A dedication service will be held at The Freedom Museum at 2 p.m. to dedicate the F-4 Phantom Fighter plane at Freedom Museum to Lt. Col James H. Ayres, a fallen solider who was missing in action for 36 years from Pampa. His remains were found and excavated from Laos in 2007.

ing Korat Royal Thai Air Force Base on a nighttime strike mission of enemy targets in Laos.

The plane crashed and hostile activity in the area prevented search and rescue attempts. Ayres and Stratton were listed as MIA. Several excavations of the crash site were executed between 2001

and 2005, and in 2007 the remains of the men were returned to their families. His remains were identified through DNA evidence, according to Ayers obituary.

Ayres family members gathered in Pampa to bury his remains on August 10, 2007.

Avres flew numerous missions against large concentrations of hostile vehicles, which is why he

Pampa High School graduation ceremonies will be at Harvester Stadium, although the synthetic turf that was supposed to be in place for the event will not be on the field.

"We will be able to use the stadium," Pampa High Principal Tanya Larkin told the school board during their regularly scheduled meeting Tuesday night.

She said there would be no turf, but there should be plenty of seating.

McNeely Field House remains the back up site in case of inclement weather just as in past years, Larkin said.

The installation of the synthetic turf was not moving along as expected, Supt. Barry

Katherine Cesinger, spokesperson for Gov. Perry said Wednesday morning that members of the Governor's Division of Emergency Management are in our county today to determine whether or not recovery is beyond local capacity, then to determine a match for the threshold of assistance

Gray County reported the following damages from the tornado and storm Friday evening.

60 homes reported damaged.

 Five homes sustained damages so severe that they are considered unlivable. 77 homes reported hail damage.

 42 outbuildings were damaged/destroyed Five farm implements were damaged.

 Seven sprinkler systems were damaged. Cesinger said the Governor's office will release results from the assessment as soon as they are available.


Pitner joked as he was leaving that he's hac a fair amount of difficult experiences during his two years as chamber director.

Appeals court hears King issues Pampa in September, 2005.

He pleaded guilty last April in Missouri to the Sept. 29, 2005, murders of Orlie McCool, 70, and McCool's daughter-in-law, Laura Dawn McCool, 47, in exchange for a life sentence in prison without parole.

King is accused of killing Brian Conrad, 31; his six-month pregnant wife, Michell Conrad, 35 and her son Zach Doan, 14, at their home between Pampa and Interstate 40 in the predawn hours

of Sept. 30, 2005.

In March, 2006, a Gray County grand jury indicted King on four counts of murder.

King was returned to the Texas Panhandle in July where he is being held in the Hemphill County iail.

Peck said in oral arguments today before a three judge appeals panel that state law requires a defendant to be brought to trial 120 Or 180 days after being extradited from another state, but there

are two laws that deal with extradition.

To clarify a question by Judge Mackey Hancock, Peck asked the panel to apply the time limit of one of the laws to another.

"This is a unique situation," Peck told the judge, when Hancock questioned if there was any case law that could be cited.

"I'm troubled by what you're asking me to do," Hancock replied. One of the laws generally deals KING cont. on page 3



projects including the family aquatic center, animal shelter, and landfill lines.

The city is building new cell at the landfill and has made other improvements, including a new building facility at the entrance of the landfill through the use of 4.1 million dollars in revenue bonds.

New water wells will also be drilled at the landfill with 1.5 million dollars of revenue bonds, Stokes said. Plans for a new aquatic

facility are still underway. City officials have agreed not to open the facility next summer as originally planned, because a location for the pool has not been

"We are trying to thoroughly evaluate options," Stokes explained. "The decision to open next summer would rush our decision and we don't want to do that."

Stokes said that some of the possible locations being considered for the facility include the north part of town, or another area that would be visible to people passing through town and potential tourists. In order to built the

facility, the city has been awarded a \$500,000 grant by the Pampa Economic Development Commission, and the city is working on applying for other grants to assist with the financial responsibility of the proj-

The facility is part of a larger plan with the Texas Department of Parks and Recreation in a 10 year plan to improve the parks and Pampa and have a direction for what the city wants the parks to become in the future.

Stokes said that the aquatic facility will enhance the quality of life for Pampa residents, and it will benefit residents in the future, and may even cause people to move to Pampa.

The search for a new police chief is still active and Stokes said a chief should be selected within the next month to six weeks.

Stokes also said that a design firm has been hired to "assess needs" at the Pampa Animal Shelter and that the project is underway and moving towards replacement of the current

with fugitives while the other deals with prisoners that are already incarcerated.

King was in custody, but had not yet been tried for the murders in Missouri when a Gray County grand jury indicted him on the murders south of Pampa, but Gray County Sheriff Don Copeland asked prison officials in Missouri to hold King while the sheriff sent deputies to the prison to pick the prison up and return him to Gray County after King's conviction in Missouri.

Peck and Wilson maintain that such action triggered a 120 or 180 time frame in which King would have to be tried in Texas.

"His right to a speedy trial," Peck argued in court today, "has been violated."

Switzer told the appeals panel that under the law such an argument should be held for appeal following a conviction.

She said she doesn't think any of King's fundamental rights have been violated. Switzer indicated that

King had been extradited under one law, but if he had been extradited under the other extradition law, he would have had 120 days to be brought to trial.

The purpose of the two laws is the same, she said, but they are two different statutes.

She said that Sheriff Copeland's request was just that, a request to hold King at the prison until he could get his deputies there to pick up the prisoner.

Peck argued that the two laws are not mutually exclusive.
