Pampan publishes book about his "haunted life"

Dan and Virginia Guthrie have shed four ghosts, but they believe they still have four living with them in their Pampa home.

Jessica, the little girl, comes and goes, Guthrie said. Two of the remaining are Cody, a Buffalo Soldier that was hung and burned, he said, and an old woman named Miriam.

"She causes us not to get very much sleep still," Dan Guthrie said.

He said she refuses to leave and doesn't believe in God.

"She likes to play with the TV and other electronics," Guthrie said, "but that's normal for any ghost."

The fourth ghost is an Indian, he said.

"He goes by 'Tom,'" Guthrie said.

Guthrie said Tom is something of a protective ghost. He said he hasn't been able to confirm it through official records, but some of the old timers in town say that Guthrie's house is built over an old Indian burial ground.

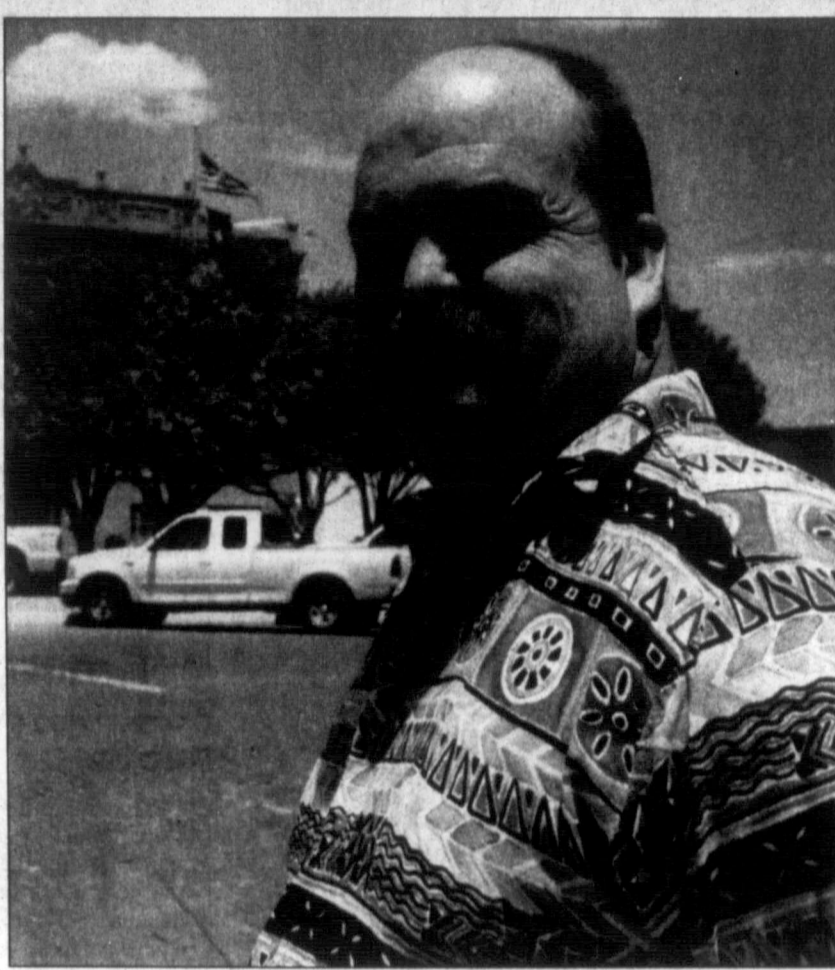
"When they built the houses," Guthrie said, "they just moved the markers and just built the houses over them."

He said he was told during his training that every place is haunted. It's just a matter of whether it's active or not.

"It took my group to get rid of the demonic entity that was actually in there," Guthrie said of his house.

Guthrie has written a book on his experiences with the paranormal. Entitled "A Haunted Life," most of the 64-page book deals with Pampa.

Exxon makes first big investment in biofuels

HOUSTON (AP) — Exxon Mobil Corp. said Tuesday it will make its first major investment in greenhouse-gas reducing biofuels in a \$600 million partnership with biotech company Synthetic Genomics Inc. to develop transportation fuels from algae.

Despite record-breaking profits in recent years, the oil and gas giant has been criticized by environmental groups, members of Congress and even shareholders for not spending enough to explore alternative energy options.

One of the company's requirements was finding a biofuel source that could be produced on a large scale. It says photosynthetic algae appears to be a viable, long-term candidate. If the alliance is successful, pumping algae-based gasoline at Exxon service stations is still several years away and will mean additional, multibillion-dollar investments for mass production.

"This is not going to be easy, and there are no guarantees of success," Emil Jacobs, a vice president at Exxon Mobil Research and Engineering Co., said in an interview with The

Associated Press. "But we're combining Exxon Mobil's technical and financial strength with a leader in bioscientific genomics."

Jacobs said the project involves three critical steps: identifying algae strains that can produce suitable types of oil quickly and at low costs, determining the best way to grow the algae and developing systems to harvest enough for commercial purposes.

Besides the potential for large-scale production, algae has other benefits.

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Southwest checks planes after hole forces landing

DALLAS (AP) — Southwest Airlines inspected nearly 200 planes and put them back in the sky Tuesday after a foot-long hole opened in the cabin of an identical jet, forcing the aircraft to make an emergency landing in West Virginia.

Passengers aboard a Nashville-to-Baltimore flight Monday said they could see through the hole above them, just in front of the plane's tail. The cabin lost pressure, but no one was injured on the flight, which carried 126 passengers and five crew mem-

bers. Passenger Michael Cunningham said he had dozed off in his seat in mid-cabin when he was awakened by "the loudest roar I'd ever heard." Southwest said it was unclear what caused the damage.

Museum works to restore Goodnight's house

GOODNIGHT, Texas (AP) — About 12 miles east of Claude on the south side of U.S. 287 stands a lone, weathered house. For more than a century people have lived in it, including one of Texas' most famous pioneering families.

The house, once white and appropriately called the "white house," is now painted to replicate its original 1887 shades. It was the home of Charles Goodnight, an entrepreneur and cattleman, and his wife, Mary Ann Dyer Goodnight, who helped settle Armstrong County.

Charles Goodnight is known as the inventor of the chuck wagon. His partnership with John Adair led to the establishment of the first permanent cattle-raising operation in the Panhandle, the JA Ranch.

In an effort to recognize and preserve this rich legacy, the Goodnight home is undergoing a multimillion dollar renovation effort.

Such an effort likely would be a surprise to Charles Goodnight, who had no concept of his own importance, said Montie Goodin, chairwoman of the board of directors for the Armstrong County Museum, which is leading the restoration effort.

"It didn't matter who you were, he invited all in," said Goodin, who was born in the house two years after Goodnight died in 1929.

Modernized through the years with electricity, natural gas, water and two baths, the house sheltered generations of ranch work-

ers and cowboys until about seven years ago.

The property, which is on the National Register of Historic Places, belongs to the Armstrong County Museum. The museum board has been raising money since 2006 to restore it to Goodnight-era authenticity and position it to be the centerpiece of the Charles Goodnight Historical Center that also will include a visitor's center, caretaker residence and operations endowment.

Nearly \$1.8 million has been raised toward the restoration project, with another \$600,000 needed to complete the work. The money has come from various sources, including the Texas Historical Foundation, fundraisers and various Amarillo-area philanthropies.

Goodin said foundation donations dried up this year due to the recession.

Phase one of the restoration is finished, which included work on the house's foundation, porches, roof, exterior paint and studies by restoration experts.

Goodin said the next step will include adding details to the home's interior: wallpaper over cheese cloth in the historic style, paint and furnishings.

Several pieces of Goodnight family furniture are in storage for when the house is complete. A simple, small rope bed built by Goodnight's stepfather, Adam Shiek, who also was a minister and furniture maker, is waiting to be

placed in the home. Ruth Robinson of Clarendon — Goodnight's great-great-niece who was just a tot when he died — donated the bed and her mother's Victorian bedroom set.

Robinson, who serves on the furnishings committee, said the furniture belongs in the house.

"Now that they're getting to restore the home, I think we need to get as much in there as is authentic," Robinson said.

Kitchens of that era were usually outfitted with pieces of furniture, said Goodin, whose father was Cleo Hubbard, the Goodnights' foster son. To capture the essence of the past, Goodin wants a black wood stove, a pie safe, a sink or sink with pump and table and chairs for the kitchen.

"We need furniture that would be similar to that period of time — a chair, a table," she said.

The task has been a journey of surprises and treasures as modern layers of the folk Victorian house were peeled away. For example, pieces of gold-veined black slate were discovered in the cellar. They turned out to be the original parlor mantel, now reassembled for use. A pocket door that opens into the hallway from the foyer was operated by a mechanism made by a company still in business.

"That's the fun thing about this historical work," Goodin said. "You never know what's coming around the corner."

Texas deputy shot dead; gunman also dead

BAYTOWN, Texas (AP) — A gunman who shot and killed a sheriff's deputy inside a mobile home Monday was found dead in a bedroom following a daylong standoff, authorities said.

Officials were unsure whether Gilbert Ortez Jr. shot himself or had been shot by a Texas Department of Public Safety trooper during the standoff in Baytown, about 30 miles east of Houston, that ended about 7 p.m., Chambers County District Attorney Cheryl Lieck told the Houston Chronicle.

Officials said Ortez was a former reserve police officer for the town of Kenefick, about 20 miles north.

Deputies went to the Tower Terrace mobile home park about 9:30 a.m. Monday after a meter reader sent to shut off water service to a mobile home fled when a woman came out and opened fire. Pamela Leggett was arrested and charged with aggravated assault and resisting arrest.

Ortez also was at the mobile home at the time and fatally shot Deputy Shane Detwiler in the head when Detwiler went inside, authorities said.

Detwiler, 31, had been with the Chambers County Sheriff's Department for just two months after six years with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Baytown police spokeswoman Patti Jett said. She

said the married father of three young children also was a highly decorated Iraq war veteran.

Authorities said negotiators tried for hours to establish contact with Ortez without success.

Neighbor Randy Young told the Chronicle he awoke to gunfire at the mobile home park Monday morning. He and more than a dozen neighbors hustled out after authorities arrived. Young said Ortez collected weapons and had shown him explosives.

"It's a nice place, maybe a fist fight every now and then," neighbor Tracy Daw said of Tower Terrace. "But nothing like this."

Mainframe computer stolen from East Texas campus

PALESTINE, Texas (AP) — Wires were cut as thieves stole the mainframe computer with student information from the Palestine (PAL'-uh-steen) campus of Trinity Valley Community College.

Anderson County Sheriff Greg Taylor told the Palestine Herald-Press says the break-in happened over

the weekend, with a backdoor pried open.

The theft was discovered Monday. Taylor says the computer included student and class information, plus grades.

About \$230, in cash and checks, was stolen from another office in the Anderson Building. The sheriff says a glass contain-

er filled with urine was discovered in the office where the money was taken.

A damage estimate was not immediately available.

Ingram man drowns after rescuing son

KERRVILLE, Texas (AP) — Services are planned Friday for an Ingram man who drowned after jumping into the Guadalupe River and pushing his son to safety.

Neither could swim. Kerrville police identified the victim as 35-year-old Jaime Casteneda Cuellar.

The accident happened Saturday night at the Upper Guadalupe River Authority Dam.

Witnesses say Cuellar and four of his children were walking across the dam when his 8-year-old son slipped and fell into the water.

A Kerrville police report says Cuellar saved his son, then yelled for help and a witness managed to pull the man from the water. Cuellar could not be revived.

efits, Jacobs said. It can be grown using land and water unsuitable for other crop and food production; it consumes carbon dioxide, the greenhouse gas blamed for climate change; and it can produce an oil with molecular structures similar to the petroleum products — gasoline, diesel, jet fuel — Exxon already makes.

That means the Irving, Texas-based company will be able to convert the bio-oil into fuels at its own refineries and use existing pipelines and tanker trucks to get it to consumers.

The \$600 million price tag includes \$300 million for Exxon's internal costs and \$300 million or more to La Jolla, Calif.-based Synthetic Genomics — if research and development milestones are successfully met.

"Even though this is a multiyear program, we

both still consider it a very aggressive timetable, and it involves a lot of basic research," said J. Craig Venter, founder and CEO of the privately held company. "As a result, you don't know the answers until you've done these tests and experiments."

Algae is considered a sustainable source for second-generation biofuels, which go beyond corn-based ethanol into nonfood sources such as switchgrass and wood chips.

Royal Dutch Shell PLC said earlier this year it would scale back large investments in wind and solar in favor of next-generation biofuels. The European oil giant is working with Canadian company Iogen Corp. on a method to produce ethanol from wheat straw, and partnering with Germany-based Choren Industries to develop a synthetic biofuel

from wood residue. Another oil major, BP PLC, plans to team up with Verenium Corp. to build a \$300 million cellulosic ethanol plant in Highlands County, Fla.

For Exxon Mobil, the world's largest publicly traded oil company, the biofuels investment is tiny compared with its spending to find new supplies of crude and natural gas.

CEO Rex Tillerson said earlier this year Exxon's 2009 spending on capital and exploration projects is expected to reach \$29 billion, up from the \$26.1 billion it spent in 2008. The company said those levels are likely to remain in the \$25 billion to \$30 billion range through 2013.

Exxon Mobil shares rose 25 cents to \$65.95 in trading Tuesday. They've traded in a range of \$56.51 to \$86.47 in the past year.

on the market for over a month now. "It's been in the making for a year and a half," Guthrie said.

This weekend he'll be signing books at Hastings in Coronado Center. Last Saturday he was at Barnes and Noble in Amarillo.

The self-published book follows Guthrie's experiences up through last fall.

While Guthrie has had paranormal experiences as a child growing up in California, his first experience with ghosts in Pampa, according to his book, was at a manufacturing plant where he worked.

Several of them, including a demonic entity, he said, followed him home and took up residence.

"I never realized that it was a demon until after it came to my house," Guthrie said. "After that thing came home, it was a daily beating for nearly eight months. It didn't like me one bit."

He said whenever it came

into the house, it stirred up seven other spirits.

Guthrie said that there are certain procedures to get rid of ghosts without getting the church involved.

"It's a matter of having the emotions to back it up," he said. "If you don't, it's not going to work."

After bringing in several groups from other parts of the state to help him, Guthrie finally created his own group.

"It took a long time to get the guys I have now because a lot of them would come on one investigation," Guthrie said, "and high-tail it the first time they got touched."

He founded The Pampa Texas Paranormal Research Society. One team is based out of Pampa and a separate crew is based in Amarillo, although they generally work together.

He noted that they are all volunteers, so it generally depends upon who's available when they go on expedition, and he said there

are plenty of places to go in Pampa and elsewhere in the Texas Panhandle.

Guthrie said most ghosts are family members just hanging around trying to explain to their loved ones that they're all right.

His team has visited several homes in Pampa that have ghosts, Guthrie said. He added that he would like to investigate some of the buildings downtown as well. At least two are reported to be haunted.

"We've got a bunch of places in town," he said. "We've got a bunch here. We've got a bunch in Amarillo. We just started up in Borger."

There are also possible cases in Alanreed and Miami.

Guthrie's working on a new book about his work. Rather than being focused on his home, he said it would be focused on the cases that his group has been involved in this past year.

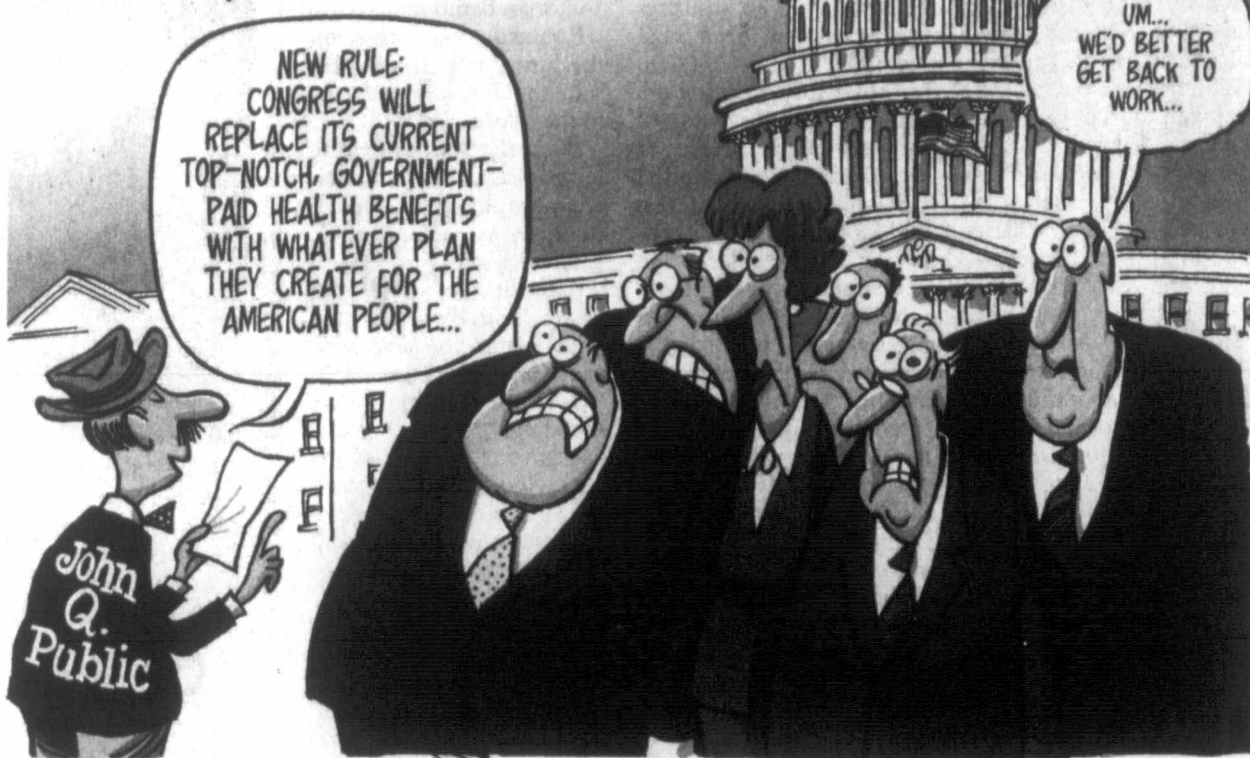

Answer is blowing in the wind

Like kids before Christmas, residents of the panhandle are experiencing anticipation at a maddening level. Will we get a shiny new bike, or socks?

The wind energy "boom" seems so close, but no one will give us a time when the construction will begin and when those jobs will be available to many displaced by the latest down in the "patch."

Last week's news that T. Boone Pickens would pick up his turbines and go to the Midwest was another blow to local hopes. But almost immediately we were reassured that we had not been abandoned.

"I am fully committed to wind energy and to developing wind projects in the US and perhaps, Canada. The capital markets have dealt us all a setback and I'm less aggressive with the Panhandle project than I have been. I'm committed to 667 wind turbines and I am going to find projects for them.

"I had hoped that Pampa would be the starting point, but transmission issues and the problem with the capital markets make that unfeasible at this point. I expect to continue development of the Pampa project, but not at the pace that I originally expected."

This is the message posted on the Mesa Power Group Web site. But we don't seem to be able yet to pin down exactly what that means for Pampa.

We finally had a conversation with T. Boone Pickens PR guy, Jay Rosser yesterday afternoon. Our long-time reporter David Bowser and I had been trying to get in touch with someone from Mesa Power Group ever since the Dallas Morning News and the Associated Press announced Pickens was pulling out of Pampa—then through Pickens denial on several TV new talk shows.

Rosser reiterated late Monday the points from Pickens short statement,

which we ran last Tuesday, along with reaction by Cross Texas Transmission, and local officials, who all basically said the winds farms are coming, with or without Pickens.

But what we wanted to be able to bring our readers is some sort of revised time line.

We understand that changes in the economic climate mean all this will take longer than Pickens originally planned.

According to Rosser, Pickens wanted to build his own transmission lines. "We are now forced to wait for the state's transmission lines."

Those lines are mandated to be built and operational by 2013.

With that as a given, shouldn't someone know when construction of wind farm is anticipated to begin?

If they do, we sure haven't been able to get any answers.

Still, when we asked about a time line, Rosser said he didn't know. When asked if and when the Mesa Power office in Pampa would reopen, he said he didn't know.

He spoke again about the 100,000 plus acres in the panhandle that Pickens hold leases one, but said he did not know the length of these leases. One lease holder we know told us that they received one payment and then a letter stating the lease was being terminated. So apparently these are not leases that landowners can count on.

It seems to us that if you are a huge enterprise, going forward with a project, you ought to have a plan.

Rosser did say that the first batch of wind turbines would be placed elsewhere. "There are many areas that don't have the limits that currently exist in Pampa." Meaning places that already have transmission lines.

Pickens said in May of 2008, "The development of alternative energy projects, especially renewable resources such as wind

power, is critical for the future of the country in the face of declining world oil resources."

"You find an oil field, it peaks and starts declining, and you've got to find another one to replace it," said Pickens, who once operated one of the largest independent oil and gas production companies. "It can drive you crazy. With wind, there's no decline curve. It's a treadmill."

The Panhandle, with its wide-open space, low population and steady winds out of the southwest, is a logical location for wind-generated energy. Studies show the Texas Panhandle winds are optimal for such a project, much of the time in the middle of the day when electric demand is at its peak.

Development of the region's wind resources also carries an economic bonus, as evidence by the boom the three largest wind farms in America are creating in Nolan County. While other towns in the region struggle with plummeting house prices and job losses, Sweetwater is in the midst of a construction explosion. Two new companies opened in the past month, one servicing the blades of the county's 2,000 turbines, another renting out cranes used in erecting new turbines. The GE 1.5-megawatt turbines, one of the most widely used wind turbines in their class, stand more than 400 feet to the tip of their blades. Tax revenues from

the energy companies are bringing jobs, new roads and houses, and renovating local schools and hospitals there."

That's nice. But lots of us here are just common taters, we are able to read and hear government and big business speak. And we're even able to translate enough to know that it's just acres of rhetoric with no real meat.

History tells us that the economic recovery will happen, and we realize that these companies are in business to make money and don't really care where they make it.

And it's not just Pickens' organization who will come and build the necessary infrastructure.

But if Pampa is to become part of the "boom that will never end," see our county coffers expand and our community prosper, it would sure be nice sure be nice to know that someone really has a plan—and can tell us what it is.

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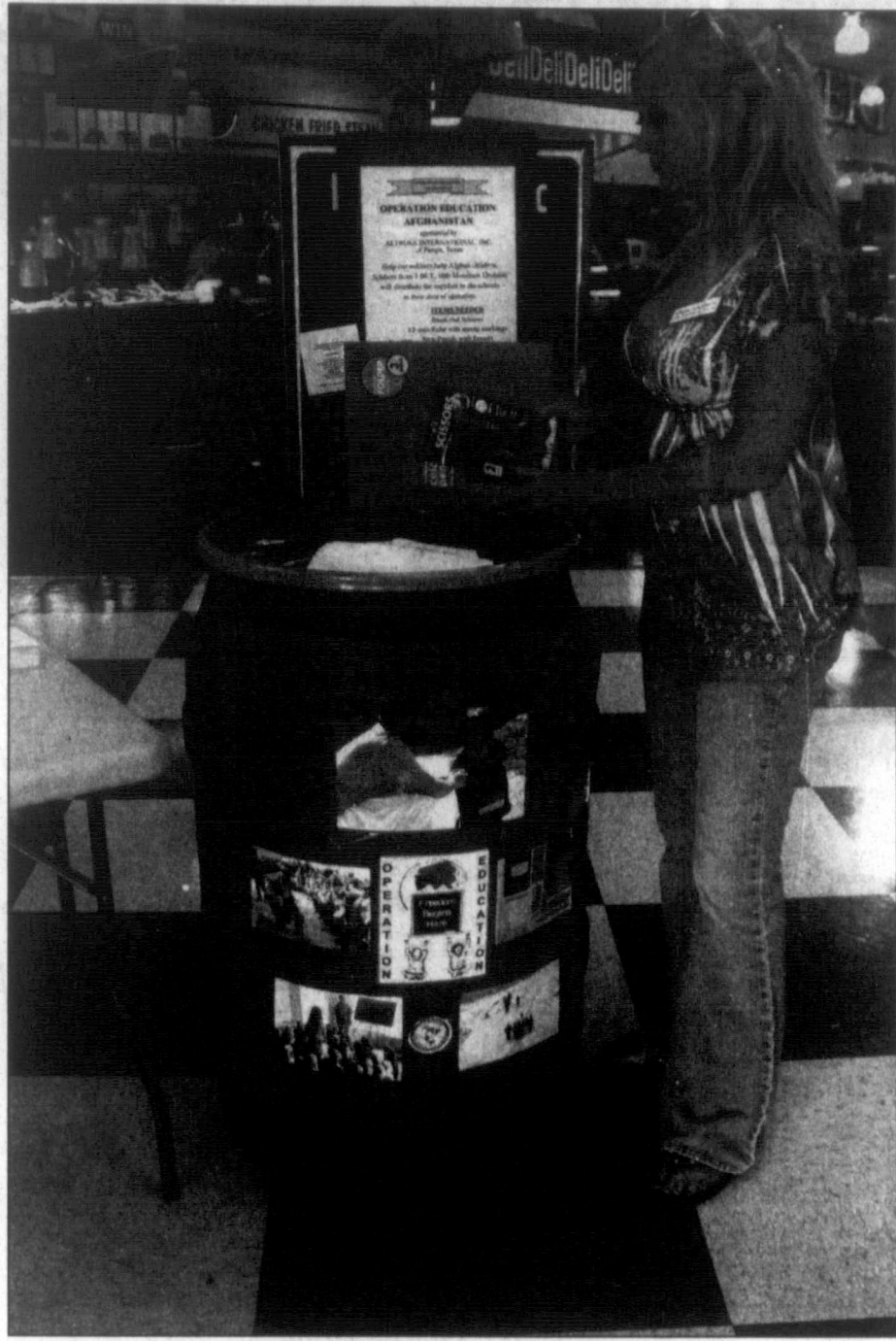

Harrelson criticizes use of cats by Tech center

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Actor and animal rights activist Woody Harrelson is criticizing use of cats for medical training at the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center.

People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, which provided a copy of Harrelson's letter Monday, says it has filed a complaint with the school in Lubbock to

end the practice.

KOSA-TV reports the cats are purchased from a shelter in Odessa.

Texas Tech officials told KCBT-TV that cats are used to practice anesthesia, so the animals are not conscious and do not suffer.

A Health Sciences Center spokeswoman did not immediately respond early Tuesday to a message from The Associated Press for further comment.

Slab with Pickens' signature removed from home

HOLDENVILLE, Okla. (AP) — A Holdenville man says a concrete slab with the signature of billionaire oilman T. Boone Pickens has been removed from the driveway of a home he owns and taken to Pickens' ranch in Texas.

The slab was in front of the former home of Pickens' grandmother. The now vacant home is owned by David McCart who says he discovered the section missing June 22nd and says he's pursuing criminal charges against Pickens.

Pickens spokesman Jay Rosser says the section was removed when Pickens recently was in Holdenville to inspect enhancements to a family plot at the Holdenville cemetery. Rosser says

police determined the slab was between the sidewalk and the street and therefore city property.

Pickens grew up in Holdenville and scratched his name in the concrete in 1946.

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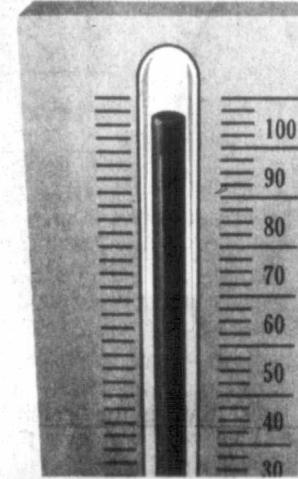
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Dear Abby...
