Court officials said they

expect the trial to take five days, but 31st District Judge Steven Emmert, who shares the courtroom with 223rd District Judge Lee Waters, has only limited days on the courtroom schedule, but scheduling the courtroom may be easy

The defense plans to call a series of expert witnesses during the trial and meshing their schedules with the availability of the courtroom is adding to scheduling problems.

Officials expect the trial to begin sometime after the first of the year.

The infant died May 21 at Pampa Regional Medical Center after suffering breathing difficulties. Paramedics and police officers tried for about an hour to save the baby.

City completes water well at prison

City officials were busy monitoring the completion of a water well this week for the Jordan Unit and Texas Department of Corrections east of Pampa.

Earlier this year, the city had five test wells drilled on the city property surrounding the prison complex.

Pampa Public Works Donny Hooper said City Manager Richard Morris was right when he predicted that the best well would be the one furthest away from the prison. The well, now being completed, is about a mile south of the prison.

The water table there is about 350 feet deep. The bottom of the formation is about 700 feet deep.

Officials with LT Drilling drilled a 24-inch with a 16-inch screen inserted to hold the gravel packing around the 8-inch pipe to the water formation. A line still has to be run to the prison.

The City of Pampa is contractually obligated. to provide water to the prison.

Sheriff to get 2 SUVs to fight county meth labs

Sheriff Don Copeland will be getting two new Chevrolet sport utility vehicles to fight drug manufacturers in Gray County.

Gray County Commissioners Court Tuesday approved Copeland's request to spend federal grant money on two specially equipped Chevrolet Tahoes that will carry the equipment to deal with illegal meth labs in the county.

The sheriff will go out for bids on the SUVs. The bids are slated to be opened at the county commission's Jan. 15 meeting.

The commissioners also approved opening a new bank account for the grants as required by federal authorities.

Separately, the commission approved a 2010 contract for the renewal of a contract for a copier for the sheriff's office.

The commission also directed County Judge Richard Peet to begin drawing up a list of county surplus equipment and discussed donating part of the equipment to other governmental entities, including a used fire truck to the McLean Fire Department and a sheriff's patrol car to


the City of Lefors. The commission also voted to maintain the contract with CIRA, the company that provides internet



sagging economy. Attorney: Fort Hood suspect out of ICU

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — The Army psychiatrist charged in last month's deadly shooting spree at Fort Hood has been moved from ICU to a private room.

Attorney John Galligan said Wednesday that his client, Maj. Nidal Hasan, remains under guard at a San Antonio military hospital and is doing rehabilitation.

Galligan says doctors have said Hasan, whose wounds left him paralyzed, needs to be hospitalized a couple more months

while he learns to care for himself.

But Galligan says he's filed a motion to have Hasan moved to a hospital closer to his office near Fort Hood, which is about 125 miles northeast of San Antonio.

An official from Brooke Army Medical Center did not immediately return a call Wednesday to The Associated Press.

Hasan has been charged with 13 counts of premeditated murder and 32 counts of attempted premeditated murder.

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County officials share plans at working lunch

Over bowls of chili, slices of cornbread and apple cobbler, Gray County Commissioners heard the plans of the Texas AgriLife Extension Service Tuesday.

County Agents Brandon McGinty and Joan Gray-Soria explained over a working lunch at the county annex at Recreation Park the programs in which they are involved in the county and their plans for 2010 as this year draws to a close.

McGinty said that they were involved in a test program seeking information on the use of natural gas in irrigation engines. While he explained that the program involved more efficient engines using racing technology, that technology can also be used for agriculture and the area's oil fields.

With decreased rainfall this past year, McGinty said that the new technology could be crucial to the

area's agricultural industry. Gray-Soria told commissioners that her office was focusing on diabetes management education.


She said that she has held classes this past year on self-care and nutrition for people with diabetes and plans on increasing the number of classes in 2010.

All too often, she said, medical officials tell people they have diabetes and that they should change their lifestyles but fail to tell the patients how to change.

Gray-Soria said that she has brought in local physicians and health professionals to hold workshops to explain what changes need to be made in lifestyle.

She also has localized a Texas AgriLife Extension Service program on diabetes in food preparation and has organized an advisory team of health care professionals and volunteers to deal with questions about diabetes and nutrition.

McGinty also said the Top of Texas Livestock Show is scheduled for Jan. 2 and 3 and will be followed Jan. 16 by the Gray County Livestock. He said the livestock show sale will be Jan.






