# PISD board tours new junior high

Beneath the tungsten lit skies of the new Pampa Junior High School, school board members toured the building that is still under construction.

Pampa Independent School District board of trustees donned hard hats and toured the new junior high school in the first of two meetings they have scheduled this week.

Jeff Reed, the supervising architect with Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, and Ricky Fleming, senior project manager with Western Builders showed the school board through the new school Wednesday

The new junior high is expected to be completed in time for the 2010 fall semester.

"We started dirt work in February," said Reed. "We'll be through for the 2010-2011 school year."

He projected a completion date in mid-July of 2010, giving the school administration time to

# PEDC discusses plan for Frisbee golf course

The Pampa Economic Development Corporation will present their annual report to the city commission Tuesday.

They will outline the things they have done and the plans they have.

At the PEDC's regular meeting Thursday, they discussed a new LED message board similar to the one the city installed on Hobart Street near M.K. Brown Civic Auditorium, the new PEDC website and a plan brought to them by Kelly Dewey for a Frisbee

golf course. Kristi Robinson suggested the board look into erecting a 17-inch electronic marquee sign at the entrance to Recreation Park. The sign would Hobart, she said, but smaller and less expensive.

The three by eight foot double-sided sign with full color display would cost a little over \$30,000. The one at M.K. Brown Civic Auditorium, by contrast, cost over \$100,000.

Enrique Cabrales, superintendent of Pampa's recreation department and manager of M.K. Brown Civic Auditorium, told the board that the City of Pampa had agreed to perform all programming and pay for the electricity used by the sign.

"I think it's a good idea," said PEDC President Gary

Sutherland. The discussion revolved

around financing. Kathy Cota, administrative assistant, said she hoped to launch

be similar to the one on the new Web site by the end of the month. The old Web site is scheduled to come down Nov. 23.

She said the front page of the new Web site has room for five, possible six, photographs. There was some discussion that the pictures ought to include oil and gas, wind energy, the hospital and a picture of the PEDC office.

PEDC board member Cathryne Warner said she would like to see agriculture represented.

In other business, Cota told the board that Dewey brought a proposal to the PEDC for a Frisbee Golf Course. It would be located at Highland Park and part

of Central Park. Sutherland said he'd like to see it open in time for PEDC cont. on page 3

# TWC says jobs added, but unemployment still up

AUSTIN — Total nonagricultural employment in Texas increased by 41,700 positions in October with significant increases in Professional and Business Services and Education and Health Services.

The Texas seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose slightly to 8.3 percent in October, up from

8.2 percent a month ago, and continued to trend well below the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 10.2 percent.


"In October, the Texas job market regained some lost ground experienced over the past several months, although it is too soon to indicate a trend," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken. "The Texas

unemployment rate continued to edge upward as our state continues to feel the effects of the national economic downturn."

Education and Health Services employment grew in October with the addition of 14,900 jobs, and Professional and Business Services added 10,800 positions in October. Employment in the Financial Activities industry increased by 4,500 jobs in October.

"Reports of job gains in October are good news, and certainly better than the alternative, but we remain concerned about the many Texans who still cannot find work," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton.



-- HAPPY BEING ME IN **MASSACHUSETTS** 





## Electrical fire knocks KAS-TV off the air

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - An electrical fire forced evacuation of KXAS during a newscast and knocked the state's longest-serving TV station off the air.

Fort Worth Fire Department spokesman Tim Hardeman said Friday that no one was injured in the blaze reported at 10:09 p.m. Thursday.

Hardeman says dry chemicals were used to put out the fire in an electrical vault. Hardeman says the damage estimate was

KXAS vice president of programming Brian Hocker says the fire at the NBC network-owned station also forced its Telemundo affiliate, KXTX, off the air.

Hocker says about 50 people were in the building when the fire alarm sounded. The stations were back on the air by 2 a.m. Friday.

KXAS was the first television station in Texas, as WBAP, in 1948. The building is listed with the Texas Historical







We want to strive to promote community awarein education and the foundation and ensure the perpetuity of the foundation with an endowment fund.

Our ten year goal is to reach an endowment of \$1 million which should provide vital assistance for our students for generations to come. We received our start up funds from some generous local citizens, foundations, and memorials.

I am pleased to announce that the Pampa **Education Foundation was** able to gift almost \$10,000 to Pampa educators through the teacher grant application process in 2008.

Some items gifted were science laboratory equipment, electronic generators, graphic calculators, computers, software, disability awareness curriculum and equipment, field trip funds, guest speakers and workshops, and books and other resource materi-

defense. "We got to know our assignments on both ends of the floor," Embry said. "That will come with time."


