One of a series of articles submitted by local organizations who benefit from the United Way Campaign.


As each of you sits here today I would like to encourage you to think about some of the things each of us take for granted. Most of you got up this morning, got dressed and then drove yourself to work. Driving a car is something that most of us take for granted. The ability to operate a car gives is a sense of control over our lives. Imagine that one day you wake up and you have lost that control. That is exactly what happened to one of the clients of Epilepsy Foundation West Texas (EFWT).

Martin was a truck driver. He loved driving. He and his wife had only been married for a few years and they had just had a baby boy. One day while Martin was working he had an accident. He was not seriously injures, but because of the accident he began having seizures. Because he was having seizures, he lost his driver's license. Without a driver's license he could no longer drive a truck. The seizures continued. He

saw a neurologist and he took his medication. But sometimes with Epilepsy the first medication is not always effective.

The doctor tried other medications and combinations of medications. The process of trying to determine what medication will work best can sometimes take vears.

Martin's wife felt that this was more than she had bargained for. Martin was having thirty to forty seizures a month. He was not able to work and she didn't feel that she could take care of him and their son. She







KXAN-TV reports the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention used information from the UT research group for the distribution strategy of the

vaccine.

Data produced by the supercomputer also shows that there could be a third wave of the H1N1 virus in the spring.

The Texas Department of State Health Service, as of last week, said the state had received nearly 1 million doses of the swine flu vaccine.

Southwest launches \$25 fare sale

DALLAS (AP) - Southwest Airlines has launched an air fare sale in which some flights cost the same as what other carriers charge to check a bag.

Dallas-based Southwest on Tuesday announced oneway travel as low as \$25, based on the length of the flight.

The discount carrier says fares are \$25 for travel up to 375 miles. The price is \$50 for travel between 375 and 549 miles, and \$75 for flights between 550 and **999 miles**.

A one-way fare of more than 1,000 miles costs \$100. The fares are available for purchase through Thursday, for travel between Dec. 2 and Dec. 16, or between Jan. 5 and Feb. 10. Other restrictions apply.

Potter County redo could use \$450 gallon paint


AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — Paint costing \$450 a gallon could be used to spruce up a courthouse in Amarillo.

Potter County commissioners have instructed facilities director Mike Head to prepare a sample of the special epoxy product for window frames.

An advisory committee is suggesting using the paint, in a restoration effort meant to keep the windows looking good for up to 30 years.

Commissioner Joe Kirkwood, who raised questions about the cost, said paying \$450 a gallon would be fine by him "if this was 100-year paint."

Obama putting \$3.4 billion toward a 'smart' power grid

ARCADIA, Fla. (AP) -President Barack Obama made a pitch for renewable energy Tuesday, announcing \$3.4 billion in government support for 100 projects aimed at modernizing the nation's power grid.

Touring a field of solar energy panels in west-central Florida, the president urged greater use of several technologies to make America's power transmission system more efficient and better suited to the digital age. The projects include installing "smart" electric meters in homes, automating utility substations, and installing thousands of new digital transformers and grid sensors.

"There's something big happening in America in

terms of creating a cleanenergy economy," Obama said, although he added there is much more to be done

He likened the effort to the ambitious development of the national highway system 50 years ago. He said modernization would lead to a "smarter, stronger and more secure electric grid."

Under muggy skies, Obama toured the DeSoto Next Generation Solar Energy Center, which is designed to generate enough energy for about 3,000 residential customers of the utility FPL. It is the nation's largest photovoltaic electricity facility.

Obama said a modern grid could give consumers better control over their

electricity usage and costs, and spur development of renewable energy sources such as wind and solar.

The \$3.4 billion in grants from the government's January economic stimulus program will be matched by \$4.7 billion in private investments. The smallest grant will be \$400,000 and the largest \$200 million.

"We have a very antiquated (electric grid) system in our country," Carol Browner, assistant to the president for energy and climate change, told reporters. "The current system is outdated, it's dilapidated."

Matt Rogers, the Energy Department official involved in the program, said the 100 projects were selected from 400 proposed. The money will be

distributed over the next two months and the work is expected to be done over the next one to three years, he said.

Even as Obama pitched more efficient and renewable energy use, his trip to Arcadia made it clear that old habits and dependencies die hard. He arrived in a motorcade of gas-guzzling SUVs. While waiting for the motorcade to get started, several vans kept their engines running to provide air conditioning for occupants escaping a hot Florida sun.

The U.S. Chamber of Commerce, which has been at odds with Obama over health care, energy and other matters, praised the clean-energy initiative.

left and took their son with her to another state. Martin moved in with his parents. After a few months his parents asked him to leave. The severity of his seizures frightened him and they did not want the responsibility of caring for him.

So, with winter fast approaching, Martin found himself homeless. Not only was he homeless, he had no way to pay for his medication or doctor visits. EFWT was able to assist Martin, by purchasing his medication and paying for his doctor visits. The social worker for EFWT networked with other United Way agencies to obtain food, clothing, and temporary shelter.

Because of your generosity, Martin is a success story. He is living in a small apartment. He is still not able to work, but he hopes to be able to one day when his seizures are under control. Martin is currently having about ten to twelve seizures a month. He is working with his neurologist to find the right combination of medication for him. As winter approaches once again, Martin is appreciative that he will not have to worry about a roof over his head or something warm to eat.

New deadliest month in Afghan war KABUL (AP) — Eight

American troops were killed in two separate bomb attacks Tuesday in southern Afghanistan, making October the deadliest month of the war for U.S. forces since the 2001 invasion to oust the Taliban.

In one of the insurgent assaults, seven Americans were killed while patrolling in armored vehicles, U.S. forces spokesman Lt. Col. Todd Vician said. He said an Afghan civilian died in the same attack. The eighth American was killed in a separate bombing elsewhere in the south, also while patrolling in a military vehicle, he said. The military issued a

statement saying the deaths

occurred during "multiple, complex" bomb strikes. It said several troops were wounded and evacuated to a nearby medical facility, but gave no other details.

Capt. Adam Weece, a spokesman for American forces in the south, said both attacks occurred in Kandahar province.

The Dallas Morning News on the federal government and medical marijuana:

There's a way to be compassionate to patients who would benefit from medical marijuana without providing a loophole allowing others to get high. At last, the federal government is making this distinction.

Last week, Attorney General Eric Holder instructed federal prosecutors not to go after people who use marijuana for relief of pain and other symptoms in the 14 states where medicinal use is permitted. His memo reverses longstanding federal policy and marks a step toward separating those who could be helped by marijuana's therapeutic properties from those who criminally distribute or use it. Medical science is gathering evidence that ingredients in marijuana can ease chronic pain, help some cancer patients and control chronic nausea, vomiting and glaucoma. The once skeptical American Medical Association sup-

ports research into marijuana's medical benefits and backs efforts to develop a smoke-free inhaled delivery system.

Public opinion also is changing, including in Texas, where any marijuana use is illegal. A 2004 statewide poll indicated that 75 percent favored allowing patients to use marijuana medicinally if their doctor approved.

The Justice Department's new stance makes certain that federal prosecutors are able to continue pursuing sham enterprises that distribute marijuana under the pretext of helping patients. 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

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
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
