ov. 3 county election results official

The votes have been cast, the ballots are in and the Gray County Commission has made it official.

During their regular meeting Monday, the Gray County Commissioners Court canvassed the votes from the Nov. 3 election for 11 constitutional amendments,

FAMILY HARVEST

a tax freeze for people 65 or older and the disabled in Gray County and for a bond issue for Lefors Independent School District.

Gray County voters approved the 65 and older and disabled property tax freeze by a margin of 1,362 to 293. Lefors voters also approved a school bonds election.

While the all of the constitution-

al amendments passed at the state level, Proposition 1 authorizing municipal and county financing of buffer areas around military installations failed in Gray County.

Joint Election Administrator Linda Lewis said 551 people cast ballots in early voting while 1,136 voters cast their ballots on Election

A total of 1,687 people voted out of 13,399 registered voters on the Gray County issue, she said.

Lewis said that in November, 2006, some 5,429 people voted. That was about 39.79 percent of the then 14,758 registered voters in Gray County.

With regard to precincts, Lewis COUNTY cont. on page 3

infrastructure and promote long-term economic development," said Charles S. (Charlie) Stone, TDRA executive director. "The grants will have a truly lasting impact on the communities that receive

them." The projects, which range from city-wide street improvements to replacement of cast-iron water pipe, would have gone unfunded if not for the agency's new competitive grant program, an \$8 million initiative authorized by the Texas Legislature and intended to make up for a funding shortfall in the federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. TDRA expects to offer the grant

\$250,000 project description is: Contractor shall replace old undersized cast iron water line to eliminate water loss and improve pressure. Construction shall include the installation of 3,890 6" water line, 5 fire hydrants, service connections and all necessary appurtenances.

Construction shall take place on Prairie Drive and Crawford.

The number of Pampa residents affected by this project is 107, according to RSF, the percenteage of those considered to be low to moderate income is 89, or 83.18 percent of those in the area.

"This is a competitive grant program, so the communities are to be commended for their diligence

The Pampa Harvesters season ended last Friday and I want to take so time to commend them on the good job they did this sea-Yes, this team only won

two games but they fought hard all season, which to some people is more important then winning. It could have been very easy for this team to pack it in after they started 0-5. However, they did not. Head Coach Heath Parker as always told me it's more important to play your best football in October than September.

On October 8, Pampa took their first district game with a 35-23 victory over the Randall Raiders moving their record to 1-0 in district. However, this team would fall into another pitfall as they lost their next two district games to the Canyon Eagles and the Dumas Demons. At that point of the season the Harvesters were in a must win facing the Caprock Longhorns at Dick Bivins

Again the Harvesters rose to the challenge. The offense had one of their best performances of the season. Pampa jumped out to a 28-7 lead which they carried to a 42-26 victory and practically locked up a playoff spot.

Then came the regular season finale at Harvester Field against the Palo Duro Dons. Pampa entered the game with high hopes of coming away with a victory and end their home losing streak. But two quick running backs on Palo Duro had other plans, as they scored touchdowns from 60, 80 and 85 yards. The Dons took a commanding 35-6 lead and coasted to a 35-13 victory.

As the game was winding down scores from the Dumas-Randall game and the Canyon-Caprock

game were coming in. Two games that could affect the Harvesters making a trip to the playoffs. But at night's end Randall lost to Dumas and Caprock lost to the district champion Canyon Eagles, sending the Harvesters to the playoffs for the first time since

That brings us to last Friday the 13th at Dick Bivins Stadium against the Hereford Whitefaces. The same field where Pampa won their last game to get them into the playoffs. Early on the Harvesters gave the fans something to cheer about as they took a 3-0 lead. The Harvesters' defense stopped the Whitefaces offense their first two possessions. But Hereford would take control of the game taking a 20-3 halftime lead and winning 41-9.

Although there was a lot of rough moments during the season, there was some

positives. The Harvesters won two district games for the first time since 2005 when they last made the playoffs, before this season. Pampa had nine alldistrict selections and five honorable mentions.

So next season looks bright for the Harvesters. Parker and his staff will get to build on the positives from this season with their returning players to have a more successful season next year. Last but not least who can forget the fans, to quote one of the boosters "that have positive energy to stay till the end of the game to sing the fight song with the players.'

Thanksgiving is top day for cooking fires

National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) is calling on cooks across the nation to include fire safety in their recipes because Thanksgiving is the leading day for home cooking fires. U.S. firefighters responded to roughly 1,300 home fires involving cooking equipment on Thanksgiving in 2007, roughly three times the daily average of cooking fires, according to NFPA.

"Incorporating fire safety into your holiday preparations can mean the difference between putting on a fantastic holiday feast for family and friends or having to call the fire department to put out a fire," said NFPA's Vice President of Communications Lorraine Carli.

Cooking is the leading cause of home fires. During 2003-2006, U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated average of 150,200 home structure fires involving cooking equipment per year. These fires caused an annual average of 500 civilian deaths, 4,660 civilian injuries, and \$756 million in direct property damage.

Cooking equipment was involved in 40 percent of all reported home fires, 17 percent of home fire deaths, 36 percent of home civilian injuries, and 12 percent of the direct property damage resulting from home fires.

Unattended cooking was by far the leading contributing factor in these fires. Something that could catch fire was too close to the equipment ranked second and unintentionally turned on or not turned off ranked third.

NFPA recommends the following cooking safety tips:

Cook with Caution
Be on alert! If you are
sleepy or have consumed
alcohol, don't use the stove
or stovetop.

Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

When in doubt, just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.




