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> AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas Comptroller Susan Combs certified the state's two-year \$182 billion budget Monday, saying there is enough revenue to sup-

> Lawmakers approved the budget covering the 2010-11 spending cycle before adjourning their session June 1. Republican Gov. Rick Perry has yet to weigh in on what parts of the budget he agrees or disagrees with.

er to certify the spending plan. She announced that she certified the main budget and the supplemental budget, a \$2.4 billion plan to cover unexpected costs for the rest of 2009. That supplemental budget includes money to address damages from Hurricane

"There is sufficient revenue available to support all of the budget bills passed by the 81st Legislature," Combs wrote in a letter to Perry. The letter was also sent to Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, House Speaker Joe Straus and other legis-

lative leaders. Unlike other states, where money is tight and budgets are in trouble, Texas moved through its legislative session without major budget hurdles. At the start of the session it appeared Texas would face a difficult revenue year, but the state was helped

in large part by billions of dollars in federal economic stimulus money

The budget includes \$12.1 billion in stimulus

money

Most of the budget's money is dedicated to education and health care. The massive spending plan increases funding for pre-kindergarten programs, makes it possible for 35,0000 more eligible students to receive college tuition help from the TEXAS Grants financial aid program and gives correctional officers a 3.5 percent raise.

Perry has line-item veto power over the budget and has until June 21 to

review the 900-plus page document crafted by the Republican-controlled Legislature.

The budget leaves an estimated \$9 billion balance in the state's so-called Rainy Day Fund, a savings account that may be desperately needed when Texas legislators convene again for a regular session in 2011. Perry has praised lawmakers for leaving that money alone.

The two-year budget bill is SB1.

Shelter upgrade on a long list

Pampa has plans for a new animal shelter, but the completion or the extent of those plans will lie with the city's finances and the priorities the city commission puts on them.

The city has contracted with BGR Architects out of Lubbock for the project, City Manager Richard Morris said. They in turn are working with a design

studio, Animal Arts, out of Boulder, Colo., on a needs survey and site survey.

"They'll be looking at the amount of animals we handle," Morris said. They'll also be compar-

ing the city's facilities with what similar-sized cities offer in the way of animal shelters. Assistant City Manager Shane Stokes said the con-

tract with BGR Architects

is for 36 months.

Morris said the animal shelter needs to be replaced or at least repaired. "It's an old facility," he

acknowledged. But what will happen to it will depend on the bud-

geting process. "We'll be covering this in our budget discussions," Morris said, as the city develops its budget between now and the end of its fiscal year in

September.

It will be a capital improvement expenditure, he said, but he cautioned there are many other capital improvements that need to be made to the city's infrastructure.

It will be a matter of prioritizing the city's needs, he said.

Morris noted that when he came to Pampa in 1991. one of the first recommendations he made was repairing the rest rooms in

M.K. Brown Civic Center. That finally got done, he said, last month.

In the mean time, Stokes said the city has been patching the roof of the animal shelter and mending fences and gates.

'We're doing everything we can to make things better," Stokes said.

Morris said that with a new manager, the project should move forward a SHELTER cont. on page 3

Haenisch says finance bill will offer some relief to schools

Pampa's school superintendent said this session's School Finance Bill was not all it could have been, but it certainly benefited the state's school systems.

While this is not the long term fix for the financing of public education that many had hoped might occur during the session," Pampa Independent School District Supt. Barry Haenisch said, "the finance bill that was passed does provide some relief for schools.

The 140-day biennial session of the Texas Legislature ended last Monday night.

With the time crunch of a particularly contentious session's deadline, lawmakers and other

officials are still trying to figure out exactly what passed and what didn't. Some bills that got stalled in a procedural slowdown were tacked on to other bills as amendments, making it difficult to track everything, but one bill that was passed by both the House of Representatives and Senate in the pink granite Capitol Building in Austin was the School Finance

"We did put another \$1.9 billion for public schools to cover enrollment growth," said Rep. Warren Chisum of Pampa, "and for the first time since I've been down there, we started concentrating on more vocational education to help students that are not college

offer schools an opportunity to provide for some much needed improvements, such as buses and a richer curriculum, Haenisch said.

He said the additional funding for vocational education will benefit students in Pampa and statewide.


Chisum said there would be a big change in the state's educa-

tional system as the result of that. He said it's not a matter of saying one student will go to college and another one won't.

"But if they choose to go into vocation," Chisum said, "we made it more available to them."

He said he thinks that's a significant change.

He said retired teachers should also see some more money, although it's not clear yet how it will be delivered.

Either there will be a small 13th month check of \$500 for retired teachers and retired state employees, Duncan said, or the money will go into the state's contribution systems, depending upon a ruling by the Texas Attorney General as to whether the 13th month check would be constitutional or not.

"There were some good provisions in the finance bill," Haenisch said.



Seven injured in Randall county crash

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — At 91, retired Army intelligence officer Albert Rosenberg is still haunted by the list of airmen he found at the Buchenwald concentration camp in Germany near the end of World War

Now he is looking to the White House for help in what may be the last mission of his life.

In April 1945, Rosenberg was a lieutenant in a special unit that Gen. Dwight Eisenhower ordered to collect evidence at Buchenwald, which had recently been liberated by Allied

When Rosenberg learned that President Barack Obama would visit the site of the concentration camp, he remembered recovering a list of 323 airmen with the U.S. Army Air Forces and the British Royal Air Force men captured by the Nazis and held at Buchenwald.

With these fliers still on his mind, Rosenberg on May 21 sent a copy of the list to White House Chief of Staff Rahm Emanuel. He included a handwritten note of explanation and a copy of his military identification.

"What became of these fliers, we could not determine in 1945," Rosenberg wrote to Emanuel. "It can be assumed that many may have perished or moved in death transports to the interior of Nazi-held territory. Rosenberg was a commanding officer of Supreme Headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Force, an intelligence unit that reported to Eisenhower.

On April 11, 1945, U.S. forces

discovered the Buchenwald concentration camp, which had been abandoned by Nazi guards in the waning days of the war in Europe.

Soon after, Eisenhower dispatched Rosenberg to the camp to gather evidence and to take testimonies from 20,000 former prisoners who remained there. An estimated 250,000 people were thought to have been held captive at Buchenwald during its existence.

"Our orders were because of General Eisenhower's firsthand encounter with what those places looked like to investigate what really happened in that particular camp," Rosenberg said Thursday in an interview at his El Paso apartment. "The allied governments wanted to know what happened in those camps." Rosenberg and his unit took written testimonies from hundreds of concentration camp survivors. They found that prisoners from about a dozen countries some high-ranking government officials, others soldiers were dehydrated, starving and suffering from disease.

Though the Nazis bombed the concentration camp's administrative building as they abandoned Buchenwald, Rosenberg's unit was able to recover documents unintentionally left behind, he said.

"Among my papers that I have kept, I came across typewritten pages that were part of our original report, which lists the name, rank and serial numbers of American pilots who had been shot down during the war by the Nazis and who had been prisoners at the concentration camp," Rosenberg

said. "They no longer were at the camp. I have no idea what happened to them." Rosenberg said he hoped that Obama's visit to the old concentration camp would refocus some attention on the list he found.

The findings of the Supreme Headquarters, Allied Expeditionary Force unit were presented to the U.S. government in a report in 1945.

The report was quickly classified because many of the surviving prisoners were communist government officials from Italy and France. If publicized, the report could have stymied U.S. cooperation with those countries, Rosenberg said.

Rosenberg never learned whether the Buchenwald report was declas-

But he learned that the original copy of the report was kept at a National Archives depository in Virginia, in box 149, before a fire in the 1970s destroyed it.

All copies of the report were thought to have disappeared until Rosenberg resurfaced with his.

In 1995, the testimonies and evidence he collected were translated from German to English and published in a book, "The Buchenwald Report," by David Hackett.

"For decades people had been looking for that report," Rosenberg said. For Rosenberg, who taught at UTEP after his military career, Buchenwald represents a painful gap in his knowledge.

"... I do not know, have the families of those prisoners, American fliers, ever been identified? Did they survive? I don't know.'



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



New Lone Star Texas plates available soon

from Gaye Whitehead Gray County Tax Assesor/ Collector

Last year, Texas citizens said yes to a colorful new license plate to replace the current design introduced nine years ago.

The new plate, the Lone Star Texas, took the top spot last February among five designs that were posted online for public voting and viewing. It features the big Texas sky with wide brushes of blue and red, the familiar lone star and the mountains of west Texas.

But don't run out and purchase the new plate just yet. The Texas Department of Transportation is encouraging residents of Gray County to be good environmental stewards. Don't buy new plates until your old plates have expired. License plates are good for seven years. If you wait, you will get the new plates at no additional charge.

Texans loved the designs. TxDOT received e-mails from close to 10,000 citizens explaining why they voted for a particular design and thanking the agency for giving them the opportunity to choose. The citizens of this state spoke with 1.1 million e-votes, 455,878 of those cast for the Lone Star Texas.

This is also the first of the new seven character combinations. TxDOT has finally exhausted the Alpha-numeric license plate patterns for the current six character version. It's the perfect time to introduce a new plate design.

More importantly, the citizens spoke. The new plate will be coming soon to our county tax office and our designated locations for handling titles, registration and renewal. Go to www.txdot.gov for more information or call the Gay County office, 669-8018.
