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
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STORM DAMAGE Area residents share stories of loss, officials still completing estimates

released their damage estimates and recommendations to the state for what level, if any, disaster declaration Tuesday morning, following the intense storm system that caused wide-spread damage in the county Friday evening. Pampa Public Works Director

and Public Information Officer Donny Hooper said late Tuesday that several city buildings sustained damage as did Hidden Hills Golf Course.

Insurance adjusters were to be in town today to help city officials make a damage assessment.

Hooper said hail as large as a baseballs, and larger took out windows in trucks and buildings, and damaged several buildings, including two under construction at the landfill. Buildings at the wastewater treatment plant sustained damage as well.

Hooper said city crews worked around the clock over the weekend to make sure everything was working properly.

We knew when power went out at the prison that it would also be out at the lift station," Hooper explained. "We had to get the pumps going to make sure they (the prison) had water."

County officials met Monday afternoon put together a report to send to the state. County emergency management officer Joe Millican said before the meeting that depending on the amount and severity of damage, some grade of disaster declaration could be declared.

"It's our new home," Shirley

Tucker said. "It's my sister's," O.L. Tucker

explained. She and her husband brought it up from their home near

Dallas over the weekend after the Tuckers' home in Lefors was ravaged by the storm that moved through Roberts and Gray Counties Friday evening spawning multiple tornadoes.

Tucker said he and his wife were with friends in a cellar when

the storm struck. After it passed, the Tuckers were helping their friends board up windows in their home where

glass had been broken out.

"I got a phone call from a friend of mine," Tucker said, "and he said, 'You need to go by and take a look at your house. You ain't got no roof left.

The Tuckers had the land for a number of years, but it was only three years ago that they moved their house onto the 15 acres on

the north side of Lefors. Hail from the storm drove

through the roof and into the rooms below. Wind bursts, possibly a tornado, ripped the roof away, leaving a large hole in the Tuckers' living room.

Rain soaked the carpeted floors of the home.

"Water was running down the walls," Tucker said, walking through the soggy rooms.

Pampa man arrested for warrants and drugs

A traffic stop lead to an arrest and drug seizure by the Gray County Sheriff's Office Sunday evening. At 5:11 p.m., a Gray County Sheriff's Office deputy

made a routine traffic stop on Gillespie in Pampa. The driver, identified as Javier Garcia, 20, of Pampa,

had multiple civil warrants out for his arrest. He was taken into custody and the deputy requested Garcia's permission to search the vehicle. Permission was

granted and the deputy found a plastic bag with a white powder believed to be cocaine. Garcia was charged with possession of a controlled substance, greater than four grams but less than two grams, and on warrants for no valid driver's license, no driver's license, no liability insurance, speeding, failure to appear,

and speeding. Garcia remained in jail Monday afternoon on a \$3,500 bond for the cocaine charge and \$1,933 in fines for the





Highlights from the **Texas Legislature**

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas House voted Monday to improve security and oversight of the state's large state institutions for the mentally disabled, which have been hit with allegations of widespread abuse and neglect.

Lawmakers have been looking to improve the facilities known as state schools in the wake of a 2008 federal report that said residents' civil rights were being routinely violated.

Gov. Rick Perry declared the issue a legislative emergency in February and the Senate passed a similar bill in March. Monday's vote in the House comes two weeks before the June 1 end of the ses-

"This bill should be the beginning of the state finally meeting its legal, ethical and moral obligation to taking care of ... our

state's most vulnerable population," said Rep. Abel Herrero, D-Robstown, whose district includes the Corpus Christi State Schools where several former employees have been charged with staging "fight club"-style bouts between residents.

Texas has 13 state schools that house nearly 5,000 residents. The House bill renames them as "state supported living centers" and each would be assigned an ombudsmen to work directly with residents' families to address problems.

It also requires video surveillance in common areas, and allows the state Office of Inspector General to help local prosecutors pursue cases of abuse, neglect or exploitation. Staff would be subject to drug tests and criminal back-SESSION cont. on page 3

BIRTH DATES BILL

A proposal to exempt government employees' birth dates from public records was gutted in the Senate on Monday after running into heavy opposition from news industry and open government advocates.

Republican Sen. Robert Duncan of Lubbock removed the controversial parts of his bill. Then the Senate passed a watered down version of the proposal in a 26-5 vote. The bill now calls only for a study on the disclosure of employee information and doesn't ban the release of birth dates. Duncan's bill next goes to the House, where it could change

again. Government employee birth dates currently are available to the public. Lawmakers who wanted to exempt employee birth dates from public records said releasing them under the Texas Public Information Act could put the employees at risk for identity theft.

Journalists and other open records advocates claim withholding the birth dates from the public is unnecessary and would hamper oversight of the government. Open government advocates also say that the birth date information is not a significant risk for identity theft, particularly financial fraud, which rélies on Social Security numbers and financial data.

STATES' RIGHTS Gov. Rick Perry declared over the weekend that he never advocated for Texas' secession from the

an opinion piece published in the Austin American-Statesman that he stood with a group of bipartisan legislators last month to speak against a big federal government and in defense of states' rights, guaranteed in the 10th Amendment of

the Constitution. "I can't say I was surprised that critics recast my defense of federalism and fiscal discipline into advocacy for secession from the Union. I have never advocated for secession and never will," Perry wrote in the editorial.

It was published just before the House planned this week to take up the states' rights resolution Perry supports.

COASTAL EROSION Texas. Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson is pressing this week for dedicated funding to address coastal erosion. He says Texas has one of the highest rates of coastal erosion in the nation.

Patterson said he wants to restore a 2-cent per barrel fee on imported oil, with the money dedicated to funding coastal protection projects. The import fee was dropped in 2005. He said other states such as Louisiana and Florida already assess a 2-cent fee on imported oil, and California charges 5 cents.

> **LEGISLATOR** RECOVERING

Rep. Edmund Kuempel, the Seguin Republican who was found collapsed in an elevator last week, is doing remarkably better, according to his House crony Rep. Charlie Geren, R-Fort Worth.

TESTING BABIES

The House gave final approval to allowing state health authorities to keep genetic material gathered when newborns are screened for diseases. The bill allows parents to opt out of the retention, in which case the state would have to destroy the samples within 60 days.

Proponents said retaining the genetic material will help researchers come up with cures and treatments for diseases. Information from the samples that does not identify the child could be used for statistical reports or research.

Samples that identify the child would be heavily restricted and treated like confidential medical

records. The bill now goes to Gov. Rick Perry for his consideration.

ZOMBIES, BOTNETS

AND CRIME, OH MY! The House on Monday tentatively approved a bill that targets cyber crime by making it illegal to create zombies and botnets.

Zombies are computers that are unknowingly controlled by a third party, and botnets are groups of zombies. The bill makes it a crime to create, buy or use zombies in order to use someone else's computer for tasks such as sending viruses and solicitations or collect information.

An offender could be ordered to pay \$100,000 per zombie in a violation or damages, whichever is greater.

The measure must be voted on again in the House.

United States. He said in into loud applause at the **Energy prices bounce** back ahead of holiday

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Energy prices resumed their climb into summer driving season Monday, a show of confidence that Americans will overlook dismal economic news as they head out on their Memorial Day weekend trips.

Benchmark crude for June delivery jumped \$2.69 to settle at \$59.03 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange after dropping \$2.28 Friday to \$56.34.

With the June Nymex contract expiring Tuesday, the market was also keeping close tabs on the July contract, which rose \$2.59

to settle at \$59.59.

Retail gas prices have followed along just before the extended holiday weekend.

On Monday, retail gas prices hit \$2.31, according to the U.S. Information Energy Administration. That's another high for the year.

Regular unleaded gasoline has jumped about 10 percent this month as refiners try to ratchet down production. Gasoline consumption continues to fall with Americans leery of traveling far from home during a recession, or no longer commuting to work because they've lost jobs.

A series of reports calling for even less global energy demand last week undercut optimism that a widespread economic recovery was imminent. The International Energy Agency, the U.S. Energy Information Administration and the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries all slashed crude demand expectations.

The outlook for the U.S. economy also turned darker last week after dismal news on unemployment and housing. Retail sales fell unexpectedly last 5 ex-state school employees plead

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Five former employees accused of staging fights among mentally and developmentally disabled residents at a state school in Corpus Christi have been arraigned on felony charges.

The Corpus Christi Caller-Times reported that Dangelo Riley, Jesse Salazar, Guadalupe Delarosa Jr., Vincent Johnson and Timothy

Dixon all pleaded not guilty to injury to a disabled person Tuesday.

A sixth defendant is scheduled to be arraigned May 29. The six were charged in March after police identified them in videos of the fights at the Corpus Christi State School recorded on a cellular phone.



Tania Lozova, a freshman at Coronado High School, had been at her aunt's house along with her parents and two of her brothers when gunfire broke out when two men chased another man into the backyard of the resi-

Daniela Gonzalez Lara, spokeswoman for the regional prosecutor's office in Mexico, said Tania and two men were killed at the party in Ciudad Juarez on Saturday. Tania was shot in the neck and died at a hospital, Gonzalez said. Six shell casings were found, Gonzalez said.

Tania, who had a broken foot and was on crutches, was in the living room when the gunshots began.

Abraham Lozoya Jr. said his parents and siblings were in Juarez to celebrate a cousin's baptism and another cousin's birthday.

He said his sister dreamed of going to an

"Ever since she saw that movie 'Legally Blonde,' she wanted to go to law school. She had been telling me for a while it was her dream to go to Harvard to study law. I would tell her she could do it, to stick to it and follow her dreams. I knew she could do it," he

said. "It's hard to believe she's gone. She struggled so hard to get where she was and in a minute, they took all that away."

Additional counselors were sent to Tania's high school on Monday to speak to students.

Principal Marielo Morales said. "It's always hard when you lose somebody, especially when they are so young and when they have their life ahead of them. I'm just thinking about her parents and siblings and how hard it must be for them."

He said Tania was an honor roll student, an outfielder on the junior varsity softball team and was on a freshman student government group.

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
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

It wasn't even raining when Scott Moore arrived at his home from work at AT&T

Thirty minutes later the Moore family emerged from their cellar to see their torrential.

Scott said he knew the damage was going to be bad before he emerged from the cellar. The wind, which he described as "a terrible howl" created a vacuum of air inside the cellar, causing the family's ears to pop, all electricity

"We found the vent hood to our central heat and air way out there in the pasture," she said.

There's water damage throughout their home.

She said her dog was in the washroom when the storm hit and was unharmed

"We had four cows out here," Shirley said out back. 'It didn't bother them."

But the barn ended up in a tree.

"We've got a tree house," she laughed. "We had a big tree there

beside the barn," Tucker said, "and it fell down on the power lines to the barn." Matt Hinton with B&G Electric fixed that back up

for Tucker, he said. "He's a great guy, Tucker said.

Over the weekend, Tucker and his neighbors took chain saws to the tree. "I've got some firewood

City Marshal Kerry Hodge said the storm came straight across Lefors.

He described it as a dark cloud that was 10 to 20 feet

off the ground. "You could see a clear area," Hodge said, "and that black cloud was right

up above it." He said there was hail, the black cloud and then more hail followed. 'As the cloud rolled across the town, debris was sucked up

into the cloud. "Up on Tumbleweed Drive," Hodge said, "a trailer house was picked up and turned over. The wheels were sticking up in

the air."

The woman who lived there, Wanda Nolte, was in the storm cellar when the storm hit, he said.

"As far as I know," Hodge said, "nobody anywhere here was injured."

Lefors Mayor Mike Young said he was out storm spotting Friday. "We were trying to spot," Young said, "but we couldn't see

anything.' Forsythe said she had gotten off work and picked her son, a senior at Lefors High School, and went

Hodge said that on Gray 17 outside Lefors, a garage collapsed on several vehi-

"It pushed the walls out and let the roof fall," he

said. To the north, crews were patching up homes on the east side of Pampa.

Greg Utsey Panhandle Customs out of Amarillo spent the weekend in Pampa temporarily boarding broken windows and plugging holes in the roofs of Stan Hudson's and David Smith homes in Keller Estates that were damaged during Friday's storm until his crews can

begin permanent repairs. 'There's serious roof penetrations," Utsey said. "The hail went through roofs and sheetrock."

He said he counted 16 holes in the Hudson roof caused by hail. The house next door had 10 to 15 holes in the roof.

The windows on the north side of most of the homes in the Keller addition were broken out by softball-sized hailstones.

"The interior damage is extreme," Utsey said.

The hail didn't just knock off some shingles. It went all the way through the roof and interior ceilings of the rooms inside to allow the heavy rain to pour in and flood the carpeted floors.

"There's shattered glass and water and debris," Utsey said.

The hail also tore off part of the stucco on the exterior and dug up divots in the lush green lawn.

Patti Hudson rode out the storm in an interior room, coming out only when the noise of the hail pounding her home eased up.

North of the Hudson home, a 24-foot trailer was moved about 50 feet by the winds and uprooted a good-sized tree.

The Smith home had 36 windows broken out by hail.

"It was so bad it went through triple pane glass in his house and just shattered his plantation shutters like they were toothpicks," Utsey said. "It was a bad deal."

Utsey said the storm apparently went across Keller Estates, then stalled and backed. Several residents said that's when they saw the clouds beginning to rotate overhead.

"It caught most of these houses on three different angles," Utsey.

Down the street from the Hudsons, Tanner Winkler was waiting on an insurance adjuster. His front windows were boarded up and blue tarps dotted his roof.

Winkler said he and his wife were picking up their daughters from the First Baptist Church day care center Friday afternoon when the storm hit.

"We stayed there until it was all over," Winkler said, "and then we came on home.

Winkler said some of the holes in his roof are bigger than his fist. Like the houses down the street, the hailstones went all the way through the roof and ceil-

"There's quite a bit of water damage," Winkler

Winkler said his two dogs were inside when the storm hit.

"The horses were outside," he said. "They got beat up pretty good, but they seem to be all right."


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

Dell aims bright new netbook at younger kids SEATTLE (AP) — Dell ers in classrooms are a nization, Dell's machine

Inc., already the largest seller of PCs to schools worldwide, is trying to extend its lead with its first "netbook" designed for young students at a time when adult consumers and businesses have cut back on technology spending.

Dell's new Latitude 2100, which was being unveiled at an event Tuesday in Australia, is part of a newly popular category of computer that's much like a laptop, but cheaper, smaller, lighter and less powerful.

Unlike Dell's other netbooks, the 2100's shell is made from brightly colored, grippy rubber, not slippery plastic. Its underside is free from vents and other openings, so plopping the computer on spilled milk won't do any damage. And a light on the lid of the computer tells teachers when kids are connected to the Internet.

The extent to which laptops improve academic performance remains debatable, but Dell Chief Executive Michael Dell, perhaps not surprisingly, argues that computkey ingredient to better starts at \$369, which schooling.

"There's no question that technology can play a role in improving outcomes for students," Michael Dell said in an interview. "This is not to say that putting computers and (information technology) systems in schools solves all the problems – there's no chance of that. But it is to say that, look, these are required skills that people need to be successful.

The 2100, aimed at students in kindergarten through eighth grade, has a 10-inch screen and a keyboard that's a little bigger than regular netbooks. It can be configured with a touch screen, which Dell says is useful for kids' small hands, and an anti-microbial keyboard, because those hands are often grubby. A Web camera add-on is also available. It can run basic versions of Microsoft Corp.'s Windows XP and Vista operating systems and the Ubuntu version of Linux.

Unlike the still-mythical "\$100 laptop" envisioned by the nonprofit One Laptop Per Child orga-

might put it out of reach in developing countries. Add on popular features and Dell said the price will be more like \$500. David Daoud, an analyst for the technology group IDC, said schools typically negotiate prices down by

about \$100 per machine. Round Rock, Texasbased Dell would not say how much money it makes selling computers to schools. Michael Dell said the company's public sector segment, which also includes governments and health care institutions, takes in \$14 billion a year, about 23 percent of Dell's 2008 revenue.

PCs for schools and universities made up just 6 percent of the total shipped last year worldwide, according to IDC, with about a third going to the U.S. Worldwide, Dell was the top player with nearly 20 percent of the market.
