It's been said that the true spirit of the holiday season is in giving, not receiving. With this in mind, it's likely that you will be spending a bit of time shopping for presents, your credit card flying out of your wallet or purse like wind-blown snow.

But as you shop in stores and online, be sure you're not giving a surprise gift to an identity thief. Because the surprise will be on you and it won't be a good

Sometimes when you do business, you may be asked for your Social Security number many cases, those asking don't really need it. If anyone asks for your Social Security number or other identifying information, ask them why they want it and whether they absolutely need it. They can refuse you service if you don't provide it, but consider whether the service is worth the

Identity theft is one of the fastest growing crimes in America. Someone who steals your Social Security number



Pheasant surveys mixed heading into hunting season

Montandon, Regulatory Biologist, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department

Pheasant season is here again! Beginning this weekend, Saturday Dec. 5th hunters across the panhandle will set out for a potentially rewarding out-

TPWD's roadside pheasant surveys are conducted in the last two weeks of October and the first two weeks of November. Established twenty-mile routes are driven shortly after daylight and the numbers of pheasants are recorded. Counties typically have two or three different lines.

ising pheasant numbers for many counties in the northern panhandle, while southern counties may not fare as well. Proper timing of spring and summer

able crop selection led to a good hatch for counties like Ochiltree, Hansford, Dallam, and Sherman counties. All of these counties showed considerably higher survey numbers as compared to 2008. Counties further south such as Deaf Smith, Swisher, Parmer, Floyd and Castro counties had more localized rainfall leading to variable nesting conditions. Overall, southern counties did not survey as well as in some years past; however, there are still portions of these counties with huntable numbers of pheasant.

fields, typically hold the most birds. However, Conservation Reserve Program Fields (CRP) and grain stubble should also provide good hunting opportunities. TPWD leased lands throughout the Panhandle typically exhibit these type conditions, so check ahead to see where the nearest public lease may be to you.

This year's pheasant season runs from December 5, 2009 to January 3, 2010. The daily bag limit is 3 cock pheasants (possession limit 6 cocks). Please obey all game laws and hunt only on lands were you have permission to tread. Remember that the Annual Public Hunting Permit (APH) will allow hunters access to TWPD leased lands. The APH is available wherever licenses

Identity thieves can obtain your Social Security number, credit card numbers, and personal information in a number of ways, including

Stealing wallets, purses, and mail;

Intercepting personal information you provide on an unsecured website, from business or personnel records at work, and personal information in your

Rummaging through your trash, and public trash dumps, for personal information;

Posing as someone who needs your information, such as a government agency, employer, bank, or

What? Charities checking immigration status for toy drives

HOUSTON (AP) -Happy holidays — now where's that immigration paperwork?

Several programs providing Christmas gifts for needy children are checking immigration status first, requiring at least one member of the household to be a U.S. citizen before handing over toys. The Salvation Army and a charity affiliated with the Houston Fire Department are asking for children's birth certificates or Social

Security cards. The point isn't to punish children but to ensure parents are citizens, legal immigrants or working to become legal residents, said Lorugene Young, whose Outreach Program Inc. is one of three groups

that distribute toys collected by firefighters.

"It's not our desire to turn anyone down," she said. "Those kids are not responsible if they are here illegally. It is the parents' responsibility.'

Cesar Espinoza, executive director of the advocacy group America for All, says such policies are unfair to kids who did nothing wrong.

"It is very disturbing to think a holiday like Christmas would be tainted with things like this," he said. "Usually, people target the adults because the adults made the decision to migrate, where the children are just brought through no fault of their own.

Other groups don't

require specific documentation. Those that check immigration status or other qualifications say they are trying to make good decisions.

"We want to be good stewards, so the people that are donating to us trust we're going to do the right thing," said Sonya Scott, manager of care ministries at West Houston Assistance Ministries. The group does not check immigration but requires identification, including birth certificates for children and proof of income.

1530 - Margaret of Savoy, Governor of the Netherlands, dies. She ruled the country for her nephew, who later became Holy Roman Emperor Charles V

1640 - Portugal revolts against Spanish control and becomes independent under John IV.

1813 - Allies agree to invade France after Napoleon Bonaparte's vague replies to peace terms.

1821 - The Dominican Republic declares indepen-

1824 - The presidential election is turned over to the U.S. House of Representatives when a deadlock develops among John Quincy Adams, Andrew Jackson, William H. Crawford and Henry Clay. Adams is declared the winner.

1887 - Portugal secures the secession of Macao from China.

1955 - Rosa Parks, a black seamstress, defies the law by refusing to give up her seat to a white man aboard a Montgomery, Alabama city bus. She is arrested, sparking a yearlong boycott of buses by blacks.

1959 - Representatives of 12 countries, including the United States, sign a treaty in Washington setting aside Antarctica as a scientific preserve, free from

military activity. India rejects Chinese proposals for cease fire and negotiations over disputed border territory.

1965 - An airlift of refugees from Cuba to the United States begins. Thousands of Cubans are allowed to leave their homeland. 1971 - The "Croatian Spring," a movement for

more independence within Yugoslavia, is crushed. 1978 - U.S. President Jimmy Carter places more than 56 million acres (22.4 million hectares) of Alaska's federal lands into the national parks sys-

1981 - A chartered Yugoslav DC-9 jetliner slams into a Corsican mountain as it approaches Ajaccio Airport, killing all 174 people aboard.

1988 - Benazir Bhutto is named Pakistan's prime minister, becoming the first woman to lead a modern-day Muslim nation.

1990 - Chad's President Hissene Habre flees the country after Libyan-armed guerrillas march into the capital; British and French workers digging the Channel Tunnel between their countries finally meet after knocking out a passage in a service tunnel.

1991 - Ukrainians vote 9-to-1 in favor of independence from Soviet Union in a referendum.

1992 - A tear gas grenade blows off a farmer's hand as tens of thousands of European farmers protest in Paris against a U.S.-European accord to cut farm subsidies.

1993 - The United States and Britain increase pressure on Belgrade ahead of Bosnian peace talks by stopping a Russian proposal to supply natural gas to Yugoslavia during the winter.

1995 - Prosecutors in South Africa formally charge former Defense Minister Gen. Magnus Malan and 19 others with the murders of 13 people in 1987.

1997 - Historians say banks in Switzerland received three times more gold than previously believed from the Nazis during World War II and that as much as one sixth was stolen from concentration camp victims.


1999 - Scientists announce for the first time they have virtually mapped an entire human chromosome, one of the chains of molecules that bear the genetic recipe for human life.

2000 - Vincente Fox is elected president of Mexico, ending the seven-decade political dynasty of the Institutional Revolutionary Party. The election marks the first peaceful transfer of power to an opposition party in Mexico's history.

2006 - Hundreds of thousands of Lebanese heed a call by Hezbollah and congregate in downtown Beirut to pressure the U.S.-supported government

The Dallas Morning News on Texas' truth-in-grading law:

Are you sitting down? Seriously, get this: Some Texas school districts have gone to court attempting to strike down a new state law that requires that a student's grades actually mean what they say

You said you were sitting down.) Hard to imagine, right? Yes, sadly, but true.

Six districts near Houston -- Aldine, Fort Bend, Klein, Alief, Anahuac and Clear Creek -- have filed a lawsuit that challenges a measure the Texas Legislature passed this spring that requires truth-in-grading. Lawmakers got into high gear after reading reports about school districts assigning students minimum grades, even if they were doing closer to zero work. Minimum-grade policies usually assign a grade of 50 to a student for a grading period, even if that student has earned something less than that.

Sen. Jane Nelson, a Republican from Flower Mound, led the charge against such wrongheaded policies, resulting in unanimous votes by both chambers of the Legislature to prohibit them. Legislators were very clear in wanting to curb the practice of giving students grades

To be fair, some districts argue that minimum-grade policies are really best for kids. Here's how the plaintiffs explained it in their suit:

"Minimum grading policies ... ensure that a student still may gain credit for a course as a whole and in turn continue progressing toward graduation, even after receiving a failing grade in, say, the first grading period, provided they can attain requisite grades in subsequent grading periods for the course. As such, minimum grading policies for report cards are a key tool for keeping students in school.'

In other words, if a child tanks in the first grading period with an extremely low score in math, that student still could work back to a passing score by knocking it out of the park in subsequent grading periods. We understand wanting to keep from discouraging kids, but we also recognize that it does children and their families no good to assign grades they don't deserve.

A teacher commenting on our Education Front blog (dallasnews.com/education front) expressed this clearly:

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Pampa City Lake slated for trout stocking

Quality fishing is one of the many natural resources Texas has to offer, but when lower winter temperatures result in decreased activity of our popular warm water species, what is an angler to do? For Texans in search of convenient winter time fishing, it doesn't get much better than winter trout season.

Each winter Texas Parks and Wildlife in cooperation with participating cities and agencies stocks approximately 270,000 catchable-size rainbow trout into 120 sites across the state. Many of the fish stockings will be conducted at small community fish-

ing lakes, state parks, and popular river tailraces that offer easy angling access. This program is designed to provide increased fishing and natural resource education opportunities for city residents and children.

The Pampa City Lake is scheduled to receive 1,000 rainbow trout on December 3, 2009 and an additional 1,000 trout on February 18, 2010. All dates and times for stocking are subject to change due to weather conditions and availability of fish.

Anglers are reminded that Community Fishing Lakes do have special regulations for rainbow trout:

the bag limit is 5 fish per day per person, and there is no minimum length regulation on these small lakes. A valid Texas fishing license is required for anyone that doesn't meet state exemption guidelines. fishing by pole and line is permitted in Community Fishing Lakes. For more information on statewide and community fishing regulations consult a 2009 2010 Texas Parks and Wildlife Outdoor Annual available at any license retailers or the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department website at www.tpwd.state.
