Farmers told to organize

Congressman Charles Stenholm was the keynote speaker at the Agriculture Round-Up and Symposium in Big Spring this past Saturday night. This event was sponsored by the Tejas Cowbell's and the Silver Belle's from Sterling City.

The CowBelles, who call themselves the "voice of women in the cattle indust41," brought two U. S. congressmen and six specialists in the beef business to explain and answer questions about innovations and legislation affecting people in the industry.

The main message given out by the speakers over and over again in the coliseum Saturday was "get involved and get organized.'

Charles Stenholm made a stiring and provacative speech to a group of about 100 cattlemen and visitors.

Evidently the crowd was in agreement with his talk as he was interupted several times with applause, particularly when he criticized the high interest rates policy followed by the Federal Reserve. He also attacked the Congress for their lack of desire to cut spending and to bring the deficit in line.

After observing that the plight of American

it was during the depression of the 30's, Congressman Stenholm critized the lack of concern shown by the administration and also the Congress. He pointed out that the United States is the only major country that does not protect its agriculture. For instance he pointed out the barriers set up against coursproducts going into Japan and the ommon European markets. A \$10. stick in California will cost \$35. in Japan and \$2.90 bushel of wheat will cost \$10. or more with the tariff going to the Japanese farmer.

The Congressman then pointed out that while he was in favor of free enterprise and free trade no one else in the world praticed this policy. If everyone played by the same rules this would be fine but the American farmer is the only one thay practices this policy. Because of this and with various embargos having been put on american agricultural products, the farmer has been devastated financially. By producing below the cost of production, the American farmer has not only subsidized the American consumer but also the entire

Anderson will join 23 other young cattlemen from across the nation in Denver on uly 18 for the beginning of a tour that will take them across the nation to Chicago, indianapolis, and Washington, D.C.

They will visit such places as the Denver NCA headquarters office, the automated box beef operations of Nonfort of Colorado, the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, the research facilities of Elanco ProductCo. in Indianapolis, and Washington, D. C. While in the nation's

capitol, they will visit various offices of the Executive Branch of government, the Congress, and allied industry associations. Their scheduled two day visit in Washington also includes an opportunity to visit with their local Congressmen.

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
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Kanchers Koundup



PUBLIC NOTICE OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

Notice is hereby given that Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the Utility') intends to change rates for electric utility service effective July 30, 1982 or as soon thereafter as permitted by law. The changes are applicable to all areas to which the Utility provides electric utility service. All classes of customers are affected by the proposed changes. The Utility expects that the proposed schedule of rates will furnish the Utility 11.53 percent more in revenues than are furnished by the existing schedule of rates.

Implementation of the proposed changes is subject to approval by the appropriate regulatory authority. A statement of intent including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules and a statement specifying in detail each proposed change, the effect the proposed change is expected to have on the revenues of the Utility and the classes and numbers of Utility consumers affected is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and the municipalities of Lamesa, Wilson, New Home, Meadow, Brownfield, Plains, Levelland and Sundown.

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Acreage Reports Due August 2

Borden County farmers who have not filed an acreage report with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service have until August 2 to do so.

The acreage reports will be used to determine compliance with farm programs and to protect 1983 crop acreage bases.

Program participants are required to report the actual planted acreage on a field by field basis.

Farmers who did not sign up for the acreage reduction program also could benefit by certifying their planted acres because the 1983 base acres will be based on the certified 1982 acreage.

ASCS will randomly check farms to verify that

the acreage reports are accurate and slos provide aerial photographs for farmers to identify their fields. To be sure reports are accurate and avoid unnecessary worry over the loss of program benefits, farmers may request measurement service. The cost is \$12.00 for the first slide and \$10.00 for each additional slide, and the measurements are guaranteed for the crop year.

"All farmers are urged to filee an acreage report with our office before the August 2nd deadline." The office is open between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective July 27, 1982, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

It is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 13.4 percent increase in the company's intrastate revenues.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

Notice to El Paso Area Customers

Effective January 1, 1982, Southwestern Bell adopted the Mountain States tariffs in effect for El Paso County. Southwestern Bell proposes to merge the separate El Paso tariffs with its tariffs applicable to the rest of Texas. The resulting new rate schedule is on file with the PUC and the El Paso area municipalities served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection at our El Paso business office.

Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

The filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for interexchange private line and foreign exchange (FX) service. Changes in such rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies because such companies provide interexchange private line and foreign exchange service in accordance with rates specified in Southwestern Bell's tariffs. While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in long distance rates, any change in those rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies.
