Bolin trial set for April

Mary Lee Bolin is scheduled to go to trial in Pampa for the death of her six-week-old baby in mid-April.

Pampa defense attorney Harold Comer and 31st District Attorney Lynn Switzer each announced ready at the docket call in December, but the problem appeared to be getting a courtroom for what is expected to be a week long trial. In addition, arrangements had to be made for a number of witnesses.

The scheduling delays, however, have been worked out and a trial date set in 31st District Judge Steven Emmert's court for Monday, April 19.

Bolin is accused of killing her baby, Kenzee Renee Bolin, in May of 2007.

The infant died May 21 at Pampa Regional Medical Center after suffering breathing difficulties. Paramedics and police officers tried for about an hour to save the baby's life. An autopsy indicated that the baby died of blunt force trauma, according to Pampa police officers.

A Gray County grand jury indicted the baby's mother, Mary Lee Bolin, in the baby's death.

She was arrested June 8, 2007, on capitol murder charges and was freed on a \$100,000 bond. A Gray County grand jury indicted Bolin on June 28, 2007.

Prosecutors said they believe the baby was shaken or slammed against a hard surface.

Freezing temps close state roads, schools

DALLAS (AP) — Texas joined other states in the nation's icebox Thursday as temperatures plummeted into the teens and 20s through much of the northern part of the state and hovered just below freezing much of the day.

School closings, traffic accidents and icy roads were common in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, which was gripped by the coldest weather snap in a decade.

Temperatures in the region were expected to remain at or below freezing until Saturday, with lows of 15 degrees predicted for Thursday night and 14 Friday night. Wind chills were expected to make it feel like zero.

The last time the region had two days of such cold was January 1997, National Weather Service meteorologist Jennifer Dunn said. Waco had a similar frozen spell in December 1990, she said.

Thursday, the unusual cold stretched down to the Mexican border, where Laredo officials issued a frost bite advisory and told residents to "dress warmly and stay dry" as temperatures were expected near freezing overnight Thursday.

"Adults and children should wear: a hat, a scarf or knit mask to cover face and mouth, mittens, water-resistant coat and shoes, and several layers of loosefitting clothing," the city advised residents who usually see near 70-degree weather in January. "Additionally, everyone should be eating well-balanced meals which will aid in keeping you warmer."

As a precaution, Gov. Rick Perry activated the National Guard and Dallas police rounded up homeless people for placement in warm shelters Wednesday night. They planned to do the same Thursday evening.

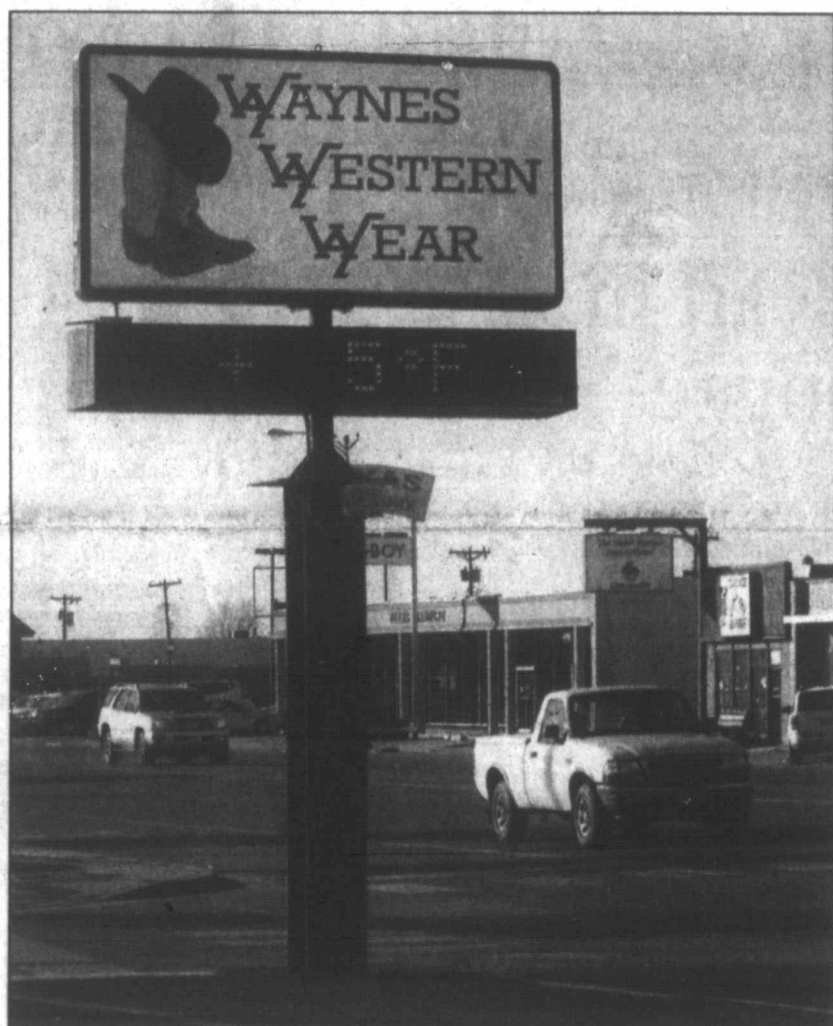
Early morning drizzle iced roads in some areas Thursday, causing scores of accidents and traffic snarls during the morning commute, although most roads had dried significantly by midday.

The University of North Texas in Denton was among a handful of area colleges that closed or delayed their start and thousands of children, mainly in Tarrant, Denton and Collin counties, got an unexpected holiday.

Jack Swearingen, a fourth-grader in Frisco, awoke to find his school closed on his 10th birthday.

"He feels like it's a birthday present from Mother Nature," said his mother, Brandy Swearingen. "But honestly, the

Drug benefit expanded to one million more seniors

WASHINGTON (AP) — In case the prospect of nearly \$4,000 in prescription assistance isn't enough to perk up low-income seniors, the government is using '60s singer Chubby Checker to publicize "the twist" in the Medicare drug program.

As of Jan. 1, more than 1 million low-income seniors are newly eligible for more generous prescription drug benefits under the "extra help" program. Benefiting from a new law are those with life insurance policies and those who regularly get money from relatives to help pay household expenses but were previously disqualified because of too many assets or too much income.

"The safety net is frayed and this is a way to start stitching it back together again," said Hilary Dalin, associate director for benefits at the National Council on Aging.

Income limits are \$16,245 a year for singles and \$21,855 for married couples living together.

Assets such as stocks, bonds and bank accounts must be limited to \$12,510 for singles and \$25,010 for married couples. The value of homes and automobiles are excluded.

Under the old law, applicants had to include the value of life insurance policies in calculating their assets. They also had to include as part of their income money received on a regular basis from relatives and friends to help pay household expenses.

Social Security Commissioner Michael J. Astrue urged seniors who were rejected for the program in the past to reapply.

To help promote the new twist in the law, Astrue enlisted Chubby Checker, who danced and sang "The Twist" to the top of the pop charts in the early 1960s. Those too young to remember Checker probably don't qualify for the 65-and-up health care plan.

"It's extra help," Checker said in an interview, "and this is what I'm all about." He is scheduled to

unveil an ad campaign Friday in New York City, including posters, brochures and a television public service announcement.

About 32 million seniors are enrolled in the Medicare Part D prescription drug program. About 30 percent of them are enrolled in the extra help program, also known as the low-income subsidy.

Benefits vary by income. For many, the extra help program eliminates premiums and annual deductibles and charges copays as low as \$1.10 for generic drugs and \$3.30 for brand names.

Robert Sachs of New York City said his prescription drugs would cost at least \$2,000 a month if he had to pay full price — an amount he couldn't afford. Sachs, 67, has multiple sclerosis and other medical problems and must take several medications.

Under the extra help program, Sachs said, he pays \$6 a prescription for name-brand

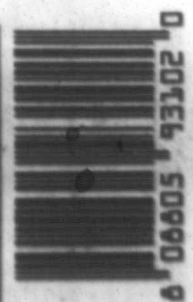

2 found dead in burned house

CHANNELVIEW, Texas (AP) — Two people have been found dead after a house fire in east Harris County. Sheriff's Lt. Mitch Weston says the cause of Thursday night's fire, in the Channelview area, is sought. The bodies of a man and a woman were in the residence.

Names of the victims were not immediately released. Derek Parrish, who says he is related to the people living in the house, says the pair had mobility issues and he does not suspect foul play.

Fire department officials declined comment.

1 dog dead, 3 suffering cold exposure in Beaumont

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) — Beaumont police say a pit bull has been found dead in a garbage can and three other dogs suffered exposure during freezing conditions.

Investigators want to know if the dumped dog froze to death.

Police say a necropsy will be done. The owners could face animal cruelty charges.

Police on Friday morning answered a call from a passer-by about pit bulls

chained outside, on a day when temperatures dipped into the 20s.

Officer Randy Stevens says the dead dog was in a trash can in a driveway. Stevens says the three other dogs appear to be malnourished and suffering from exposure to the cold.

Stevens says the dogs were allowed to remain with the owners, who agreed to place the animals in the garage or another warm location.

El Paso man convicted in death of 3-year-old

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — An El Paso man is headed to prison for life for killing his girlfriend's 3-year-old daughter.

An El Paso County jury convicted 27-year-old Francisco Javier Castaneda

ERCOT reports record demand

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The bitter cold that has most of Texas in its grip has generated two winter peak demand records in as many days on the state's biggest electrical grid.

The Electric Reliability Council of Texas operates that grid, which covers most of the state. An ERCOT statement said peak demand reached a new winter record of 55,856 megawatts during the 7-8 a.m. period Friday.

That broke the day-old record 52,001 megawatts set during the 7-8 a.m. period Thursday. Kent

Saathoff, vice president of system planning and operations, said, "The ERCOT grid has not experienced any major operational issues during this severe weather event."

One megawatt usually powers about 500 average-size homes under average conditions.

ERCOT's summer peak demand record is 63,400 megawatts set last July 13.

Obama to announce more spending on green jobs

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama plans to announce more government spending to create tens of thousands of green jobs as the nation is weighed down by an unemployment rate stuck at 10 percent.

The White House says

Obama on Friday will announce projects that will help develop solar and wind power and energy management technologies. The funding is part of the \$787 billion economic stimulus package Congress approved early last year.

Obama orders up more air security, intel sharing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hundreds of law enforcement officers are being trained as federal air marshals to ramp up security as the Obama administration tries to prevent a repeat of the near-catastrophic attempt to blow up an airliner bound for Detroit on Christmas Day.

President Barack Obama ordered the U.S. intelligence agencies to do a better job of recognizing serious terror threats and sharing information with those who can disrupt a plot as quickly as possible.

The White House on Thursday released a declassified summary of

a two-week review that began when a 23-year-old Nigerian man allegedly tried to blow up a Northwest Airlines flight from Amsterdam to Detroit with an explosive hidden in his underwear.

Officials received fragments of information as early as October about an alleged terror recruit they later learned was Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab.

Although intelligence officials knew that an al-Qaida operative in Yemen posed a threat to U.S. security, they did not increase their focus on that threat and did not pull together fragments of data needed

to foil the scheme, the review found.

Obama announced about a dozen changes designed to fix that, including new terror watch list guidelines, wider and quicker distribution of intelligence reports, stronger analysis of those reports, international partnerships and an interagency effort to develop next-generation airport screening technologies.

Extra air marshals — one of the additional layers of security ordered for air travel — will add to the more than 4,000 already in the system, officials familiar with the classified

strategy said. Obama has also called for enhanced screening technology to detect explosives and other dangerous materials terrorists could try to sneak onto an airplane.

While Obama promised improved security, however, his solutions were laced with bureaucratic reshuffling.

Americans might be surprised that the government was not already taking some of the steps Obama ordered. For instance, he directed the intelligence community to begin assigning direct responsibility for following up leads on

high-priority threats. Obama himself hinted at the difficulties of improving intelligence and security against a terrorist network that devises new methods as fast or faster

than the U.S. can come up with defenses.

"There is, of course, no foolproof solution," he said. "We have to stay one step ahead of a nimble adversary."

Because Rick and I hang out together, some of the macho guys have started a rumor that we're gay, and now everyone in the school thinks it's true. Our PE teacher has even made comments to this effect, which compounds the problem.

Rick and I are shunned and have even been physically attacked because of this. We are not gay. We are just good friends who share common problems. We are interested in girls, but they aren't interested in us. When I try to say I'm not gay, they say, "Then who is your girlfriend?" When I tell them I don't have one, they laugh at me.

Rick and I are both "A" students. We keep telling ourselves that we will succeed where some of the macho guys who are obvious losers will not, and we'll have the last laugh. However, this is still a terrible situation for us, and we can't stand the thought of another two years like this. Please help. — SOPHOMORE IN SACRAMENTO

DEAR SOPHOMORE: If you and your friend haven't already told your parents what's going on, do so immediately. Then you and your parents should pay a visit to the school principal to report that you have been attacked by other students and misidentified as gay not only by your peers, but also by a member of the staff.

It appears that both staff and student body in your school need to be educated about the fact that discrimination, assault and hate crimes are illegal. And if the harassment is not stopped immediately, your families should take this

matter to a lawyer.

DEAR ABBY: My 38-year-old married daughter's house is filthy. Her youngest is now in the hospital with pneumonia, and her two other kids are sick all the time. They are constantly coughing, have runny noses, fever and ear infections. I have tried talking to her regarding her housekeeping but she doesn't want to hear anything I have to say.

Her husband has convinced her that they have "more important things to be concerned with" than a clean house. He says they have love, and a clean house doesn't matter. The oldest girl is 11, and she tells me she's embarrassed to have anyone visit her. She has no friends (nor does my daughter) and I am afraid her life will go down along with my daughter's. The second is to discuss your very real concerns with the doctor who is treating your grandchild for pneumonia. While your son-in-law may think that a house filled with love doesn't have to be clean, if it's so dirty it is hazardous to the health of the children who live there, he is seriously mistaken.

DEAR ABBY: I have an etiquette question my friends and I are wondering about. What is an appropriate response when you find out someone is expecting but she doesn't want to be? "Congratulations" doesn't seem right, but neither does, "You have my sympathy." I feel lost when this situation comes up. Do you have any ideas? — MELISSA IN KANSAS

sun is shining, the road is dry, so I think they should have been in school, maybe delayed."

Hardware stores in parts of the state had runs on portable heaters and insulating materials. Texans snapped up plastic water pipe covers in anticipation of more cold.

In the Rio Grande Valley, South Texas citrus growers studied forecasts that disagreed on whether the temperature would actually get

below freezing Saturday.

Citrus fruit is damaged once the temperature reaches 28 degrees or below and stays there for three to four hours, said Ray Prewett, president of Texas Citrus Mutual. Tree damage occurs if temperatures hold at several degrees lower. He said most growers will probably flood their groves, hoping the water will make the 1 or 2 degree difference that saves their crop.

Today in History

Today is Friday, Jan. 8, the eighth day of 2010. There are 357 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 8th, 1935, rock-'n'-roll legend Elvis Presley was born in Tupelo, Miss.

On this date:

In 1798, the 11th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was declared in effect by President John Adams nearly three years after its ratification by the states; it prohibited a citizen of one state from suing another state in federal court.

In 1815, U.S. forces led by Gen. Andrew Jackson defeated the British in the Battle of New Orleans — the closing engagement of the War of 1812.

In 1918, President Woodrow Wilson outlined his "Fourteen Points" for lasting peace after World War I. Mississippi became the first state to ratify the 18th Amendment to the Constitution, which established Prohibition.

In 1959, Charles de Gaulle was inaugurated as president of France's Fifth Republic. In Cuba, Fidel Castro and his army arrived in Havana in triumph following the overthrow of Fulgencio Batista.

In 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson declared a "War on Poverty" in his State of the Union address.

In 1973, the Paris peace talks between the United States and North Vietnam resumed.

In 1976, Chinese Premier Zhou Enlai died in Beijing.

In 1987, for the first time, the Dow Jones industrial average closed above 2,000, ending the day at 2,002.25.

In 1989, 47 people were killed when a British Midland Boeing 737-400 carrying 126 people crashed in central England.

In 2003, a US Airways Express commuter plane crashed at the Charlotte, N.C., airport, killing all 21 people on board. A Turkish Airlines jet crashed in Turkey, killing 75 people.

Ten years ago: During a debate in Johnston, Iowa, Democratic presidential candidate Bill Bradley accused Al Gore of trying to scare voters by misrepresenting his health care proposal; for his part, the vice president said he had not been hiding in a Washington bunker but campaigning on "the front lines in the fight for our future."

Five years ago: An Army platoon sergeant who'd ordered his soldiers to throw Iraqis into the Tigris River was sentenced to six months in military prison; the jury in Fort Hood, Texas also reduced the rank of Army Sgt. 1st Class Tracy Perkins by one grade.

One year ago: President-elect Barack Obama urged lawmakers to work with him "day and night, on weekends if necessary" to approve the largest taxpayer-funded stimulus ever. Obama named Virginia Gov. Tim Kaine the next Democratic National Committee chairman. The U.N. Security Council called for an immediate cease-fire in Gaza by a 14-0 vote, with the United States abstaining. No. 1 Florida beat No. 2 Oklahoma 24-14 for the BCS national title. Cornelia Wallace, former wife of Alabama Gov. George Wallace, died in Sebring, Fla. at age 69.

Americans deserve greater transparency in health care bill negotiations

On Christmas Eve, just as Americans were getting ready to celebrate the holiday with family and friends, Senate Democrats passed a partisan health care bill without a single Republican vote. It was crafted in secret and packed with sweetheart deals. A majority of Americans

were rightly opposed to the bill, but it was rushed through without regard to the rising concerns raised by citizens throughout our country.

and will not be in the legislation, as well as to know who is sitting at the table during the talks. That is why several of my Senate colleagues and I recently wrote to Senator Reid urging him to fulfill President Obama's campaign pledge to allow C-SPAN cameras to go behind closed doors and televise the final health care bill deliberations live and in their entirety.

We look forward to the Majority Leader's response to our request and hope that he will demonstrate a renewed commitment to full transparency as the Senate works with Speaker Pelosi and the White House to come to a final compromise. The goal of health care reform should be to bring down the high cost of health care and make insurance coverage more affordable.

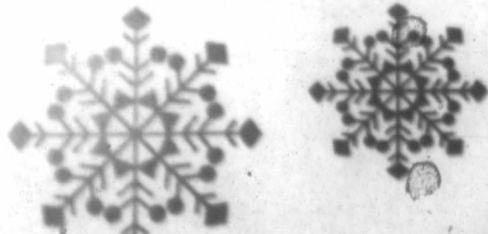

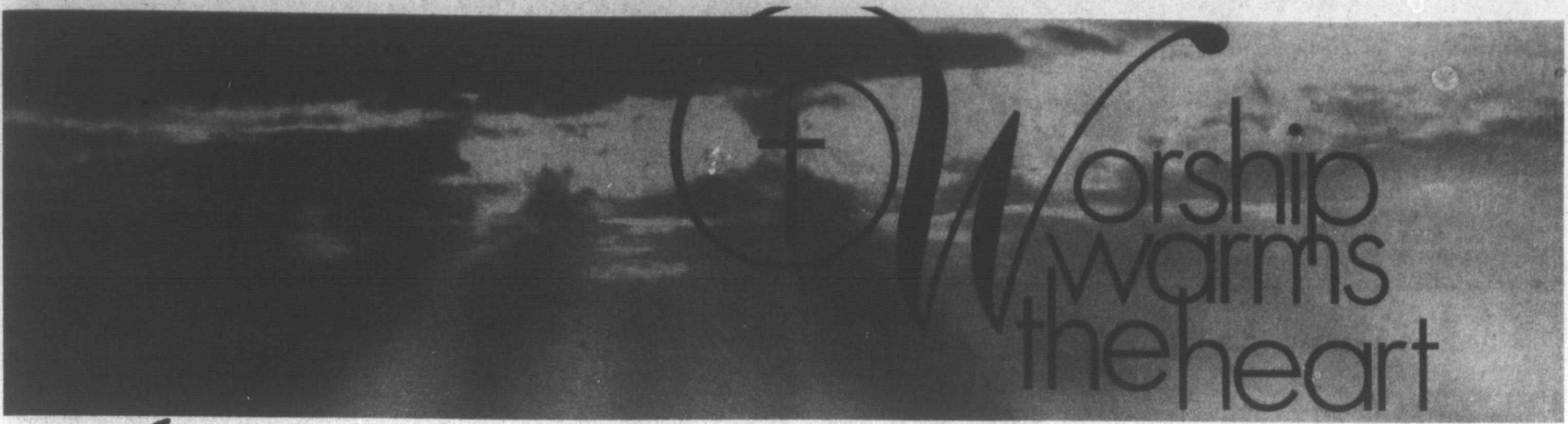
