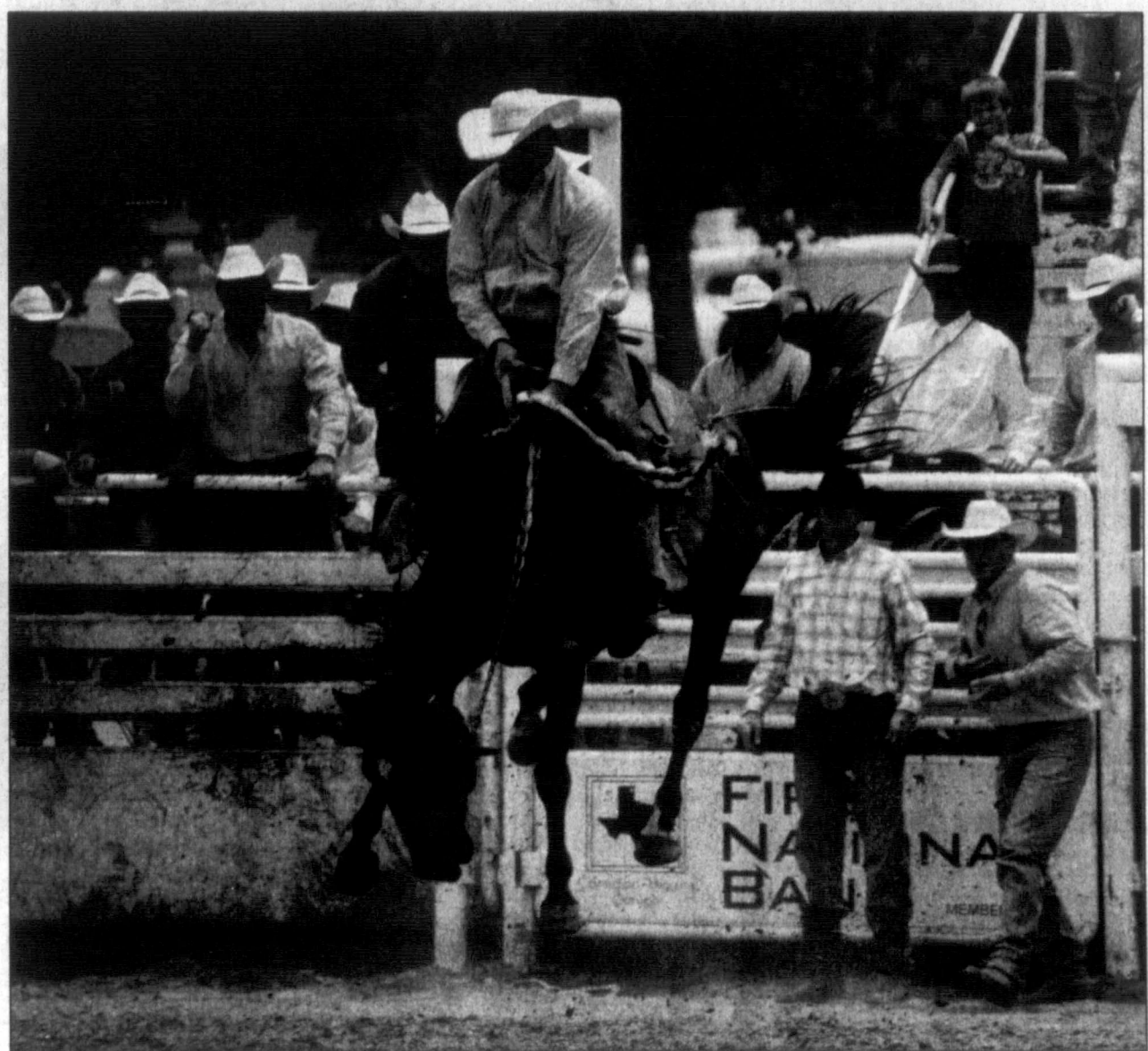

Man shot in Groom

Carson County Sheriff Tam Terry was mum this morning in connection with a weekend shooting near Groom.

Sunday, officials said an Amarillo man was shot to death in a Carson County cornfield. An Amarillo woman was arrested on murder charges and booked into Carson County jail, although her name was not released.

Terry said Sunday that the name of the dead man was not being released until his family could be notified.

Authorities said the couple pulled off Interstate 40 about 1 p.m. Sunday near FM 2880 between Groom and Conway, just inside Carson County. They apparently were returning to Amarillo from Greenbelt Lake.

The woman reportedly called 911 to report the shooting. Carson County deputies said they found the woman in the cornfield with a gun.

Justice of the Peace Bill Hinson ordered an autopsy in the case.

Water boards meet this week

AMARILLO — Groundwater Management Area 1 will have two meetings this week in Amarillo. The first will begin at 11 a.m., Tuesday. The second will begin at 1:30 p.m., Tuesday. Both meetings will be in the boardroom of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, 415 W. Eighth, in Amarillo.

The morning meeting will deal with the adoption and ratification of the desired future conditions of the Ogallala Aquifer in the Texas Panhandle. The management area board of directors adopted those conditions at their May meeting.

The board will also review the development of the Texas Water Development Board's groundwater availability model used in the determination of the desired future conditions and the administrative completeness of the submission to WATER cont. on page 3

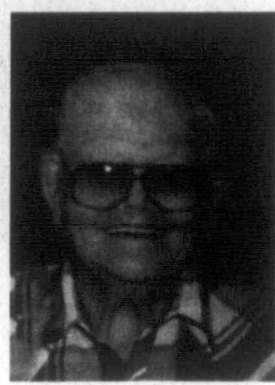

Cornyn draws boos during Austin 'tea party'

Texans who think government is too big and taxes are too high rallied on the lawns of the Texas Capitol and courthouses across the state on the Fourth of July, at times interrupting the remarks of Sen. John Cornyn in Austin.

From Gilmer and Lufkin in East Texas to McAllen in the Rio Grande Valley, hundreds of people gathered for Independence Day "tea parties."

In Austin, Cornyn was booed at the start and close of his remarks critical of federal spending and taxes. Cornyn, a Republican invited by organizers to speak, drew some boos for voting for the federal bailout of Wall Street last year.

"I'm not part of Washington," Cornyn said after the speech, the Austin American-Statesman reported. "I happen to work there, but on behalf of Texas, and I can vote 'no' on these reckless spending bills, on

the refusal to cut taxes."

Republican Gov. Rick Perry told the Austin crowd that Washington needed to hear them "loud and clear" on a message of cutting spending and taxation and shrinking the government.

Perry also drew some boos on his support of toll roads to alleviate traffic congestion.

Many in the crowd of hundreds in Austin wore stickers that read, "I resist Socialism."

In Lufkin, organizers urged the crowd to call President Obama and tell him "we are not happy, and we are working to make Texas free from his legislation."

Members of the crowd booed as the names of Obama, Secretary of State Hillary Clinton and House Speaker Nancy Pelosi were read.

"I believe that President Obama was elected because we failed to lead," Ted Cruz, former solicitor gen-

eral of Texas, told the Lufkin crowd. "But I also believe that his greatest legacy as president will be that he inspired a new generation of conservatives to rise up and defend our liberty."

In Longview and Gilmer, tea party participants signed petitions and were urged to tell their Washington lawmakers how they feel.

A crowd estimated at more than 25,000 attended a tea party at Southfork Ranch near Dallas on Saturday.

In the Rio Grande Valley, members of the Rio Grande Valley Tea Party Association gathered at a race track to hear the Declaration of Independence read, watch fireworks and a car race.

"The Constitution seems to have been misplaced in Washington lately," said Roxanna Herring of McAllen. "We would like it to come back in style."

Oil plunges below \$64 on fears recovery may lag

Oil prices plunged nearly \$3 to below \$64 a barrel Monday as dismal unemployment figures from the U.S. and Europe last week sparked investor doubts about any nascent economic recovery.

By midday in Europe, benchmark crude for August delivery fell \$2.97 to \$63.76 a barrel in electronic trading on the New York Mercantile Exchange. It last settled on Thursday at \$66.73.

Trading was closed in the U.S. on Friday for the Independence Day holiday.

Oil has tumbled from an eight-month high above \$73 a barrel last week after gloomy U.S. consumer confidence and jobs numbers fueled doubts about a rally that has doubled the

price of crude since March.

"It's not looking too pretty in terms of economic data," said Christoffer Moltke-Leth, head of sales trading for Saxo Capital Markets in Singapore. "The demand side fear is coming back into play."

A Labor Department report last week showed the U.S. economy lost a larger-than-expected 467,000 jobs in June. The unemployment rate climbed to 9.5 percent, a 26-year high. Unemployment in the 16 countries that use the euro spiked to a 10-year high in May, also at 9.5 percent.

"More and more people are becoming convinced we won't see a full-blown recovery any time soon," Moltke-Leth said. He said he expects the oil price to soon test the \$60 a barrel level.

"With economic news still gloomy, oil demand sluggish, stocks plentiful and no supply side disruption in sight, we could be on the verge of a short term downward price correction," said KBC Market Services in London.

The dollar's rise against other major currencies also weighed on oil prices, as investors who seek out commodities as a hedge

against dollar weakness and inflation returned to the U.S. currency.

Lending some support to prices was another attack on oil operations in Nigeria. Militants said on Sunday they attacked a Royal Dutch Shell oil facility in southern Nigeria, the latest sabotage in a campaign that has undermined output from Africa's largest producer.

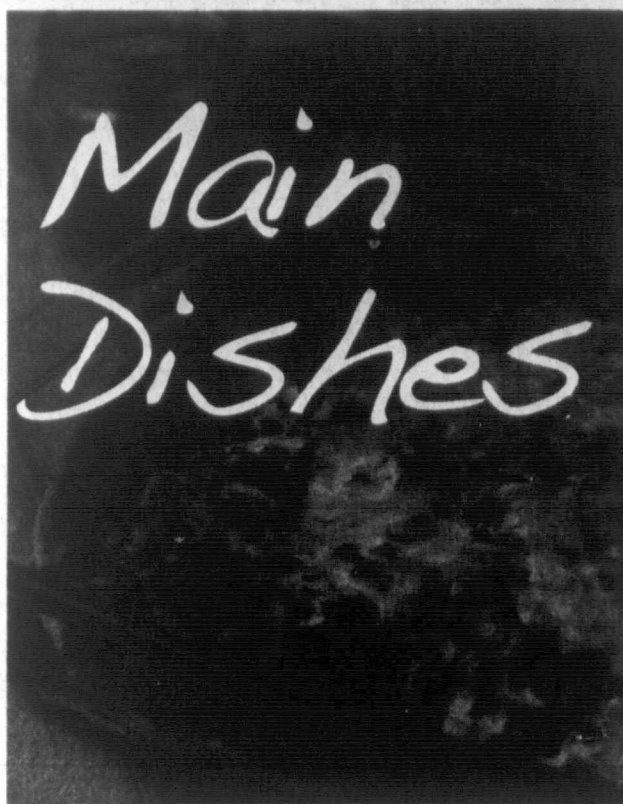

2 cup chopped cooked chicken
 2 cup sour cream

Cowboy CASSEROLE

1 lb. hamburger meat
 1 sm. jar cheese whiz
 1 sm. can Rotel tomatoes
 1 bx. Jiffy Corn Bread Mix (any brand you choose)
 1 can Ranch style beans
 1 can corn (whole kernel)
 salt and pepper
 3 tbs. onion (chopped) optional

Start by cooking hamburger meat. Add onion. Salt and pepper to taste. While meat cooks, mix corn bread according to the directions on the package and set aside. Open can of Ranch Style Beans, Rotel tomatoes, and corn and drain. Toss them all together with cooked hamburger meat. Stir in the entire jar of cheese whiz. Mix thoroughly. Place in a 9 X 13 baking dish and take corn bread mixture and pour over the top, place in a 400 degree oven and bake until corn bread is cooked through or until top of corn bread is golden brown. Refrigerate leftovers in covered container.

Black-eyed PEA CASSEROLE

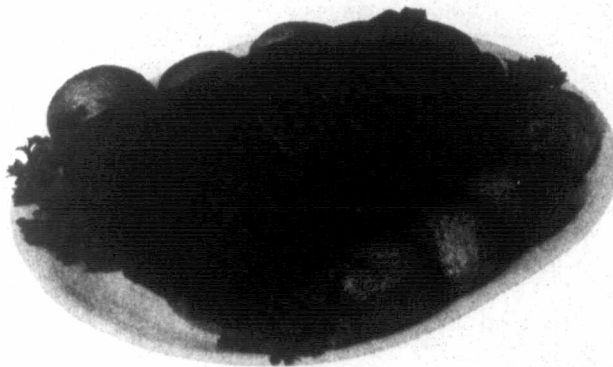
1 lb hamburger meat

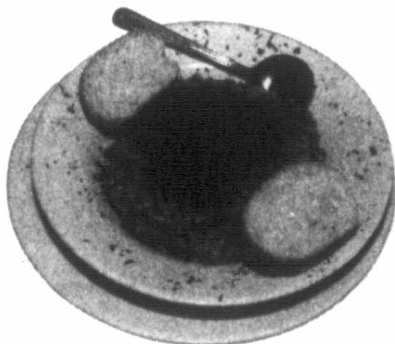

Cowboys Stadium likely off-limits for drilling

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys' new \$1.15 billion stadium would probably be off-limits for underground drilling under the team's contract with the city of Arlington.

City Attorney Jay Doegey said there are concerns about the possible risks of drilling under such an expensive and huge structure. The Dallas Morning News reported Sunday. The stadium weighs more than 805 million pounds.

"We don't want the ground to give and cause it to crack or sink," Doegey told the newspaper.

Options for drilling are already limited because the 200-acre site is in a developed area, but language

in the contract makes it potentially harder to lease the property for drilling.

The language was added before five small earthquakes shook Cleburne, a town 50 miles southwest of Dallas. Researchers are examining whether those earthquakes were caused by gas drilling.

In recent years, thousands of wells have been drilled in the areas of North Texas. The region sits upon the Barnett Shale, a geologic formation that is perhaps the nation's richest natural gas field.

Attorney Glenn Sodd said the potential ban could affect his clients — former property owners whose land was acquired for the stadium. Sodd's clients

were allowed to keep some mineral rights through a previously unpublicized deal.

If the city bans drilling under the stadium property, Arlington could only lease the land to drillers if it were "pooled" with adjacent property. Revenue would be split among all mineral rights owners.

There are no immediate plans to lease the stadium property for gas drilling.

The market for drilling leases has dropped in the past year due to the recession and falling natural gas prices. Signing bonuses have decreased from nearly \$30,000 per acre in some areas to about \$2,000 to \$2,500 per acre.

I know of no one my age who calls her mother every night. Talking once a week to catch up on things would be better — we could have an enjoyable conversation. How can I stop this without feeling horrible? Am I wrong? -- CONFLICTED IN SOUTH CAROLINA

DEAR CONFLICTED: I feel sorry for your mother. She apparently has no other life, no other interests beyond you. You have my sympathy, too, but at her age, it is unrealistic to expect her to change a pattern that was set 35 years ago.

I don't know how

involved these nightly conversations with her are, but I recommend you make them very short. "Hi, Mom -- I'm home. Goodbye!" Alternatively, you could agree upon a signal such as one ring of the phone so she'll know you are safe. Even then, she probably won't be satisfied, so be prepared.

DEAR ABBY: I recently spent a few days with my 64-year-old brother, "Austen." His wife divorced him several years ago, and his latest girlfriend recently broke up with him. I suspect I know why. He has turned into a crashing bore.

My brother used to be interested in the people around him, but now it seems like he doesn't care about anyone but himself. He spends hours on end telling me -- and anyone else who will listen -- about the minutiae of his daily life. He talks about his chores, his plans for future chores, and the shows he listens to on the radio.

He never once asked about me or the rest of the family, about our interests or activities unless it was

a setup so he could deliver another monologue about something.

DEAR SILENT SISTER: When did this personality change in your brother occur? Was it sudden, or has it been coming on for a long time? He may be depressed over the failure of his marriage and his latest romance. Or there may be an underlying physical cause.

As a loving sister, suggest that your brother have a checkup with his doctor if it has been some time since he's had one. If he wants to know why, it would not be out of line to tell him that when you visited him it seemed that his horizons are no longer as broad as they used to be, and you are worried that he may be depressed. But do not tell him you think he has turned into a self-centered bore because it would be both unkind and unhelpful.

Quincy Carter cut as football team's QB

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — Former Dallas Cowboys starting quarterback Quincy Carter is out of a job again.

The Abilene Ruff Riders of the Indoor Football League cut the former Georgia Bulldog after he failed to show up for a home game Saturday against the Odessa Roughnecks.

Coach Gerald Dockery tells the Abilene Reporter-News that Carter phoned him four hours before Saturday's game to tell him that he wouldn't play. At half-

time, general manager Barney Welch said Carter was no longer on the team.

In 2003, Carter led the Cowboys to a 10-6 season and the playoffs in their first season under coach Bill Parcells. Dallas released Carter in training camp before the next season, and he started briefly for the New York Jets before poor play and drug-related arrests ended his NFL career.

San Antonio man charged in triple homicide

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A 30-year-old San Antonio man has been charged with murder after his girlfriend, their 2-year-old daughter and another man were found dead in his apartment.

Chris Allgood is booked in the Bexar (BAYR) County Jail in San Antonio with bond set at \$205,000. He's also charged with discharging a firearm.

Police identify two of

the dead as 26-year-old Courtney Gass and their toddler, Anika. The dead man's identity hasn't been revealed.

Police spokesman Chris Benavides tells the San Antonio Express-News that the shooting happened around 3 a.m. Sunday at the Coral Ridge Apartments on the city's North Side.

A guard at the complex heard the shots and found the 30-year-old man in the

parking lot armed with a rifle. Benavides says the guard detained the suspect and called police.

Man jumps to his death after chase

HOUSTON (AP) — A man who was speeding away from authorities struck a concrete wall and jumped 50 feet to his death off a Houston highway exit ramp Sunday morning.

The pursuit began after a deputy with the Harris County Constables stopped the man for a traffic violation, and he became agitated and uncooperative. As the deputy talked to the man, he abruptly put his white BMW in gear and sped off, said Chief Mark Herman of the Harris County Constables.

The deputy followed him to the southbound exit ramp

to Interstate 45, where the man's vehicle struck a concrete retaining wall. As the deputy got closer, he saw the man jump over the structure and fall to the service road below.

He was pronounced dead at the scene, Herman said.

The man, who authorities are still trying to identify, was between 20 to 30 years old, Herman said. Authorities are also trying to determine if he was the owner of the BMW.

Other drivers witnessed the incident Sunday morning.



4 go on trial for roles in Texas school fight club

McALLEN, Texas (AP) — Grainy cell phone videos showing developmentally disabled students forced to fight each other will likely be shown to jurors this week as four former employees at a Texas school go on trial.

The late-night "fight club" at the Corpus Christi State School — orchestrated, authorities say, for the entertainment of those responsible for protecting the students — was uncovered in March after the images were found on a lost cell phone.

On Monday, jurors were expected to be picked for the trial of Timothy Dixon, 30, D'Angelo Riley, 23, and Jesse Salazar, 25, all charged with multiple counts of causing bodily injury to a disabled person. In a separate courtroom, Stephanie Garza, 21, was to face a lesser charge of not intervening to stop the fights. Two other former employees are scheduled to go on trial later this year.

"These people did horrific things," said Jeff Garrison-Tate, of the advocacy group Community Now!, which has called for closing the state schools in favor of community-based services. "But they were given silent permission for these heinous acts."

District Attorney Carlos Valdez did not return calls for comment. Defense attorneys for the accused declined to comment.

Almost 20 videos dating back to 2007 were found on a cell phone turned in to police, showing staff at the Corpus

Christi State School forcing residents into late-night bouts, even kicking them to egg them on.

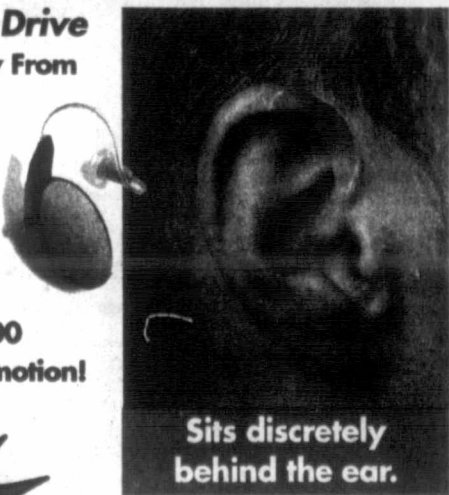
