



water," Hall said. Altrusa believes the most efficient and effective way to help our soldiers help Afghan children is to make standardized School Supply Kits. 3 BCT, 10th Mountain Division soldiers will distribute these kits to the schools in their area of operation.

Each kit contains basic, badly needed items that can make a world of difference to a child going to school.

- Items needed are:

Amarillo would drain the water beneath his ranch.

While CRMWA and Amarillo focused on water in Roberts County, Pickens joined other landowners, buying water rights or partnering with other landowners in Roberts, Hemphill, Ochiltree and Lipscomb Counties in the northeastern corner of the panhandle.

The City of Amarillo maintains that it won't develop its water rights until years into the future, but CRMWA is pumping water from its Roberts County well field to its 11 member cities, including Pampa.

As part of the state's water planning process, the Texas Legislature created 16 groundwater management areas across the state and is having them determine the desired future condition of their aquifers.

Groundwater Management Area 1 consists of four groundwater conservation districts in the panhandle, and on May 13, they adopted their desired future conditions.

White Deer-based Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District and Lubbock-based High Plains Underground Water Conservation District elected to keep 50 percent of their water in storage for the next 50 years in what has become known as the 50-50 rule.

Dumas-based North Plains Groundwater

Conservation District chose to keep 40 percent of the water in their western counties in storage for the next 50 years and 50 percent in their eastern counties.

Canadian-based Hemphill County Underground Water Conservation District chose to keep 80 percent of their water in storage for the next 50 years.

The three counties surrounding Hemphill County — Lipscomb, Roberts and Wheeler — all have adopted the 50-50 goal as their desired future condition.

Arrington said that the 80-50 goal of Hemphill County is too restrictive and has essentially made his water worthless.

In negotiations over the past year, Mesa offered about 174,000 acres of water rights in Roberts, Lipscomb and Hemphill Counties to CRMWA.

CRMWA said it was interested in the Roberts County water rights because it adjoins or is close to the water rights they already have, but they said they weren't interested in the Lipscomb County water rights because they were too far away.

CRMWA said that it wasn't interested in Arrington's Hemphill County water rights because of the Hemphill County district's goal of keeping 80 percent of their water in the ground.

Arrington said Hemphill

County now faces the same dilemma that Pickens faced a decade ago. He said that the surrounding counties with their higher production potential because of their lower storage goals will drain the water beneath his ranch and others in Hemphill County.

Indeed, computer models indicate that groundwater now flowing into Hemphill County will flow out of the county to the surrounding counties if water is pumped at production limits set by the desired future conditions adopted by GMA1.

Arrington has notified the four groundwater dis-

tricts of his intent to appeal the differing desired future conditions adopted by GMA1.

Jones said he expects to file the appeal with the groundwater management area this month.

Water officials said the administrative procedures could take a couple of years, but depending upon the decision of the water development board, the case could end up in court.

Arrington said that the other members of GMA1 are responsible for adopting a desired future condition that recognizes the Hemphill County goal.

CRMW meets Wednesday

SANFORD -- The issuance of bonds and expansion of their Roberts County well field will be topics of discussion for the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority board of directors when they meet here Wednesday.

The board will consider a resolution authorizing the issuance of Canadian River Municipal Water Authority contract revenue bonds, Series 2009 for the Conjunctive Use Groundwater Supply Project, when they meet beginning at 10:30 a.m., Wednesday, at their offices here at Lake Meredith.

They will also hear an update on the Phase III well field expansion for the John C. Williams Well Field north of Pampa in Roberts County and consider ratifying their recent application to amend the existing groundwater production permit.

The board will also consider a resolution to initiate condemnation proceedings for a temporary easement

regarding land in Oldham County with regard to CRMWA's salt cedar control project. Landowners along the Canadian River have agreed to join in the project to spray the invasive plant except for one ranch in Oldham County.

The board will consider authorizing a water tap off their aqueduct for the City of O'Donnell, discuss a low level pumping project and reallocating future surcharges.

They will also address their operating and maintenance budget for 2009-2010 fiscal year.

The board will hear reports on the Texas Legislative Session, the status of Lake Meredith's water supply, administrative activities, pending litigation, salinity control project and water quality.

The Canadian River Municipal Water Authority provides water from Lake Meredith and their Roberts County well field for their 11 member cities, including Pampa.

Advising Dad that the "gesture was unwelcome" is advising him to swallow all efforts to communicate and connect with his daughter and her fiance, when he clearly wants to be included.

I'm also unimpressed with a young man who would make no effort to ingratiate himself to his future children's grandfather. Marriages in our society are struggling to survive precisely because young people like those place no importance on building a support system. We need our parents and others to help us through the tough challenges. As a divorced father, "Dismayed" deserves every opportunity before the wedding to help his daughter get it right the first time. -- JAN IN ST. PAUL

DEAR JAN: Your opinion was shared by some -- but certainly not all -- of those who wrote to comment. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: The custom of asking a father for permission to marry his daughter is outdated and for good reason. It's not so much a gesture of respect as a symbolic gesture that indicates the woman is a piece of property being

"purchased" from the previous owner (the father) by a prospective new owner (husband-to-be).

The daughter in that letter, "Amanda," is one of many women today who regard the practice as disrespectful to women, not respectful to loving fathers. Dad's comment about "who wears the pants" in the family shows he feels Amanda should be unequal and subservient to her new "owner." She wants no part of this custom, not because her fiance "doesn't pass muster," but because she lucked out and found a man who, unlike her dad, views her as an equal in their relationship and, therefore, is as offended as she is by this outdated practice. -- OUTRAGED IN BELLEVUE, WASH.

DEAR ABBY: "Dismayed" said that his 24-year-old daughter was "out on her own, leading a productive life." Why should he feel that her hand was his to give?

Woman free on bond after Sunday shooting death

PANHANDLE - An Amarillo woman was free today on a personal recognition bond after being charged with manslaughter while Carson County officials await the results of an autopsy on a man shot near Groom.

Josh Robinson, 33, of Amarillo, was shot to death shortly before 1 p.m. Sunday in a Carson County cornfield, according to Carson County authorities.

Marci Lynne Johnson, 29, of Amarillo, was free on bond today after being charged with manslaughter in Robinson's death.

Officials said the couple was returning to Amarillo from Greenbelt Lake

when Robinson pulled off Interstate 40 between Groom and Conway near FM 2880 and into a cornfield near a center pivot irrigation system.

Carson County authorities said Johnson called 911 after the shooting and deputies found her walking in the field with a .45-caliber pistol in her hand.

Robinson and Johnson had apparently been fighting over the weekend at Lake Greenbelt. Officials said Robinson had accused her of being unfaithful.

Robinson reportedly threatened Johnson with a pistol, a fight ensued and the pistol went off.

Authorities said Robinson suffered a gunshot wound under the armpit in the chest.

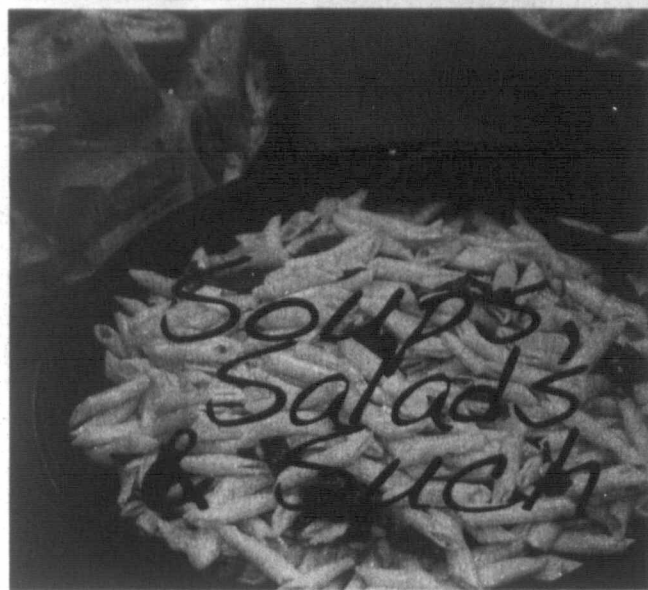

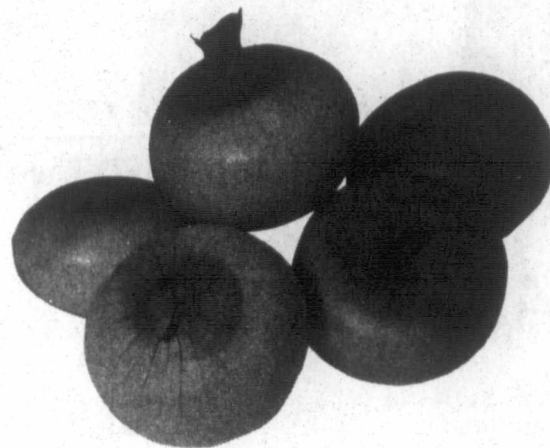
- 1 can tuna drained

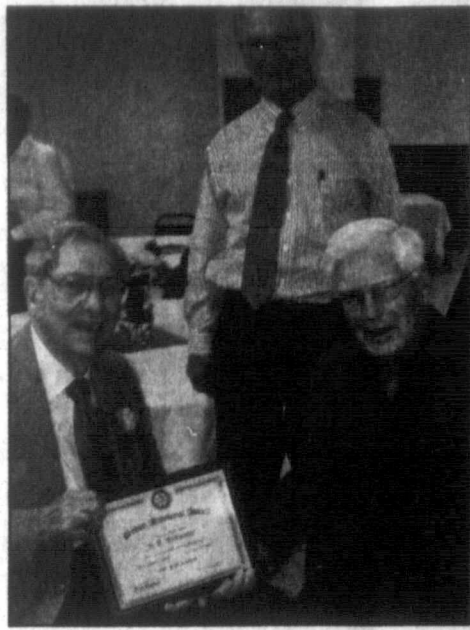
Rotary installs officers
