

A 4-H member for nine years, Greg received the District Gold Star Boy Award, the Danforth "I Dare You" Award and the beef showmanship award. He also served as state junior leader for swine production, delegate to both the district and county 4-H councils and president of the county and local 4-H clubs. Greg participated on rifle and live-

Greg, who plans to maior in animal science at Texas A & M University, was one of 50 recipients of Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarships presented at the state 4-H Roundup.

The Show, which will also present 50 four-year, \$6000 scholarships to FFA members during their state convention in July, is the largest donor of agricultural scholarships in the United States. During the coming school year, the Show will have 445 students on scholarships in Texas colleges and univer-

sities, at a commitment of \$2.45 million.

The winners, carefully selected from hundreds of applicants, are the best in the state from the standpoints of academics and leadership. The only requirements made of the students are that they major in some form of agriculture at a college or university within the con-

Gasohol Bill Killed

The fillibuster, threatened by Houston Sen. Jack Ogg came as a surprise to supporters of House Bill 24. The filibuster killed the measure on the final day of

the session Monday. Hereford Senator Bill Sarpalius succeeded in bringing the gasohol measure to the floor but Ogg's threat of a filibuster persuaded senators to postpone consideration of the bill to an unspecified time.

Sponsored by Sarpalius and Rep. Dan Kubiak, the bill would exempt alcohol fuels from the 5 cent per gallon gasoline tax until 1987. After that time, the tax would be reimposed at the rate of 1 cent per year until fully restored in 1991.

The bill had received continuous positive support during the legislative session. The bill had passed the House with a vote of 134-5 and the Senate had tentatively approved the bill on Sunday.

would create a new industry in Texas which would bring more money into the state to replace the taxes that would be lost. The estimated loss in state revenue resulting from the bill would have been \$16 million for the 1982-83 bieni-

"We had it won....they just beat us on a technicality," said Guy Austin, president of the Board of Directors of the High Plains GPI Coop. Austin and others have worked hard for the passage of this bill and are currently soliciting support to get Governor Clements to put this

bill in his special session. The High Plains GPI Coop is currently trying to secure financing to build a 35 million gallon yearly capacity alcohol plant in this area. The alcohol would be 200 proof.

"We will have to start all over again," said Austin, "but he (Clements) is for it and we hope to get it in. If we don't get it passed this time we may never get it passed," he

Austin is not sure what kind of effect this bill's failure to pass will have on the planned gasohol plant but he does know it will not be beneficial.

Austin is seeking help from groups or individuals who will express their support through letters to the Governor's office.

The letters should be sent to Jim Kaster, c/o Governor's Office, State Capital, Austin, Tx. 78711. Austin is sending a letter in behalf of the Coop stating: "We feel that HB 24 should be read in the Governor's special legislative session. HB 24 passed the House and it had the votes to pass the Senate. The efforts of two Senators who took the opportunity to filibuster, stopped the passage of HB 24. We feel that this was unreasonable as the bill had the votes to

Lamb County Agent, John Farris, reported that the "overall outlook is good. We have received some hail damage north of Earth towards the Sunnyside area which will affect 5 to 10 thousand acres of irrigated crops. Some of these farmers will go back

in and replant and some may be able to salvage some of their crop," Farris

Expressing the concern for corn crop in this area, Farris stated, "Some of the corn has been set back a week to 10 days and approximately 15 to 20 percent will be replanted. Wheat in the hail area will suffer a 20 to 30 percent reduction in yield."

Parts of the Lamb County area received as much as 3 inches of rain with some wind and sand damage towards the western parts of the county.

In assessing the outlook for Lamb County, Farris said, "Compared to this time last year we have better crops on the ground

and growing, as well as better sub-soil moisture. There are some spotted areas in the dryland parts of the county that still need rain badly, but overall, the conditions are definately more favorable this year."







Dear editor:

Even if a problem has an easy solution, politicians will roll up their sleeves and make it a hard one. I think it's one wya they have fun.

Take re-districting. Because people won't stay in one place, are always moving to some place else where they're no better off either, voting districts get out of balance and have to be reshaped. You can't have one Congressman representing a million people and another a few

thousand, although with Senators it's excusable.

So when new census figures come out politicians begin scrambling to redraw district lines, trying to snake them around in odd shapes to include voters they think are on their side. They stay up all night trying to figure it out.

There's a simplier method. Say you want 500,000 people per district. Divide that into the total population of some 220,000,000 or so people in the country and you get the number of Congressmen needed, around 400, give or take a few, which in some cases wouldn't be noticed any-

Now figure up the number of square acres in the United States, divide that by 400 or so Congressmen, and the result is the number of acres per Congressional district. Every Congressman then has the same number of acres.

But, you'll say, number of people per square acre in some places






