Top O'Texas Rodeo cuts admission

The Top O' Texas Rodeo just got less expensive.

Because of the economic slump, Tommy Parks said the association voted Monday night to cut admission prices by five dollars across the board.

"That's going to be adults, kids, everybody," said Parks, president of the Top O' Texas Rodeo Association.

It was eight dollars for adults and six dollars for kids, but each of those prices have been cut by five dollars.

"We want to help out," Parks said.

Something else new this year is the horse races.

"This year on Saturday night we're having horse races," Parks said.

He said it would be on the east of the softball fields at Recreaton Park.

We're going to run three different sets of horses," he said. "We're going to run a girls' heat, a boys' heat and then an open heat.

"The girls and boys, their horses have to be rideable,

# ENTREPRENEURSHIP ARC partners believe in hard work

Steve Snelgrooes believes in hard

work – hard like concrete. After 32 years with Celanese,

Snelgrooes has partnered up with a friend's son-in-law and gone into the concrete business. Snelgrooes, a Pampa native, and

Jeff Robison of Amarillo have joined together to form ARC, Affordable Rock Creations. While they do conventional con-

crete jobs such as driveways and walks, their expertise lies in their creative use of what most people consider a mundane gray building material.

If anybody doubts their creativity, the entryway to Snelgrooes home looks like a textured rug with a maroon-colored diamond pattern. It's concrete. So is his kitchen floor that looks like brick.

The textured front walk, lined with stained brick, is typical of his projects. He just finished a similar project in Canyon, matching the brick to trim on one of the older homes there.

Snelgrooes also casts hollow concrete rocks to form waterfalls and ponds, but it's inside the home where ARC seems to be catching on.

Standing in the master bath, he pointed to the swirls of color that form the vanity countertop. Concrete. Snelgrooes explained that the concrete was laid over the existing countertop. He already has two jobs in Pampa for such projects.

# commits funds to wind energy

The Board of Directors of the Pampa Economic Development Corporation met Thursday July 16, 2009 at 11:00 a.m. in a regularly scheduled board meeting in their office at 106 N. Cuyler.

The board voted to provide \$202,000.00 to Clarendon College-Pampa Center for the purchase of training equipment that will be used in their wind energy

training program. Funding, by the Pampa EDC, for the equipment will require a public hearing and approval of the Pampa City Commission.

The wind energy training program is scheduled to begin Fall semester 2009 with online courses. Training equipment is expected to be in place for hands on training by Spring semester 2010. Clarendon

College-Pampa Center Dean Mr. Ray Jaramillo made a presentation to the Pampa EDC board at a recent meeting requesting financial assistance for the wind energy training equipment.

Executive Director Clay Rice reported that Spencer McIlhannon, Business Development Facilitator, for the Entrepreneur Alliance is already counseling more than

twenty clients after only three months of work in Pampa. The Pampa EDC contracts with the Entrepreneur Alliance to provide Mr. McIlhannon's consulting services in Pampa each Wednesday to aspiring entrepreneurs as well as to established business owners.

### Gov't calls for volunteers to test swine flu shots

WASHINGTON (AP) The government is calling for several thousand volunteers to roll up their sleeves for the first swine flu shots, in a race to test whether a new vaccine really will protect against the virus before its expected to rebound in the fall.

The National Institutes of Health's infectious disease chief, Dr. Anthony Fauci, tells The Associated Press that scientists first will test different doses of the swine flu vaccine in healthy adults and, if there are no immediate safety concerns, quickly begin testing babies and children.

The studies will begin at eight medical centers around the country - in Baltimore; Iowa City, Iowa; St. Louis; Nashville; Seattle; Atlanta; Cincinnati

# **Airman from Texas lost** legs after surgery

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) - A 20-year-old airman from Texas lost parts of both legs and was in critical condition after routine gallbladder surgery at Travis Air

Force Base went terribly wrong, his family said. Airman 1st Class Colton Read, who graduated from Arlington's Sam Houston High School, was to get his gallbladder removed laparoscopically — via a small inci-

sion — at David Grant Medical Center on July 9. During the procedure, surgeons nicked or punctured an aorta, a large artery that carries blood from the heart throughout the body, according to his wife, Jessica Read. The surgeons repaired the breach enough to save his life, but the repair began leaking and disrupted the blood supply to his legs, she said.

Read was flown to UC Davis Medical Center in Sacramento, where doctors told the family that damage from the lack of blood required amputation. Family mem-

bers say he's undergone 10 surgeries to remove dead tissue from his legs, leaving him without much of his right leg and the lower portion of his left.

And Read still hasn't had his gallbladder removed because of the surgery complications, relatives said.

# Concealed arms reciprocity reject

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a rare win for gun control advocates, the Senate on Wednesday rejected a measure allowing a person with a concealed weapon permit in one state to also hide his firearm when visiting another state.

The vote was 58-39 in favor of the provision establishing concealed carry permit reciprocity in the 48 states that have concealed weapons laws. That fell two votes short of the 60 needed to approve the measure, offered as an amendment to a defense spending bill.

Opponents prevailed in their argument that the

measure violated states rights by forcing states with stringent requirements for permits to recognize concealed weapons carriers from states that give out permits to almost

This is no minor shift in policy," said Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., whose

state requires people to be fingerprinted, get gun training and to undergo a federal background check before issuing permits. "It in fact would be a sweeping change and I think with some deadly consequenc-

The vote reversed recent trends where Republicans and gun rights Democrats from rural states joined to push pro-gun rights issues and block gun control legislation.

Congress this year voted to restore the rights of people to carry loaded weapons into national parks and the Senate moved to effectively eviscerate the tough gun control laws of the District of Columbia.

Congress has also ignored urgings from President Barack Obama and Attorney General Eric Holder to revive a ban on military-style weapons that expired in 2004.

The concealed weapons measure, promoted by the National Rifle Association and Gun Owners of America, would have made a concealed weapon permit from one state valid in the 47 other states with permit laws. Only Wisconsin and Illinois have no carry permit laws.

Sen. John Thune, R-S.D., the sponsor, said it would not provide for a national carry permit, and that a visitor to another state would have to obey the limitations of that state, such as bans on concealed weapons in restaurants or other places.

stoppable, have a little calf in them. In the open, if you can get on it and ride it, bring it."

The horse racing is free for spectators, he said.

The racing is part of the association's participation in the Children's Miracle Network.

"Everything we make on the racing goes towards the Children's Miracle Network," he said. "We're going to make some good money for them."

The 63rd annual Top O' Texas Rodeo will be Aug. 13 through 16, but it's only the second year for the rodeo to be sanctioned by the Texas Cowboy Rodeo Association instead of the Professional Cowboy Rodeo Association.

The Top O' Texas Rodeo was voted the best new Texas Cowboy Rodeo Association's rodeo last year.

"We're hoping to be bigger and better this year,' Parks said.

"We were voted the best new rodeo of 2008," said Cindy Kemph, the rodeo association's office manager, "and the Top O' Texas Rodeo Association got Committee of the Year. It was pretty good for the

first year." Pampa's Top O' Texas Rodeo traditionally had

been sanctioned by the PRCA, Professional Rodeo Cowboy's Association, but last year the local association broke with tradition and joined the Texas Cowboy Rodeo Association.

Kemph admitted there were, and still are, those who question the move, but last year's rodeo came off without a hitch -- except for the weather.

It rained throughout the first performance and the opening night barbecue.

"Being our first rodeo last year as an open rodeo," Parks said, "if it hadn't been for the rain, we would have set records, but we still had a fantastic show." The open rodeo drew a

wide variety of contestants and the stock was stellar. Parks said an open rodeo

draws more hometown entrants and participation. "Last year was our first year as a TCRA rodeo,"

Parks said. "Our first year out, we were one of the largest rodeos with the TCRA."

He said they would have been the largest, but they didn't have the added money for prizes.

"We were second on money," Parks said, "but as far as our performance, the way we handled ourselves, they said there were none

The Top O' Texas Rodeo Association also earned an award last year.

"We got Association Committee of the Year,' Parks said.

He said the association has 32 directors, and the success of the rodeo wouldn't have been possible without the work each director did.

This year, there are some new directors, but many of the veterans are back.

"Our association stepped up during the TCRA finals," he said, "and we took 25 people to the finals to help them. They just couldn't believe the support our committee gave them."

Last year, the finals were in Amarillo. This year, they will be in Vernon.

This is Parks third, and last year, as president of the association.

Normally, it's a two-year job, he laughed.

"It's my last rodeo as president," Parks grinned. "I've got many more coming on the board, but it's my last year as president."

He said he intends to stay on the board and work on many Top O' Texas Rodeos for years to come.

# Analysis: Gates arrest a signpost on racial road

It took less than a day for the arrest of Henry Louis Gates to become racial lore. When one of America's most prominent black intellectuals winds up in handcuffs, it's not just another episode of profiling — it's a signpost on the nation's bumpy road to equality.

The news was parsed and Tweeted, rued and debated. This was, after all Henry "Skip" Gates: Summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Yale. MacArthur "genius grant" recipient. Acclaimed historian, Harvard professor and PBS documentarian. One of Time magazine's "25 Most Influential Americans" in 1997. Holder of 50 honorary degrees.

If this man can be taken away by police officers from the porch of his own home, what does it say about the treatment that average blacks can expect in 2009?

Earl Graves Jr., CEO of the company that publishes Black Enterprise magazine, was once stopped by police during his train commute to work, dressed in a suit and tie.

"My case took place back in 1995, and here we are 14 years later dealing with the same madness," he said Tuesday. "Barack Obama being the president has meant absolutely nothing to white law enforcement officers. Zero. So I have zero confidence that (Gates' case) will lead to any change whatsoever."

The 58-year-old professor had returned from a trip to China last Thursday afternoon and found the front door of his Cambridge, Mass., home stuck shut. Gates entered the back door, forced open the front door with help from a car service driver, and was on the phone with the Harvard leasing company when a white police sergeant arrived.

Gates and the sergeant gave differing accounts of what happened next. But for many people, that doesn't matter.

They don't care that Gates was charged not with breaking and entering, but with disorderly conduct after repeatedly demanding the sergeant's name and badge number. It doesn't matter whether Gates was yelling, or accused Sgt. James Crowley of being racist, or that all charges were dropped Tuesday.

All they see is pure, naked racial profiling.

"Under any account ... all of it is totally uncalled for," said Graves.

"It never would have happened — imagine a white professor, a distinguished white professor at Harvard, walking around with a cane, going into his own house, being harassed or stopped by the police. It would never happen."

Racial profiling became

a national issue in the 1990s, when highway police on major drug delivery routes were accused of stopping drivers simply for being black. Lawsuits were filed, studies were commissioned, data was analyzed. "It is wrong, and we will end it in America," President George W. Bush said in 2001.

Amid the indignation over Gates' case, a few people pointed out that he may have violated the cardinal rule of avoiding

the sergeant's name and arrest: Do not antagonize badge number. It doesn't the cops.

The police report said that Gates yelled at the officer, refused to calm down and behaved in a "tumultuous" manner. Gates said he simply asked for the officer's identification, followed him into his porch when the information was not forthcoming, and was arrested for no reason.But something about being asked to prove that you live in your own home clearly struck a

nerve - both for Gates

and his defenders.

"You feel violated, embarrassed, not sure what is taking place, especially when you haven't done anything," said Graves of his own experience, when police made him face the wall and frisked him in Grand Central Station in New York City. "You feel shocked, then you realize what's happening, and then you feel it's a violation of everything you stand for."

Wrote Lawrence Bobo, Gates' Harvard colleague, who picked his friend up from jail: "Ain't nothing post-racial about the United States of America."

## **Dallas** police will have to hide their tattoos

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas police officers with tattoos will need to cover them with clothing or perhaps even makeup.

Lt. Andrew Harvey said a lot of officers have tattoos, but the department wants officers "to display a more professional image.

The Dallas Morning News reported Wednesday that the official policy is being drawn up by the department's personnel division and could take effect by the end of summer.

According to current rules, police personnel must "present a neutral and uniform image to effectively relate to all segments of the population they serve."

Previously, individual commanders decided whether an officer needed to cover tattoos.

Harvey said several other cities have similar policies, including Houston, Arlington and Los Angeles.

Officer Nick Novello has four tattoos on his arms, including an American Indian on his right forearm he had when he was hired by Dallas in 1982.

Novello said he thinks the department should consider grandfathering in current officers.

"If I got hired in 1982 and had that tattoo on my forearm, how can you expect me to cover my tattoo up in 2009?" he said. "If you have to cover up your arms, they're going to have a lot of problems staying hydrat-

Novello, who also has an eagle bursting out of an American flag on his left arm, said he can understand requiring officers to cover up tattoos if they are offensive in some way.

"In culture at large, tattoos are extremely prevalent," he said. "We're not divorced from society at

Ethan Hunt, who shut out North Randall County 2-0 Saturday by giving up only two hits, pitched a no-hitter and allowed only two base runners as Pampa dominated the state tourna-

After losing to both Seminole and North Randall County last week in pool play, a warm up to the state tournament, Pampa gave up only two runs in the tournament. After Saturday's 2-0 win against North Randall County, Pampa run ruled Seminole 11-1 Saturday behind the one-hit pitching of Ryan Powell.

Hunt needed only 84 pitches, 54 for strikes, to put Seminole away He struck out Tuesday. seven and walked one. He retired the side in order in every inning except the second when a wild pitch resulted in a strikeout with the batter able to reach first A walk followed. A passed ball allowed the runners to advance a base.

Pampa had taken a 3-0 lead after a jittery first inning from Seminole. Aaron Allen opened with a double, just beating the left fielder's throw to second. A wild pitch moved him to third. He scored on a balk. Cade Engle and Hunt drew Engle took secwalks. ond on the balk that scored Allen. He stole third and came home on a fielder's choice. center in the fourth inning. The game ended when Hunt fielded a slow ground ball near first base and made a backhanded flip to Troxell, who grabbed the ball and stepped on first a split second before the batter.

"The kids came together this week like I've never seen an all star team come together before," said Kevin Hunt, the manager of the team.

Coaches are Chris Engle and Kennan Davis. The team committed no errors compared to three for Seminole.

For the first time in years, Pampa's 11-12 all stars will compete in a regional tournament. It will be held next week in Springdale, Ark. regional tournament is one step below the Cal Ripken World Series.

On Saturday, Pampa defeated North Randall County by a score of 2-0 and on Sunday, defeated Seminole by a score of 11-1. Whichever team Pampa ends up playing

will have to defeat them twice to win the championship.

On Saturday, Ethan Hunt pitched a complete game shut out, giving up only one hit while striking out 10 to earn the win. Hunt scattered four walks during the game. Jacob Nelson drove in both of Pampa's runs. In the bottom of the 2nd, Blayne Troxell singled, stole 2nd went to 3rd on a sacrifice bunt by Tom Haley and then scored on a ground

out by Nelson. In the bottom of the 4th, Ryan Powell singled and stole second. Powell would eventually make it to third and would score an an infield single by Nelson. The infield consisting of Aaron Allen at third, Cade Engle and shortstop, Jacob Nelson at second and Blayne Troxell at first played solid defense all day.

The defensive play of the game went to Casey Martindale playing left field. In the top of the 5th and Pampa clinging to a 2-0 lead, Randall got the leadoff hitter at 2nd base and no outs. The runner stole 3rd and the throw went into left field. Martindale alertly backed up the throw and threw a perfect strike to Powell to nab the runner trying to get home. Powell also threw a runner out in the 4th inning trying to steal 3rd.

On Sunday, Pampa came out pounding the ball, scoring 5 runs in the first inning. Allen led off with a double to deep left center field on the first pitch of the game, Hunt walked, Powell singled, Troxell walked, and then Pampa tallied 3 consecutive singles by Nelson, Martindale and Thomas Haley.

Pampa added 2 runs in the second inning after Engle reached on an error, stole 2nd and 3rd and scored on a wild pitch. Powell singled, stole 2nd and scored on a throwing error.

In the 3rd, Pampa added more runs. Martindale singled. Chance Douglas pinch ran for Martindale and quickly stole 2nd. Douglas then scored on a double to right center field by Haley. Rhett Harden moved Haly to 3rd on a ground out to first and Haley scored on a perfectly executed squeeze play by Aaron Allen.

In the fifth, Pampa added 2 more runs when Nelson single, stole 2nd, took 3rd on a wild pitch and then scored on a balk, With one out, Haley singled and stole 2nd. He advanced to third on a ground out by Nathan Furgason. Haley would score the game ending run on another balk by the Seminole pitcher.

Ryan Powell pitched 5 solid innings for Pampa, giving up 1 run on only Powell struck 2 hits. out 3 and walked only 1. Pampa's defense stepped up to the challenge again and committed only 1 error. Nelson, playing 2nd base, had 7 chances and did not make an error. Allen playing 3rd made several good plays as well. Furgason made a nice running catch of line drive to center field.

# Storms do little to relieve drought

COLLEGE STATION needed rain and cooler temperatures to some parts of Texas.

However, the fronts left other drought-stricken areas - notably the southern half of the state -- high and dry, according to the National Weather Service http://water.weather.gov/.

Even where there was rain, substantial accumulations were spotty as of the morning of July 21. While some isolated areas received 3 inches or more, accumulations were less than 1 inch most everywhere else.

Record high temperatures as high as 108 degrees in the southern parts of the state - further stressed crops and livestock. For the Southwest and other regions, the summer of 2009 was shaping up to be the hottest, driest one on record, according to Texas AgriLife Extension Service

personnel. More information on drought in Texas can be found at the Web site of the Drought Joint Information Center at http://agrilife.

tamu.edu/drought/. The following summaries were compiled by AgriLife Extension district report-

Extreme CENTRAL: temperatures and no rainfall. Most all areas remained in need of precipitation. Stock tanks were rapidly drying up. Crop harvests were showing low yields. Producers were supplementing cattle.

COASTAL BEND: Extreme heat and lack of rain worsened drought conditions. Sorghum stubble was being baled for livestock. Cotton and soybean yield potential was low. Pastures were burned up from high temperatures. Most surface water impoundments were dry. Livestock herds were liquidated or heavily fed.

EAST: Though parts of the area received as much as 3 inches of rain, lack of moisture remained a major concern across the area. Burn bans remained in effect for much of the region. Trinity County reported drinking-water shortages were becoming a problem. Hay harvesting slowed drastically or stopped all together.

FAR WEST: Widely scattered rainfall was reported. Cotton did well under hot temperatures. daytime Producers continued to irrigate pecans and cotton. Some southwestern cotton rust was found, but fungi-

cide sprayings controlled Storm fronts brought much the disease, according to Texas AgriLife personnel. Most dryland cotton looked good after the last rain, but after hot, windy days it needed more rain to keep it growing. Haygrazer was completely planted and doing well. Pecan nut development was about 60 percent complete with little pest pressure reported. Growers completed their third cutting and baling of alfalfa. Chiles were in full bloom with fields showing

signs of heat stress. NORTH: Soil moisture ranged from adequate to short. Daytime temperatures hovered near 100 degrees for most of the reporting period. The hot weather was taking its toll on crops and pastures. Corn appeared to be way below average due to excess water during the growing season in May. Ears were not filling out in many areas, with many fields being harvested as silage.

The extreme heat hurt milk production at dairies. PANHANDLE: Soil moisture remained short in most areas. High temperatures and wind stressed crops, and most producers were applying full irrigation. Corn, cotton, peanuts and soybeans were reported in good condition and sorghum was reported as fair. Insect activity was light for July. Producers were controlling weeds with herbicides. Rangeland was drying out. Some producers were supplying protein blocks to cattle because of lack of rain, but livestock in general were doing well.

ROLLING PLAINS: Conditions remained extremely hot and dry with temperatures well above the century mark for most of the reporting period. Cotton looked good, and producers were spraying for insects and weeds. Hay was being cut. Grain sorghum was maturing. Record high temperatures took a toll on all vegetation. All plants were under severe stress. Pasture conditions nosedived because of temperatures from 105 to 108. Flies were abundant and continued to be a problem.

SOUTH: Extremely hot, dry and windy conditions continued for most of the reporting period. Temperatures above 100 degrees took a toll on rangeland and pastures. Livestock producers were heavily culling or liquidating their herds due to the high cost of hay and extremely dry stock tanks.




