and the Korean War. The man who burned the flag was convicted under a Texas law banning desecration of the flag. That conviction was thrown out in 1989 by the U.S. Supreme Court, which ruled that flag burning was a constitutionally protected free speech.

Walker's son, Rusty Walker, recalled being shocked but not surprised when he turned on the national news the night of the flag burning and saw his father.

"He was a West Point graduate, and when he saw them burning the flag, he couldn't stand it," he said. Walker disposed of the

NRCS announces sign-up for conservation program

Natural Resources Conservation Service state conservationist for Texas, Don Gohmert, announced a sign-up beginning on Aug. 10, 2009, for the new Conservation Stewardship Program to assist agricultural and forestry producers. CSP is a new program authorized in the 2008 Farm Bill.

"Farmers and ranchers actively engaged in conservation land stewardship have the opportunity to earn conservation rewards through CSP," Gohmert said. "This program gives conservation-minded producers the ability to apply and build on their current stewardship efforts."

CSP is a five-year program which offers continuous sign-up, but all eligible applicants who sign up between Aug. 10 and Sept. 30, 2009, will be ranked as a group in October and November. A second ranking of subsequent applications will likely take place again in January or February.

CSP replaced a program authorized in the 2002 Farm Bill, the Conservation Security Program which was only offered on a watershed-specific basis.

The new CSP is now available to landowners statewide.

Gohmert noted only top stewards

will be awarded contracts for CSP and receive funding.

NRCS encourages farmers and ranchers actively involved in conserving their natural resources to apply for CSP in order to maintain existing conservation activities and implement additional enhancements or practices on their land. "CSP is for the best of the best stew-

ards," Gohmert said. "We have many land stewards in Texas that are worthy of this recognition, and I encourage

them to apply."

Lands eligible for CSP include cropland, grassland, pastureland, and private nonindustrial forestland, a new land use for the program. Agricultural land under the jurisdiction of an Indian tribe

is expressly eligible as well.

The CSP application process begins with a self-screening checklist. Interested producers can obtain additional information from the NRCS website at www.nrcs.usda.gov/programs/ new csp/csp.html.

AMR boosts its cash coffers and shifts routes

American Airlines' par- balance. ent company is making a potentially risky move in taking on significant new debt at a time when revenues are being hammered, but the \$2.9 billion in fresh financing and flight schedule changes announced Thursday should quiet concerns — for now — that it is in danger of a cash crunch and a bankruptcy filing.

Passengers will see big changes from the nation's second-largest airline, including increased flying in Chicago, New York, Los Angeles, Dallas-Fort Worth and Miami, but fewer flights in Raleigh/ Durham, N.C. and St. Louis, where American is giving up major ground to Southwest Airlines.

AMR Corp. said the extra funding it has received includes \$1 billion in cash from an advance sale of frequent flyer miles to Citigroup. The company is treating that money as a loan.

The Fort Worth, Texas, company said it also has received \$1.6 billion in sale-leaseback financing commitments from GE Capital Aviation Services, a unit of General Electric Co., and \$280 million in cash in a loan from GE Capital Aviation Services secured by aircraft.

Of the \$1.3 billion in new liquidity, all but \$55 million will be included in the third quarter 2009 cash

ATLANTA (AP) — and short-term investment

The transactions will increase the company's cash balance to roughly \$3.7 billion by the end of the third quarter, which is Sept. 30. AMR had \$14 billion in total debt at the end of the second quarter. It's unclear how much that figure will increase at the end of the third quarter. And AMR has \$1.3 billion in debt maturities in 2010.

"The announcement today from our perspective takes the liquidity ques-tion off the table," Virasb Vahidi, American Airlines' senior vice president of planning, said in an inter-

Analysts generally agreed.

Standard & Poor's reiterated its "Hold" opinion on AMR shares.

The larger question that looms is what will happen in the future. Overall demand for air travel has shown some improvement in recent months, but yields are down because passengers are paying less for their tickets and are not flying as much in premium

AMR said it will strengthen its flight network by increasing capacity in four hubs cities. Those cities, and Los Angeles, are key parts of the company's plan to benefit from closer cooperation with British Airways, Iberia and other partners.

Housing, jobless data point to a recovery

WASHINGTON (AP) -Housing construction rose in August and the number of newly laid-off workers seeking unemployment aid fell unexpectedly last week, adding to signs the

recession has ended. Still, the reports suggested a slow and fragile economic recovery. In part, that's because the increased housing starts were due solely to a surge in construction of apartment buildings - while the much larger singlefamily homes sector fell for the first time in six months. And jobless claims remain far above the levels associated with a healthy economy.

Even as the housing industry begins to recover from its worst downturn in decades, a glut of unsold homes and record levels of home foreclosures are weighing on the industry.

Construction of multifamily homes and apartments rose 1.5 percent to an annual rate of 598,000 units, the highest level since November, the Commerce Department said Thursday. That was slightly lower than the 600,000-unit pace economists had expected. And it remains more than 70 percent below the peak rate hit in 2006.

The tentative improvements in housing are most likely a rebound "from unsustainably weak results

reinforced by a temporary boost to demand" from the \$8,000 first-time homebuyer tax credit that ends Dec. 1, Joshua Shapiro, chief economist at MFR Inc., wrote in a note

"Gains from here on will probably be much more difficult to achieve," due to high unemployment, tight credit and a large number of new and existing homes already on the market, he

Applications for building permits, a gauge of future activity, rose a 2.7 percent in August to an annual rate of 579,000 units, slightly below the 580,000 level that had been forecast. Permits for single-family homes dipped 0.2 percent but rose for multifamily units by 15.8 percent.

The 1.5 percent rise in housing starts followed a small 0.2 percent dip in July. The August strength reflected a 25.3 percent surge in construction of multifamily units, a volatile sector that had fallen 15.2 percent in July.

The single-family sector dipped 3 percent last month to an annual rate of 479,000 units, the first setback following five straight monthly gains.

Meanwhile, initial claims for unemployment benefits dropped last week to a seasonally adjusted 545,000 from an upwardly revised 557,000 the previous week, the Labor Department said Wall Street Thursday. economists expected claims to rise by 5,000, according to Thomson Reuters.

The decline was the third in the past four weeks. The four-week average, which smooths out fluctuations, dropped 8,750 to 563,000. When federal extended benefits are included, 9.01

million people received unemployment insurance in the week ending Aug. 29. That's down from 9.16 million the previous week. Congress has added up to 53 weeks of extended benefits on top of the 26 weeks provided by the states.

Some economists said the overall housing construction gain was an encouraging sign that the worst is over for that troubled market.

Builders have been ramping up because buyers want to take advantage of the new federal tax credit for first-time homebuyers. The National Association

of Home Builders said this week that its housing market index rose in September, reflecting growing optimism in the industry about rising home sales. The trade association said its index rose one point to 19, the highest

reading since April 2008. Thursday's reports come a day after the Federal Reserve said production by the nation's factories, mines and utilities increased for the second straight month in August, the latest sign the economy is recovering.

Tomball man contracts brucellosis from feral hogs

James Belcher developed symptoms that turned out to have nothing to do with swine flu but everything to do with hogs.

Doctors earlier this year diagnosed the 76-year-old Tomball resident with brucellosis.

"It has been a nightmare," said Belcher, who picked up the disease from feral hogs that have rooted through parts of his property in Cherokee County.

Belcher's brucellosis was traced to him cleaning a feral hog in March. Belcher and his son butchered one of the many feral hogs they had shot or trapped.

"People need to know that they should be cau-

tious when they handle those pigs, and always wear gloves," he said. "I wouldn't want what's happened to me to happen to anybody."

Belcher faces months of more treatment for the disease, which is caused by a bacteria linked to feral hogs. An estimated 2 million of the wild creatures roam Texas.

The Houston Chronicle reported Thursday that about 10 percent of Texas feral hogs test positive for brucellosis bacteria, but the rate in eastern parts of the state has been known to be higher. The disease can cause pregnant animals to prematurely abort their young.

In humans, brucellosis

can cause flulike symptoms such as fever, chills, aching muscles, intense joint pain, nausea and fatigue.

Human fatalities are rare. Belcher was diagnosed with brucellosis following surgery for an aortic aneu-

rysm. "The pain was incredible," he said. "That first week, I honestly can say I didn't care if I lived of died it was that bad."

A physician with experience dealing in brucellosis in South America helped diagnose Belcher, offering antibiotics in a treatment process he continues today.

"I never used gloves when I cleaned hogs, Belcher said. "I sure wish I had, now."

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Dallas youth's motivational speech a

(AP) Dalton Sherman is an oud 1-year-old motivational 24,000 people at a globspeaker, a talking testament to the difference a teacher's belief can make in a student's success.

Last year Dalton gave an inspirational back-toschool speech that brought Dallas 20,000 schoolteachers to their feet in thunderous applause and the video was posted on YouTube. Now Dalton is a celebrity of sorts.

He's been on Oprah Winfrey's and Ellen DeGeneres' talk shows. He's hobnobbed with Donald Trump, poet Maya Angelou and U.S. Education Secretary Arne Duncan and on Friday, Jenna Bush Hager will interview him on NBC's "Today" show in her broadcasting debut.

"It just keeps going and growing," said Dallas schools spokesman Jon ... Dahlander. "The power of YouTube strikes again of for Dalton Sherman. It couldn't happen to a nicer family or a greater kid."

Two years ago Dalton's way with words sometimes proved too disruptive for the classroom. His teacher at the time Irene Redmond, encouraged him to find -- other avenues for his talent. The speech that's garnered him so much attention in some ways is a tribute to Redmond's belief in his ability to succeed in life.

Friends and family say Dalton's growing fame hasn't gone to his head. He is still the same kid who loves shooting hoops, horsing around with his siblings, scrambling eggs for his family at breakfast and rooting for the Dallas Cowboys.

He's a straight-A, sixthgrader at a Dallas magnet school and has had a difficult time keeping a low profile. In his second week at Dallas Environmental Science Academy, the "Today" show's cameras followed him around.

This summer, a Fort Worth-based international theater group called Kids Who Care, turned Dalton's "Believe in Me," speech into a musical in which he recently starred.

One of his largest pre-

sentations came in June, when he spoke to about al training conference in Charlotte, N.C., for ACN Inc., a direct-marketing company.

"He was incredible," said Lisa Krass, who directs events for ACN. "He had everyone sitting on the edge of their seat just waiting to see what he was going to say next.

"He had many in tears, and others just in awe over how dynamic a young man he was."

Dalton admits he doesn't really know why his speech, which is tailored to suit his audience, has resonated with so many. He's just enjoying the ride.

"It's fun to speak in dif-ferent places," Dalton said, excitedly rattling off what he's seen in Chicago, San Francisco, Lubbock, Louisville, Ky., and other cities where he's spoken.

The 4-foot-9 kid with a big smile wants to be a broadcast news reporter when he grows up.

He doesn't get scared

when he steps before large crowds because he prays with his father before each

"That builds my confidence. We pray for God to help me," Dalton said.

Dalton's dad, Carlos Snerman, said his son is a typical kid, but when he's speaking, he has a different anointing.

"It's a ministry in a lot of ways. It's nothing that could have been orchestrated," he said. "That's when you know a divine hand is in it."

His dad, a Verizon customer service representative, said Dalton has loved to talk ever since he was a tyke.

But there were times when his gift of gab got him into trouble in the classroom.

That all changed when the teacher, Redmond, encouraged her fourthgrader to enter an oration contest about Martin


Luther King Jr.
At age 9, Dalton won \$1,000 first-place the prize for that speech and soon caught the attention of Dallas school district administrators

They asked him to present the fall 2008 convocation address. The district's communications chief wrote the speech, but credits Daiton with transforming it.

The speech calls on teachers to not only believe in themselves and the importance of their role as educators but to believe that the students they teach can reach their highest potential, no matter where they come from.

"Because here's the deal," Dalton tells them. "I can do anything, be anything, create anything, dream anything, become anything - because you believe in me."

Requests for speaking engagements have poured in from as far away as London and Italy, but the Shermans have limited Dalton's appearances to the U.S. for now.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 17, 1939, the Soviet Union invaded Poland during World War II, more than two weeks after Nazi Germany had launched its assault.

On this date:

In 1787, the Constitution of the United States was completed and signed by a majority of delegates attending the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia.

San Antonio Express-News on answers from the Texas Department of Transportation:

At first glance, it seems like a joke.

The Texas Department of Transportation compiles a list of the 100 most congested road sections in the state, and what is widely believed to be the most congested road section in Bexar County doesn't even make the list: U.S. 281 from Loop 1604 to the Comal County line.

Eight roadways in Bexar County did make the list, including multiple segments of Interstate 35 and Interstate 10. The worstranked section locally -- 10th on the statewide list -- is a portion of Interstate 35 from U.S. 90 West on the Southwest did to U.S.

281 north of downtown.

A TxDOT explanation of the congestion on this stretch of Interstate 35 notes: "A trip that takes 20 minutes in free-flow conditions will take approximately 33 minutes during rush hour."

While that may be bad, many commuters can attest that the rush-hour congestion on U.S. 281 north of Loop 1604 is much worse. So how is it possible that TxDOT failed to place it on the list?

The TxDOT methodology describes a multistep process of compiling a statewide database of major roadways, review by "transportation staff familiar with the local road network" and the calculation of congestion measures by

the Texas Transportation Institute.

Perhaps the initial database was deeply flawed and failed to identify U.S. 281 north of Loop 1604 for congestion problems. Even if this were the case, TxDOT experts who have familiarity with Bexar County roadways should have caught this glaring error as part of their review.

Either way, TxDOT -- not the Texas Transportation Institute -- flubbed the process. And the result is much worse than a joke.

Highway funds will naturally flow to the worst congested roadways in the state. Assuming the legal and environmental hurdles for construction on U.S. 281 are ever surpassed, it's not even on the list of priority projects.

Local leaders should be outraged at the TxDOT report. Bexar County residents who suffer through bumper-to-bumper commutes on U.S. 281 deserve to know whether something more than incompetence on the part of the state's transportation authorities is to blame.

the idea of medical malpractice reform, or tort reform in his proposal, and offered a good deal more detail as to what he wants in a plan, rather than general principles for Congress to put legislative flesh on. Whether it will get something done that he can sign and call satisfactory reform is difficult to tell.

The headline is that he

says he supports a "non-profit public option," apparently a government insurance plan that will be available to those who can't afford insurance even with reform. He says it will not be subsidized by tax-payers but will survive on premiums.

It seems unlikely that a government program that turned out not to be sustainable on premiums would not eventually be subsidized, however. That is what concerns people who fear that eventually a government program would enjoy unfair advantages (starting with being tax-free) when competing

against private plans. Perhaps the most constructive suggestion he made__ although again some details were lacking - was the idea of an insurance exchange through which individuals and small businesses would be able to pool their buying power to negotiate lower insurance rates. He was not clear about whether this would be a national, regional or state-based exchange, who would set it up, or who would make the rules.

If it was set up to operate across state lines, an exchange might be the

functional equivalent of allowing people to buy health insurance across state lines. But it would be simpler just to allow people to buy health insurance across state lines, which would increase competition and not involve all the administrative expenses of an exchange. The

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The president's promise to pay for his new spending through eliminating waste, fraud and abuse from the current system was also unconvincing. Numerous efforts to do so have been made over the years, and none has been especially effective because they didn't change the incentives- for providers and patients alike -- to overconsume health care because somebody else is supposedly paying for it.

There was also a tle shift in the promise he has repeatedly made that nobody who is satisfied with their current health care plan and doctor will see any substantial changes. "Nothing in this plan will require you or your employer to change the coverage or doctor." But that doesn't rule out shifting incentives, perhaps through the public option, so that many employers will simply drop coverage without it being "required."

President Obama tossed a few bones to critics of the plans passed through various committees. But tort reform will be resisted in Congress and the current status— the House won't pass a plan without a public option and the Senate won't pass a plan with one— is unlikely to change.

Hugg said his team will be on the lookout for Pampa's passing game.

"We feel like they are very good on offense and have an excellent quarterback that throws the ball well," Hugg said. "They have very good size and have put lots of points up this year."

Hugg said Pampa's defense is similar to what they ran when he was a coach with the Harvesters.

"It looks like their defense is showing signs of going back to the days when I coached there running a 4-3 defense," Hugg said. "We played great defense in those years and took lots of pride in that."

Parker said Perryton's biggest strength is the passion they play the game

"They play really hard," Pampa's head coach said."Every time I've watched them they look like they are playing harder than their opponent."

Parker said Perryton is good at running to the out-

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
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Pampa better than their record shows
