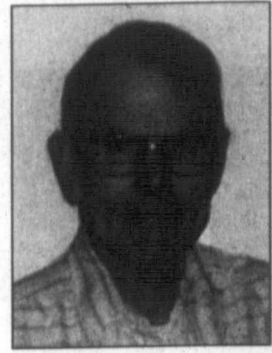
University in Wichita Falls.

Southwest faces Tuesday deadline from FAA

DALLAS (AP) — Southwest Airlines Co. faces a deadline of Tuesday for settling a dispute with regulators over the use of unapproved parts on more than 80 planes.

Southwest says it has replaced the unapproved parts in more than 25 planes but needs more time to find parts for the remaining jets. Without an extension, the Federal Aviation Administration could force the airline to ground some planes.

The airline said Monday it wants more time to continue replacing parts without disrupting service for customers.

FAA officials said the unapproved parts — designed to push hot engine exhaust away from the wings — didn't pose an immediate safety hazard. On Aug. 22, they gave Southwest 10 days to fix the problem.

Southwest originally said the parts were installed on 46 planes, but spokeswoman Beth Harbin said Monday further checking boosted the number to 82 planes.

"Southwest did an exhaustive audit of the vendor, and are comfortable we've found all the parts at issue," she said.

Harbin called the parts

"perfectly safe" but acknowledged they were made by a subcontractor who wasn't approved for the work by the FAA. The subcontractor was hired by a maintenance company hired by Southwest. Neither the maintenance company nor the subcontractor have been publicly identified.

Southwest has more than 500 planes. If the FAA forced Southwest to idle all the planes that still have the unapproved parts, that could be nearly 10 percent of its fleet of Boeing 737 aircraft.

Bell, security guards union reach contract deal

Bell, security guards union reach contract deal

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Bell Helicopter has reached a new contract with the union representing security guards and firefighters at its Dallas-Fort Worth-area plants.

Bell says members of the Security, Police and Fire Professionals of America Local 256 ratified the

three-year contract Sunday. The union represents about 60 workers at Bell's DFW plants.

The deal was the fourth and last labor contract Bell negotiated this year. The others that went smoothly were with unions representing office workers and engineering workers.

That wasn't the case for a union representing 2,500

manufacturing workers, which went on strike for nearly six weeks. United Auto Workers Local 218 members finally ratified a four-year contract in July after several failed talks with Bell.

Fort Worth-based Bell Helicopter is a wholly owned subsidiary of Textron Inc.

Rescued

The crew of a sport fishing boat spotted the men waving their white T-shirts near Port Aransas and rescued them Saturday. The three were reported missing Aug. 22 after they left Matagorda, about 90 miles southwest of Houston, on a fishing trip and never returned. Port Aransas is about 130 miles from Matagorda.

The three were asleep that Friday night and were awakened by water coming in the boat, Hawkins said.

"Once we were awake and saw what happened, it flipped over in one minute," Phillips told the Chronicle. "Then us country boys went into survival mode. That's all we could do."

The men rationed their salvaged bubble gum, crackers, beer and chips, and used a hose to suck fresh water out of the internal "washdown" tank. Fishermen often keep such

a tank to wash fish slime off their boat when they are out in the salt water.

"We'd eat crackers one day, and then a handful of chips," Phillips said. "Everything tasted like gasoline and saltwater."

Hall and Haskins both said they saw U.S. Coast Guard helicopters and rescue planes fly over. The Coast Guard, which gave up the search after the men had been missing a week, never saw them.

Phillips said the roughest time was during the heat of the day, when they would try to endure the sun's rays and keep up their spirits. The men also started seeing things.

"About the fourth or fifth day we started hallucinating about people dropping off food and water," Phillips said. "And we were talking to them, but they weren't there," Phillips said.

One thing the men saw

that wasn't a hallucination was sharks.

"We had a bunch of black-tipped sharks schooling up under the boat," Phillips said. "One of them jumped across the back of the boat."

Finally, they were spotted by Eddie Yaklin, a Corpus Christi car dealer who was fishing on his 75-foot yacht. Yaklin told NBC the boat went right past the men while heading to a nearby oil rig to fish. But then after about an hour he spotted them. They were atop their boat when Yaklin arrived.

Hawkins said he initially wondered if his rescuers were another figment of his imagination.

"My first reaction was, 'Is this really real?' You just have to kind of sit back and say is this real or hallucination," he said. "You have to wake yourself up three or four times to make sure it is real."

King

by a relative in a rural Pineville, Mo., home on Sept. 30, 2005 — the same day authorities in the Texas panhandle discovered the bodies in the Conrads' home.

Missouri authorities said King left the state in Orle McCool's Dodge pickup truck, driving south and then west on Interstate 40 before coming upon the Conrads' home about 10 miles north of I-40.

King was caught the same night trying to re-enter the United States at the Mexican border in El Paso, Texas. Prosecutors and law enforcement haven't said what may have prompted the attacks.

When he was arrested, authorities found in his truck four loaded weapons, several with rounds in the chambers. One of the weapons was a .38 caliber handgun taken from the

McCool's home, authorities said.

Investigators have said they also found a name tag bearing Brian Conrad's name in the vehicle.

Nanci Gonder, a spokeswoman for the attorney general's office in Missouri, said if King is acquitted in Texas he will be returned to Missouri to serve his two consecutive life sentences.

Tornado hits coast

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — A tornado left at least three people hurt in Galveston.

The damage was being surveyed Monday.

National Weather Service meteorologist Charles Roeseler says a water spout that formed Sunday night became a tornado when it reached land.

Galveston Police Chief Charles Wiley says two officers were treated for minor cuts after the windows on their patrol cars were blown out.

CenterPoint Energy spokesman Keith Gray says electricity was knocked out to about 4,000 customers, but most power was restored by early Monday.

The blaze was only about 5 percent contained late Sunday and had scorched 71 square miles (184 square kilometers) in the Angeles National Forest. Mandatory evacuations were in effect for neighborhoods in Glendale, Pasadena and other smoke-choked cities and towns north of Los Angeles. At least 18 homes were destroyed in the fire and firefighters expected to find many more, authorities said.

"Our neighbors sent us photos of all the other houses that are lost," said Beth Halaas, who lost her house in Big Tujunga Canyon, one of the many communities under mandatory evacuation. "We've heard as many as 30 houses burned."

On Mount Wilson, crews cleared brush and sprayed retardant in an attempt to ward off flames approaching the transmitters of more than 20 television stations, many radio stations and cell phone providers, U.S. Forest Service Capt. Mike Dietrich said.

Television stations said if the antennas burn broadcast signals would be affected but satellite and cable transmissions would not be.

Two giant telescopes and several multimillion-dollar university programs are housed in the century-old Mount Wilson Observatory. The complex of buildings is both a historic landmark and a

thriving modern center for astronomy.

The fire has been growing steadily, doubling in size on Sunday. Dietrich said it was possible it would double in size yet again over the next few days.

A slight dip in temperatures was expected Monday, but temperatures in the 90s F (30s C) and low humidity would remain the norm.

The fire was the largest of many burning up and down California, including a blaze northeast of

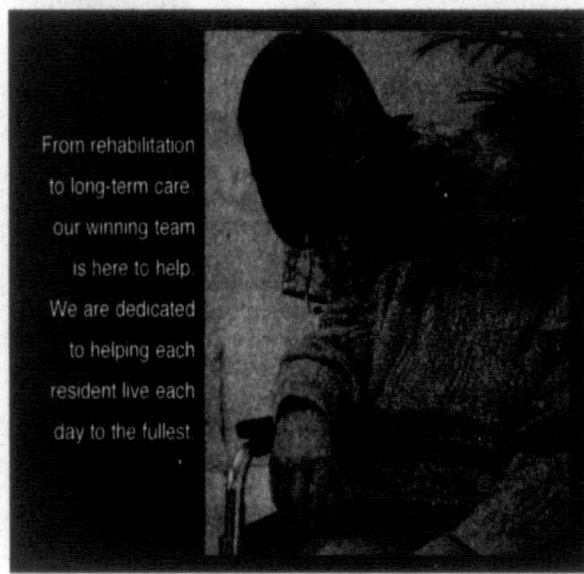
Sacramento that destroyed 60 structures, many of them homes in the town of Auburn. The fire had wiped out an entire cul-de-sac, leaving only smoldering ruins, a handful of chimneys and burnt cars.

The fire had blackened 275 acres (110 hectares) amid high winds and was 50 percent contained Sunday night, CalFire spokesman Daniel Berlant. The governor declared a state of emergency in the Sierra foothills area because of the fire, which began Sunday afternoon.

Corse said her girls played excellent both matches and stepped up.

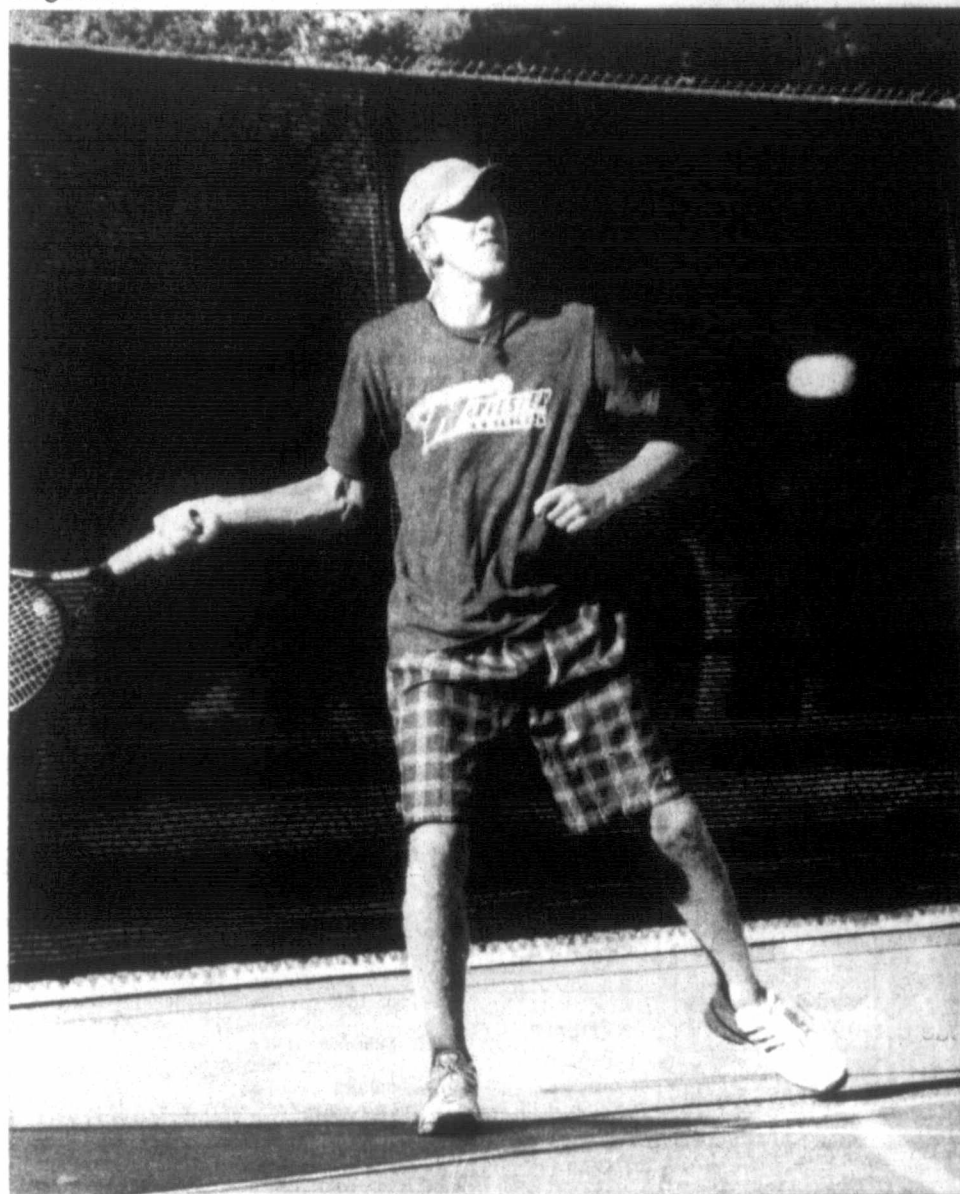
"We had three girls go

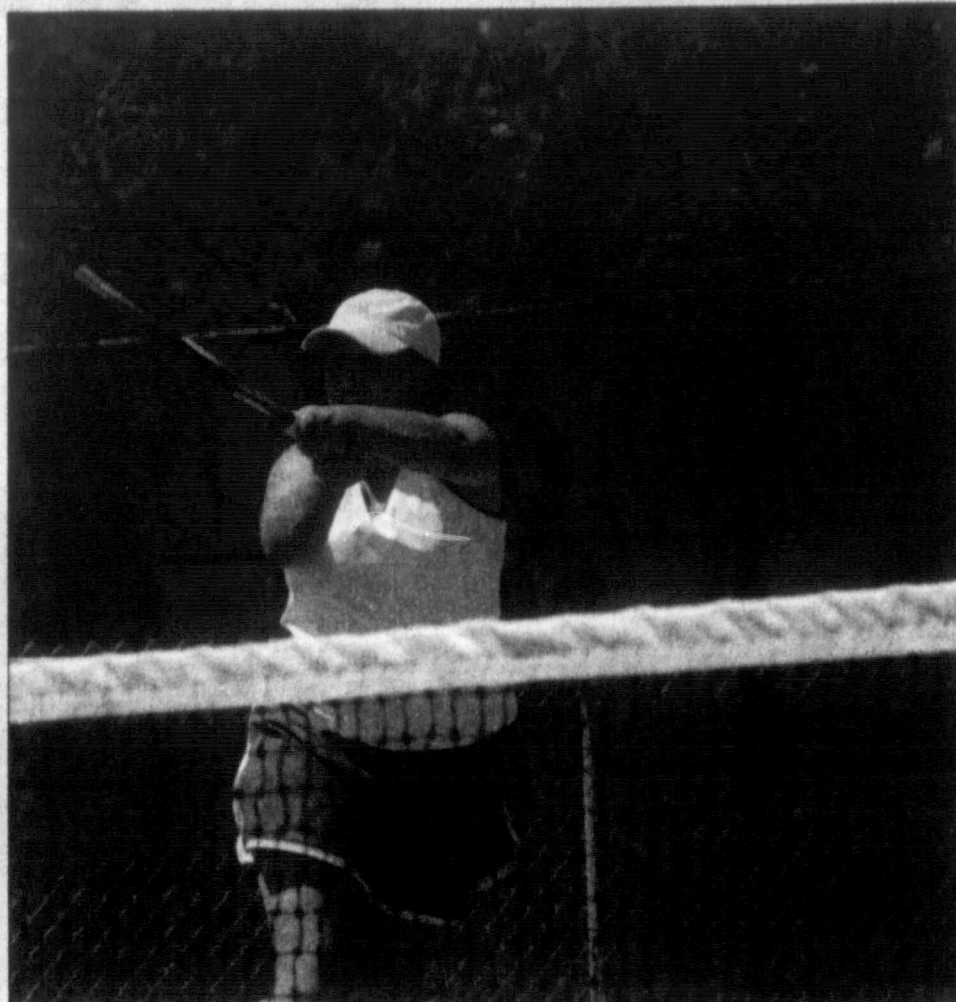

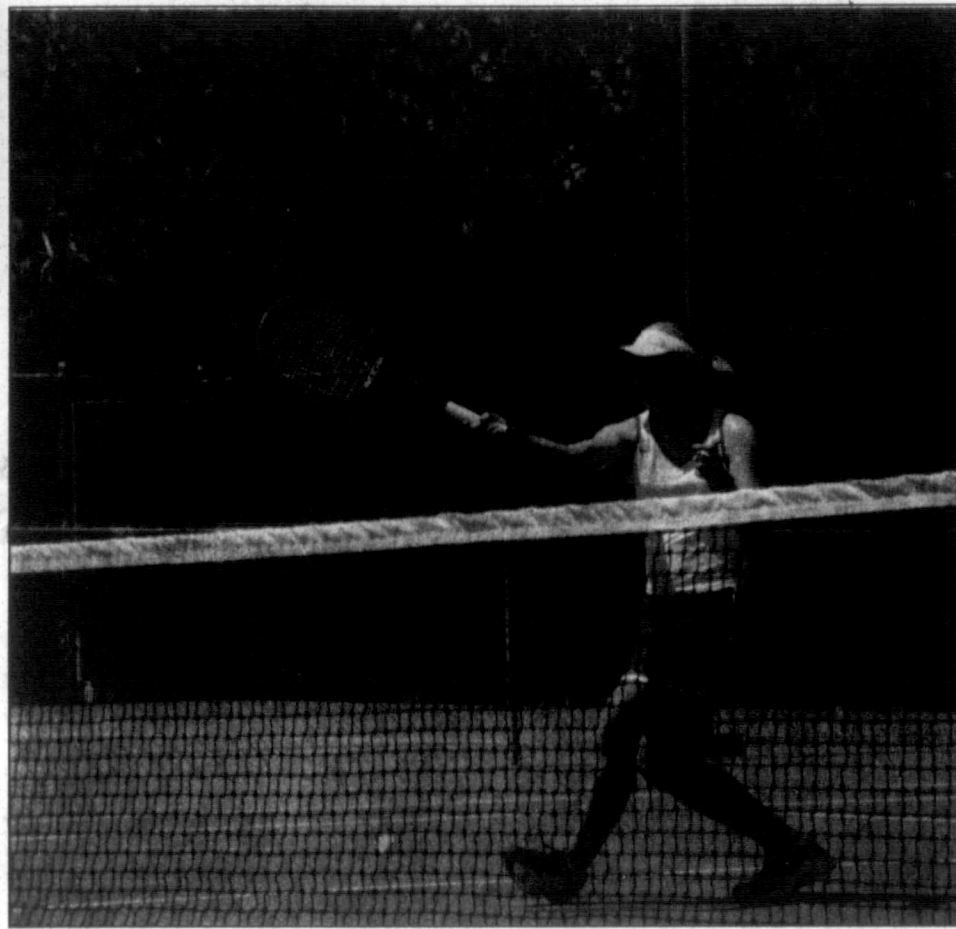

Minnesota closer Joe Nathan then made a throwing error in the ninth that loaded the bases with no outs, but he escaped without allowing a run.

Trailing 3-2 in the eighth,

the Twins used a walk, three singles, a squeeze bunt and an error to go ahead.

"We kind of knick-knocked them a little bit," Twins manager Ron Gardenhire said. "A lot of good things happened."

Brendan Harris' RBI single off C.J. Wilson (4-6) tied the game and when Nelson Cruz mishandled the ball in left field, it put runners on second and third.

Gomez, running for Jason Kubel, was set to go on contact with Mike Redmond at the plate. Redmond grounded to

"I was going to make contact no matter what, Redmond said. "I was just trying to get it on the ground and Go-Go had a great jump. ... I think we put some pressure on them at the end of the game and it worked out for us."
