King trial delayed, DNA results not in Attorneys for Levi King, 26, had Steven Emmert.

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — A judge on Monday delayed the trial of a Missouri man charged with murdering a pregnant woman, her husband and son at a Texas Panhandle farmhouse in 2005, pending the arrival of DNA test results.

asked that the trial be delayed, saying they couldn't proceed without the test results. It's unclear what the DNA tests involved.

Prosecutor Lynn Switzer and one of King's defense attorneys, Joe Mar Wilson, declined to comment on the ruling, citing a gag order put in place by State District Judge

Emmert said after the hearing that he, too, could not elaborate on the details of the case. He did not set a date to begin the trial.

Prosecutors are seeking the death penalty for King in the deaths of 35-year-old Michell Conrad, her 31-year-old husband Brian Conrad and her son on Sept. 30, 2005. If

convicted and sentenced to death, the Texas punishment would take precedence under an agreement with Missouri.

King pleaded guilty last year in the shooting deaths of Orlie McCool, 70, and his 47-year-old daughter-in-law, Dawn McCool. KING cont. on page 3

"One woman said this morning that her husband had been off for four months because of struggles. And she was about to have surgery herself," Highland Park Baptist pastor said. "So they were wanting to make advance preparations for lower income, as far as both of them being off work."

Nachtigall said this is something that people need, and not just ones who have lower income.

Southwest Airlines reduces flights on total of 92 routes

DALLAS (AP) — Southwest Airlines will temporarily halt flights on three routes early next year as it deals with a decline in air traffic and tries to bend its

schedule to fit seasonal demand. The airline published a new schedule Tuesday that covers flights from next Jan. 9 to March

per day on 92 routes and increase service on 42 routes, usually by one trip per day as well. Southwest also will suspend

service between Albuquerque,

The airline will cut one flight

N.M., and Portland, Ore.; and between Manchester, N.H., and Phoenix, with flights resuming in February. Flights between Kansas City, Mo., and Seattle will stop in January and resume in May, according to the airline.

Chief scheduler Bill Owen said Southwest is adjusting for seasonal travel patterns — the Pacific Northwest routes are stronger in summer, he said and bolstering service in cities where Southwest has recently started service.

Drought in central Texas is taking heavy toll on trees

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Experts blame the lingering Texas drought for an increasing number of dead trees.

Trees throughout Central Texas, including native species such as live oak and hackberry, have succumbed to drought and intense summer heat, arborists and foresters said.

"I have not seen it to this extent in my lifetime," said Jim Houser of the Texas Forest Service. "We're even seeing cedars (Ashe junipers) dying. They can exist on sunbaked, rocky plantscapes. And we're seeing them die all over the place."

Hundreds of the city's estimated 300,000 trees have died this summer, said Walter Passmore, urban forester for Austin.

The Austin American-Statesman reported Tuesday that the city this month plans to cut down nearly 50 trees in Zilker Park that were determined to have been killed by drought.

Dead trees on city property are cut down and turned into mulch, Passmore said. Trees on private property in urban areas are typically cut down so that they don't fall down and cause damage.





Report: Texas has highest rate of repeat teen births

DALLAS (AP) — A new report says that Texas has the highest rate of repeat teen births of any state at 23 percent.

Child Trends, a nonpartisan national research group, said in its report that among 73 major U.S. cities in 2006, the latest year for which city-level data are available, Dallas had the highest repeat percentage of repeat teen birth at 28 percent.

Houston lead U.S. cities in girls under 15 giving

Among seven metro areas, Arlington had the



lowest rate repeat teen birth rate at 19 percent, while Fort Worth's 25-percent rate was in a tie nationally for seventh-highest. Also making the list were San Antonio with 26 percent, and Houston and Austin, both with repeat teen birth rates of 24 percent.





American to cut 921 flight attendants jobs

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - American Airlines is cutting 921 flight attendant jobs as it deals with a downturn in traffic and lower revenue. The airline said Tuesday that the cuts will take effect Oct. 1.

American, the nation's second-largest airline, says 228 employees will be furloughed - laid off but with rehiring rights — and the company put 244 more on leave for two months. Another 449 took voluntary options such as leave.

The company says it planned to cut 1,200 flight attendant jobs but was able to reduce the number by adjusting staffing requirements for the winter.

Nanci Gonder, a spokeswoman for the attorney general's office in Missouri, said last week that if King is acquitted in Texas he will be returned to Missouri to serve his two consecutive life sentences, both without parole.

Europe marks WWII beginning

GDANSK, Poland (AP) Former enemies and allies somberly marked the 70th anniversary of the start of World War II on Tuesday, underlining the need to remember the bloodiest conflict in the 20th century so as not to repeat it.

Russian Prime Minister Vladimir Putin, whose country sided with Nazi Germany during the initial invasion of Poland in 1939, said the war and its causes needed to be studied from all perspectives.

"We should examine everything which ended up bringing about the tragedy of Sept. 1, 1939," Putin said, standing next to Poland's Prime Minister Donald Tusk after the two met ahead of official commemorations. "We must do this so that this tragedy never happens again.'

Poland's leaders gathered at dawn on Gdansk's Westerplatte peninsula to mark the exact time the German battleship Schleswig-Holstein, in the war's opening salvo, shelled a tiny Polish military outpost housing the navy's arsenal.

Red-and-white Polish flags fluttered as the officials opened the ceremony at 4:45 a.m. (0245GMT), placing wreaths at the foot of the monument to the defenders of Westerplatte. An honor guard looked on.

"Westerplatte is a symbol, a symbol of the heroic fight of the weaker against the stronger," President Lech Kaczynski said. "It is proof of patriotism and an unbreakable spirit. Glory

to the heroes of those days, glory to the heroes of Westerplatte, glory to all of the soldiers who fought in World War II against German Nazism, and against Bolshevik totalitarianism."

Tusk warned of the dangers of forgetting the war's lessons.

"We meet here to remember who started the war, who the culprit was, who the executioner in the war was, and who was the victim of this aggression," Tusk said.

"We meet here to remember this, because we Poles know that, without this memory - honest memory about the truth, about the sources of World War II - Poland, Europe and the world will not be safe," he said. The initial German attack

on Poland started more than five years of war that would engulf the world and result in the slaughter of more than 50 million people as the German war machine rolled over Europe.

Poland alone lost 6 milion citizens, half of them Jews. During the German occupation, the country was used as a base for the Nazis' genocide machinery. It was home to Auschwitz, Majdanek, Sobibor and other death camps built for the annihilation of Europe's Jews.

At the height of the war, the European theater stretched from North Africa to the outskirts of Moscow, and pitted Germany and its allies, including Italy, against Britain, France, the Soviet Union and the United States, along with a host of other countries, including Polish forces in exile.

The war in Europe ended May 8, 1945, with Germany's unconditional surrender.

President Barack Obama, who was not at Tuesday's ceremonies, sent a message noting that today, as a NATO member, Poland is protected by a creed that says an attack on one is an attack on all

'We celebrate together the determination of the people of Poland to fight authoritarianism and to choose democracy and freedom," Obama said in the message to Poland. "Today, we live in a different era in which the United States and Poland are close allies, partners in meeting global challenges to our security and prosperity, and in supporting fundamental human rights around the world."

Earlier Tuesday, German Chancellor Angela Merkel, who was taking part in the commemoration, told Germany's ARD television that her country would never forget the "causes and effects" of the war.

"Germany triggered the Second World War," she said. "We brought endless suffering to the world."

Within a month of the Sept. 1 attack, Poland was overwhelmed by the Nazi blitzkrieg from the west, and an attack two weeks later from the east by the Soviet Union, which had signed a pact with Hitler's Germany.

them disease and insects. Stress from the drought and heat is often the fatal blow, he said. "Apparently completely

healthy, vibrant oaks are going down," Houser said. "There is just absolutely no water in the soil."

Experts say to improve the health of trees, slowly soak them with about 5 gallons of water for every Houser said the death of inch of trunk diameter

11-run lead almost no enough for Toronto in Texas

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Adam Lind helped power the Toronto Blue Jays to a big early lead with his first career grand slam. He then put the game finally out of reach after Texas cut an 11-run deficit to one.

Lind finished with a career-high eight RBIs after adding a solo homer three-run double and in a seven-run ninth for Toronto in a wild 18-10 over the slipping Rangers on Monday night.

"You know you have to outslug these guys. They came back tonight and showed why they're in the hunt for the playoffs," Lind said. "I hit it on the sweet spot on a couple of pitches.

Rod Barajas also homered twice and drove in five runs. He hit a three-run homer in a five-run first, a led off the fifth with a 438foot blast into the Toronto bullpen in left-center for an 11-0 lead.

And, when the Rangers started hitting, it appeared that might not be enough.

"No lead is comfortable here. You have to produce," said Barajas, who played in Texas from 2004-06. "Once we got to 11 runs, I was hoping it would be good. ... We were lucky to hang on."

The Rangers pulled to 11-10 in the seventh on Chris Davis' sacrifice fly to deep center, where Vernon Wells made a leaping catch on the warning track to keep another runner at first base. But they didn't score again, coming up short of their largest comeback in team history.

"We put ourselves in the position to make a push there at the end. You have sacrifice fly in the third and to give credit, they piled on

runs in the ninth," Rangers third baseman Michael Young said. "We don't really consider this to be a deflating loss.

But the Rangers (72-58) wrapped up a losing August and dropped four games behind idle Boston in the AL wild-card race.

Lind's slam made it 10-0 with no outs in the fourth and chased Rangers rookie left-hander Derek Holland

The eight RBIs matched the most in the majors this year. They were also the most in the American League in two years, and the most by a Toronto player since Roy Howell had a team-record nine 32 years ago.

Toronto set a season high for runs after being limited to 14 runs combined the previous five games.

"We finally score some runs and can't hold it,

manager Cito Caston said. "If you walk away losing this game, what a shame.'

Toronto led for good after Marco Scutaro had a leadoff single and Aaron Hill an RBI double within the first three pitches of the game by Holland, who had been 4-0 his last five starts at Rangers Ballpark.

"I was pitiful," Holland said. "Definitely didn't have command. I didn't throw the ball where it needed to be thrown. ... I couldn't establish any of my pitches."

An inning before Wells' nifty catch, Texas stranded two runners when Marlon Byrd had an inning-ending deep flyball to center after RBI singles by Ian Kinsler and Josh Hamilton.

Brett Cecil (6-3) barely made it through the five innings needed for the vic-

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: Your advice to "Sick of Waiting in Denver" (June 25) will help a number of our patients. Physicians don't want frustrated and angry patients, and we don't plan our day expecting long waits. Your suggestion that when a doctor is running more than 15 minutes late, the next person should be warned is appropriate.

Your other suggestion to call the doctor's office an hour ahead of time to see if he/she is on schedule might not work. The physician might be on schedule, but a problem could arise that throws him/her off. Arriving at the office and finding the doctor horribly backed up after hearing that he was on schedule at the time of the phone call would be upsetting.

Unfortunately, haven't found an easy solution to this in my 25 years of practice. It does help to focus on good manners and empathy, and to alert patients at the time of check-in if there's a problem, which allows them to return or reschedule. Of course, the physician conveying personally to his patients that their time is as important as his also some of the comments I received from patients:

DEAR ABBY: I find it interesting that the doctor's rights are prominently posted in the waiting room, e.g., co-pays are due before you see the doctor, if you don't cancel your appointment 24 hours in advance and you fail to show up, you will be billed for the appointment. But nowhere do you see the patients' rights posted.

As a patient I insist on one simple right -- that the doctor see me within 15 minutes of the appointed time made by his/her staff. Last year I fired two doctors for keeping me waiting. In both cases I let the doctor know I would no longer be seeing them and why. One had the gall to tell me his patients EXPECTED to wait for him!

As patients, we enable doctors to get away with unprofessional behavior by not insisting on accountability. I am a professional, and time spent in a doctor's office is time taken away from my clients. My time is as valuable to me as the doctors' time is to them. --LARRY W., SUN CITY, ARIZ.

DEAR ABBY: I suggest that whenever possible, patients should request the first appointment in the morning or after lunch. The chances of being seen on time are greater at those

times. -- MAGGIE B., DANA POINT, CALIF.

DEAR ABBY: My husband had an appointment with a physician who kept him waiting an hour in the waiting room and nearly another hour in the examination room. When the doctor finally appeared, my husband complained about the long wait.

"I'm a doctor and I can't be rushed," he responded. "If I make a mistake, someone could DIE.'

My husband, without missing a beat said, "Really? Well, I'm an architect. If I make a mistake, THOUSANDS could die. I guess I win."

With that, he got

dressed and walked out. Needless to say, we never returned to that doctor.

I disagree that it is the patient's job to make sure the doctor isn't running late. His office staff can easily inform people of that fact when they walk in, giving them the option of waiting if they wish (or can). -- NO LONGER WAITING, HARMONY,

DEAR ABBY: I am a professional. My hourly fees are similar to those of doctors. My policy is any waiting time after 30 minutes, I bill the doctor for my time. -- PATRICK IN SAN ANSELMO


