Dems ready to go-it-alone on

WASHINGTON (AP) — A leading Senate Democrat said Monday his party is determined to push through a health care overhaul bill with or without Republican support because the "system is broken."

"We prefer to go at it with Republicans if we can reach compromises in some areas," said Sen. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y. "But we're not going to not pass a bill."

Schumer dueled with Republican Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison on a network morning news show in the wake of a key Senate vote Saturday night that advanced a 10-year, \$959 billion health bill to full debate. Hutchison argued that "you're going to put taxes and mandates on business" that would be a drag on an economy still struggling to recover from

recession. Congressional Democrats are trying to resolve differences within their rank and file over abortion, taxes and letting the government sell health insur-

ance as a competitor with private insurers. Those are all crucial policy questions, and House and Senate Democrats have taken conflicting approaches.

Appearing on NBC's "Today" show Monday, Schumer said, "We all know we have to give a little. ... If we don't do anything, that is the worst situation, and we have a good bill." He said lawmakers must come together because "the health care system is broken."

Schumer argued that Republican critics "haven't put any alternative on the floor."

Hutchison called it "a terrible idea at this time." She said that Republicans "have put alternatives on the floor," including individual tax credits that would not include cutting Medicare and permitting a government takeover of the health care system.

The Democratic measures would leave 12 million or more eligible Americans uninsured. Many middle-class families who'd now be required to buy coverage would still find the premiums a stretch, even with government aid. A new federal fund to provide temporary coverage for people with health problems would quickly run out of cash.

For now, these breadand-butter concerns take a back seat to more pressing issues for Democratic lawmakers trying to deliver on President Barack Obama's

signature issue. The House passed its health care bill 220-215 earlier this month. The Senate cleared the way Saturday for debate on legislation unveiled by Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev. The bill, a compromise between two committee-passed versions, could undergo significant changes as senators amend it during weeks

of arduous debate ahead. Both bills would require all Americans to carry health insurance, with government help to make premiums more affordable. They would ban insurance companies from denying coverage or charging more to people with health problems. They would set up new insurance markets for those who now have the hardest time finding and keeping coverage — selfemployed people and small businesses. Americans insured through big employer plans would gain new consumer protections but wouldn't face major changes. Seniors would get better prescription cover-

"For the first time, we're going to allow American consumers to be involved in a buyers' market for health insurance," said Sen. Chris Dodd, D-Conn., one of the authors of the Senate bill, "This Congress is going to pass, and this president is going to sign, a national health care pro-

gram for all Americans." Before any signing ceremony, lawmakers must



To the editor,

In light of a recent letter, I would like to share an experience my family had last year. My dad became very ill. After being seen by his physician, he was admitted to Pampa Regional Medical Center ICU. He was cared for by both a private physician and an employed physician. He was also cared for by many wonderful nurses and respiratory therapists.

His illness progressed rapidly and he was flown to an Amarillo hospital for more "specialized" care. This is where our nightmare began. While in Amarillo, he was cared for by private physicians. One of which was wonderful, the other was not. The less than wonderful private physician only made rounds to see his patients after midnight which did not allow for any family/ but what we knew was a physician interaction. He strong hard working 76

also scheduled a procedure on my dad three days in a row but never showed up or called to cancel. I took each day off so my mother and I could be with my dad during the procedure. No procedure was performed and no apology from the physician was given ..

The Amarillo hospital staff did not care about my dad or our family. They gave him a hospital acquired infection that he did not have at PRMC. We know this because he was initially tested on admission for this infection at PRMC. They made no attempts to get him out of bed nor did they perform any sort of physical therapy to keep him from wasting away during his long illness. They allowed him to lay in bed with minimal interaction. They saw a frail, debilitated man year old father that had worked 10 hour days up until the day before he was admitted. They gave up on any recovery and would have allowed him to die if we hadn't intervened.

We had enough and demanded he be transferred back to PRMC where we knew he would receive much better care. After arguments with his condescending nurse case manager and through her, his physician agreed to transfer him if we could find a physician to accept him. I knew my father's personal physician would take better care of my dad.

He returned to PRMC and after his physician, the caring nurses, respiratory therapists, and physical therapy had worked their magic, my dad came home.

His story doesn't end here. He was terminal and made several returns back to PRMC, most of which were through the ER, before he died. There again, he received excellent care.

When he died it was not alone in an Amarillo hospital. It was in our hospital, in ICU, with his family at his bedside and the nurses

that had worked so hard to keep him alive close by to help us.

Some of those that know us say that my dad received "better" care locally because my mother, my daughter, and I are nurses. If that were true, he should have received "better" care in Amarillo because I can assure you by the time we left, the physicians and staff in Amarillo knew we were nurses.

My point is this. Whether a physician has a private practice or is employed by the hospital doesn't make him or her a good physician. The physician chooses to be one or the other. A larger hospital does not guarantee good care. It begins with the people working day in and day out in that hospital. I would not go or take my family anywhere else but PRMC for care unless the services needed were not offered locally. I would urge everyone in our community and surrounding areas to do the same. There's no place like home.

"If it ain't broke, don't fix it"? You and Charlie have wonderful relationship right now. You can enjoy him and help him out when he needs it, and you're still free to absent yourself when his girls become too much for you.

Marriage is a package deal. If you combine households feeling the way you do, it would be unfair to yourself, to Charlie and all four of the children. I advise against it.

DEAR ABBY: 24-year-old daughter, "Tiffany," still lives at home. When she was out of work for six months, we paid all her bills.

She has become very disrespectful to me and my husband. The atmosphere in our home has become so toxic that we asked her to move out. She threatened us by saying if we make her move we'll never see her again.

Warriors shoot down Eagles, advance to quarterfinals

Miami's 114-69 area playoff win over the Chillicothe Eagles Friday night in Silverton, Texas, was a tale of two halves.

The Eagles gained 385 yards and scored 63 points in the first half enroute to a 63-60 advantage. The second half, however, was all Miami as they outscored Chillicothe 54-6 to end the game at the 1:56 mark in the fourth quarter via the Mercy Rule.

The Eagles jumped out to a 14-0 lead before the Warriors ran an offensive play.

Cameron Tidmore returned the opening kick 52 yards and Manuel Perez made the conversion kick. A Miami fumble on the ensuing kick set up a 25-yard Tidwell to Tanner Vaden score. Down by two scores, with less than two minutes gone the Warriors responded with a four-play, 48-yard drive, that culminated with a two-yard run by Ian Smith. After forcing the Eagles to go three and out, Cole Booze's 11-yard TD pass to Candido Mejia pulled Miami within two 14-12. Chillicothe answered with a six-play drive that covered 58 yards when Tidmore found Andru Freeman from 20 yards out. The quarter ended with Booze being sacked and the Warriors trailing 20-12.

The second quarter was an offensive shootout with both defenses being a non factor. The teams combined for ninety one points and 584 yards. Six TDs were scored in the final minute and a half. Ian Smith opened the scoring with a four-yard run and his conversion kick tied the game at 20 all with 9:39 to play in the half. Thirty seven seconds later a 31-yard pass from Tidwell to Freeman and a Tidwell to Perez conversion pass put Chillicothe up 27-20. One minute later, Smith's 59-yard run pulled the Warriors to within one.

The Eagles opened a sixteen point advantage with scores on their next two possessions. The first TD came on a 37-yard pass from Tidwell to Perez with Perez converting the kick. After a Miami fumble Tidwell found Vaden behind the defense for a 25-yard score. Perez's conversion kick gave Chillicothe its largest lead of the game at 43-26 with 6:02 left in the half.

Trailing by three scores, Jared Roberts' 67-yard return of the ensuing kick to the Eagle 7 was huge. Two plays later Smith's one-yard run cut the deficit to 43-32. Roberts made another big play when his tackle halted The Eagles next drive at the Warrior 3. After two runs by Smith gave Miami breathing room, Booze threw to C. Mejia who rumbled 48 yards to cut the margin to five.

increased the Eagle lead to 49-38 with 1:27 remaining in the half. Twelve seconds later Smith's 60-yard run and conversion kick pulled Miami within three. A 49-yard reception by Vaden from Tidwell took all of nineteen seconds and Chillicothe led by eleven. Smith's 38-yard dash brought the deficit to 57-52 fifteen seconds later. Adrian Lara gave the Warriors a chance for their first lead of the game when he recovered the ensuing on-side kick at the Eagle 34. Three plays later they would take advantage when Booze threw seven yards to Seth Boone. Smith's conversion kick put Miami up 60-57 with twelve seconds in the half. Chillicothe's answer was a 30-yard run by Tidwell and the Eagles went to the locker room with a 63-60

Tidwell to Freeman pass kickoff return by Roberts to go up 66-63. The ensuing on-side kick was recovered by Smith and three plays later his 24-yard pass to Boone increased the lead to 72-63. With the offense hitting on all cylinders, it was time for the defense to play up to its potential.

The Warrior defense which had been embarrassed in the first half stopped Chillicothe at the Eagle 28 and three plays later Mejia increased the lead to 78-63 with an eightyard run. A Booze interception killed Chillicothe's next drive and set up Miami's final score of the third quarter. The Warriors went 58 yards on two plays with Roberts sprinting the last 34. Smiths' kick put Miami up 86-63 and that offense with 400 yards on

drive that Smith finished by running through tacklers from the 15. After the defense forced a three and out Roberts' five-vard run put the Warriors on the brink of the century mark.


Smith's conversion kick got them there at 100-69. A sack by Boone forced Chillicothe to turn the ball over on downs and Roberts sprinted 50 yards on the next play. After Smith converted the kick the Warriors were a TD away from a 45-point playoff win. Roberts would oblige with a 49-yard dash one play after Kade Morse recovered an Eagle fumble.


The Warriors totaled 730 yards including 597 rushing yards and 21 first downs. Ian smith led the

Other defensive standouts were, Candido Mejia- 9 tackles, Kade Morse 5 tackles and a fumble recovery, David Mejia-five tackles and Cole Booze-3 tackles and an interception.




