Inez Carter Park will be the location of the Pampa's new aquatic center. The City Commission voted 3-2 for the decision in its Tuesday evening regular meeting.

Commissioners Bill Allison and Robert Dixon voted against the project, but for different reasons.

A few residents who live close to the location attended the meeting to voice their displeasure.

Among them was O. K. Lee, who said he thinks constructing the water park in his neighborhood would be detrimental to those who live there. Lee said the trash, noise lights and "a big fence" would bring down property values.

"Nobody wants to live next to a water park," Lee said, adding that the site was right across the street from a church and noise from the park might disturb Wednesday evening


services. "I can't understand why

you would hurt citizens when you have a pool with no housing around," Lee said.

Commissioner Allison agreed, saying he wouldn't want it in his neighborhood either.

Beth Earhart said she thought a water park would be wonderful, but has serious concerns about the location, which she said would be "10 steps from my bedroom window." Traffic is already bad in the area, she added, as is trash.

" Young families with toddlers would not choose that area to live," she told the commission. Earhart had a question about hours of operation, saying she likes to sit on her porch or garden in the evening in peace. She said with "countless empty fields" around Pampa she doesn't understand the location choice. She also said she thinks the facility would be

unsafe in a residential area. Assistant City Manager Shane Stokes, who has been lead wrangler on the project said trash would be picked up by park employees and the only noise would be children's voices. He said they've had no noise complaints related to the current pool. Bill Commissioner

Allison told Stokes he applauded the work he's done on the project, "... but I'm not in favor of that location. I know the PEDC (Pampa Economic **Development** Corporation) won't participate if we put it somewhere else, but I don't feel it's fiscally responsible to spend \$100,000 on land, when

we already own a lot of land."

"Until the contractor found out the EDC was against (the M.K. Brown site) they were for it," Allison said.

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

Fish kill 'natural phenonemon,' says biologist

A state biologist said today that the dying fish at Lake McClellan are a seasonal phenomenon.

John Clayton, assistant district fishery biologist for the State of Texas, said this morning that fish are dying in Lake McClellan are a natural phenomenon.

"There's no oxygen in the water," Clayton said.

He said it is not uncommon and usually happens in warm weather.

The fact that the lake level is rising due to recent rains means that vegetation near the shore that has been flooded starts to die adding to the situation.

Clayton said that plankton in the water manufactures oxygen for the lake and gives the lake its blue or greenish color, but on cloudy days, the plankton use more oxygen than they make.

"When they don't have sun," he

said, "they consume oxygen." Warm, cloudy days, he said, tend to lead to fish die-offs because there is less oxygen in the water although he said he did see some live fish when he was at the lake Tuesday.

The question, Clayton said, is what's going to happen during the cloudy days at the end of the week. There may be more die-offs do to lack of oxygen or rain may replenish the oxygen in the lake.

A judge on Monday delayed the capital murder trial of Levi A. King to await DNA test results. It's unclear what the tests involved. A bailiff said the trial will begin Thursday.

King is accused of killing 35-year-old Michell Conrad, her 31-year-old husband Brian Conrad 14-year-old and son Zach Doan. They were found dead in their Texas Panhandle farmhouse near Pampa on Sept. 30, 2005. Michell Conrad was six months' pregnant.

A judge moved the trial from Pampa to Lubbock over fears of prejudicial pretrial publicity.

Last year, King got consecutive life terms without parole in Missouri for killing two people. Those bodies were found the same day the bodies were found in the Conrads' home.


local VFW Post for judging. All recordings must be in your own voice (hearing or speech impaired students should contact the Voice of Democracy

AP - Oil prices fell for a third straight day Wednesday, dipping below \$68 a barrel despite an Energy Department report showing a drop in crude and gasoline supplies that suggests demand may be recovering.

Benchmark crude for October delivery fell 12 cents to \$67.93 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. The contract lost \$1.91 on Tuesday to settle ak \$68.05.

Oil and gasoline in storage is much greater than usual right now, partly because it has been a dismal travel season. It's one of the biggest reasons why you won't pay a lot to fill your tank if you travel this Labor Day.

The average price for a gallon of regular gasoline fell a half penny overnight to \$2.602, according to auto club AAA, Wright Express and Oil Price Information Service. That's about 5 cents more than a month ago, but about \$1.08 less than at this time last year.

Gasoline inventories fell by 3 million barrels to 205.1 million barrels, the Energy Department said, a steeper decline than analysts had expected.

Oil analyst and trader Stephen Schork had expected a large gasoline draw given the lateness of this year's Labor Day holiday.

Gasoline supplies have increased by 2 percent since Memorial Day, while a typical driving season at this point would show a draw of around of 4.6 percent.

"A build in gasoline supplies through the summer driving season has only occurred once (2004) over the last 20 years for which the DOE provides data," Schork wrote in his morning report.

3.2 million barrels last week Refiners voluntarily report the API numbers, while the Energy Department reports mandatory supply figures.

But crude prices slipped just ahead of the Energy Department report, as new figures from the Labor Department showed companies earlier this year slashed spending on everything, including energy. The morning crude inventories report boosted prices above \$68, but the rally couldn't hold.

Oil sank almost \$5 a barrel in the first two days of the week on worries that a global economic recovery this year would be slow and may not justify the big rallies in stocks and commodities since March.

U.S. stock indexes fell about 2 percent Tuesday, largely on rumors of a major bank failure.

On Wednesday, both the energy and equity markets were weighing mixed signs about whether that the U.S. economy - the biggest consumer of oil — is improving

The ADP National Employment Report said employment fell by 298,000 in August, the smallest drop since September 2008, though ADP said employment is likely to decline for at least several more months.

The Institute for Supply Management, a trade group of purchasing executives, said its manufacturing index rose in August, indicating an expansion for the first time since January 2008. And the National Association of Realtors said pending U.S. home sales rose to the highest level in more than two years.

In other Nymex trading, gasoline for October delivery gained 1.4 cents to \$1.7966 a gallon and heating oil lost 1.2 cents to \$1.7467 a gallon. Natural gas fell 5.1 cents to \$2.77 per 1,000 cubic feet.





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

Productivity up 6.6 percent in 2Q, most in 6 years

WASHINGTON (AP) -Worker productivity, the single biggest factor determining living standards, grew at the fastest pace in nearly six years in the spring while labor costs fell by the most in nine years, as companies slashed costs to survive the recession.

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Increases in productivity can help boost living standards because companies can increase wages financed by rising output. But during the recession, companies have been using their productivity gains to bolster their bottom lines as many struggle to stay in business.

This cost-cutting helped many companies report better-than-expected secondquarter earnings despite falling sales. But economists worry that such aggressive cuts will make it harder to mount a sustainable recovery. That's because the lack of wage growth and shortage of jobs will depress household incomes and make the prospects for a sustained rebound in consumer spending less likely.


Consumer spending is critical to the recovery since it accounts for about 70 percent of total economic activity.

The Labor Department said Wednesday that productivity, the amount of output per hour of work, rose at an annual rate of 6.6 percent in the April-June quarter, the largest advance since the summer of 2003. Economists expected an increase of 6.4 percent, matching the government's initial estimate last month.

Labor costs fell at an annual rate of 5.9 percent. That's the largest drop since the second quarter of 2000, and slightly bigger than the 5.8 percent decline estimated a month ago.

The slight changes reflected that total output, as measured in productivity terms, did not drop as much as initially estimated and hourly compensation, after adjusting for inflation, did not rise as much.

On Wall Street, stocks were trading in tight range Wednesday morning. The



The 6.6 percent rate of increase in productivity in the second quarter compared with a 0.3 percent rise in the first quarter. It was the largest quarterly increase since a 9.7 percent jump in the third quarter of 2003. The 5.9 percent drop in

unit labor costs followed a 5 percent decline in the first quarter.

Businesses producing more with fewer employees means that unemployed Americans continue to face a dismal job market. The unemployment rate dipped to 9.4 percent in July, but many economists expect it returned to 9.5 percent in August. The government is scheduled to release that report Friday

While many of the big U.S. retailers have said back-toschool sales have been dismal, the government's Cash for Clunkers program did boost auto sales in August.

Ford Motor Co., Toyota Motor Corp. and Honda Motor Co. all' reported increased sales in August as consumer snapped up their fuel-efficient models. But rivals Chrysler Group LLC and General Motors Co., which have just emerged from bankruptcy protection, saw their sales fall for the month.

Meanwhile, the Commerce Department said Wednesday that factory orders rose 1.3 percent in July, after the June increase was revised upward to 0.9 percent. The July bump was still below analysts expectations of a 2.2 percent increase, according to a survey by Thomson Reuters.

Shipments of new autos grew 5.1 percent, as sales jumped due to the clunkers program. An 18.5 percent jump in transportation goods orders drove the overall increase. Orders for commercial aircraft and parts doubled after that volatile category fell 30 percent in June.

But orders for nondurable goods, such as food, petroleum products and chemicals, fell 1.9 percent, the most since December.



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

Fast for Fall Filling inter asses

AUSTIN, Texas — The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is encouraging hunters in need of certification to enroll soon as fall hunter education courses are filling up fast. As hunting seasons draw closer, demand for hunter education classes is expected to increase

"It would be much better to enroll early and avoid the rush right at the beginning of hunting seasons," said Terry Erwin, Coordinator Hunter Education at TPWD. "Don't wait, because the number of available courses begins to taper off as the hunting season grows closer."

Anyone born after Sept. 1, 1971 is required to take the Hunter Education Training Course in order to hunt in Texas. The minimum age a hunter may be certified was lowered last year to 9, and experts have advice for people who want to take advantage of this relatively new provision.

"Though students may be certified at age 9, we still suggest they be accompanied by an adult guardian until the parent or guardian feels that they're mature enough to hunt on their own," Erwin said. "We lowered certification to age 9 last year to go along with the Texas Youth Hunting Program, which requires certification to participate. We do expect parents to provide good supervision during hunting, and who better should know if their

youngster is mature enough to be allowed to hunt?"

Hunters who are at least 17 years of age and have not completed the hunter education course can defer completion for one year. Hunters who opted for "deferral" last year must complete the hunter education course to hunt legally

this year. Hunter education courses are conducted by certified volunteers all year across the state of Texas. Courses cost \$15 and students have two options: take the FREE classroom study portion on-line plus a one-day field component or take the traditional two-day course that averages 14 hours of instruction.

"The deferral is only available once. The license point-of-sale vendors are not allowed to sell a deferral once it has been purchased by an individual," Erwin said. "The database keeps track of the sale, and will not allow a sale to

vidual."

As a result of hunter education courses, Texas hunting accident rates have steadily decreased since 1966 when 12 accidents per 100,000 hunters were reported and the last three years have seen the rate lowered to 2.9 accidents per 100,000 hunters. to get Crane Permits

AUSTIN, Texas — Texas sandhill crane hunters are being advised to visit one of 30 Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement (game warden) offices spread across the state to obtain a free permit, or obtain a permit online or by phone, since private hunting license retailers no longer provide the permit this year.

A federal sandhill crane hunting permit is required to hunt sandhill cranes, and failure to have the permit can result in a citation and fine. The permit is available at no cost. It is important, since it helps wildlife managers estimate hunting pressure and decide how to set sandhill crane hunting seasons and bag limits.

For the 2009-2010 season, private license retailers no longer provide sandhill crane permits. This is because it became obvious to game bird program managers at the state and federal levels over the last several years that many retailers were indiscriminately providing the permits to many hunters, regardless of whether they hunt sandhills, thus rendering permit data useless for wildlife management purposes. "Last year, close to 125,000 sandhill crane permits were issued in Texas, and before we went to the electronic license sales system in the 1990s we use to issue about 12,000 paper sandhill permits per year," said Vernon Bevill, TPWD small game and habitat assessment program director. "It is highly unlikely the number of crane hunters has increased that much."

"We try to keep tight estimates on crane populations and harvest and this requires a good estimate of hunter numbers," Beville explained. "The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service surveys sandhill crane hunters each year, and they asked Texas to tighten up its method is distributing crane permits so they can obtain more accurate harvest estimates."

This season, hunters can obtain the free sandhill crane permit at TPWD law enforcement offices located in Abilene, Amarillo, Austin (headquarters) Beaumont, Brownsville, Brownwood, College Station, Corpus Christi, El Paso, Fort

Worth, Freeport, Garland, SHouston (two locations, north and south), Kerrville, LaMarque, Laredo. Lubbock, Lufkin, Midland, Mount Pleasant, Rockport, Rusk, San Angelo, San, Antonio, Temple, Tyler, Victoria, Waco, and Wichita Falls. Hunters can also obtain sandhill crane permits online, and the permit is still free, but online transactions charge a \$5 convenience fee covering shipping and handling. Hunters can bundle multiple license purchases into a single online transaction and still pay only one \$5 fee.

Or, hunters can also obtain sandhill crane permits by phone at (800) TX LIC 4 U (800-895-4248). License phone center hours are 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday, closed Saturday, Sunday and most holidays. Each phone transaction also charges a \$5 convenience fee.
