#### Free carpet pad with any installed Celanese auction ends Saturday carpet purchase **Free whole house** carpet cleaning

Bargain hunters have been at the former Celanese plant this week, as the inventory of items is sold off. Celanese opened in Pampa in 1952 and was sold in August, 2007. Operations ceased in January.

The plant that once hummed with activity as a symbol of Pampa's manufacturing might in the petrochemical industry now echoes with memories and an auctioneer's chant as bargain hunters search through the empty corridors, rooms and spaces.

This week's auction of equipment at the Celanese plant west of Pampa will draw to a close Saturday withe the sale of furniture, drafting tables, office equipment, computers, laptops and respiratory equipment. Each day of the four day sale featured different types of equipment. Tools, machinery, safety equipment, shelving and work benches are on the block today.

Established in 1952, to take advantage of the area's abundance of natural gas, the plant primarily produced acetic acid and acetic anhydride, chemicals that eventually became part of various commercial products ranging from aspirin to photographic film to textiles.

Celanese joined with the Australian investment and advisory firm of Babcock and Brown in 2006 to support a state proposal to connect power plants in the Texas Panhandle to the ERCOT (Electric Reliability Council of Texas) downstate.

Babcock and Brown is a global investment firm involved in power generation and electric transmission and distribution. That had planned on developing a wind farm near Pampa and using the coal-fired power plant at the Celanese plant for backup during peak demand.

The international company, however, is now restructuring and plans are on hold while the world tries to work through economic problems.

> participation pact. If dealers refuse to sign, GM will terminate their franchise. And for those that sign on to the new pact, they are required to accept any demands without appeal or protest that GM might make pertaining to upgrading their stores and addressing any competing franchises within the

same dealership. But as Richard Stowers looked at the language in the GM document, he said he was shocked. "I don't like it. It's wrong on so many levels, I don't know where to begin. What GM is doing is just wrong. I wish they'd filed bankruptcy six to eight months

ago," Stowers said. Stowers spoke of what the dealership has meant to his family. He is the third generation of the family at the helm. His grandfather, Frank Culberson started the business, and Richard's father, Dick Stowers, has been involved in the business since 1951. Richard, Jr. started in the automo-

bile business at the age of 15. "Every day when I left school, I'd go straight to the dealership". He says he worked in every department, where he learned the business literally from the ground up.

The corporation has made several acquisitions through the years, including the purchase of Tom Rose Cadillac, Brown Pontiac, and in the 1980's they brought the popular

Toyota line to Pampa. Politicians were speak-ing their minds this week, to GM's president Fritz Henderson. 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## New Texas historian starting 2-year term Wheeler

SHERMAN, Texas (AP) - Short and stocky, Light Cummins laughs that no one will mistake him for the lean and tall Marlboro Man, the advertising icon of an earlier generation who came to personify the stereotypical Texan.

Despite appearances, Cummins is every bit a Texan. His family pedigree goes back almost 200 years in the Lone Star State and his summers growing up were spent on a Texas ranch where he learned to ride horses and handle

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Now Cummins, 63, is the new Texas state historian and has a statewide platform to preach the gospel of Texas history, which he's taught for nearly a third of a century at Austin College in Sherman.

"Every Texas historian is in one way or another trying to address the question: Why is Texas unique?" he said from his North Texas college office crammed floor to ceiling with books about the state and dominated by a pull down map of Texas. "What is it about our myth, our mythology, what it is about ourselves that so compellingly makes the Texas experience historically unique? That's a very very important thing that all Texas historians seek to deal with."

He'll spend the next two years, the term of his appointment by Gov. Rick Perry, advancing awareness of Texas history and providing mechanisms for people to get information about the state's colorful past. Within days of his swearing-in a couple weeks ago in Austin, he established a Texas State Historian blog.

'There are several other states that have a uniqueness to them," he said. "But Texas is unique in that it may be the only state in the union where people have a state-based identification to it, similar to the concept historians call nationalism. That's very very unique.

He credits the Republic of Texas, when in the decade beginning in 1836 Texas was its own country, for fostering that senti-

talking

in the early 19th century all over the world where people developed national identification," he said. "People who came to Texas developed that in the Republic and it stuck."

Cummins, who just finished his eighth Texas book, a biography of Emily Austin, the sister of Stephen F. Austin, in May became the second person to hold the state historian title in its current form. The Texas Legislature in 2005 formalized the job, which pays nothing and receives no state financial backing. It does, however, make him the public face at libraries and teacher seminars and local historical community functions for a state that has more than 600 museums and more historic courthouses dating from the mid-19th century

than any other state. "I grew up in a family that was very proud of its Texas heritage and with stories of ranching life and pioneer times," he said. "I knew people who remembered very clearly as young folks the era of the trail drives and the great cattle ranches. I had relatives that participated."

succeeds Cummins Frank de la Teja, a professor and chairman of the history department at Texas State University in San Marcos.

"Much of what Light needs to do is in the area of consciousness raising," he said. "Many people don't know about the state historian and if they do, don't know exactly what is involved." Larry Oaks, execu-

tive director of the Texas Historical Commission, said Cummins' books and research and accomplishments make him "a master of enriching people's lives through history.

By statute, the historian's only official function is to advise state government leaders and promote the understanding and teaching of Texas history.

'It's great that the state has this office, and as the general public becomes more aware of its existence, I'm sure whoever holds it will be in a position to help promote the great historical and cultural legacy of the state," de la

Cummins calls it a selfgenerating job and lauded his predecessor for bringing enthusiasm for Texas history wherever he went.

"And that's what I'm going to do," he said. 'I'm simply doing what I always do... If anything, I'm intimidated and daunted. I'm worried people may have expectations for what I'm doing that are simply not realistic.

"I'm simply going to be a professor to a larger constituency."

Cummins calls himself "native Texan born in Connecticut," the result of his mother living with relatives in the East while his father was in the military during World War II. They moved back to Texas two months after he was born, settled first in Bandera, then moved to San Antonio, where his father was a dentist and where he attended school. He spent summers on ranches of relatives in Columbus, west of Houston, received his undergraduate degree at Southwest Texas State and did graduate work at Tulane University. He's a former Fulbright Scholar.

Cummins figures over the years he's been to every town in Texas "big enough to have a stoplight, and some that haven't." Over the past two years alone, he's logged more than 30,000 miles working on a book project with his wife, Victoria, also an Austin College history professor, that began with identify-

employees

ing murals painted in post offices in the 1930s. Now it's grown to include other artwork like sculptures and music and markers from what he calls "the great era of Texas nationalism."

"Texas is a living history laboratory, it really is," he

And it's changing.

"Texas is a far more diverse state than it was in a lot of ways," Cummins said. "And Texas history, if we're going to keep our identity, Texas history is going to have to respond to that diversity.

"The typical stereotype of Texas can be the cattle ranch and the cowboy, but how many Texans live on ranches today and how many Texans are cow-boys?" he asked. "Today, most Texans are urban."

They also aren't typically Anglo.

"We're making new history now," he said, suggesting that 100 years from now the stereotypical Texan "may well be a city dweller, may be a woman, may be someone who's not of Anglo-Saxon heritage, but it will be someone who is thoroughly Texan."

One thing he doesn't expect to change is the friendliness he sees among Texans in his travels, like his visit to Blanco in the Hill Country over the recent Memorial Day weekend.

"Texans have an exuberance that you don't generally see in a lot of other states.



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

"We have not increased the cost of a lifetime license for 12 years," said Gene McCarty, TPWD deputy director of administration. "Frankly, these licenses have been undervalued and could represent significant lost revenue over time if not adjusted.'

Boat owners in Texas will also see increases in boat registration and titling fees. Boat registration, which are valid for two years, for vessels less than 16 feet in length increase from \$30 to \$32 and those in the 16-26 foot range go from \$50 to \$53. Boats 26-40 feet increase from \$70 to \$110 and boats greater than 40 feet

increase from \$90 to \$150. The department received less than 400 comments related to the fee increases during the public comment period, the majority of which came from the TPWD online survey and by email, with only 16 comments resulting from a series of 19 public bad economic times as the

primary reason. "Initially we considered a 10-15 percent increase but in this economy we know that is unrealistic and counterproductive," said McCarty. "But, it's important to mention that this will just keep us even."

McCarty noted the fees for none of the special endorsement stamps were increased.

In addition to the fee increases, the commission approved a new administrative fee of \$100 for reinstatement of any recreational or commercial license that has been revoked or suspended.

The commission also authorized staff to implement a drawing for a package that includes a lifetime hunting and fishing license and one-year subscription to Texas Parks & Wildlife magazine. Entry fee for the drawing will be \$5 and will go on sale Aug. 15 wherever licenses are sold.

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
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
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
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## famed musician Gordon Mote

## Actor David Carradine found dead in Bangkok

BANGKOK (AP) — The body of American actor David Carradine, best known for the 1970s TV series "Kung Fu," was found in a hotel room closet with a rope tied to his neck and genitals, and his death may have been caused by accidental suffocation, Thai police said Friday.

The 72-year-old actor's body was discovered Thursday in his luxury suite at Bangkok's Swissotel Nai Lert Park Hotel. Police initially said they suspected suicide, though Carradine's associates had questioned that theory.

Police Lt. Gen. Worapong Chewprecha told reporters that Carradine was found with a rope tied around his genitals and another rope around his neck.

"The two ropes were tied together," he said. "It is unclear whether he committed suicide or not or he died of suffocation or heart failure."

Thai police completed an autopsy on Carradine on Friday. But Police Col. Somprasong Yenthuam, superintendent of the Lumpini police station, which is handling the case, said results would not be ready for at least three weeks because the cause of death was unclear. He called the time lag "normal."

Dr. Nanthana Sirisap, director of Chulalongkorn Hospital's Autopsy Center, told reporters that the autopsy was conducted because of the "unusual circumstances surrounding Carradine's death," but did not elaborate.

Police Lt. Teerapop Luanseng had said Thursday that Carradine's body was found "naked, hanging in a closet," and that police at the time suspected suicide.

But one of Carradine's managers dismissed the theory.

"All we can say is, we know David would never have committed suicide," said Tiffany Smith of Binder & Associates, his management company. "We're just waiting for them to finish the investigation and find out what really happened. He really appreciated everything life has to give ... and that's not something David would ever do to himself."

Carradine had flown to Thailand last week and began work on a film titled "Stretch" two days before his death, Smith said. He had several other projects lined up after the action film, which was being directed by Charles De Meaux.

Carradine was in good spirits when he left the U.S. for Thailand on May 29 to work on "Stretch," Smith said.

"David was excited to do it and excited to be a part of it," she said by phone from Beverly Hills.

Filming began Tuesday, she said, adding that the

crew was devastated by Carradine's death and did not wish to speak publicly about it for the time being.

Aurelio Giraudo, the hotel's general manager, said Carradine checked into the hotel May 31 and he last saw him June 3. He said Carradine chatted with staff and even played piano a few nights in the lobby as well as flute which the "guests really enjoyed."

"I was a fan. I had a very nice talk with him when he checked in," Giraudo told The Associated Press. "He was very much a person full of life. I mentioned to him that I had seen (the movie) "Crank" with my family and that was the last smile he gave me."

Giraudo said a chambermaid discovered Carradine's body, adding that she knocked and entered after there was no response. Police arrived shortly thereafter.

anyone else in the room at the time of Carradine's death.

Carradine, a martial arts practitioner himself, was best known for the U.S. TV series "Kung Fu," which aired in 1972-75. He played Kwai Chang Caine, an orphan who was raised by Shaolin monks and fled China after killing

the emperor's nephew in retaliation for the murder of his kung fu master.

Carradine also appeared in more than 100 feature films with such directors as Martin Scorsese, Ingmar Bergman and Hal Ashby.

He returned to the top in recent years as the title character in Quentin Tarantino's two-part saga "Kill Bill." Bill, the worldly father figure of a pack of crack assassins, was a shadowy presence in 2003's "Kill Bill — Vol. 1." In that film, one of Bill's former assassins (Uma Thurman) begins a vengeful rampage against her old associates, including Bill.




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
