### renovation nearing final stage

The Pampa Independent School District board of trustees set June 30 as the date for a public hearing to discuss and adopt the proposed 2009-2010 budget and tax rate.

Carol Fields, the district's business manager, told the school board at their meet-

ing Tuesday night that she had not yet received the appraisal information yet, but the budget has to be adopted by the end of June.

Construction, a lawsuit and a logo for the new Pampa Junior High School were also main topics of conversation at the school board Tuesday night.

The board of trustees heard progress reports on

the high school renovation and expansion project and construction of the new junior high. They also amended the contract with the construction company installing the new synthetic turf on the football field at

Harvester Stadium. Randy Stephenson, construction coordinator for the district, told the board that faulty tile on the second floor of the science area of Pampa High School was being replaced by the tile company at no cost to the district. He also said that everything had been moved into the new library and most of the equipment had been installed in the new kitchen.

Stephenson said minor work still remained to be done in the commons area, but the district already had plans to use the commons, which will seat almost 600 people, for training sessions beginning in August.

The most visible signs of construction at the high school this summer, he said, would be work in the parking lot on the north side of the school.

# City, PEDC to team up against trash

The city and the Pampa Economic Development Corporation are ironing out the details of a PEDC funded clean-up program for non-profits.

City of Pampa Public Works Director Donny Hooper told commissioners at the regular meeting Tuesday afternoon that one of the most consistent problems is the city's alleyways. PEDC board members and city staff are currently hammering out details for a Cash for Trash program exclusively for non-profits.

#### Debate on name of PJHS mascot favors unity

Eloquent pleas by a teacher and a coach from Pampa Junior High School and a change on the school board may lead to a change

in name, mascot and logo. The Pampa Independent School District Board of Trustees were to vote on the adoption of a logo for the new junior high being during their meeting Tuesday night, but Coach Jim Gill and Miranda Bailey, both from the junior high school, told the board that the majority of the teachers, staff, students and athletic department wanted the junior high teams to be the Harvesters.

Earlier this year, after months of debate, the school board had selected the name 'The Reapers'

"It's hard to beat one team," Gill said.

He cited several towns where school pride is centered on one team and one mascot, saying the students grow up in a tradition.

"They start when they're little bitty," Gill said.

He said the junior high students should be Harvesters in name as well

"Please let us be one town, one team," gill said. "Let us be Harvesters."

Bailey said Pampa Athletic Director Stuart Smith was on record as saying 100 percent of the athletic department was in favor of making the junior high mascot the same as



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#### Court: Appeal from Selena's killer in wrong court

HOUSTON (AP) — The convicted killer of Tejano music star Selena has lost an appeal in the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

Yolanda Saldivar had asked the court to order her appeal filed nine years ago to move forward, but the state's highest criminal appeals court says it was filed in the wrong county.

The court also said Wednesday that the order Saldivar sought from the court wasn't proper. Saldivar's murder case stemming from the 1995 fatal shooting of Selena in a Corpus Christi motel room was transferred to Harris

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — She dared a deputy constable to shock her with a Taser. So, he did.

Video released by a Travis County Constable's Office shows Deputy Chris Bieze confronting 72-year-old

Kathryn Winkfein after stopping her for speeding on May 11 just outside Austin. Video from a camera mounted in the deputy's car

shows Winkfein cursing and challenging the deputy and even daring him to use the Taser on her. "You're going to shove me? You're going to shove a

72-year-old woman?" she yelled. Precinct 3 Sgt. Maj. Gary Griffin said Bieze used the Taser only after Winkfein became combative.

options to decide whether a special session was necessary to continue the operation of the agencies. By Tuesday, he said, it was clear a that a special session would have to be called.

The Texas governor can call multiple special sessions lasting up to 30 days each. Perry can add any number of items to the agenda of a special session. He wouldn't say whether a contentious GOP-backed voter identification proposal - which would require Texans to show more ID before casting a ballot would be on the agenda.

"When I decide on the date, I'll let you all know what we're going to discuss, but it's a little bit premature," Perry said.

Fighting between Democrats and Republicans over the voter ID measure bogged down the regular session and, in the Texas House, caused the death of other legislation.

Perry answered reporters' questions as he began a meeting at the Capitol with business leaders about energy. At the start of the meeting, Perry criticized Washington politicians for proposals they are considering that he says would strangle Texas' energy industry.

Perry, whose denouncements of Washington have intensified the past few months, faces a tough Republican primary race for re-election in 2010 against U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison timing of a special session affects his ability to raise money for that expensive campaign.

He cannot collect camin Indianapolis, Indiana paign cash during a regular or special legislative session. He also must wait to hold fundraisers until after the June 21 conclusion of the veto period for the reg-

ular session. When the Texas Senate Ann Thrasher and Terri out approving legislation to keep the state agencies running, a Republican senator suggested the governor could keep the agenorder.

Perry said that was "blatantly bad information' given to the senators and that research his staff conducted determined it cannot be done.

and Perry Republican leaders pledged after the legislators' adjournment that insurance regulation, road building and other government functions would continue, despite the lawmakers' inaction.

The agencies in question would be shuttered by Sept. 1, 2010, without the legal authority to continue.

Shortly before adjourning, the Texas House passed a measure to postpone the agency sunset dates, but that legislation did not include \$2 billion in road-building bonds many lawmakers wanted.

Some senators were furious at the situation the House left them with, and the Republican-controlled Senate decided to adjourn without passing the agency operations bill. Republican senators who pushed for the adjournment, over the objections of Democrats, said it would be better to let Perry call lawmakers back into a special session so they could keep the agencies running and pass the road bonds.

After Perry's comments Tuesday, Democratic Sen. Rodney Ellis of Houston issued a letter he wrote to Perry asking that several criminal justice issues be placed on the special session agenda, such as eyewitness identification reform. He said mistaken eyewitness IDs are the leading cause of wrongful convictions.

Ellis also wants the Legislature to try again to pass a measure that could allow the governor to approve posthumous pardons, as in the case of the late Tim Cole, who died in prison while serving time for a rape he didn't commit. Perry said Tuesday that a work slowdown in the Legislature over the voter ID bill led to the death of the posthumous pardon proposal.





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
