
Chautauqua booths up this year

King trial in penalty phase

Lubbock - Testimony in the Levi King case shifted today from the discovery of the family killed in Gray County to El Paso, where King was arrested as he came back across the border from Mexico.

Customs and Border Protection Agent Richard Reyes described in testimony this morning how King pulled too close to the car in from of him at the border crossing at El Paso, arousing Reyes' suspicion and how Reyes had King pulled out of line for questioning.

Reyes said King initially gave the border agent a Texas Department of Agriculture pesticide applicator's license when he was asked for identification. Reyes said subsequent answers were contradictory before King finally identified himself.

King was put in a holding cell at the border crossing, Reyes said, and other officials were called in to search the pickup truck he was driving.

One of the officials, Mark with a drug dog, but found no drugs.

Parsons said he did find a Mauser rifle with a scope, an AK-47 and a 9 mm pistol. All the weapons were fully loaded.



school officials included a suggestion that students could compose essays stating how they could help support Obama — an idea the education secretary acknowledged was wrong-

In his conversation with the Wakefield students, Obama said that not having a father at home "forced me to grow up faster."

One young person asked the president whom he would choose to dine with if he could make only one such selection.

"Gandhi," Obama replied. "He's somebody I find a lot of inspiration in. He inspired Dr. (Martin Luther) King" with his message of nonviolence.

"He ended up doing so much and changed the world just by the power of his ethics," Obama said of the inspirational leader Mahatma Ghandi. At another point, Obama told the students that "a lot of people are counting on me.

Obama proceeded later with the speech the White House had released a day early, virtually unchanged. The school he chose as the setting for his talk -Wakefield — is the most economically and racially diverse school in Arlington County, according to the Department of Education. Nearly 40 percent of graduating seniors pass an Advanced Placement test. That's more than twice the national average.

"There is no excuse for not trying" he said in the speech. He said students must be individually responsible for their education, and that it's important to work hard, pay attention in school and complete assignments.

"Whatever you resolve to do, I want you to commit to it," Obama said. "The truth is, being successful is hard. You won't love every subject that you study. You won't click with every teacher that you have."

"At the end of the day, we can have the most dedicated teachers, the most supportive parents and the best schools in the world, and none of it will matter unless all of you fulfill your responsibilities," the president said.

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EPA to reject Texas air permit process

DALLAS (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency says it won't approve portions of Texas' air-pollution permitting program that don't meet the federal Clean Air Act.

In a statement issued Tuesday, the agency announced its intentions to reject aspects of the plan. Final decisions about changes to the plan will be made soon under a recent agreement with Texas businesses.

Texas has major air-pollution problems, thanks to pollution from power plants, industry and cars. Houston and Dallas have never been within Clean Air Act requirements for ground-level ozone pol-

The EPA and Texas environmental regulators have long been at odds over the state's permitting

Supreme Court hears bonfire case

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -The Texas Supreme Court has heard oral arguments on a construction company's motions for rehearing involving the 1999 Texas A&M University bonfire collapse.

Zachry Construction Corp. is attempting to make the university at least partly responsible in the remaining lawsuits arising from the collapse that killed 12 people and injured 27 others. The court heard arguments Tuesday.

In a detailed legal brief, Zachry argued Texas A&M was a "responsible third party." Texas A&M represented by the state attorney general's office said Zachry's argument is moot.

Texas A&M reached a \$2.1 million settlement with several plaintiffs last October.

Families of some of the students killed and injured sued university administrators and construction contractors hired to help build

the 59-foot-tall tower of logs that toppled.

President advises caution in what kids put on Facebook

ARLINGTON, Virginia (AP) — In a pep talk that kept clear of politics, President Barack Obama on Tuesday challenged the nation's students to take pride and ownership in their education — and stick with it even if they don't like every class or must overcome tough circumstances at home.

"Every single one of you has something that you're good at. Every single one of you has something to offer," Obama told students at Wakefield High School Arlington, Virginia and children watching his speech on television in schools across the country. "And you have a responsibility to yourself to discover what that is."

Presidents often visit schools, and Obama was not the first one to offer a back-to-school address aimed at millions of students in every grade. Yet this speech came with a dose of controversy, as several conservative organizations and many concerned parents warned Obama was trying to sell his political agenda. That concern was caused in part by an accompanying administration lesson plan encouraging students to "help the president," which the White House later revised.

Obama preceded his broad-scale talk with a meeting with Wakefield students, where at one point he advised them to 'be careful what you post on Facebook. Whatever you do, it will be pulled up later in your life.

Obama, accompanied by Education Secretary Arne Duncan, met with some 40 students gathered in a school library before the

speech carried on ESPN and on the White House Web site.

"When I was your age," Obama said, "I was a little bit of a goof-off. My main goal was to get on the varsity basketball team and have fun."

The uproar over his speech followed him across the Potomac River, as his motorcade was greeted by a small band of protesters. One carried a sign exclaiming: "Mr. President, stay away from our kids."

During his meeting inside, one young person asked why the country doesn't have universal health insurance. "I think we need it. I think we can do it," Obama replied. The president said the country can afford to insure all Americans and that doing so will save money in the long run.

Obama is not the first president to give such a school-opening talk, but his plans seemed to almost immediately get plunged in controversy. Critics accused him of overstepping his authority, and school districts in some areas decided not to provide their students access to his midday speech.




