

City to lower property tax rate

If your property taxes go up this year, don't blame the city.

The City of Pampa Commission voted to approve a tax rate about four cents lower per \$100 of property valuation than the current rate during their regular meeting

Tuesday evening.

The tax rate approved for the 2009-10 fiscal year is \$0.62693, a drop from the current approximately \$0.665 rate.

The first public hearing on the tax rate is scheduled for a special commission meeting to be held at 5 p.m. September 1 in the commission chamber in city hall.

The second and final public hearing on the tax rate will be held during a September 8 commission meeting, beginning at 4 p.m.

Commissioners also set a schedule to tackle the budget process for the coming fiscal year.

Their first workshop will be held at 3 p.m., right before the regular August 25 meeting.

A public hearing and first reading of the budget will be conducted during the September 1 meeting.

The final reading of the 2009-1020 budget will occur during a special meeting at 11:45 a.m. Friday September 18.

At that same meeting a first reading of the resolution to set the property tax will be heard.

Court says condemned killer may drop appeals

HOUSTON (AP) — A federal appeals court Wednesday granted a condemned Texas inmate's request to drop his appeals and move forward with his execution for the slaying of an 84-year-old East Texas woman more than nine years ago.


Danielle Simpson, 29, told the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals he's tired of being locked up and wants to die.

The court agreed to dismiss his appeals after a competency hearing, his attorney's sentiment that Simpson is sincere and a handwritten note to the court expressing Simpson's wishes.

The decision from the New Orleansbased appeals court clears the way for his trial court in Anderson County to set an execution date.

crash that killed four I exas man charged

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -A man has been charged with intoxication manslaughter in a wrong-way collision near Jonah that killed four people and injured two others.

Luke Anthony Looschen, 48, of Georgetown, was charged Tuesday with three counts of intoxication manslaughter in the deaths

of Pete Mendez, 44, Paula Martinez, 38, and Crystal Martinez, 16. A fourth person, Stephanie Valadez, 24, died Wednesday.

Looschen also was charged with three counts of intoxication assault. Department of Public

Safety spokesman Tom Vinger said Looschen was driving a pickup the

wrong way on Texas 29 on Monday night when he collided with a Jeep and a van carrying seven people. All the people who died were in the van.

Two young children who were in the van -3-year-old Tristan Valadez and 6-month-old Jacob Valadez - were taken to Scott & White hospital in

stable condition Monday. Vinger said he did not have an update on their conditions Wednesday.

According to an arrest affidavit, Looschen told an officer he had been drinking and had taken the painkiller hydrocodone, as well as antidepressants.

"There was evidence at the scene, within the

vehicle, as well as additional evidence that leads us to believe that (Looschen) was intoxicated," Department of Public Safety spokesman Tom Vinger told the Austin American-Statesman. Blood test results were pending, Vinger said.



MORGAN'S POINT RESORT, smoke inhalation. Texas (AP) - A Central Texas firefighter escaped serious injury when he was struck by ammunition that exploded during a house fire.

Investigators searched for the cause of Thursday's fire at Morgan's Point Resort, in Bell County.

Morgan's Point Resort Fire Chief Bill Richards says one woman from the home was treated at the scene for

Richards told KWTX-TV that ammunition stored inside the structure started to discharge during the blaze. Richards says a firefighter, wearing heavy gear, was hit in the chest by a bullet, but avoided serious injury.

One killed in plane accident

POTEAU, Okla. (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration says one person has been killed in an accident involving an ultralight plane at the Poteau airport.

The victim's name has not been

FAA spokesman Roland Herwig says it's believed the accident occurred as the Pegasus Quantum 15 aircraft was being moved into a hangar.

He says the plane is registered to

Ronald Lynn Boyd of Humble, Texas. Oklahoma Highway Patrol Capt. Chris West says the accident occurred about 9 a.m. Thursday.

Herwig says because it appears there was no intent to fly the plane, Poteau police will handle the investigation while the FAA will monitor the infor-

Appeals

Simpson was sentenced to die for the murder of Geraldine Davidson, a former Palestine school teacher and church organist who was abducted from her home during a burglary in January 2000. She was driven around in the trunk of her car, beaten, wrapped with duct tape, had cinder blocks tied to her ankles and then dumped into the Neches River.

A passing motorist spotted her body floating in the river about 100 miles southeast of Dallas.

A year ago, the 5th Circuit sent Simpson's case to a lower court to examine whether he was mentally impaired and ineligible for execution under Supreme Court rulings. Earlier this year, Simpson wrote the appeals court a handwritten motion in which he said he was "tired of being in a institution that's unjust, degrading, and corrupted."

The court said he wrote: "Whereas on the other hand, I'm tired of struggling to survive in a system that's highly injustices. 'I'm ready to die'!! If I can't be free - 'Kill Me'.!!"

The "Kill Me" phrase was underlined twice.

A federal district judge found Simpson suffered from "a mental disease, disorder or defect" but was able to appreciate and understand his legal position and competent to make his choice to die.

Then last month, Simpson sent another handwritten note to the court.

sentence under adult parole supervision.

Testimony December 2000 tria showed Simpson had burglarized Davidson's home at least two other times. The burglars were in her house when Davidson returned home. She was robbed or money from her purse, tied and taped, had a pillow case placed over her head then was carried outside and thrown in the trunk of her car. They drove around with the bound woman for much of the day, bough marijuana, had lunch and occasionally stopped to show friends their captive.

Evidence also showed Simpson had a history of violence and gang membership and was on probation at the time of the killing after pleading guilty in 1999 to a charge of indecency with a child.

"I'm impressed with Casey," Martindale said. "He's a great writer. He's a really good guitar player."

Martindale, a Pampa native, also plays with the Texas Blues Renegades and with Lonesome Goat.

Highlights in history on this date:

1521 - Spaniard Hernan Cortes captures Tenochtitlan, completing the defeat of the Aztec

Years after President rorists as the White House saw fit.

There is built-in tension here before the president picks any of the nation's 93 U.S. attorneys. Job seekers in any administration can expect some variation of the questions, "What have you done to help elect the Did Bush political adviser president?" and "Do you have anything in your past so his friend could get the that could embarrass the job? Did the White House president?"

On paper, a U.S. attorney has wide authority as the senior federal law enforcement official in his district. In reality, he gets his priorities from the attorney general and the White House. If the administration's priorities are terrorists, guns and gangs, the new U.S. attorney may shut down investigations into environmental crimes, corruption or computer fraud.

At its heart, that's a political decision. If the president promises to stop violent crime but a U.S. attorney is instead getting tough on polluters, the White House is going to notice.

In the run-up to the 2006 firing of New Mexico U.S. Attorney David Iglesias, the head of the state's Republican Party e-mailed the White House, complaining that Iglesias was soft on voter fraud. He asked that Iglesias be replaced so the state could "make some real progress in cleaning up a state notorious for crooked elections."

The Bush administration took the complaint to heart. In a June 2005

fight communists and ter- e-mail, White House adviser Scott Jennings said the New Mexico congressional delegation was also frustrated over the lack of voter fraud cases. He urged that

Iglesias be fired. 'Iglesias has done nothing. We are getting killed out there," Jennings wrote to Rove's deputy.

Comments like this are

what the controversy is really about. The firing only matters if it offers insight into whether the White House wanted Iglesias to take out its political opponents. Federal prosecutor Nora Dannehy is investigating that question, and House Judiciary Committee Chairman John Conyers, a Michigan Democrat, says he gave her all the documents the panel collected.

The relationship between attorneys Washington is not a simple matter.

A president who worries that voters think he's soft on crime might want a gang crackdown. The attorney general might demand more gun cases. Maybe the U.S. attorney in a high-crime swing state gets an ultimatum.

Political? Definitely. But not unheard of.

But what if the president tells the attorney general to spike a case against a major donor? To investigate a potential rival? This is the road toward the Watergate scandal and President Richard Nixon's resignation.

Republicans do not want to talk about what the U.S. attorney fir-

ings might reveal about political motives. Justice Department investigators have already concluded that Bush appointees improperly let politics influence decision-making. Focusing the congressional investigation and the public debate on political warfare would only underscore that finding.

Republicans want this to be about the firing of a few prosecutors. They say the president has that authority. Period.

Democrats are being disingenuous, too. They pretend the Justice Department is an independent body, that the Bush administration was the first to bring politics into the halls of Justice.


They ignore the fact that the department receives letters from Congress every day asking for investigations into situations that constituents or political allies are worked up about. They gloss over the fact that one of the perks of the Senate is being able to influence who gets picked as U.S. attorney, since the Senate confirms the president's nominees.

And they forget that the White House may never have had a closer ally in the Justice Department than when Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy Jr. was his brother's most trusted adviser.

There's a long history of politics in the Justice Department. The question is where the line gets drawn, and whether it's been crossed.



Pampa six-year-old in mutton bustin' finals

A six-year-old from Pampa qualifies for the Youth Bull Riding finals in mutton busting and dreams

of being a bull rider. Parker Ailport son of Kandice Ailport, started mutton busting in 2007, when he was four.

"He saw it at the Pampa Rodeo and said he wanted to do it," Kandice Ailport said.

According to the First Coast News web site, mutton busting is where a sheep is caught and held. A child is put on the sheep in riding position and the sheep is let go to knock the child off. The object for the rider is to stay on the sheep the longest.

Parker Ailport rides in two rodeo associations, the Out West Junior Bull

Riders (OWJBR) and the Junior Rodeo Cowboy Association (JRCA). The OWJBR is based out of Elk City, Oklahoma.

Parker Ailport qualified for regionals and was first with an 80 percent ride average.

Kandice Ailport said they are very proud of their son's accomplishments.

"He's worked very hard," Ailport said. Ailport said Parker finished first at year's end

with the JRCA. Ailport's son will compete in the finals in August 2010 in Fort Worth.

Parker will also be competing in the Texas Junior Bull Riding Association Invitational in Seminole, Texas. to qualify for the National Junior Bull Riding Association Finals in Shawnee, Oklahoma, in

November.

Ailport said her son told her that he wants to ride bulls in college and ride bulls in the professional bull riders association. Parker's mom also said her son has a couple of rodeo heroes: Mike White, the 1999 PRCA World Champion in bull riding, Kody Lostroh, a U.S. Border invitational winner. Ailport said another hero of his is retired bull rider Cody Custer.

"We rodeo with his kids," Ailport said. "So he (Parker) gets to met him (Custer) all the time."

Ailport said Parker is already looking forward to next year.

"He starts riding calves with one association and can't wait to move up faster," Ailport said.

Hunter's pitching helps Rangers defeat Indians 5-0

 Tommy Hunter had complete confidence in his pitches and the Texas Rangers' scouting report.

The rookie right-hander turned the shutout tables on the Cleveland Indians by pitching into the eighth inning to lead Texas to a 5-0 victory Wednesday night.

Hunter (5-2) faced Cleveland for the first time, but said he was well prepared and just followed

the game plan. "They gave me a sheet of paper that said they didn't hit off-speed stuff that well, so we went with that," said Hunter, who gave up six hits and struck out five without a walk over a career-high 7 2-3 innings. "Then we attacked with the fastball when we got behind in the count. It was all about preparation. I just tried to do what I was

told." Josh Hamilton had three hits and drove in two runs for Texas, which remained 11/2 games behind Boston in the AL wild card. The Rangers bounced back from a 5-0 loss to Cleveland on Tuesday with their league-leading eighth

shutout. "Tommy was tough," Texas manager Ron Washington said. "He had everything going, a good changeup, fastball, and was spotting it."

Hunter shut down a Cleveland offense that hit

.304 while averaging 6.4 runs in winning 12 of its previous 17 games, but was shut out for the fifth time this season. The righthander has allowed three runs or fewer in eight of his nine starts. Since July 3, the 23-year-old is 5-1 with a 1.84 ERA in seven starts.

"I was very impressed by him," Indians manag-er Eric Wedge said. "He threw his fastball where he wanted. Early in the game he was utilizing his breaking ball and then he mixed in his changeup later.

C.J. Wilson came on in the eighth after Grady Sizemore singled for his third hit and went to second as right fielder Hamilton bobbled the ball for an error. The lefthander struck out Asdrubal Cabrera to end the inning, then worked a perfect ninth, striking out two

"Hunter threw everything but the kitchen sink to Sizemore," Washington

Hunter said he took that at-bat as a challenge since Sizemore had already singled twice.

"I wanted that out," Hunter said. "That's the first time since I've been up here that I've used four pitches in one at-bat. I threw four quality pitches. He fought one off and got another hit. That's why he's a great hitter."

Carmona allowed two runs and five hits over six innings. He dropped to 0-4 in four home starts against Texas. The right-hander has a 2.65 ERA in three no-decisions since being recalled from the minors on July 31. A 19-game winner in 2007, he went 1-2 with an 11.57 ERA in five previous outings before being

sent down June 5. "I'm not feeling any frustration," Carmona said. "I want to win, but I'm happy with the way I'm pitching. I'm keeping my team in the game. I'm giving us a chance to win."


Texans LB Cushing injured, won't play against Kansas City



Rap video lands Taft police, city mgr in trouble

TAFT, Texas (AP) A rap video shot in a Southeast Texas town has led to the threatened firing of two police officers and disciplining of the city manager.

Taft Police Chief Paul Rivera has recommend two officers be terminated for their alleged help with production of the video, featured on YouTube, about "Swangn."

The profanity-laced video shows adults and some children dancing, shots of vehicles winding down streets, landmarks like the water tower and a police car. An officer is shown shaking his head.

The Taft City Council on Tuesday voted to issue a written reprimand to City Manager Flo Sauceda for giving permission for the video shoot.

they have to suffer embarrassment. A friend with two sons




directed individuals. --MANHATTAN, KAN., **TEACHER**






