealer numbers would further reduce manufacturer's revenue and market share and do little or nothing to improve the manufacturer's viability in the short term.

Elimination of dealerships will only serve to hurt the hard-working employees of those dealerships and

their families, the numerous communities that rely on the taxes generated by those dealerships, the related businesses that sell to those dealerships; the consumers that are served by the competition and convenience of the dealerships and the numerous charitable organizations that benefit from dealers' support. When a dealership closes, the loss to the community is real and immedi-

The 1,368 new car and truck dealerships located in 311 Texas cities and towns are essential to the daily lives of our citizens, for transportation to work, to school, to the doctor and to run Texas business and industry.

These primarily familyowned and operated busi-

nesses, that collectively employ over 80,000 Texans, are part of the very fabric of our state. Closing the doors of even one dealership reduces the quality of life of Texans and does nothing to enhance the viability of the company that dealership has represented faithfully, in many cases for generations.

The truth is, closing dealerships won't affect the bottom line for any manufacturer positively, but will negatively affect thousands of independent businesses, their employees, their customers who depend on them for sales and service and the communities that rely on those dealerships Bill Wolters




she wanted each of you to have your own special day.
