

Report: Boeing to pay gov't \$2M to settle lawsuit

SAN ANTONIO (AP) -The Boeing Co. has agreed to pay \$2 million to the Justice Department to settle a whistle-blower's previously sealed claims that the company overbilled the government for work done at a plant in San

Antonio, a newspaper reported Tuesday.

The government joined in a 2006 lawsuit filed by former Boeing employee Edward Quintana, who claimed Boeing manipulated records to show others besides him

had been maintaining Air Force KC-135 tankers when they had not, the San Antonio Express-News reported. The lawsuit was kept secret while the Justice Department investigated Quintana's claims.

Pampan grateful to those who saved his life

On the first of August, Jason Rowell, was working on a stump in his backyard when he became faint.

"I got dizzy and passed out," Rowell

When he came to, he tried to call his wife who was going to run some errands, but passed out again.

"My chest was hurting," Rowell said. "My heart was racing."

He finally made it to the front yard and flagged his wife down as she pulled out the drive.

"She called 911," Rowell said, "and they showed up. I thought I was having a heart

The Pampa Fire Department was the first on the scene with Capt. Keith Arnzen, Engine Operator Jim Sirmans and Fire Fighter Kasey Presson.

"They tried to get my heart rate down," Rowell said. "Everything they tried, they couldn't get it to come down."

When the Guardian Ambulance Service showed up, Bryan Johnson and Alan Price, also tried to get his heart rate down (Johnson is also a Pampa firefighter).

"They loaded me up with some drugs," Rowell said, "and tried to get my heart rate to come down."

Nothing worked. Rowell's heart was beating 256 times



Eunice Kennedy Shriver dies at 88

President John F. Kennedy's sister, Eunice Kennedy Shriver, who carried on the family's public service tradition by founding the Special Olympics and championing the rights of the mentally disabled, died early Tuesday surrounded by relatives at a Hyannis hospital. She was

Shriver had suffered a series of strokes in recent years and died at Cape Cod Hospital, her family said in a statement. Her husband, her five children and all 19 of her grandchildren were by her side, the statement said.

"She was the light of our lives, a mother, wife, grandmother, sister and aunt who taught us by example and with passion what it means to live a faith-driven life of love and service to others," the family said.

The hospital is near the Kennedy family compound, where her sole surviving brother, Sen. Edward Kennedy, has been battling a brain tumor.

Sen. Kennedy said his earliest memory of his sister was as a young girl "with great humor, sharp wit, and a boundless passion to make a difference."

"She understood deeply the lesson our mother and father taught us - much is expected of those to whom much has been given," he said in a statement. "Throughout her extraordinary life, she touched the lives of millions, and for Eunice that was never enough."

President Barack Obama said Shriver will be remembered as "as a champion for people with intellectual disabilities, and as an extraordinary woman who, as much as anyone, taught our nation - and our world - that no physical or mental barrier can restrain the power of the human spirit.'

As celebrity, social worker and activist, Shriver was credited with transforming America's view of the mentally disabled from institutionalized patients to friends, neighbors and athletes. Her efforts were inspired in part by the struggles of her mentally disabled sister, Rosemary.

"We have always been honored to share our mother with people of good will the world over who believe, as she did, that there is no limit to the human spirit," her family said in the statement.

The Waterloo, Iowa, police helped the young man, who was disoriented, dehydrated and exhausted.

Waterloo police contacted Joiner and her husband and they flew to Iowa late

Wednesday. The Iowa police treated Josh well, his mother said, giving him food and hotel

room. However, she said the officers found Mulkey's story "outlandish."

"So do we," she said. "We never thought anything like this could happen in Pampa. I think of all the people who walk in the morning in our neighborhood, it could have been anyone."

She said Waterloo detectives grilled Mulkey and he understood that they were trying to help. But nothing about the abduction makes sense to the family.

"We know he's not involved with drugs," Joiner said. "But we realize the police have to check out everything. They went through his computer. There was nothing even slightly out of the ordicont. from page 1

"I told Chief Powell that these guys need to be recognized for what they did," Rowell said.


Rowell is at home recuperating now, he said. This week, he'll go back to the hospital Wednesday for a follow up examination.



But, pay attention because the times are changing. At some point everyone gets tired of being taken for granted and for the middle class the time has arrived. We get it now. The politicians just aren't that into us and are only going to call when they need something before they head back to the deep pockets they truly

That's okay because we can take care of ourselves and just you wait and see. The strength of America was never at the top. It's always been with the average American voter who gets up and goes to work, shows up at school night and takes care of their elderly parents. Finally, they're catching on to that too and are organizing everywhere to come up with their own agenda. It's as if we've finally kicked the freeloaders out of the basement.



Pampa led by as many as eight, before winning by 10. Coach Polasek said she was pleased with the way her middles played.


"They were strong in hitting," Polasek said. The ninth grade coach said they need to work on a little bit of everything.

2009 Property Tax Rates in City of Pampa

This notice concerns 2009 property tax rates for City of Pampa. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. 
