





Although he was mostly serious, he could be funny and play practical jokes, so he was well-liked, she said. He was known for helping others and even started a school program to help welcome new students, she said

Schieffer admired President John F. Kennedy and seemed to emulate his speaking style, she said.

"He was interested in running for office when nobody else was in those days," said Miller, now a Houston attorney. "He would start talking and he would hold a crowd. I was surprised that someone our age could talk in such a serious way."

Schieffer served three terms as a Democratic state representative, first elected at age 25 in 1972.

Schieffer, an attorney, later became a business partner with George W. Bush and they bought the Texas Rangers baseball team. He was the club's longtime president and succeeded Bush as general partner after Bush became governor in 1995.

After Bush was elected to the White House, he appointed Schieffer as U.S. ambassador to Australia in 2001 and to Japan in 2005. Although Schieffer is

a Democrat, his past ties to Bush are not necessarily a bad thing, said Jerry Polinard, a political science professor at the University of Texas-Pan American in Edinburg.

"You've got to have a candidate to attract independent voters and siphon off Republican voters ... while holding onto the more liberal wing, which is a question mark, but nonetheless they may hold their noses and vote for Schieffer," Polinard said. "If he has Perry as an opponent, he can isolate him as a far right-wing candidate. And it's not like he'd be running against a person who's enjoyed overwhelming support.'


Still, any Democratic gubernatorial candidate faces an uphill battle in Texas, where no Democrat has won statewide office since 1994, Polinard said.

As a moderate and conservative Democrat, Schieffer could benefit if the GOP emerges fractured and bitter from its primary, Polinard said.

Schieffer, who has said he had no regrets about supporting Bush, said he's a lifelong Democrat but can rise above partisanship.

Analysis: Obama scores major victory on climate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Facing a rare defeat, President Barack Obama put a big dose of political capital on the line and scored a major victory just when he needed one.

In private telephone conversations and last-minute public appeals, Obama leaned heavily on House Democratic holdouts to support the first energy legislation ever designed to curb global warming. The measure ended up passing in dramatic fashion. In the end, the president's furious lobbying coupled with a final push by allies including former Vice President Al Gore carried much weight. To a certain extent, the victory validated Obama's governing style — and that could bode well for his other top domestic priority, health care. He faces an even more difficult test in shepherding the energy and climate legislation through the Senate.

in Obama's first year in office; health care tops the list.

As Congress tackles that contentious issue, Obama's left flank is beating up him and his allies over the effort to overhaul the costly and complex U.S. medical system. Moderate Democrats are looking to forge compromises to pass a measure; liberal critics are dug in over elements they want to see in any legislation. Liberal groups are running ads against senators who won't publicly support a government program to compete against private insurers. Democrats have a comfortable House majority. But the climate legislation pitted Democrats who represent East Coast states that have been cleaning up their act against Democrats in the Midwest and other places that rely heavily on coal and industry. They have a longer, more expensive path to meet requirements in the measure. Senate passage is far

"Now my call to every senator, as well as to every American, is this: We cannot be afraid of the future. And we must not be prisoners of the past," Obama said in his weekend Internet and radio address. He scrapped his talk on his original topic, health care, and recorded the climate bill speech shortly after the Democratic-controlled House backed the measure on a 219-212 vote late Friday.

It was a win Obama certainly needed. Congress was getting ready for a weeklong holiday break and already health care was hanging in the balance. While his popularity remains strong, Obama's overall ratings have slipped a bit. This restive nation also is wary of some of his proposals, including deficit spending as Obama pumps an enormous amount of money into the economy and elsewhere.

The narrow House vote suggests potential trouble ahead with the Democratic rank-and-file as the White House seeks to tackle more big-ticket issues from certain, given that Democrats lack the 60 votes needed to cut off a likely filibuster.

Obama's personal touch — and another dose of his pclitical capital — will be required again.

White House senior adviser David Axelrod said Sunday on ABC's "This Week" that he didn't expect Senate action until the fall. "We're trying to solve a problem that has languished for a decade," he said.

"I hope it won't pass the Senate," Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell said on "Fox News Sunday," claiming the measure would lead to "significant increases in electricity across

America."

Obama acknowledged Sunday that he had reservations about a provision that would penalize trade partners that don't work to curb pollution. Still, he called the bill "an extraordinary first step."

He temporarily may have put to rest concerns — expressed publicly by Republicans and privately by Democrats — that he's trying to do too much: so many policy changes in the midst of a recession and wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Obama has had a string of early successes, the \$787 billion economic stimulus among them.

The climate bill victory was different. It was grander. It had international consequences. It perhaps meant more to Obama than the others.

After ignoring global warming for decades, most leading nations now

r the short shrift.

Remaking the energy industry and curbing global warming have been hallmarks of Obama's platform since he began his presidential campaign in 2007, if not before that.

Sensing the legislation was in trouble early last week, the White House stepped up its involvement. First, Obama pressed the

House to act during a news conference.

Then, the White House held a hastily arranged Rose Garden event Thursday that raised the stakes. Obama pleaded for votes, acknowledged the changed world view on the subject and stressed the opportunity at hand for the United States.

"The nation that leads in the creation of a clean energy economy will be the nation that leads the 21st century global economy. Now is the time for the United States of America to realize this as well. And now is the time for us to lead," he said.

A day later, after a flurry of phone calls from Obama to recalcitrant Democrats, the House spoke — and said it agreed.

NFL players put the heavy in metal

JDALLAS (AP) — Marc Colombo lowers his bald head and leans his sweaty, 6-foot-8, 318-pound frame toward the microphone, growling to the crowd that the next song will "rip your face off."

The sometimes scary stage presence of the heavily tattooed guitarist and singer, who is one of three Dallas Cowboys offensive linemen in the heavy metal band Free Reign, is a thing of beauty for the head of the recording company that just signed them.

"They're big guys — big, ugly, mean guys," said John Howarth, owner and CEO of the Australian company Riot Entertainment. "You see the press photos and they look intimidating, and that's the market we want to push into."

The rest of the lineup is bass player Leonard Davis (6-6, 353 pounds), drummer Cory Procter (6-4, 308) and guitarist Justin Chapman (who looks tiny compared to his NFL bandmates but is about 6 feet tall and 235 pounds). In a rock 'n' roll genre where bands snarl and act intimidating while playing thunderously loud guitars, this 1,200-pound band is built for face-ripping.

During their concert at the House of Blues on Saturday — their second major show and the last one before they turn their full attention to football the band looked more like seasoned metal-heads than jocks toying with a new hobby.

Colombo shouted to the crowd and moved around with lead-singer swagger, rocking his head violently and throwing out the heavy metal salute (fist with pinky and forefinger extended which former University of Texas alum Davis probably also intends as the "hook 'em horns" sign). Colombo looked perhaps his most heavy metal-ish when bending over, grabbing the microphone with two hands and delivering guttural screams.

"I get up on stage and no nerves or anything," he said. "It's just fun." Davis didn't move around much, mostly nodding his bald head and looking menacing. Procter didn't look much more gigantic than most drummers because his drum kit is pretty much offensivelineman sized.

Killswitch Engage, but that its sound is unique. "We're heavy. We can lighten it up a bit. We scream a lot," Colombo said.

Free Reign started with a locker-room conversation between Colombo and Procter last season. Colombo, who played in Chicago bands when he was with the Bears, knew Procter played drums and asked him to jam. They liked what they heard and before long recruited Davis and Chapman, who grew up together in the town of Wortham about 80 miles south of Dallas. Chapman, a longtime local musician, is both lead guitarist and heavy metal coach.

As for the name, Procter says it developed out of a lengthy "Spinal Tap"caliber discussion with Colombo.

"We're always talking about taking over the world and world domination and face-ripping metal and good music and stuff," Procter said. "We were kind of like, we need something to show we're dominating and have free reign over the land. And we just kind of looked at each other and were like, Free Reign."

They're dominating the Cowboys and their fans. About two dozen teammates, including quarterback Tony Romo, showed up for their first big gig. Fans at their shows look more like game-day fans than typical metal customers, with Cowboys hats and jerseys far outnumbering black T-shirts and skull designs.

Cowboys fans fretting that this rock 'n' roll fantasy will detract from the line's job needn't worry, the band says. (Plenty of Cowboys fans — who have blamed the Jessica Simpson distraction for Romo's past on-field failures — posted angry messages about possible inattention when the record deal was announced Tuesday.) "It's 100 percent football

when the season starts," Colombo said. "A lot of these athletes go play golf in the off-season. We play heavy metal music." Next up is the scheduled October release of their five-song EP and touring after the season. Howarth says he's excited for metal fans to get ahold of the EP and see that there's some quality music behind the NFL names.

going to get a lot of pub, but I just heard something in the music that tapped into what the kids are into today," he said.


It all may sound like Free Reign is well on its way to major rock stardom, but the band knows it's still in the heavy metal minor leagues.

While the House of Blues gig was the biggest yet, there were a lot of empty seats in the 1,600-seat venue. The opening act was a handful of groups appearing as part of the Next American Star Regional Finals Tour — basically a talent show. Free Reign members waited out those acts in a tiny green room that smelled a lot like old cold cuts. Once the show was over, they had to load their own gear into their own trucks.

While they hope to one day have roadies, for now they say they'll focus on improving as a band — and enjoying the ride.

"I never really imagined this," Davis said. "I'm kind of amazed."



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

Decision on bond for Stanford to be reviewed

Associated Press Writer HOUSTON (AP) Texas financier R. Allen Stanford, indicted on charges alleging he swindled investors out of \$7 billion, could find out Monday if he will be freed on a \$500,000 bond or stay locked up until his trial.

U.S. District Judge David Hittner was set to hold a hearing to listen to arguments from federal prosecutors that Stanford, who holds Antiguan citizenship and may have access to hidden vast wealth, is a flight risk.

But Dick DeGuerin, Stanford's attorney, says his client is broke, has never tried to flee and wants to fight the charges against him.

The once high-flying financier and three executives of Houston-based Stanford Financial Group were accused June 18 of orchestrating a massive fraud by misusing most of the \$7 billion they advised clients to invest in certificates of deposit from the Stanford International Bank in the Caribbean island of Antigua.

U.S. Magistrate Judge Frances Stacy granted Stanford's bond last week and also ordered GPS monitoring and home detention. Caribbean island processes

But Hittner, who is presiding over Stanford's case, granted a prosecution request to delay Stacy's order until he can review the decision and rule on whether Stanford's bond should be revoked.

Court records show the \$100,000 in cash that needed to be given for Stanford's bond had been paid.

The money for the bond came from his family and friends. Stanford was once considered one of the richest men in America with an estimated net worth of more than \$2 billion. But DeGuerin said his client is now broke as authorities have seized all his assets, including his underwear and socks.

Last week Stanford and executives Laura Pendergest-Holt, Gilberto Lopez and Mark Kuhrt pleaded not guilty to charges filed in a 21-count indictment.

Jury selection in the trial of Stanford and the others was set for Aug. 25 but will likely be delayed.

Also indicted is Leroy King, the former chief executive officer of Antigua's Services Financial Regulatory Commission. King is free on bond but under house arrest as the

a request for his extradition to the United States.

King is accused of accepting more than \$100,000 in bribes to turn a blind eye to irregularities.

Stanford and his codefendants are charged with wire fraud, mail fraud, conspiracy to commit mail, wire and securities fraud and conspiracy to commit money laundering.

Stanford, Pendergest-Holt and King are also charged with conspiring to obstruct a Securities and Exchange Commission investigation and obstruction of an SEC investigation.

Investigators say even as Stanford claimed healthy returns for investors, he was secretly diverting more than \$1.6 billion in personal loans to himself.

The indictment also says Stanford and the other executives misrepresented the Antigua island bank's financial condition, its investment strategy and how it was regulated.

The SEC filed a lawsuit in February accusing Stanford and his top executives of committing crimes similar to those in the indictment.

Police disputed the accusation of excessive force and said the department would thoroughly inves-


