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Court upholds death sentence in 1986 murders

HOUSTON (AP) — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals has upheld the death sentence of a Houston man convicted of killing a woman and her 2-year-old son although three of the nine judges believe he deserves a new trial.

Michael Wayne Norris was convicted and condemned for the November 1986 shooting deaths of 38-year-old Georgia Rollins and her son, Keith.

At the time, Norris, now 51, already was out of prison after serving seven years of an eight-year term for another murder.

Judge Paul Womack, joined Wednesday by two other judges on the state's highest criminal court, says he believes the law making multiple killings eligible for a death sentence was misapplied in this case because Norris didn't intend to kill the child.

Study finds Texas teacher merit pay did little for kids

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas spent \$300 million on merit pay for teachers in the past three years in an effort that led to few gains by students.

The National Center on Performance Incentives reviewed the now-defunct Texas Educator Excellence Grant.

The Dallas Morning News reported that researchers determined there was "no systematic evidence that TEEG had an impact on student achievement gains."

Researchers examined reading scores on the TAKS for more than 140,000 students.

A spokeswoman for Gov. Rick Perry, Allison Castle, says he supports incentivizing the best teachers through merit pay.

Legislators provided nearly \$200 million annually for another merit pay plan that began last year, District Awards for

Teacher Excellence, or DATE.

"Tonight's passage of Proposition 4 sends this important message: Texans understand that more nationally recognized research universities will help retain Texas-grown talent, recruit top

researchers who will generate billions of dollars in economic growth and create more high paying, permanent jobs," said former Lt. Governor Bill Hobby, co-chair of Texans for Tier One.

All the ballot propositions had to win two-thirds passage in the Legislature to go before voters.

2010 Visionaries in Preservation communities selected statewide

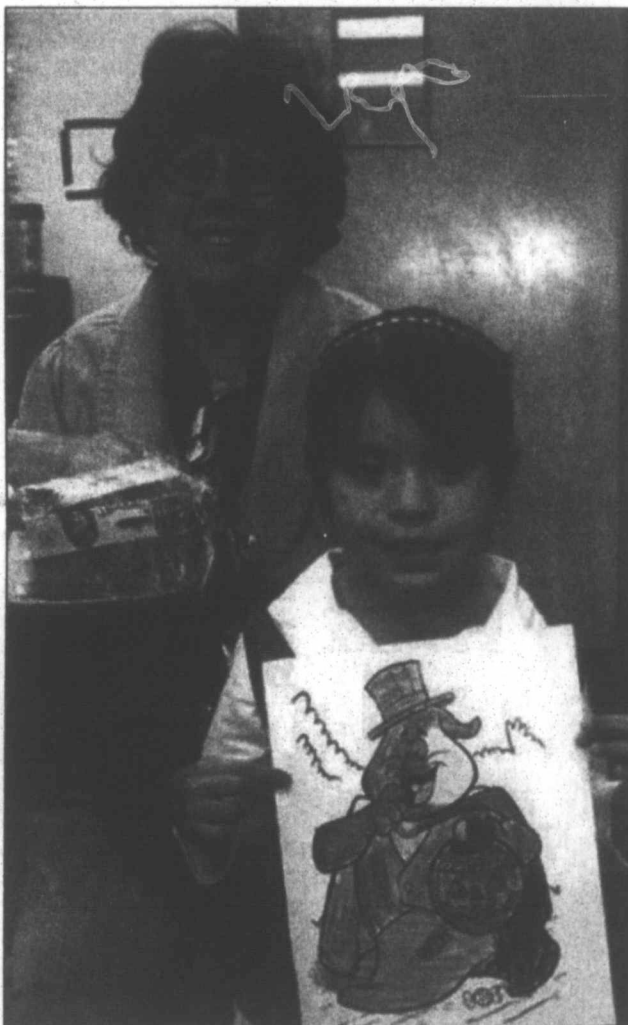
AUSTIN, Texas — The Texas Historical Commission (THC) recently announced the selection of three new communities to participate in the 2010 Visionaries in Preservation (VIP) program. Beaumont, Eastland and Gonzales were chosen to work with this program, which provides cities with the opportunity to plan for the future and implement revitalization projects.

Every Texas community has a unique history and helping tell their stories and preserve their unique sense of place is one goal of the VIP Program. However, many of these communities have been neglected and affected by urban sprawl. The VIP Program empowers them to shape the future of their historic preservation efforts through visioning and planning by providing training and assistance tailored to achieve local preservation goals.

"VIP communities are

places that capture the true Texas mystique," said Josh Lasserre, state coordinator of the VIP Program. "The structures and the people that shape each unique place tell the real stories of our state's historic past."

Beaumont, Eastland and Gonzales join 31 other communities participating in the VIP Program that utilize historic preservation as a vital element to create jobs, provide affordable quality housing, increase economic development and revitalize downtown business districts. The VIP Program helps establish a path to capture these benefits using an innovative planning process known as "visioning." Visioning is a tool that brings citizens together to develop a shared image of the future and the steps needed to achieve specific goals. The visioning process consists of a series of facilitated public workshops that produce a local preservation action plan based on com-

Today's Highlight in History:

One year ago, on Nov. 4, 2008, Democrat Barack Obama was elected the first black president of the United States, defeating Republican John McCain; Democrats gained seats in the Senate and House.

On this date:

In 1884, Democrat Grover Cleveland was elected to his first term as president, defeating Republican James G. Blaine.

In 1922, the entrance to King Tutankhamen's tomb was discovered in Egypt.

In 1924, Nellie T. Ross of Wyoming was elected the nation's first female governor to serve out the remaining term of her late husband, William B. Ross.

British forces commanded by Lt. Gen. Bernard Montgomery.

In 1952, Dwight D. Eisenhower was elected president, defeating Democrat Adlai Stevenson.

In 1979, the Iran hostage crisis began as militants stormed the United States Embassy in Tehran, seizing its occupants; for some, it was the start of 444 days of captivity.

In 1980, Ronald Reagan won the White House as he defeated President Jimmy Carter by a strong margin.

In 1991, Ronald Reagan opened his presidential library in Simi Valley, Calif., with a dedication attended by President George H.W. Bush and former Presidents Jimmy Carter, Gerald R. Ford and Richard Nixon — the first-ever gathering of five past and present U.S. chief executives.

In 1995, Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin was assassinated by a right-wing Israeli minutes after attending a festive peace rally.

Ten years ago: Aaron McKinney, who beat gay college student Matthew Shepard and left him to die on the Wyoming prairie, avoided the death penalty by agreeing to serve life in prison without parole and promising never to appeal his conviction. Some 10,000 Iranian students rallied outside the former U.S. Embassy in Tehran to mark the 20th anniversary of its seizure by Islamic militants.

Five years ago: Following his re-election victory, President George W. Bush pledged to aggressively pursue major changes in Social Security, the tax code and medical malpractice awards. It was announced that Elizabeth Edwards, wife of former Democratic vice-presidential candidate John Edwards, had been diagnosed with breast cancer the same day her husband and Sen. John Kerry conceded the presidential race.

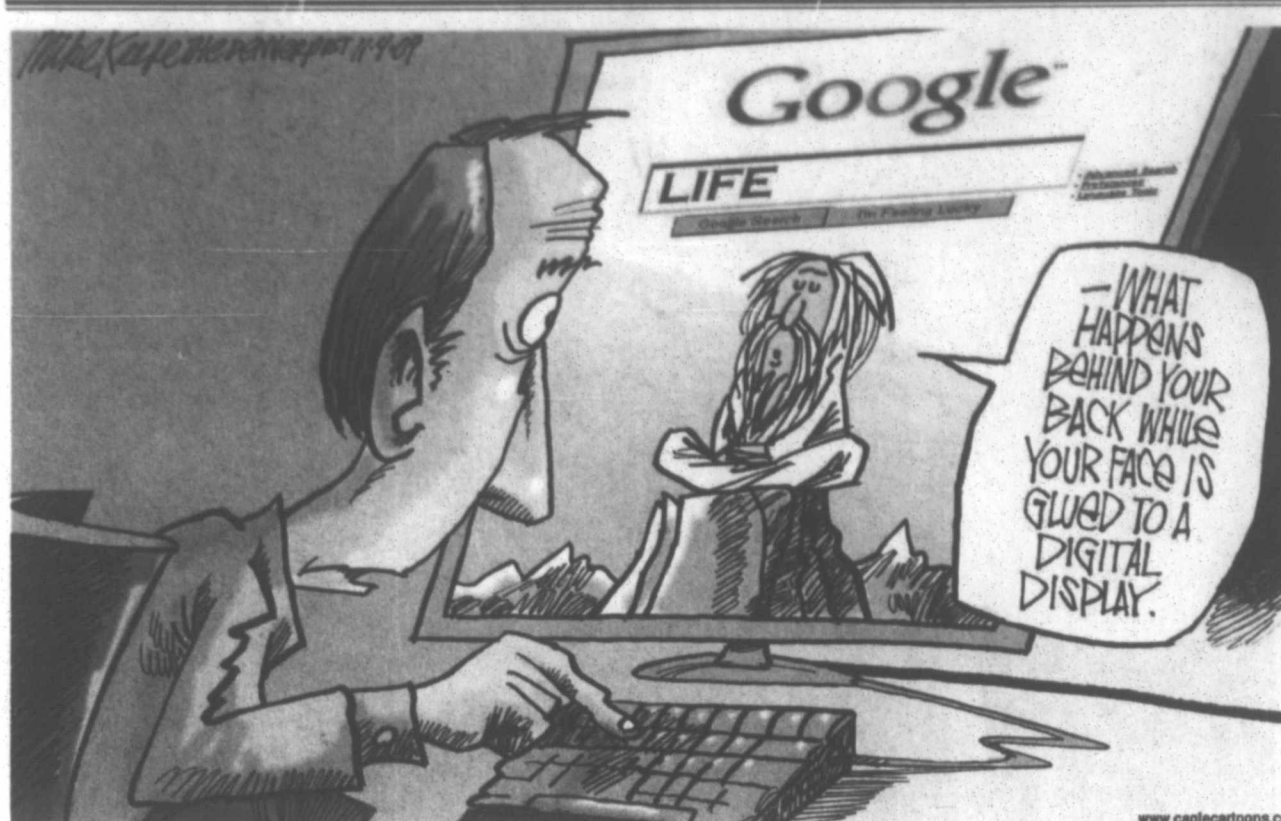
One year ago: California voters approved Proposition 8, a constitutional amendment outlawing same-sex marriage, overturning a state Supreme Court decision that gave gay couples the right to wed just months earlier. Author Michael Crichton died in Los Angeles at age 66.

Opinion from across Texas

The Dallas Morning News on testing teachers:

The U.S. Department of Education has put down a marker: First-year elementary school teachers in Texas must pass a broad exam to be considered "highly qualified." Being tested in a single subject will not cut it.

This recent move by Washington is a good one because elementary children deserve teachers who are equipped to teach effectively in all the core subjects they are responsible for -- including math, science, reading and social studies. Not getting those building blocks right sets students up for failure somewhere along their public school path.

A test alone won't guarantee great teachers, but it can stop unqualified ones from getting jobs in elementary schools, where instructors most often teach multiple subjects.

The No Child Left Behind law requires teachers to be certified as "highly qualified." Hallelujah for that. And we commend Education Secretary Arne Duncan for continuing to make a huge deal of improving the quality of teachers. In a recent speech at Columbia University, he challenged schools of education to turn out better teachers.

That takes guts, given the power of teachers unions in some parts of the country. So, too, did his ruling regarding first-year elementary teachers in Texas.

Texas Education Agency Commissioner Robert Scott responded with a letter largely challenging the ruling. But he also offered a compromise: Let new Texas teachers off the hook this year for passing the exam, and in return, the agency will require future first-year teachers to pass it.

Scott's offer is reasonable. The suggested compromise does not let the state off the hook for improving its teacher corps, but it would also avoid potential upheaval one-third of the way through the current school year.

It could take Washington awhile to respond to Scott's letter, and, the next thing you know, it could easily be December. We don't see the effectiveness of testing teachers that far into the school year. (Dallas Independent School District spokesman Jon Dahlander says about 75 DISD teachers would be eligible for this test.) We hope Washington accepts the TEA compro-

mise, while keeping the pressure on to make sure this teacher-quality message remains highly visible.

As much as we all appreciate teachers, the most important people in this equation are students. If they are sitting in classrooms where teachers aren't qualified in critical subjects, they deserve better.

That's the bottom line.

Fort Worth Star-Telegram on flu-vaccine distribution:

The last thing needed during this H1N1 pandemic is for the public to be alarmed unnecessarily by manufactured and hyped-up outrage about an issue that makes perfect sense when explained in reasonable and noninflammatory terms.

Yet screaming newspaper headlines and boisterous soundbites on talk radio have aroused many residents to the point of hysteria over that fact that thousands of prisoners in the state penitentiary might be inoculated with the swine flu vaccine before "law-abiding Texans."

It is understandable that many people -- in Texas and around the country -- are frustrated with the slower-than-expected vaccine production and delivery to major population centers. But that is no reason to become irrational because proper procedures are being followed to give priority to high-risk populations that include pregnant women, those with compromised immune systems and people with medical conditions that put them at a higher risk for complications from the flu.

Texas prisons contain thousands of high-risk people -- pregnant women, HIV-positive inmates and those with other severe medical issues -- who, if left untreated, could spread the disease not just within the more than 158,000 closely confined men and women inside the prisons but also far beyond their walls.

High-risk inmates are scattered throughout 112 prisons located in communities across the state. More than 40,000 correctional officers and medical personnel -- people who go home to their families at the end of their shifts -- come in contact with those locked behind bars. Then there are the thousands of family members of inmates who visit, as well as outside vendors and service providers who make contact with people

inside those institutions.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice officials have requested enough swine flu vaccine to inoculate the 45,244 most at-risk individuals immediately and eventually the entire prison population. As of today, the TDCJ has not received any vaccine.

As state Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, said: "I can appreciate that people in the free world who are waiting for a shot may not understand why people who are incarcerated are priority, but that doesn't mean we should allow a catastrophic epidemic inside the very enclosed high-risk populations in prison."

Twenty-three cases of H1N1 within Texas prisons were reported from Sept. 1 through Monday, TDCJ officials said. The state has the responsibility to take every precaution to keep the virus confined to as few inmates and employees as possible.

State and federal lawmakers who are being encouraged by misguided constituents to somehow get involved by changing the distribution policy should resist their instinct

to pander. Public health decisions are best left to those most qualified to administer the plans for fighting this pandemic.

Although the list of priorities for those who receive vaccinations first was set months ago by the U. S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, this is not a new procedure in Texas. Every year, the same high-risk confined population is given the vaccine for whatever stripe of flu is going around. This year there just happens to be two stripes the seasonal variety and H1N1.

Within the prison system, medical staff will receive the first doses, followed by correctional officers and other workers and then the inmates.

This is not only a logical plan, but a wise one. There is no need to be riled by the alarmists.

Democrat vows \$10 million run for governor

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A wealthy Houston businessman says he will use \$10 million of his own money in his Democratic primary bid for governor.

Hair care executive Farouk Shami says he plans a formal campaign announcement Nov. 19.

Shami, the founder and chairman of Farouk Systems Inc., also says he would waive the governor's \$150,000 annual salary and accept just \$1 to serve Texas.

The Austin American-Statesman reports

the 66-year-old political novice said Tuesday that he is "100 percent sure" that he will be the next governor of Texas.

Gov. Rick Perry and U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison are expected to face off in the Republican primary in March.

Others seeking the Democratic nomination include former U.S. ambassador Tom Schieffer, therapist Mark Thompson, humorist Kinky Friedman and rancher Hank Gilbert.

Marine from San Antonio killed

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Marine from Texas serving in Afghanistan has been killed.

The Defense Department says 26-year-old Sgt. Cesar B. Ruiz of San Antonio died Saturday while supporting combat operations in the Helmand province.

Ruiz was assigned to Marine Forces Reserve in New Orleans.

Further details on the death were not immediately released by the Pentagon.

About 20 relatives gathered Tuesday night in San Antonio to remember Ruiz. The San Antonio Express-News reports his mother, Maria Ruiz, was celebrating her birthday on Halloween when she learned that her son had been killed the same day in a roadside bombing.

DEAR GRANDPA: Whether Rhett's behavior -- and his parents' tolerance of it -- is "fine" in today's world depends upon the standards in that household. However, there are "family manners" and "company manners." From your description of the goings-on during your visit, and that no effort was made to spend any quality time with you, I'd say your grandson's behavior was just plain rude.

That said, Rhett was not entirely to blame. Some fault lies with your son and his wife for tolerating your being ignored and not insisting that you be treated with more courtesy and respect.

DEAR ABBY: My brother, "Jeff," has not communicated with any of the family -- parents or

siblings -- for two years. Nobody knows why. We grew up a close-knit family with lots of love and affection.

About six years ago, Jeff moved with his wife and children to a different state. During the first few years, he stayed in touch via phone calls and E-mails, but suddenly all communication ceased. 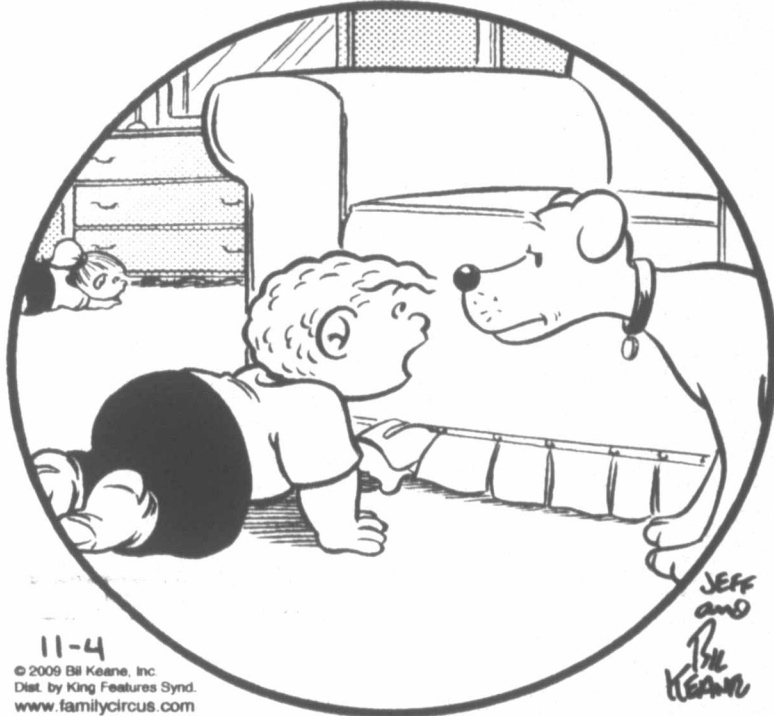

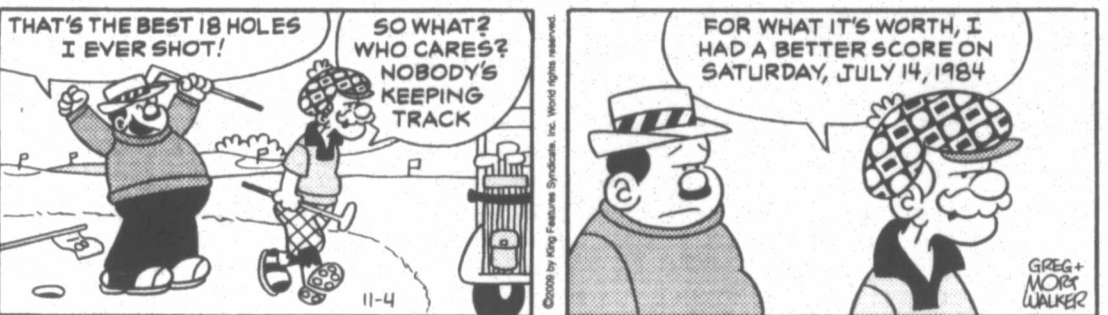

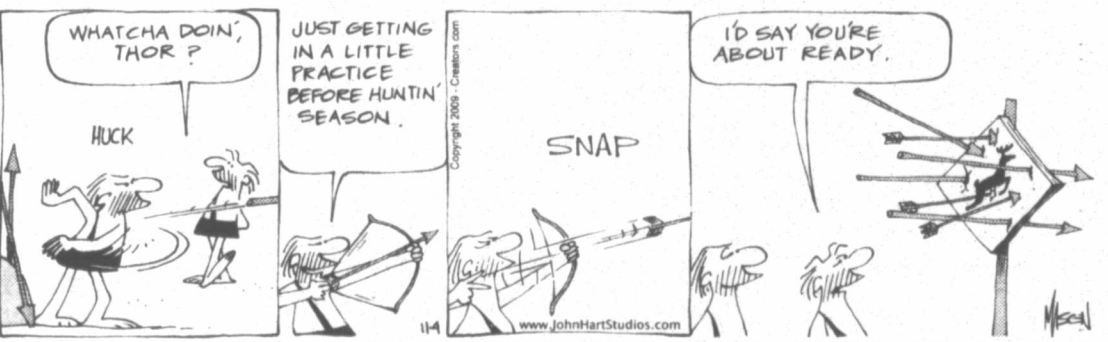

Head Coach Mark Elms said they had ups and downs this year but fin-

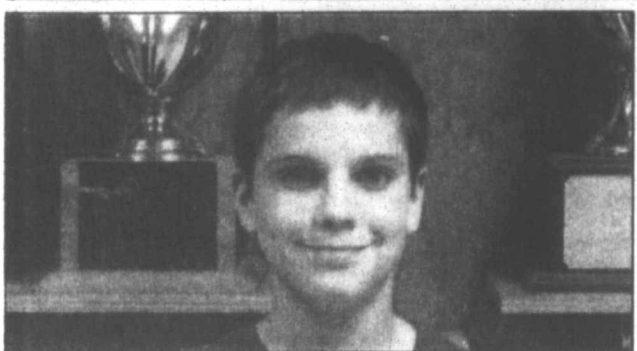
ished with everyone running hard.

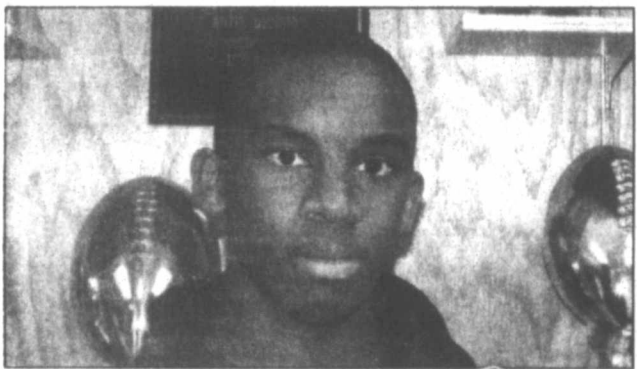
