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

Squeezed in the old Gilbert's store on Cuyler are headboards, dressers, bookcases, beveled mirrors, washstands, two old iceboxes, tables and desks. There are several roll top desks, including a lady's roll top. There's one desk made from an organ.

"A friend of mine made that for me." Clement said.

Along one wall is an old console radio.

With a broad grin, he said it worked until he bought it.

Clement, who is originally from Wellington, started moving into his Cuyler Street location last November.

"We bought a home here in September," he said.

His brother, Guy Clement, used to live in Pampa. "He worked for Culberson-Stowers Chevrolet for 34 years here," Clement said. "His wife, Gwen, still lives here."

Clement retired from education after spending 30 years in the school district at Wellington -- everything from custodian to superinten-

# Palo Duro Canyon State Park marks 75th anniversary

#### Boz Scaggs concert, free park admission highlight special weekend

CANYON, TX-A park known to many as the "Grand Canyon of Texas" and beloved by generations who have visited its landmark features celebrates 75 years as a popular Panhandle travel destination near Amarillo, with special events and activities scheduled for the weekend of July 4-5.

To celebrate the 75th anniversary, the park is offering free admission to all visitors, waiving the customary \$5 per-person adult admission fee (children ages 12 and younger are always free). The park will also host a number of activities such as nature hikes and wildlife viewing tours along some of the park's numerous nature trails.

Highlighting the weekend's festivities will be a special edition of the musical drama "Texas" on the evening of July 4-including extra fireworks and music to honor the Fourth of July tradition-and a concert by Boz Scaggs and his band the evening of July 5. Both events are scheduled for the park's Pioneer Amphitheater. A portion of the proceeds from the concert will benefit the Partners in Palo

Duro Canyon Foundation and the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation.

"Palo Duro Canyon has been important to everyone who has lived here, going back some 12,000 years," said park superintendent Randy Ferris. "From prehistoric man to the Comanche and Kiowa peoples, who considered it a sacred place, to ranchers who brought livestock here because of the water. In the 1930s, the Civilian Conservation Corp came here to restore access to this place and help build the economy. Everywhere you look, Lighthouse Rock

to escape from our busy lives. You can still drive into the canyon, and imagine you are the first person ever to discover it.'





## Case of condemned killer of 2 to get another look

of

Texas Court of Criminal Appeals on Wednesday sent back to a trial court the case of an East Texas man condemned for a crossstate murder spree that left two men dead.

Attorneys for Clinton Lee Young questioned what they said was false testimony presented by prosecutors and a failure by prosecutors to produce evidence favorable to Young at his 2003 trial in Midland. Young's lawyers also argued that some evidence was improperly suppressed.

In each instance Young's constitutional rights were violated, they contended. In a brief order Wednesday, the appeals court remanded the case to the trial court in Midland County to examine the allegations. Two other challenges raised by Young's

HOUSTON (AP) - The lawyers were rejected by the state's highest appeals court.

> The same court in 2005 upheld Young's conviction and death sentence and the U.S. Supreme Court a year later refused to review the case. Another appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals also was rejected in 2006. The most recent appeal

was filed in April. Young, 25, from Ore City, was convicted of the 2001 fatal shootings Samuel Petrey, 52, of Eastland, and Doyle Douglas, 41, of Ore City. Testimony showed

Young, who was 18 at the time of the slayings, killed Petrey in a Midland oilfield after carjacking him the night before in a grocery store parking lot in Eastland, about 200 miles east of Midland.






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# Pickens left indelible mark on Ob

**OKLAHOMA** CITY (AP) — With a black Sharpie marker, T. Boone Pickens mapped out for Barack Obama the way to U.S. energy independence - right there on a white tablecloth.

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It was a demonstration he wouldn't soon forget. After Pickens' wife encountered Obama at a function this week in Las Vegas, she relayed word that the president was still astounded by her husband's indelible markings.

But as he tours the country promoting his "Pickens Plan," the Texas billionaire is confident that Obama has done more than just remember his plea. He believes the president will make great strides this year in formulating an energy plan that is less reliant on countries that aren't friendly with the U.S.

"I know the man understands the problem and I

know that he knows the solution, and I know that that's the direction we're headed and you are going to see this year the most progressive, monumental changes in energy policy in America you have ever seen," Pickens said Wednesday during a speech at a downtown Oklahoma City hotel.

"It's going to affect your life, mine, all of us in America.'

Pickens used his speech at the annual Sovereignty Symposium to ask American Indians to support the construction of wind turbines and solar panels on tribal land as part of his goal to eliminate America's dependence on foreign oil. Pickens wants to convert the country's electrical supply to alternative sources like wind and solar power, which would then free up natural gas to fuel vehicles.

He said American Indians would be affected as wind farms spring up on the Plains from Oklahoma to the Canadian border and as solar technology gets installed in Southwest Texas to states from California.

"This is going to affect you, too. ... I encourage you to look at it closely. Don't try to stop it. Work out the best deal you can for yourself and let it happen," Pickens said.

Stating matter-of-factly that he's "done a very good job of predicting the price of oil" to build his fortune over the years, Pickens said current energy policy has America headed toward importing 75 percent of its oil at a cost of \$300 per barrel by the year 2019. That would cost the U.S. more than \$2 trillion annually, Pickens said.

"That is not sustainable. It is not possible," Pickens said. "Something has to change."

Pickens has worked with members of Congress to propose a bill outlining the plan he has been promot-

ing since last summer with a series of town hall meetings across the country.

'We have to get our oar in the water. We have to make something happen. We have got to start getting on our own resources," Pickens said.

"It's way too easy and way too dangerous to continue to rely on the enemy for our resources. We cannot do that. And I do believe that this is teed up for President Obama. It's a big, fat ball sitting on a tee for him and I think he's going to knock it out of the park.'

Pickens said that during his 90-minute meeting with Obama in August, the future president discussed his preference to use battery technology to power vehicles. Pickens said he explained to Obama that natural gas was the only American resource that could power an 18-wheel-

"Natural gas is cleaner, it's cheaper, it's ours

and it's abundant. Lucky break for us," Pickens said. "Lucky break. A window of opportunity, and I'm convinced this administration will not let that window close without us getting through it. We are going to have this happen."

Pickens also predicted that oil prices, which fell to \$66.12 per barrel on Wednesday, would reach \$75 by the end of the year and consumers would again see \$3-per-gallon gasoline.

Now the price of gasoline has gone down, but the dependency features still exist, so it's a security problem for us more than it is an economic problem," Pickens said. "So, today, we're importing just as much oil as we did a year ago."

"The No. 1 problem we have is security," he added. "There's no question that we're buying oil from the enemy and we're paying for both sides of a war."







The Dallas Morning News on Straus as the new Speaker of the Texas House

The story that beat all others in the 2009 Texas Legislature is the emergence of Joe Straus as speaker of the House.

Gov. Rick Perry and Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst naturally had their share of the spotlight, focusing on policies from school standards to voter identification. But it was the emergence of their younger, untested colleague that mattered above all else. And more often than not, the newcomer ran the chamber with a steady hand In fact, until the House's rendezvous with the voter ID bill over the Memorial Day weekend, Straus' leadership of the rambunctious chamber had been as flawless as one could expect from a freshman speaker. Democrats had few complaints, and most Republicans liked the way their even-handed colleague ran the show. Six vears of Tom Craddick's tight control of the House had left most members ready for a change. The soft-spoken Straus, a centrist Republican from San Antonio, supplied it. He had been a state representative for only two full terms, and becoming speaker for this session could not have been on his mind for long. He emerged as a possible candidate only after disaffected members settled on him as their lead challenger to the sharply conservative Craddick a few days before the '09 session began. The background is important because Straus easily could have failed. He did not. He figured out how to run the House, which is about as easy as learning how to drive a train as it hurtles down the tracks.

was struggling with an issue. Members decided they should seek guidance from "upper management," meaning Straus and his team.

What happened next was revealing: The speaker told committee members to work it out themselves. That was far from standard operating procedure in the Craddick years, but Straus believes committees should have the freedom to come up with their own solutions.

Unfortunately, letting the process follow its own course can have its casualties, depending whom you give authority to shape policy. Straus guaranteed the defeat of the local-option transportation plan by the team he put in place. That blew the best opportunity in this lawmaking session to fight urban traffic congestion. Ironically, he told this newspaper's editorial board in February that he believes transportation in Texas is underfunded. His instincts were right on this problem, but he did nothing to steer the House toward a solid solution. This points to the challenge that will come if Straus is elected speaker again in 2011. Speakers aren't just supposed to keep the trains on track; as the House leader, he also has an obligation to pursue policies that are best for the state. Speaker Straus has the next 18 months to work on that part of his approach to governing. Over the last five months, he mostly proved himself in his hurried debut, which makes his performance the story of this session. How well he scores in a second term depends upon how he matches his commitment to fairness in the House with good policies for the state.

R-Texas, is absolutely right when he asserts that the confirmation of Sonia Sotomayor to the nation's highest court should be a rigorous one.


He could have gone a step farther and added that the confirmation process should be a fair one. Cornyn, however, fell into the attack launched by his party's ultraconservative wing, which took great umbrage at comments attributed to the U.S. Supreme Court nominee a federal appeals court judge in New York that were quite provocative.

First, the ultraconserva-

The other comment that caused a stir in the ultraright bullpen paraphrased Sotomayor as saying her Latina upbringing makes her a better judge than a white male. Sotomayor's parents moved to New York from Puerto Rico.

What she said was this: "Gender and national origins may and will make a difference in our judging." But wait, there's more. She paraphrased a fellow woman jurist, who, Sotomayor said, "believes that judges must transcend

tives say, Sotomayor said somewhere that judges make policy. Gasp!

Before calling for the defibrillators, those taking offense at Sotomayor's supposed comments might want to read Plessy v. Ferguson or Brown v. Board of Education. Or, closer to home or much more recently, the Texas 3rd Court of Appeals decisions that stood both law and common sense on its head by declaring in a campaign finance case that the definition of "funds" did not include checks.

If all that musty reading is just too much bother, they might want to quote Sotomayor accurately or in full context.

She did say appeals courts are where policy is made, but she was quick to add: "I'm not promoting it, and I'm not advocating it ... The court of appeals is where, before the Supreme Court makes the final decision, the law is percolating. Its interpretation, its application.'

Like it or not, she accurately explained a portion of the role of judiciary under that treasured system of checks and balances.

Legislatures are not sacrosanct, and neither are laws they write. Legislation is written by human beings making compromises that are sometimes downright ugly. The judiciary is there

their personal sympathies and prejudices and aspire to achieve a greater degree of fairness and integrity based on the reason of law." Which should put her

pretty much in sync with what Cornyn says he's looking for. Cornyn's comments are significant because of his ascendancy in the Republican Senate leadership and his seat on the Judiciary Committee.

Cornyn will also be watched closely during the confirmation process because his home state is rich with Latino voters. Gratuitous insults will further alienate Latinos from the Republican Party.

Cornyn said he wants the confirmation process to allow Sotomayor "to prove herself to possess the impartiality, integrity, legal expertise and judicial temperament" of a Supreme Court justice.

She did just that by defending the right of a police employee in New York to send "patently offensive, hateful and insulting" racist communications on his free time. She was on the losing end of the decision, but she wrote that "concerns about race relations in the community" should not trump "the centrality of the First Amendment in our lives" when government is "confronted with speech it does not like."

Others have questioned her intellectual capacity for the job. Sotomayor was at the top of her class at Princeton and was an editor at the Yale Law Journal and was appointed to the bench by President George H.W. Bush.

Barring some earthshaking development, there's no reason that Sotomayor won't survive a fair and unbiased review. Cornyn plays a huge role in setting the tone. Let's hope he sets the right one.



FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — The achievements of Dr. David Lichtman's 43-year medical career may seem impressive since he's a specialized surgeon, a retired U.S. Navy rear admiral and a former commander of the National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda, Md.

One thing Lichtman, now chairman of the orthopedics department at the University of North Texas Health Science Center and the JPS Health Network, couldn't claim was an undergraduate degree.

Tufts University near Boston recently resolved the quirk in his curriculum vitae by granting him a bachelor's degree in chemistry and biology without his ever returning to the classroom.

Lichtman, 67, jokes that his years of cumulative experience as a surgeon ---including treating returning Vietnam War veterans must be the equivalent of one year's schooling at Tufts.

"I didn't think I needed a bachelor's degree because I figured I was going to graduate from medical school," he said. "But because it went unfinished, I used to have dreams that I went back to Tufts."

"This is very unusual. But I'm sure Dr. Lichtman is very deserving since he was granted the degree," Dixon said.



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
