AMARILLO - Sid Mauldin didn't win this year at the big car show here over the weekend, but it was only because he wasn't eligible.

The Pampa resident won Best of Show last year at the Amarillo Corvette Club's sixth annual Top of Texas Wheels Xtravaganza Car Show so he was ineligible to win the honor again, but his customized 1957 Corvette was certainly a hit.

And the Xtravaganza Car Show wasn't the only one he won last year. In 2008, he walked away with Best of Show, People's Choice and Participant's Choice.

"I think that's the only time one car got all three," Mauldin said.

Mauldin's Corvette features a Yenko Wildfire LS7 V8 that pumps out 554 horsepower.

"It was built as a race car," he said. "It's truly a full race car.'

It was built by Bill Rea, who was the suspension man for Don Yenko's Corvette Racing Teams, to compete in vintage races against 1956 and 1966 Ford-powered Shelby American Cobra sports cars, but with a laugh, Mauldin said it got out of hand.

"He built this to kill Cobras," Mauldin said.

How fast will it go? It should top 180, but Mauldin said the lack of seat belts acts as a governor on the engine.

Hidden Hills back out of the rough

Hidden Hills Public Golf Course opened it's doors last Friday for the first time in a week since storms caused major damage to the course.

The greens are still not in perfect shape, according to Harley Knutson, employee, but personnel have been working overtime to make the grounds playable.

"It's come a long way in a week, and it's looking pretty good," Knutson said. The greens have required major repair, including the placement of 30 tons

of sand on the greens to smooth in the grapefruit size holes left from hail damage.

Machines were brought

in to smooth the sand, and then the grounds were reseeded and mowed to make them level for playing.

Knutson said in another month, the greens should be back to the condition they were in before the storm hit Friday.

"There has been a real good effort by everyone to get this place reopened," Knutson said.

Ken Norris, golf course superintendent, and grounds employees have worked long hours every day since the storm repairing the greens to a playable condition.

David Teichmann, Hidden Hills golf professional, estimated the damages so far to be somewhere between \$15,000 and \$25,000. That estimate includes the loss of revenue for being closed six days and a potential loss of revenue from people not playing there because of the damages.

That damage estimate will increase, Teichmann said, "we just don't know how much yet." The roof's on multiple structures will have to be replaced, as well as other structural damage repaired, and repair to golf carts.

"We've got it to where the course is fairly playable and it will just get better every day," Teichmann said.

Members of Hidden Hills have been offered an extended months play to

Flyer honored

After some 36 years of being listed as Missing in Action, the remains of the two men were recovered and returned to the U.S. in 2007. Ayers was buried in Pampa.

The F-4E Phantom, the model Ayers was flying on his final mission, was made available to the Freedom Museum by the Air Force free of charge, noted Andy Epps, curator of the museum, but the people of Pampa has to raise almost \$60,000 to have it moved from Ruidoso, N.M., to the Texas Panhandle.

Epps, during the dedication ceremonies Monday afternoon, credited his father with raising the money.

"He said he'd put up \$100 and challenged everyone else in Pampa to do the same," Epps said.

It took only a few weeks to raise the funds to move the plane.

Epps said the F-4 was never designed to have the wings removed, but they had to in order to truck the plane to Pampa. The plane now stands to the east of the museum's main building

Monday afternoon, mother, Lacy Ayers' Ayers; his wife, Brenda Ayers; his son, Jim Ayers; and his sister Dorothy Davidson were joined by Stratton's widow, Sallie Stratton, and friends and supporters for the dedication of the plane.

now, Mauldin said that he's been known to make the drag in it down Cuyler. It runs as good as it looks, he said.

Senate on Monday night approved its version of a major overhaul to the state's road-building agency, including allowing voters in counties in the state's largest metro areas to raise gas taxes to pay for road projects.

The Senate bill to renew the Texas Department of Transportation also would keep the agency's five-member commission, even though the governor-appointed panel would be subjected to closer scrutiny from lawmakers.


Those two provisions are major differences between the Senate and House with the June 1 end of the session looming.

The Senate would allow 30 counties in

San Antonio, El Paso and Corpus Christi metro areas to hold local elections to raise gas taxes by up to 10 cents per gallon and raise vehicle registration fees.

Sen. John Carona, R-Dallas, said it will provide much-needed to money to build roads for those cities' bursting populaations.

And while the Senate wants to keep the agency commission intact, the House wants to replace it with a single statewide elected commissioner and divert much of the embattled agency's power to local commissions.

DEAR ABBY: I disagree with your response to "Needs Help Finishing Th ... " (Feb. 23), who can't complete her projects now that she has graduated from college. I could have written that letter, except that I graduated from college 30 years ago.

I have always had problems finishing anything that didn't have specific external consequences if it wasn't completed. Now that I'm in graduate school, this trait has become a real problem. I tried every mind game, motivation and organizational technique I could think of, while silently berating myself because no matter what I did, I eould not finish writing my papers or complete my research projects.

Eventually, I was sent by student counseling to a psychologist who ran a battery of tests and found that I have the inattentive form (non-hyperactive) of attention deficit disorder (ADD). I am now on medication and making progress.

Not everyone who can't complete tasks has ADD. But for those who do, being told they are "self-indulgent" only adds to the despair and selfrecrimination they already feel. "Needs Help" should read up on adult ADD/ ADHD to see if some of the characteristics fit and then seek professional help. -- 50-YEAR-OLD GRAD STUDENT WITH ADD

DEAR ABBY: Being disorganized and not a self-starter could be signs and/or symptoms of several psychological problems that interfere with personal growth and satisfaction in many areas of life. There could be a deep, underlying reason for that person's lack of motivation in getting on with life after graduation.

Talking to a therapist would get to the core of the problem. There are recognized disorders that prevent people from starting and finishing even the smallest project. -- PAULA IN ROCHESTER, N.Y.

DEAR ABBY: As a college professor, I often see students who thrive under the structure of formal classes have difficul-

to independent projects. The ability to conceptualize and complete unsupervised projects requires skills that can be learned and strengthened with practice. DEAR ABBY: The disorganization of some creative people is often chalked up as a side effect of their creativity because

they do not seem to have trouble in school. These students often gravitate toward the arts because the climate is more accommodating of their "difficulties.'

Because I was an excellent student who was considered creative, people set aside the fact that I was disastrously messy and disorganized. It wasn't until I was in my late 20s that I was diagnosed with ADD. That diagnosis changed my life and provided immense relief. -- BEEN THERE IN HAMILTON, N.J.






