

LA firefighters sent to help Texas

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Crews trained to fight wildfires from around Louisiana are heading to east Texas to help the Texas Forest Service with wildfires. Agriculture and Forestry Commissioner Mike Strain says the five 13-person crews were to leave Wednesday with their equipment — including bulldozers for digging firelines to contain the fires.
The crews will stay in Texas for two weeks. If the fire activity remains high in Texas, then the firefighters will be replaced with fresh crews.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas lawmakers have convened the special legislative session in Austin. The Texas House gavelled in just after 10 a.m. Wednesday to kick things off. The plan for this session is to wrap things up quickly, the governor says.

Agent shoots fleeing immigrant

McALLEN, Texas (AP) — A Border Patrol agent shot a suspected illegal immigrant after an altercation in a Kingsville convenience store Wednesday. It was not immediately clear whether the man was armed. The agent, who was not identified, chased the man into the Kwik Pantry convenience store after he and other people ran from a vehicle the Border Patrol was pursuing around 8 a.m., said Border Patrol spokesman John Lopez. The agent has more than five years' experience with the agency, Lopez said. Inside the store, the immigrant fought the agent's attempts to detain him and the agent "found it necessary to shoot to stop the altercation," Lopez said. The agent was unharmed. The immigrant was flown by helicopter to Christus Spohn Corpus Christi-Memorial hospital, said Kingsville Fire Department Lt. Michael Luna. The man had been shot in the abdomen and was stable when he left the ground, Luna said. The agent remains on duty and the FBI will handle the investigation, Lopez said.

'The Straight Shooter' Joe Bowman dies

HOUSTON (AP) — Marksman Joe Bowman, known as Houston's world-famous "The Straight Shooter," has died. He was 84. Bowman died Monday in his sleep at a hotel during a trip back to Houston from a series of exhibitions and was in good health overall, his wife Betty Reid-Bowman told the Houston Chronicle. Joe Bowman was a Tennessee-born bootmaker turned shooting expert who once made a pair of boots for Roy Rogers. In his Wild West exhibitions, Bowman could hit an aspirin tossed in the air and a playing card's edge from 50 paces. He served as a consultant to actor Robert Duvall for his role as Gus in "Lonesome Dove." Besides his wife, he is survived by son, Mark M. Bowman II, and daughter, Jan Bowman, of Dallas.

Gene Haufler, as well as Denny, Lenny and Mark Minton, the band's drummer.

If you were a rock and roll loving teenager in Texas — particularly in the Dallas area — in the late 1950s, early 1960s, you probably were a fan of The Nightcaps.

Their familiar singles, "Wine, wine, wine" and "Thunderbird" hit home with fun-loving kids like Dennis "Denny" Mills and his younger brother, Lenny.

They joined the band in 1962 and 1968 respectively. The band was formed in 1958, and has had various incarnations with different members. Next to Shine and Haufler, the Mills brothers have remained members the longest.

Denny and Lenny cut their musical teeth playing in one of the first rock and roll bands in Pampa, The Townsmen.

Both local men have moved away from Pampa, but Denny passes through often and stops to visit with his friend, Preston Pairsh.

"Every time he comes through — because we are old friends — he stays a few days," said Pairsh, who has a welding shop a few miles south of Pampa. A few weeks ago, Pairsh repaired a motorcycle trailer for Mills during one of his stops.

"Preston and I have known each other since Junior High," Mills said.

"We started playing football together," Pairsh added. "We were in the same class."

At that time, Mill's dad owned Hogue Mills Equipment Company, the local International Harvester dealer.

"We played football as freshmen the first year that Robert E. Lee Junior High opened," Preston recalled, opening a 1960 copy of The Rebel, the school yearbook.

"I had hair back then," he added, nodding toward Denny. "You did, too."

Mills also had a passion for the guitar and girls, and found an outlet for both in The Townsmen. He played lead guitar.

"We used to play the Catholic Parish Hall and the Episcopal Hall," he said. "We would rent it, our parents would collect the money and we'd go play rock and roll. Everybody would come and dance."

Then Lenny brought home a copy of The Nightcaps album and pretty soon, "Wine, Wine, Wine" was on The Townsmen's playlist.

"Maybe they didn't recognize it," Mills laughed. "We weren't really that great."

The band rounded out their play list with "Chuck Berry and stuff like that."

Their local notoriety was short-lived when Denny ran afoul of the school administration, a situation which the 64 year old musician remembers with a smile on his face: "I kind of got into some problems with the school, because I kind of forgot to go to class for something like six weeks. I happened to know the girl, the monitor who took the absentee slips up to the office every day and the slips just

never got there.

"By the time they found out Anyway, so my parents shipped me off to Dallas and I finished at Thomas Jefferson High School."

In Dallas, he began "jobbing around with different bands."

"When I moved to Dallas, I was a lead guitar player," he said. "It seemed like everybody in Dallas played lead guitar, but there weren't any bass players. This kid, who was the younger brother of a really good musician, had a bass he let me use. He played lead, because he was better than I was and he knew bluesy stuff better than I did."

"I started playing bass with them and I discovered everybody needed a bass player, so my parents bought me one."

"I worked my way through college. I was making anywhere from \$100 to \$250 a week in college back in the 1960s playing weekends. So I did really well and I was always in demand, and that is how it started."

Mills graduated from the University of Texas at Arlington with a Bachelor of Science in Biology and a Minor in Chemistry and Math. He was a pre-dental major, but a rock and roller at heart.

The Nightcaps have been called one of the great overlooked bands of that era, simply because they never achieved the national following of other contemporaries.

However, they also have been given credit for influencing such great artists as Jimmie Vaughan and his younger brother, Stevie Ray Vaughan, and ZZ Top, who recorded the song Thunderbird on their "Fandango" album. (ZZ Top now owns the rights to the song, because The Nightcaps never got around to copyrighting it.)

"At the time we were covered up with work," Mills said, "every weekend."

Although band members have come and gone, the band has stayed relatively active through five decades.

"Playing is still therapy," Mills explained. "When you start playing, you relax and nothing else matters. It is for all of us guys."

Denny and his family live in Dallas. He spends a lot of time in Cuchara, Colorado, where he owned a hotel for 19 years.

"Cuchara is the middle of the San Isabel National Forest and is beautiful," he said. "The floor of our valley is 8,650 feet in altitude and it has big peaks on both sides. It is a little western-like town with boardwalk streets."

He also plays in another band, Pauncho and Lef-T, along with Larry Lincycomb of Clarendon (Lef-T) and Dave Rogers of Amarillo (Pauncho).

"Most of the time they come up to Cuchara (approximately 350 miles from Pampa) and we play the bars up there,"

said Mills. "They are really good. We do a lot of western stuff and a lot of really good music I didn't get a chance to play with the Dallas people."

Mills spends his summers in Colorado and lives in Dallas the rest of the year.

"I do carpentry work to pay the bills and keep me busy and when they book a job I go back to Dallas to play a few days and see the wife and pet the dog, because I can't stand Dallas in the summertime anymore," he said. "I get back to Pampa at least twice a year."

And when he passes through, he stops to see Preston.

"I go up to his cabin sometimes and we work together," Pairsh said. "Shoot, we've built and remodeled things. He has helped me with some stuff and I've helped him with some stuff."

One of the ironies of his music career

is that the The Nightcaps never played in Pampa.

"The closest we ever played was in Dumas," he noted. "We played a high school graduation dance — it must have been 1964 or '65 — at the gym."

Still, few Texas musicians can say the Governor is a fan.

"Rick Perry is a fan. Most of the Texas guys who were around in the late '50s and early '60s knew our music," Denny said. "They told us at the (Senate) recognition ceremony that some of the Senators were in the back chamber singing our songs before we arrived."

He added with a smile: "You could make some yerses to songs that you could sing at jobs, but you couldn't record. We had a great time."

A&M faculty votes 'no confidence' in chancellor Session

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — The Texas A&M University faculty slapped system Chancellor Mike McKinney with a "no confidence" vote just weeks after the resignation of the university president and a suggestion that McKinney's job might be combined with the university president's to save money.

The Faculty Senate passed a resolution Tuesday saying they had "no confidence" in McKinney's leadership.

"This is not to say that the chancellor is a bad person," Michael Benedik, a senator and biology professor, said in Wednesday's Bryan-College Station Eagle. "Take the words literally. Do we have confidence in him as a leader? ... I, for one, do not."

Rod Davis, a spokesman for the system leadership, declined to comment.

Although the faculty has tangled with McKinney before, the vote came after University President Elsa Murano, the first female and first Hispanic in the school's history, resigned in the face of a dismal performance review by McKinney. She had been on the job just 17 months.

McKinney had previously said the regents were considering combining his job with the university president's job to save money — a suggestion that angered many faculty members. He has since said he has no desire to oversee the day-to-day operations at the A&M System's flagship school.

The regents have appointed Bowen Loftin, the chief executive of A&M's campus in Galveston, as interim president of the university. Bob Stawser, one of the faculty members who opposed the no-confidence vote, said the Board of Regents and McKinney sought input from the faculty in recent weeks, and the resolution was not in the best interest of the university.

"What we need to do is end all this and move forward in a positive manner, working with the regents to make Texas A&M the place we want it to be," he said.

Space shuttle fueling test looks successful

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A fueling test on space shuttle Endeavour uncovered no worrisome hydrogen gas leaks Wednesday and paved the way for a launch in a week-and-a-half for the delayed mission, NASA said.

Early Wednesday morning, launch controllers filled the external fuel tank again to see if repairs plugged the leak. No abnormal leaks were detected during the three-hour test, and preliminary results indicated the repairs were successful, NASA spokeswoman Candrea Thomas said.

Sen. Glenn Hegar, R-Katy, who sponsored a rewrite of the transportation agency that failed when the regular session expired, said lawmakers should wait on the contracts issue until 2011. That's when they'll take another look at the agency as a whole.

"I'm pretty optimistic this can be a quick session," Hegar said. "But I don't think we should be addressing the contracts or even have the discussion until we pass agency reforms first."

As governor, Perry has the power to call the special session and set the agenda. He has said he kept it short to keep lawmakers focused on the necessities and away from "mischief."

He ignored pleas from Democrats to add expanding subsidized children's health insurance and the Texas Farm Bureau's call to keep pressing an eminent domain bill that died in the regular session.

"Today, Texas is ground zero for America's health care crisis," Sen. Eliot Shapleigh, D-El Paso

said, noting that children's health insurance bills passed the House and Senate during the regular session. Perry had suggested he would veto those bills, but they never made it to his desk.

"It is equally important as building highways, I would say more important," said Rep. Garnet Coleman, D-Houston. "If you're standing at the bully pulpit, use it."

The special session is scheduled for 30 days but lawmakers can leave earlier if they finish their work.

When Perry called several special sessions to deal with congressional redistricting (in 2003) and public school finance (2004, 2005 and 2006), lawmakers stayed in Austin for weeks and months of overtime. But history shows some special sessions are quite short.

For example, a 1982 special session lasted all of three days in September. In June 1987, lawmakers were back in Austin only two days.

- Highlights in history on this date:
- 1847 - The U.S. Post Office issues the first adhesive-backed stamps.
 - 1867 - The provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario officially become the Dominion of Canada. As a dominion, Canada still owed its allegiance to the British crown and didn't receive total independence until 1982.

America must stand strong with those fighting for liberty

In the past week, millions of Iranian citizens have taken to the streets protesting the election of Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, saying it was a sham. Iranian leaders blame foreign influence for this unrest. But what is really happening is that Iranians are looking to beacons of freedom around the world for solidarity and support as they appeal for the basic liberties that, today, we take for granted in America. The people of Iran know their call for freedom is resonating around the globe. In photos sent from blackberries and cell phones we see Iranians of every generation holding signs, many of them in English, demanding, "Where is my vote?"

Some of the most disturbing images to come out of Iran show the last moments of the life of a young woman who was shot in the streets of Tehran. The world has come to know her as "Neda," Farsi for "the voice" or "the call." The picture that will endure and define this chapter in history is of Neda lying on the ground, desperately cling-

ing to life while her teacher tries to staunch the flow of blood drawn from a cowardly sniper's bullet.

The Iranian regime has resorted to violence, media blackouts, and murder to retain power and to extinguish the people's desire for freedom. Today, the world stands at a critical juncture. What happens in the streets of Tehran has major implications for the future of democracy in the Middle East, as well as the ability of the Free World to prevail against all the forces of tyranny in the 21st Century.

The Ayatollah Khomeini's regime, founded in 1979, could be described as the first modern terrorist state. It has been the key financial and weapons supplier of Hezbollah, which, in 1983, bombed U.S. military barracks in Beirut, killing over 200 U.S. Marines. For 30 years, the regime has sponsored countless attacks on American troops, allies, and assets in the Middle East, causing death and destruction.

But the greatest victim of this nefarious regime has been the Iranian people. Because of the leading Islamic clerics' extreme

interpretation of "sharia law," Iran is one of the world's worst violators of human rights — especially the rights of women and religious minorities.

While President Ahmadinejad and his cronies, empowered by the Ayatollah, repress the Iranian people, they are also accelerating Iran's nuclear weapons program. We must not allow Iran's theocracy to bear nuclear arms. It would pose a greater threat than ever to American interests and allies, including Israel, which Ahmadinejad has publicly said should be "wiped off the face of the Earth."

That is precisely why America must support the brave men and women in the streets of Iran who are confronting the Iranian regime head-on with a battle cry of freedom. The success of the Iranian people is indispensable to U.S. leadership of the Global War on Terror.

Since 9/11, the U.S. has worked to advance democracy in the Muslim World so that its people might enjoy free elections, equal rights for women, religious tolerance, and other basic civil liberties. Our

efforts have been costly and paid with the lives of Americans. But we are beginning to see progress. Last year, radical Islamists were dealt a grave blow in the Pakistani election. Earlier this year, secular forces in Iraq won a huge election victory. Even more recently, Hezbollah was routed in Lebanon's election.

In his inaugural speech, President Obama proclaimed, "To those who cling to power through corruption and deceit and the silencing of dissent, know that you are on the wrong side of history; but that we will extend a hand if you are willing to unclench your fist."

The Iranian mullahs are clenching their fists against the people and the President must say so forcefully; proclaiming to the world that the United States stands firmly with the Iranian people and on the right side of history. America has the perspective — and the responsibility — to espouse democracy for all who desire it both in words and deeds.

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Picnic food safety greater concern in hot weather

COLLEGE STATION — Ants aren't the only little creatures that can spoil a summer picnic, said a food safety expert with the Texas AgriLife Extension Service.

"Another thing that can spoil a picnic or other outing is food-borne bacteria from improperly handled, prepared or stored foods," said Rebecca Dittmar, AgriLife Extension associate for food protection management.

"Hot temperatures accelerate the production of bacteria that contain toxins which may cause food poisoning," Dittmar said. "Typically you can't see, smell or taste food-borne bacteria."

Symptoms of food-borne illness include a fever or headache, stomach cramps, vomiting and diarrhea.

Picnic foods typically require a lot of handling, and the more foods are handled the greater the risk of contamination, Dittmar said.

"The key guidelines

to follow for better picnic food safety are: clean, separate, cook and chill," she said.

Dittmar said hands should be washed thoroughly, as should the surfaces on which food is being prepared and any containers, serving pieces or utensils being used.

"Since many picnic areas may not have easy access to running water, it's a good idea to bring your own dish washing soap and water, hand sanitizer or anti-bacterial wipes," she said.

She added that it's especially important to keep picnic foods separated when storing, preparing and serving them.

"Use a separate cutting board for fresh produce and raw meats," she said. "Foods to be grilled on-site should be securely wrapped so juices don't drip onto other foods. They should be separated from vegetables and premade foods, preferably in their own cooler."

"Keep them in the cooler until you're ready to cook and only take out the amount you intend to put on the grill."

Dittmar added that separating raw and cooked foods will help avoid cross-contamination, and keeping foods covered will help avoid contamination from insects or foreign objects.

Hot foods should be kept hot and cold foods should be kept cold, she noted, and beverages and perishable foods should be kept in separate coolers.

Dittmar suggests cooking steaks and fish to a minimum internal temperature of 145 degrees. She adds that pork and hamburgers are best cooked to an interior temperature of 160 degrees, while poultry should have an interior temperature of at least 165 degrees.

"A food thermometer is a small but valuable investment for helping ensure food safety by making certain the interior temperature of foods is adequate,"

she said. She also recommends keeping hot foods at 140 degrees or higher until served.

Cold foods prepared for picnicking should be kept at a temperature of 40 degrees or lower, she added. The cooler should be placed in the interior of the vehicle, not the trunk.

"Once you get to the picnic site, put the cooler in the shade, and only open it when necessary, leaving food inside until just before serving time," Dittmar said.

Cooked meat, poultry, fish or seafood should be eaten right away, she added.

"Never let food sit out for more than an hour when it's 90 degrees or hotter," she said. "You should either eat it or store it in a cooler, insulated container or refrigerator within that time."

The clock also is ticking on consuming any foods remaining in the cooler once the ice has melted,

Dittmar added. "Usually there's about a two-hour maximum window for safely consuming food after the ice in a cooler has become water," she said. "But if you're concerned about whether food

is safe or not, the best rule of thumb is always: When in doubt, toss it out."
