## Two arrested in Pampa DPS meth bust

Two Pampa residents were in Gray County jail today on drug charges following a lengthy investigation by state narcotics officers. Curtis Wayne Matlock, 51, and Lori Beth White, 40, were arrested in Pampa Thursday by Texas Department of Public Safety officers on warrants charging them with possession of a controlled substance

Department of Public Safety officers with the agency's narcotics division in Amarillo said today that narcotics officers and DPS troopers arrested the pair shortly after 11 a.m. Thursday at 304 Tignor on warrants issued by 223rd District Judge Lee Waters.

Lt. Lucinda Russell with the Department of Public Safety narcotics' office in Amarillo said today that the arrests were the result of an investigation. She said

a drug lab at the Tignor Street house was not in operation, but a quantity of methamphetamine was seized.


Gray County Justice of the Peace Kurt Curfman was expected to set bond for the duo this afternoon.

# for shuttle launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - The countdown clocks at NASA are ticking toward a Monday launch of space shuttle Atlantis.

Officials said Friday everything is going well at the launch pad. Even the forecast is good, with 90 percent odds of fine flying weather.

Atlantis is loaded with spare parts for the International Space Station. The shuttle will carry up six astronauts and return with seven. The seventh, Nicole Stott, has been living on the station since the end of August.

Liftoff is set for 2:28 p.m. The flight could be delayed until Tuesday if an unmanned rocket with a communication satellite does not blast off Saturday as planned and is rescheduled for Sunday.

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## Countdown begins SRO at White Deer groundwater meeting

WHITE DEER -- It was standing room only at the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District this week when they held a public hearing on proposed conservation areas and additional study areas.

The district's board approved two new study areas, one in the southwest Roberts County and one in southeast Donley County.

The study area designation is the first step in monitoring a decline in groundwa-

ter in the district. The district's board of directors also delineated changes in boundaries in study areas in northeast Armstrong County, the Kingsmill area in Gray and Carson Counties, southwest Wheeler County, western Donley County and in Donley

The furor came at the meeting over a proposal to name two areas, one in Roberts County and one in Donley County, as conservation areas.

Texas Rangers investigating an in custody death involving Perryton P.D. and Wade Devin Wilson, 46 of Oklahoma have received a preliminary

autopsy report. The report indicates that Wade Wilson died of a combination of factors. It was cited that Wade Wilson had a preexisting heart condition and had also ingested Methamphetamines. These two factors contributed to Wade Wilson's death.

Texas Rangers investigating this case found that the Perryton P.D. acted as first responders to incident and tried to save the life of Wade Wilson. Rangers have also found that Perryton P.D. acted in an appropriate manner and that there is no indication of wrong doing on Perryton P.D.'s part.

The Rangers are also awaiting the final autopsy before closing the case.

## Lawyer: Accused Fort Hood gunman may be paralyzed

FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) - The Army psychiatrist accused in the fatal shootings at Fort Hood may be paralyzed from the waist down after being shot multiple times during the attack, his attorney told The Associated Press on Friday

Civilian attorney John Galligan said Maj. Nidal Malik Hasan told him that he had no feeling in his legs and extreme pain in his hands. Hasan, who was shot four times by civilian police officers, said doctors told him the condition may never improve.

Galligan said he spoke with Hasan for about an hour in the intensive care unit at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio on Thursday, the same day Hasan was charged with 13 counts of premeditated murder.

The attack at the sprawling Texas post last week injured 43 people, including 34 who suffered gunshot wounds. The military initially said 29 people and Hasan had been wounded, but some of the injuries came to the attention of authorities days later as they pieced together what happened the day of the shooting.

Galligan said that his client's medical condition remains "extremely serious" and that Hasan didn't flinch when Galligan touched his leg. One of Hasan's relatives was able to see him Thursday for the first time since he was hospitalized.

Hospital spokesman Dewey Mitchell said he could not confirm whether Hasan was paralyzed because Hasan told hospi-

tal officials not to release any information about his condition or injuries.

Galligan said military prosecutors have not told him whether they plan to seek the death penalty, but he plans to file motions asking for a second military defense attorney and a civilian investigator to help with the case.

Army officials have said they believe Hasan acted

alone when he jumped on a table with two handguns, shouted "Allahu akbar" and opened fire inside a building at Fort Hood. The 13 people killed included a pregnant soldier and at least three other mental

Army Criminal Investigation Command spokesman Chris Grey has said Hasan could face additional charges.

It had not been decided whether to charge Hasan with the death of the soldier's unborn child, officials told The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak about the case publicly.

Galligan said he wasn't pleased that Hasan was charged in the hospital without his lawyers pres-

## CDC's swine flu toll: 4,000 dead, 22 million ill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Estimates of deaths caused by the swine flu have grown to nearly 4,000 since April, roughly quadrupling previous estimates. But that doesn't mean swine flu suddenly has worsened.

Instead, the federal numbers made public Thursday reflect a long-awaited better attempt to quantify the new flu's true toll. Most cases still don't require a doctor's care.

Swine flu has sickened about 22 million Americans since April and killed about 540 children.

And it's still early in the season.

"I am expecting all of these numbers, unfortunately, to continue to rise," said Dr. Anne Schuchat of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. "We have a long flu season ahead of us."

Tight supplies of vaccine to combat the illness continue: Not quite 42 million doses are currently available, a few million less than CDC had predicted last week.

A new Associated Press-GfK poll shows nearly 1 in 6 parents has gotten at least some of their children vaccinated against swine flu since inoculations began last month. An additional 14 percent of parents sought vaccine but couldn't find any.

Only about 30 percent of children routinely get flu vaccinations during a normal winter. That even this many have gotten vaccinated against the new flu, which scientists call the 2009 H1N1 strain, despite the shortage suggests CDC's target-the-young message has gotten through.

But three times as many adults have tried and failed to find vaccine for themselves as have succeeded.

And interest among the young adults who also are at high risk is waning fast, found the AP-GfK poll of 1,006 adults nationwide.

Schuchat urged patience in seeking

"It's a marathon and not a sprint," she said. "More vaccine is being ordered and delivered and used every day."

Until now, the CDC has conservatively estimated more than 1,000 deaths and "many millions" of new H1N1 infections.

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## Family hurt in Bushland pipeline explosion files suit in Potter County

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> WRITER LUBBOCK. (AP) — A family whose members suffered burns when a natural gas pipeline exploded last week in the Texas Panhandle filed a negligence lawsuit Thursday against the companies that own and oper-

The Torres family filed the suit in Potter County against the pipeline's owner, El Paso Natural Gas Co.; its parent company, Houston-based El Paso Corp.; and the pipeline operator, Atmos Energy

Company spokesman declined to comment.

Kevin Glasheen, the Lubbock attorney representing the family, said the suit was filed so soon after the explosion to ensure that evidence at the blast site is

The 24-inch pipeline exploded near Bushland, 15 miles west of Amarillo, about 1 a.m. on Nov. 5. The blast shook homes, melted window blinds and shot flames hundreds of feet into the air that were seen 20 miles away. The blast left a hole about 30 yards by 20 yards and close

to 15 feet deep. Federal pipeline investigators continued to look into the cause of the explo-


According to a statement from Glasheen's firm, the Torres home was about 100 yards from where the pipeline exploded. Three

members of the family were injured.

The family's mother and father, Alfredo and Agnieszka Torres, have been released from an Amarillo hospital.

Franczeska Torres, 15, remained in a Lubbock hospital's burn unit Thursday with serious burns to 30 percent of her body, Glasheen said. She suffered burns to her face, legs and hands, the release said.

In 2007, El Paso Natural Gas agreed to a \$15.5 million fine as part of a settlement with the U.S. Department of Justice and pipeline safety regulators involving an explosion near Carlsbad, N.M., in 2000 that killed 12 members of a family who were camped near the pipeline.

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




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


