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


Pampa has its own weather station.

The WeatherBug computer application is free software provided by AWS Convergence Technologies, Inc., of Germantown, Maryland.


Pampa's WeatherBug site can be seen at http://www. aws.com/FlashDisplay. a s p ? i d = P M P S T , Underwood said.

"The WeatherBug people said the National Weather Service would be using this station to gather information for their forecasts and reports," Underwood said. "It's fun to watch, especially during times of real weather."

The Plaza catered the food and beverages for the event. The tables were decorated with confetti and pictures from games.





Obama in Oslo: Afghanistan troop withdrawal won't be steep

OSLO (AP) — President Barack Obama said Thursday that the withdrawal of U.S. troops from Afghanistan, set to start in 19 months, will be gradual, and U.S. aid to that nation will last for years.

"We're not going to see some sharp cliff, some precipitous drawdown," Obama told reporters in Oslo, where he traveled to accept the Nobel Peace Prize.

The president said he is sticking to his plan to start the drawdown in July 2011, but he signaled that the United States will help Afghanistan train its security forces and develop its economy for some time.

"Several years after U.S. combat troops have been drastically reduced in the region," he said, "the Afghanistan government is still going to need support for those security forces. We are still going to have an

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interest in partnering with Afghans and Pakistanis and others in dealing with the remnants of terrorist activities there."

Some critics have questioned Obama's timetable because the United States is about to send 30,000 more troops to Afghanistan. Many liberals in Congress and elsewhere oppose the buildup in the first place. Obama said there should be no con-

fusion about his intentions. "Starting in July 2011 we will begin that transition, that transfer of

responsibility," he said. "The pace at which that takes place, the slope of a drawdown, how it occurs tactically, those are all going to be conditions-based," he said, just as there has been "a constant monitoring of the situation" in Iraq.


Obama seemed to place more emphasis on the eventual transfer

of responsibilities to Afghans than on solid timetables for bringing U.S. troops home.

"July 2011 will signal a shift in our mission," he said.

Meanwhile in Washington, the top U.S. military commander and top diplomat in Afghanistan continued the weeklong effort to explain Obama's new strategy on Capitol Hill. In the eighth hearing since Obama

In the eighth hearing since Obama announced the plan Dec. 1, members of the House Foreign Affairs Committee questioned Gen. Stanley McChrystal and Ambassador Karl Eikenberry on lawmakers' concerns about the timeline for withdrawal, the strain new deployments put on the armed forces, corruption within the Afghan government, and insurgent safe havens in neighboring Pakistan.

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



Barrel racer Sears moves to top of rodeo standings

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Lindsay Sears won the seventh round of barrel racing with a 13.71-second run Wednesday night at the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo to take the lead in the world standings.

Sears, the defending world champion from Nanton, Alberta, has won an eventbest \$80,813 to push her season total to \$222,031. Brittany Pozzi of Victoria, Texas, the 2007 world champion who didn't place among the top six with a time of 19.07, dropped to second place with \$210,324.

Sears, who has placed among the top six in all seven rounds, also is first in the aggregate score race with a time of 97.11 over seven rounds.

"I have never had a plan for the average," Sears said. "I always figure it will take care of itself if you do well taking each run at a time. The average does play a major role in the end, but we have to go at it one run at a time, and that is what I

concentrate on."

In steer wrestling, two-time world champion Luke Branquinho of Los Alamos, Calif., won his second consecutive round, finishing in 3.8 seconds, to take over the world standings lead with \$182,493, the aggregate score top spot with a time of 28.2 over seven rounds and the NFR earnings lead with \$69,940.

"I'm going to go at these last three rounds one at a time, like they're three one-headers, and knowing that you've got to win money every round to have a chance at a world championship," Branquinho said. "That's how I am going to look at it; just go win as much as I can each go-round."

Lee Graves of Calgary, Alberta, who led in the aggregate score, NFR earnings and world standings races after six rounds, fell to second in world earnings with \$179,340, in NFR earnings with \$58,767 and in the aggregate with a time of 34.1.





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
