Reapers will be PJHS mascot

The Pampa Independent School District board of trustees decided to stick with their decision to name the junior high school mascot 'The Reapers' and adopted a logo that had been submitted earlier this spring.

Lee Porter, school board member, told the board at their meeting Thursday evening that in the training he'd received from the Texas Association of School Boards, boards of education should follow two rules. They should never go back and change what a previous board had done and they should not commit future boards to actions taken in the present.

At their meeting earlier this month, the board discussed changing the mascot at the urging of the Pampa Junior High School staff and Pampa Athletic Department to 'The Harvesters,' the mascot of the high school.

"There are compelling arguments on each side of

Haenisch: Students had safe year

School Supt. Barry Haenisch said the 2008-2009 had been a very safe year for students in the Pampa Independent School District.

Still, Haenisch said it appears there will always be playground accidents.

In his report during Thursday night's school board meeting on accidents at the schools in the district, Haenisch said there were no accidents reported in August or September last year.

In October, paramedics were called to Travis for one student for illness and another student had been taken to a physician by a parent.

Also in October, a Wilson student fell in gym, hurting a leg and requiring medical attention.

In November, two students collided in gym class. One suffered a cut scalp. The other suffered a bruised chin. Both were sent to see a physician.

A high school student suffered a seizure in November and paramedics took the student to Pampa Regional Medical Center.

Billionaire to appear in court

DALLAS (AP) — Texas billionaire R. Allen Stanford, chairman of the troubled Stanford Financial Group, is set to appear in federal court Friday on fraud charges after surrendering to FBI agents in Virginia the day before, officials said.

Authorities plan to unseal an indictment charging Stanford, law enforcement officials said, speaking on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss the case. Stanford surrendered in Stafford, Va., on Thursday and is to appear in federal court in the state capital, Richmond, the officials said.

Stanford's initial hearing was set for 1:30 p.m. Richmond court authorities said they did not know if Stanford was being held by marshals inside the courthouse or elsewhere ahead of the hearing. The court clerk's office said the initial hearing will also deal

with detention issues.

A grand jury in Houston has been investigating Stanford Financial Group. The Securities and Exchange Commission filed civil charges earlier this year accusing Stanford and his top executives of conducting an \$8 billion fraud by advising clients to buy certificates of deposit from the Antigua-based Stanford International Bank.

The SEC's lawsuit charged that the bank advertised its CDs in a brochure touting a conservative investment philosophy. But instead the bank's portfolio was "misappropriated by Defendant Allen Stanford and used by him to acquire private equities investments and real estate," the suit says.

An amended complaint by the SEC has accused Stanford and his finance chief, James M. Davis,

3 dead in Corpus Christi explosion

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Three people died Thursday when an explosion blew apart a home in Corpus Christi.

Police Capt. John Houston said the bodies of a 45-year-old woman, her 14-year-old daughter and the woman's 52-year-old boyfriend were found in the rubble. Another adult and a teen who had access to the home were accounted for late Thursday.

Houston said the investigation continued into the cause of the explosion but they were "leaning" toward it being an accident.

He said family members said the

residents "were doing some remodeling and were complaining of gas leaks." He said propane tanks at the residence also were being looked at.

Houston said debris was found about two blocks away. He said the explosion "pretty much leveled the whole place" and shattered windows in other homes nearby.

Witnesses told police that the explosion blew the roof 30 to 35 feet above the tree line.

A portion of the roof sat on the top of a truck in the driveway. The walls were blown out and items from the home ended up across the street.

Surf Boards said the blast shook the whole shop.

"My husband and I ran into the street. It was raining debris," she said in the Corpus Christi Caller-Times. "My first instinct was that a plane went down. Debris was raining down like it was 9-11. I have house insulation in my parking lot."

Houston said samples would be taken from the house Friday to test for anything incendiary.

The bodies of the victims were sent to the medical examiner's office for identification. Houston said dental records would be needed to make positive identifications.

Houston judge indicted for keying car

HOUSTON (AP) — A state district judge from Houston was indicted Thursday on a vandalism charge after a surveillance videotape supposedly showed him scratching his next-door neighbor's car with a key.

Woody Ray Densen was indicted on a state jail felony charge of criminal mischief after a grand jury listened to testimony earlier in the day and also watched the surveillance footage.

He faces up to two years in state jail if convicted.

The surveillance video, taken by the judge's neighbor Adam Kliebert, shows Densen in May walking his dog past Kliebert's Range Rover. On the video, Densen can be seen moving his left hand close to the vehicle as he walked by.

Another video shows Densen walking by the car at a different time, moving his right hand closer to the vehicle as he went past it.

Densen's attorney, Robert Pelton, said the judge is innocent and

passed a lie detector test. He also said none of the video footage directly shows his client marking up the car.

"It doesn't prove he

committed a criminal act and that's why we are so disappointed with all of this," Pelton said.

THP trooper seizes drugs during traffic stop

Carson County — A Highway Patrol Trooper working on I-40 in Carson County on June 16 observed a vehicle traveling east, speeding above the posted limit of 70 mph. The Trooper conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle and identified the driver as Shalonda Rynnette McNeal of Lynwood, California. A passenger in the vehicle was identified as Crystal Antoinette Shoaf of Compton, California. The pair was traveling from Los Angeles, California to Memphis, Tennessee. During the traffic stop the

Trooper could smell the odor of burnt marijuana coming from the interior of the vehicle. The Trooper then conducted a probable cause search of the vehicle. During the search 9,460 grams of codeine, 3,052 grams of hydrocodone, 1,857 grams of xanax, and 37 grams of marijuana were located in the trunk and under the passenger seat of the vehicle. Both occupants were placed under arrest for possession of a controlled substance and booked into the Carson County jail.

this issue," said Derrell DeLoach, school board president.

In the end, they elected to let their decision to keep 'The Reapers' as the mascot, and on a 4-2 vote, they selected a logo showing a man with a scythe against the outline of the state.

Board members, Joe Martinez, Lance DeFever, Dana Terry and Porter voted in favor of the new logo. DeLoach and David Teichmann voted against the logo. Board member Mark McVay was absent Thursday night.

The school board also discussed the concrete fence bordering the front of Pampa High School along Harvester.

While there has been a great deal of interest in preserving the fence from alumni groups, the school board expressed concerns over the safety of the 70-year-old fence.

School officials noted that nine cross bars of the fence had been identified as dangerous.

"Safety is number one," said Martinez, school board member.

DeLoach and Porter, school board member, echoed Martinez' opinion.

Carol Fields, PISD business manager, said the estimate the district had received to repair the fence and return it to pristine condition was \$100,341.

"I don't think the district can afford that," said DeLoach.

By comparison, Fields said the estimate to demolish the fence built by the Works Progress Administration, WPA, about 1940, was \$5,400.

Dana Terry, school board member, expressed concern about people driving across the lawn at the high school if there was no fence there.

Sena Brainard, a concerned citizen, told the board that contractors had told her there was new technology that could be used to repair the fence.

The school board elected not to take any action on the fence, delaying it until the high school renovations were complete or at least further along, with hopes that a civic group would express an interest in restoring the fence.

In other action, the school board named Teichmann a delegate to the annual Texas Association of School Boards convention Oct. 3 and 4 in Houston.

The approved the adoption of policy updates as recommended by the Texas

Association of School Boards with the exception of a transportation policy concerning special education students. They decided to amend that policy proposal and consider it next month.

The board also decided to hold one school board meeting a month. During the construction process of the high school renovations and building the new junior high school, the board had elected to hold two meetings a month. The first meeting each month was intended to deal only with construction issues. The consensus of the board now is that the district is far enough along in the construction to return to one meeting a month.

The monthly will be on the third Thursday of each month.

The school board also decided to allow students who had a 96 percent attendance record, had made all their remedial TAKS test session, had no disciplinary issues on their record and had passed all their regular class work to participate in graduation ceremonies.

The board also approved a proposal to mark the blank side of the Pampa Junior High School cornerstone, which will be

laid by the local Masonic Lodge, as a memorial to the Campbell family, who donated the land for the school.

The school board approved a bid of \$1,790 for weight room supplies and equipment and renew

"Each client has their own goals of what they would like to accomplish," she explained, "and we work toward that with them through training and practice."


"Normally we have 20-25 people a day, although we have 37 signed up and we have transportation available for them," she said.





Establishing minimum standards for the safety of financial products

Given the urgency and severity of the financial crisis, it is not surprising that most policymakers have to date been focused on here-and-now tactical initiatives to stabilize the financial system, rather than laying the foundation for a more sound and better regulated system in the future.

There are exceptions; Senator Durbin's proposal for a Financial Product Safety Commission is one of them. The proposed Commission would establish minimum standards for the safety of financial products, and would focus especially on identifying deceptive and fraudulent practices. The institution's mandate would be analogous to the Consumer Product Safety Commission. As the proposal's sponsors argued to the Treasury Secretary in a recent letter, "there is no reason for us to have regulations that prevent toasters from exploding into flames, but no protections to prevent mortgages and credit cards from doing the same."

Opponents, thus far, have mustered what seems a half-hearted and formulaic argument against the proposal: introducing a new bureaucracy as the ultimate arbiter of prod-

uct safety would effectively iron out differences in product structures and pricing, and dampen innovation.

The opposite is true. We have minimum standards on practically every consumer product -- from automobiles to the aforementioned toasters -- but innovation appears to proceed apace. You would be surprised what toasters can do these days!

Minimum product standards, then, don't necessarily crowd out innovation. Instead, the difficulty for principled innovators in consumer financial services has been engineering new, improved product structures that can economically match the value captured through questionable, customer-unfriendly practices engaged in by competitors. Take the prime credit card business, for example. It is difficult to compete with large incumbents willing and able to use zero percent teaser rates, coupled with hair-trigger universal default repricing. The economic value of that customer-unfriendly practice was a killer advantage which stifled the need or potential for innovation.

A more persuasive objection to the proposed Commission is that it would add to the existing

thicket of state and federal financial regulators, rather than replacing them. By doing so it would create further administrative hoop-jumping and destructive friction on innovation.

In reality, the industry suffers from too many regulators not from too much regulation. The proposed Commission should preempt them -- or, at least, it should preempt other federal authorities on these issues. The result would be more clarity, less arbitrage, and fewer burdens.

The proposal could be improved with an expansion of its mission from merely setting minimum standards. It is certainly true that deceptive sales practices are a major problem in consumer financial services, but they aren't the main problem.

The main problem is that consumers -- who, as it turns out, are human beings -- are, in general, incapable of adequately weighing abstract financial risks and rewards. Perhaps the most telling example is banks' "free checking" offerings, which aren't free at all, because they tend to generate significant fees through non-sufficient funds ("NSF") penalties on overdrafts. Consumers are aware of NSF fees; they just systematically underestimate how often they

will incur them.

This is where the proposed Commission could help. Let me suggest an analogy. Restaurants in Los Angeles County are required to post a large placard in their front windows, showing an "A", "B", or "C". Those letter grades correspond to an establishment's scoring in routine health department inspections. The Los Angeles approach made more transparent the hygienic disparity between restaurants. That is, it helps consumers understand that while many restaurants meet minimum standards, they are not all equally safe.

Using this approach with financial products would allow the Commission to encourage and reward especially consumer-friendly product structures, while not ironing out innovative product wrinkles. This is the outcome that we should all desire.

Doctors' boos show Obama's tough road

WASHINGTON (AP) — Barack Obama isn't used to hearing boos.

For all the young president's popularity, the response he got Monday from doctors at an American Medical Association meeting was a sign his road is only going to get rockier as he tries to sell his plan to overhaul the nation's health care system.

The boos erupted when Obama told the doctors in Chicago he wouldn't try to help them win their top legislative priority — limits on jury damages in medical malpractice cases.

But what could they expect? If Obama announced support for malpractice limits, that would set trial lawyers and unions — major supporters of Democratic candidates — on the attack. Not to mention consumer groups.

Every other group in the health care debate has a wish list and a top priority. Insurers don't want competition from the government. Employers don't want to be told they have to offer medical coverage to their workers. Hospitals want to stave off Medicare cuts. Drug companies want to charge what the market

will bear.

Obama can't give all of them what they want. Instead, he's got to figure what's just enough to keep as many groups as possible on board — without alienating others. It's a fine line for him — and sometimes for them.

The doctors were only Obama's first house call. He'll be making his case to the other groups — and to the nation at large — in an increasingly energetic campaign to get a bill passed by the end of his first year in office.

AMA insiders shouldn't have been surprised by Obama's upfront refusal to consider malpractice caps.

The group couldn't get that idea passed by a Republican Congress and president a few years ago.

Instead, Obama left the door open to some kind of compromise on malpractice.

The president said he's willing to explore alternatives to taking doctors to court. In the past, he supported special programs in which hospitals and doctors are encouraged to admit mistakes, correct them and offer compensation. Studies have shown the approach can work,

because doctors' refusal to acknowledge mistakes is one reason many families file suit.

Doctors have special reasons to be wary of the president's plans to overhaul the health care system.

Not long ago, doctors' decisions were rarely questioned. Now they are being blamed for a big part of the wasteful spending in the nation's \$2.5 trillion health care system. Studies have shown that as much as 30 cents of the U.S. health care dollar may be going for tests and procedures that are of little or no value to patients.

The Obama administration has cited such findings as evidence that the system is broken. Since doctors are the ones responsible for ordering tests and procedures, health care costs cannot be brought under control unless they change their decision-making habits.

"Change is scary," said Dartmouth University's Dr. Elliott Fisher, a doctor turned costs researcher. "I think there is a fear of loss of autonomy, that someone is going to tell you what to do."

But Obama did not

blame the doctors. Instead, he tried to woo them, much as he has done with recalcitrant foreign leaders.

"It's the equivalent of international diplomacy. He's got to make them feel like it's possible to have dialogue about what the future looks like," said Blendon.

Obama assured the doctors that his plan would provide them with objective information on what treatments work best, with new computerized tools to better manage their patient case loads, and with support for harried solo practitioners to form networks.

He promised that Washington would not dictate clinical decisions. And he asked the doctors to imagine a world in which nearly every patient has insurance coverage and they can devote their full attention to the practice of medicine.

"You did not enter this profession to be bean-counters and paper-pushers," Obama said. "You entered this profession to be healers — and that's what our health care system should let you be."

That line got him an ovation.

Perhaps one way to wash away, diminish and erase the bad is to restore, rejuvenate and reflect on the good.

As I recall a few cherished moments with my dad, some Bible verses also come to mind, reminding me of a Father that is always caring for and loving both me and my dad throughout eternity.

I loved watching television with my dad -- albeit a black and white one in those days. One of my greatest afternoon delights was when my dad came home from work and invited me to watch his favorite talk show with him. I can't say how many times I watched TV with him, but apparently it was meaningful for me to snuggle with him on the sofa. I remember feeling wanted and loved in his warm embrace.

"Blessed be the Lord thy God, which delighted in thee..." (II Chronicles 9:8)

One of my early childhood dreams was to be a professional singer and musician -- not that I had any special talent for either. I remember very well the day my parents bought me a baritone ukulele like my 4th grade teacher's. My dad set up a music stand in my room that displayed a chord instruction book. After a few suggestions from him, he left me alone to self-teach. I remember feeling self-assured and encouraged by his confidence in me.

"Fear not, little flock; for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom." (Luke 12:32)

It's probably a true statement to say we all want, like and need to be needed. One of my fondest memories with my dad is when he asked me to help him mix up concrete. He was making a decorative brick wall around our back patio at our new house. My job was to scoop the cups of concrete mix. Indeed, perhaps my most indelible memory of all is holding my dad's hand. I'm looking at a photo right now that is on the bookcase in front of my desk. I'm in my Easter dress and bonnet standing beside my dad holding his hand. So yes, oh yes -- in the words of Holly Dunn -- "I'll always remember the love in (my) Daddy's hands."

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
