Additional suspect in burglaries arrested

Another McLean teenager was in Gray County jail today in connection with an investigation into a burglary ring.

William Thomas Eldridge, 17, was arrested by Gray County deputies Wednesday on charges of burglary of a building.

Gray County Sheriff's Lt. Joe B. Hoard said today that Eldridge was arrested on a warrant issued by Justice of the Peace Mary Ann Carpenter of McLean.

Monday, three McLean teenagers were arrested by Gray County sheriff's deputies on similar charges.

Garrett Tyler Griffin, 17, is in Gray County jail today in lieu of \$2,500 bond set by Justice of the Peace Joe Martinez. He was charged with burglary of a building and also faces charges of driving without a license.

Scott Casey Smith, 17, and

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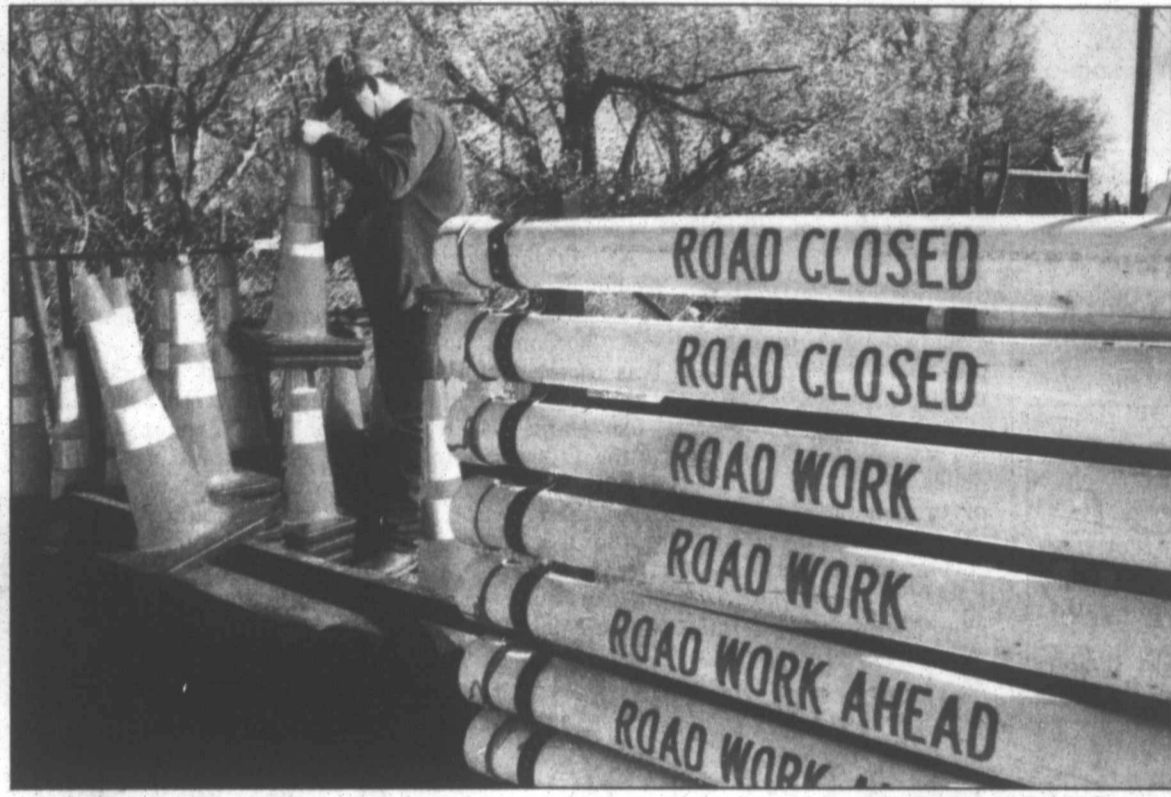

City staff ready for winter weather

With winter fast approaching, the Pampa Public Service Department's street and parks crew is busy preparing for cold weather.

"Most of our equipment is ready," said Ed Turner, superintendent for the city's street and parks.

He said they haven't mounted the snow plows yet since they're still using the trucks for other tasks, but when the first storm of the winter hits, it won't take long to get the plows on the trucks and the trucks on Pampa streets.

"We're still using the truck for hauling," Turner said, "but we can hook the plows up on a minute's notice."

On a bright, sunny fall afternoon at the city barn, Turner said that with the newer trucks and plows they have, it takes only a couple of minutes to mount the plows.

"With the older trucks, maybe it's a little longer," Turner said.

He said with the new plows, it's just a matter of pulling up to them, hitting a switch and going on to clear city streets.

"It's a lot different than it was in the old days," Turner grinned.

He and Terry Brown of the street and parks crew built the mounting brackets on the front of one of the older trucks.

"We built the snow plow that goes on the front of it, too," he said.

It took three or four weeks to build the mounting platform on the older truck.

Turner admitted that mounting a snow plow on an oversized dump truck can be a problem on an icy morning before dawn, but his crew now has it down to a system, especially with the newer equipment.

"We'll have three sand trucks running," Turner said. "Depending upon how much snow we get,"

Gray County Grand Jury hands up 47 indictments

A Grand Jury, impanelled by the 223rd District Court of Gray County handed up 47 indictments during the second week of November.

Tom Douglas Williams, 18, was indicted on one count of criminal mischief allegedly committed January 4, 2009. The indictment charges; Williams, intentionally or knowingly destroyed a computer server and software by spraying a fire extinguisher into the computer server. Damage is listed at between \$20,00 and \$100,000. Bond was set at \$4,000.

Williams was further indicted on one charge of burglary of a building. Bond was set at \$3,000.

Quentin Daniels Story, 21, was indicted on one count of sexual assault on a child, allegedly committed on August 15, 2008. Bond was set at \$10,000.

Wilma Steward, 56, was indicted on one count of manufacture with intent to deliver methamphetamine in an amount more than four grams but less than 200 grams. The alleged offense is stated to have taken place December 10, 2004. Bond was set at \$25,000.

Raymond Arthur Steward, 55, was indicted on one count of manufacture with intent to deliver methamphetamine in an amount more than four grams but less than 200 grams. The alleged offense is stated to have taken place December 10, 2004. Bond was set at \$25,000.

Julio Lopez Soto, 50, was indicted on one count of Driving While Intoxicated, third offense or more, allegedly committed on February 22, 2009. Soto has prior convictions in July, 1989 and August, 2003. Bond was set at \$2,500.

Eleazar Soto, Jr., 46, was indicted on one count of possession of a controlled substance, cocaine, a state jail felony. The offense allegedly occurred on January, 3, 2009. Bond was set at \$2,000.

Soto was also indicted on one charge of Driving while intoxicated, third offense or more, a second degree felony. The alleged offense occurred on Jan. 3, 2009. According to the indictment, he was

Gov to decide condemned killer's fate

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — The fate of a man facing execution Thursday evening for his role in a fatal robbery was in the hands of Gov. Rick Perry after the state parole board recommended the death sentence be commuted to life in prison.

The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles made the rare recommendation Wednesday for Robert Lee Thompson, 34, who was not the triggerman in the fatal shooting of a Houston convenience store clerk. The shooter, Sammy Butler, was convicted and received life in prison.

Perry was not required to follow the recommendation of the board, whose members he appoints.

"The governor has received the board's recommendation but has not made a decision," spokeswoman Allison Castle said Wednesday.

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FAA glitch causes widespread US air travel delays

ATLANTA (AP) — Air travelers nationwide scrambled to revise their plans Thursday after an FAA computer glitch caused widespread cancellations and delays for the second time in 15 months. The Federal Aviation Administration said the problem, which lasted about five hours, was fixed around 10 a.m., but it was unclear how long flights would be affected.

Doug Church, a spokesman for the National Air Traffic Controllers Union, said controllers were still entering flight plans manually in some locations even after the glitch was fixed.

Aviation officials told The Associated Press that the problem began at the computer center in Salt Lake City. The officials asked not to be named because they were not authorized to speak publicly.

FAA spokesman Paul Takemoto said the problem started between 5:15 and 5:30 a.m. Airplane dispatchers had to send plans to controllers, who entered them by hand.

"It's slowing everything down," Takemoto said.

Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport, the world's busiest, was particularly affected. The problem also exacerbated delays caused by bad weather in the Northeast, with airports in the Chicago, Washington, D.C., and New York metro areas reporting problems.

Some flights were more than two hours behind schedule. Airports around the South also reported delays and cancellations.

U.S. Sen. Charles Schumer, D-New York, said the country's aviation

system is "in shambles" and the FAA needs more resources to prevent such problems from continuing.

"If we don't deliver the resources, manpower, and technology the FAA it needs to upgrade the system, these technical glitches that cause cascading delays and chaos across the country are going to become a very regular occurrence," he said in a statement.

Houston's two airports and Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport reported few delays but said things could get worse, especially for travelers headed east. Los Angeles International Airport also reported that delays were likely later in the day.

Man in coma awakes to ATM crime

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A man who spent two months in a coma at an Austin hospital awoke to discover he was a crime victim.

Austin police said Thursday that they're seeking a woman seen on ATM bank surveillance video using his debit card.

Police say the Seton Medical Center patient lapsed into a coma in May and that his debit card was used at least eight times in late June to steal more than \$1,300. One withdrawal happened in San Antonio, while the rest were in Austin.

Police Detective Matt Conley says the card had been in the man's wallet in a backpack kept in his room. He says that when the man came to, the backpack remained but the wallet was gone.

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Execution

Thompson's lawyer, Patrick McCann, also had an appeal before the U.S. Supreme Court to stop the lethal injection, which would be the 23rd this year in Texas and second in as many nights.

The parole board's 5-2 vote came in response to a petition from McCann, who argued that the case was similar to that of Kenneth Foster, who was also convicted and sentenced to die under the law of parties. Under that law, offenders conspiring to commit one felony like robbery can all be held responsible for another ensuing crime, such as murder.

Perry commuted Foster's sentence to life two years ago. Foster became only the second inmate since Texas resumed carrying out executions in 1982 who won a recommenda-

tion from the parole board as his execution loomed.

In the first case, in 2004, Perry rejected the board's recommendation and mentally ill prisoner Kelsey Patterson was executed.

Perry's explanation for commuting Foster's sentence was that Foster and his co-defendant were tried together on capital murder charges for a slaying in San Antonio. In Thompson's case, he and Butler were tried separately for the shooting death of 29-year-old Mansoor Bhai Rahim Mohammed.

At least half a dozen other Texas inmates have been executed under the law of parties.

The U.S. Supreme Court since 1982 has barred the death penalty for co-conspirators who don't themselves kill. The justices made an exception in

1987, however, ruling that the Eighth Amendment didn't prohibit the execution of someone who plays a major role in a felony that results in murder and whose mental state is one of reckless indifference.

Evidence at his trial showed Thompson, who is black, told detectives he went on a two-month crime spree in 1996 because God told him to do something about Middle Eastern and Asian store clerks who discriminated against blacks.

In a recent interview with The Associated Press, Thompson said he wasn't against punishment for crime.

"That's the foundation of our system," he said. "But I am against the unfairness of the system, the way it picks and chooses."

Winter

we'll have two plows on the trucks and two motor graders running."

Of course, they never know for sure when a weather front is going to move through. The one that was forecast to bring snow to Pampa last week stayed to the north of Gray County, but that doesn't mean that Turner and his men ignore the weather forecast.

Turner said they start clearing streets whenever they get called.

"It could be the middle of the night," he said, "or we may start working one morning and the snow starts that day, and we'll work right on through the night."

Shaking his head, he admitted that his crews have pulled some 22-hour days to keep the streets clear for the residents of the city.

One of the things that will help this year is a new trailer that Brown built. It carries a lot of the traffic cones, signs and equipment to repair streets in bad weather.

"We've been talking about building one of these for years," Turner said, "and Terry just took it upon himself and got it done."

With costs rising on equipment, Turner said Brown had saved the city a lot of money by building it here in the city's maintenance barn.

"We had the trailer available," Turner said. "The only thing we had to do was put new fenders on it and build the racks and stuff."

Warning signs with frames that fold up slide easily into plastic pipe sleeves mounted in racks on the side of the trailer.

"We can just go up here

and take them out and put them up," Turner said. "We like organization."

With snow predicted in the next few weeks, Pampa Public Works Director Donny Hooper said they city is already stockpiling sand for the streets.

"We use bottom ash," Turner explained.

It's the ash from the bottom of the boilers at Xcel's Harrington Station north of Amarillo.

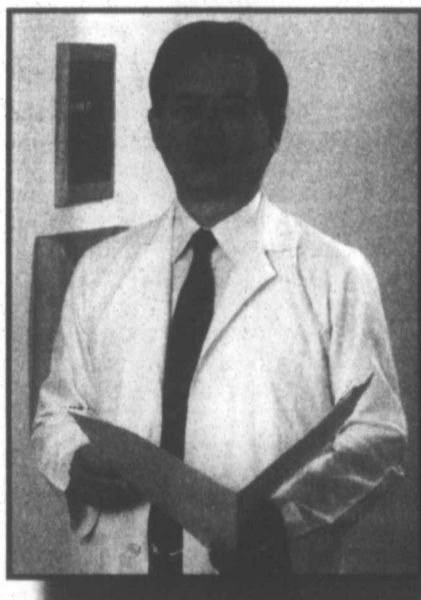

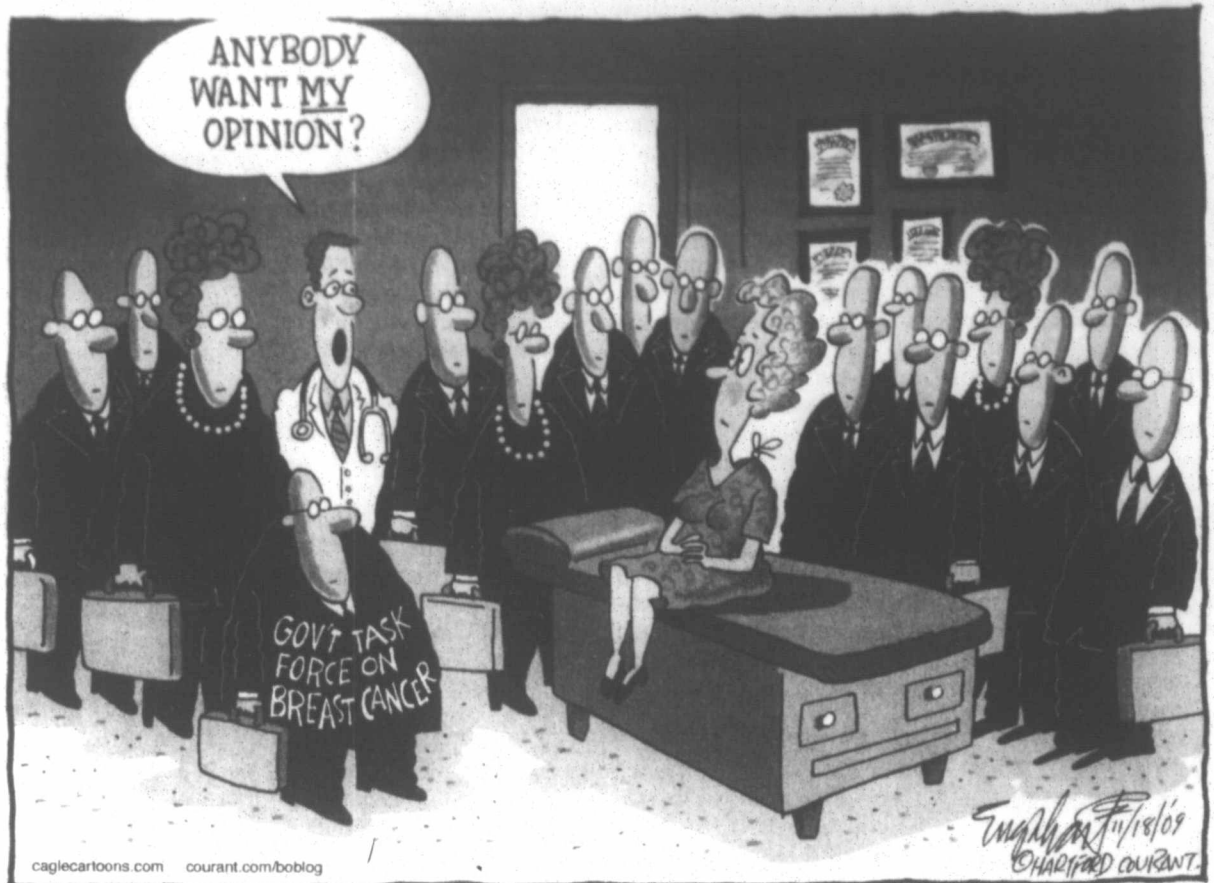

US works with and around Afghan leader

WASHINGTON (AP)

— The Obama administration has a simple-sounding strategy for the problem that is Hamid Karzai: Work with him and around him at the same time.

As President Barack Obama nears an announcement about whether the United States will add military forces to an unpopular war, he cannot avoid dealing with the corruption-stained Afghan leader and the culture of graft and inefficiency that years of U.S. and international largesse has helped to build.

But Washington is also looking for ways to direct aid, expertise and influence to local and provincial governments far from Karzai's compound in Kabul. The U.S. troop infusion widely expected for next year will also largely bypass Karzai, who wants more troops but won't get much say in where they go or how they are used.

"He has some strengths, but he has some weaknesses," Obama said Wednesday.

Never a favorite among Obama insiders, Karzai takes office for a second five-year term on Thursday

as Washington's inevitable man, instead of the indispensable man he was to former President George W. Bush.

Obama praised Karzai for holding his government together but declined to say he trusts him.

"I'm less concerned about any individual than I am with a government as a whole that is having difficulty providing basic services to its people," Obama said in his latest blunt assessment of the Karzai government. Obama made his comments during his trip to Asia in interviews with NBC, CNN and CBS.

The Karzai government's competence and ability to shed at least some of its taint of corruption are critical to whether there will be any credible Afghan civilian support for the growing U.S. war effort, now in its ninth year.

Senior administration officials say they are applying the tough love that Bush did not. For starters, Washington is asking Karzai not to embarrass his patrons by keeping obvious thugs on the payroll.

U.S. officials say they are already diverting some development money and

decision-making power away from Kabul ministries, taking advantage of Afghanistan's historically decentralized power system to give local leaders more direct control over projects in their backyards. The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because Obama's announcement about a revamped Afghanistan strategy is still under wraps.

The United States would prefer to see honest politicians at the helm of key government ministries such as Interior, Intelligence and Defense and the sketchier Karzai loyalists shunted off to places where they could do the least harm.

Washington has sent word that a few Karzai cronies must go and that he should not toss out ministers who have demonstrated their independence.

One failed critical test, so far, is that Karzai has refused to push aside a half brother long alleged to have links to the drug trade.

"The U.S. strategy cannot be dependent on Karzai," said Alex Thier, an Afghanistan specialist at the U.S. Institute of

Peace.

The Karzai government unveiled an anti-corruption and major crimes unit this week just as Afghanistan slipped three places to become the world's second most corrupt country, according to an annual survey by Transparency International, an anti-corruption watchdog.

"They've done some work on that, but in our view, not nearly enough to demonstrate a seriousness of purpose to tackle corruption," Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton told reporters Wednesday during her flight to Kabul for Karzai's inauguration. "We are concerned about corruption and we obviously think it has an impact on the quality and capacity of governing."

Clinton's presence lends a carefully calibrated blessing to Karzai's second term, which came after one deeply flawed election and one Karzai claimed by default.

Some other nations sent heads of state, but there was never much chance that Obama himself would make the trip.

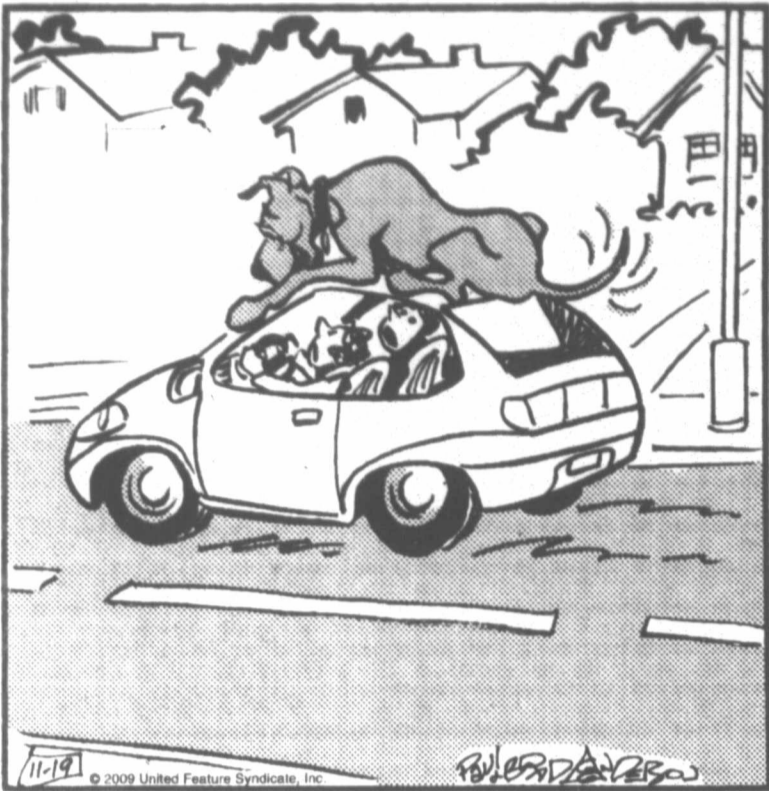

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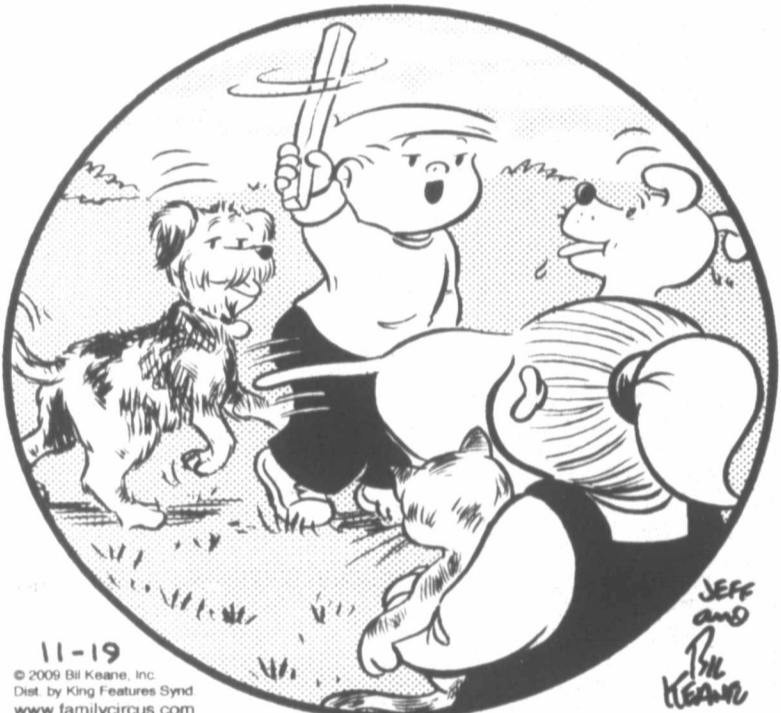

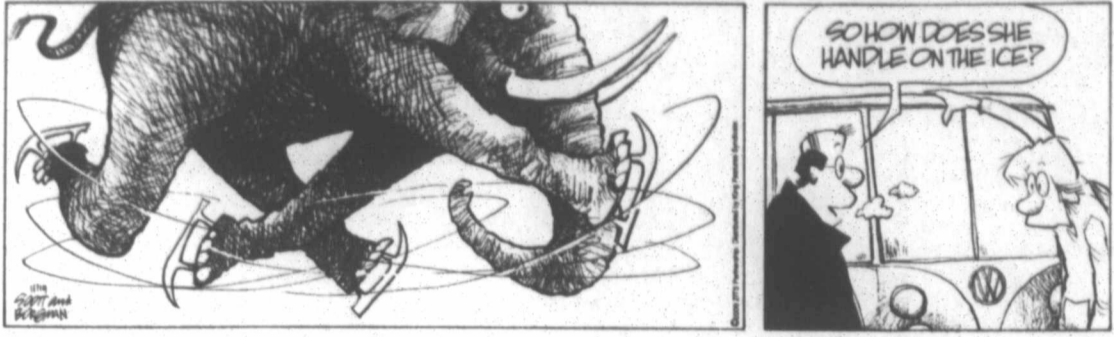
