USDA seeks input on resources

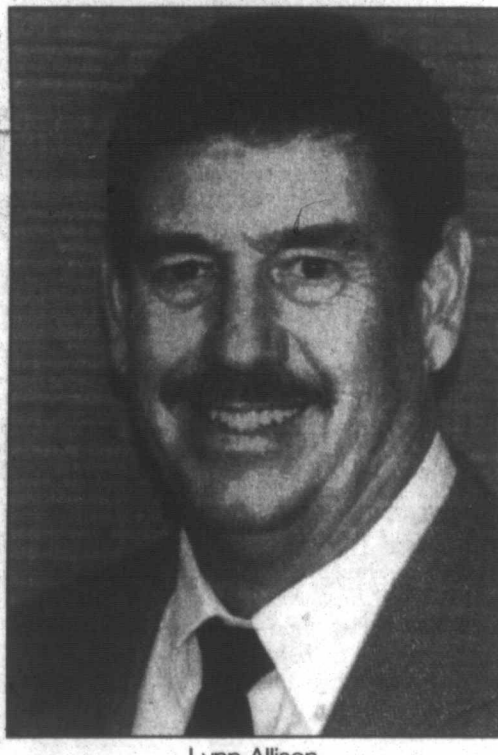

Medina adds fire, uncertainty in governor's race

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Republican race for governor has mostly been a heavyweight showdown, with the senior U.S. senator from Texas trying to knock out the state's longest serving governor.

But Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison and Gov. Rick Perry aren't the only Republicans in the race. Fiery GOP activist and gubernatorial candidate

Debra Medina, who has strong libertarian views and does not rule out seceding from the union, could affect the contest, even if she loses, as experts anticipate.

But Medina is unswayed by the experts. "I feel it in my gut," said Medina, a registered nurse from Wharton, just south of Houston. "I am not quitting. I am not taking my foot off the pedal. Not one inch."

Medina has been waging a low-budget guerrilla war against Perry and Hutchison — at the last reporting in July, she hadn't broken past \$50,000 — using the Internet, social media and the heady enthusiasm of her volunteers to raise her profile. The strategy paid off last week, when Medina snagged a coveted spot in the upcoming statewide televised debate in Denton Thursday with the two GOP stars. That has caused her Internet traffic to spike and brought more attention to her candidacy. Analysts say she still has virtually no chance of actually winning, but her attacks on the establishment candidates could take a toll on them and the party, and if she gets enough traction she could trigger a gubernatorial runoff election. Polls have shown Medina in the single digits, but even a few points in a close race could be enough to spark a runoff. If no candidate wins 50 percent of the vote in the March 2 primary, the top two contenders have to face off on April 13. If there is a runoff, experts believe it will again be Perry and Hutchison, engaging in a costly do-over played out over an intense six weeks. Medina has a different scenario in mind: she gets into a runoff with Perry and wins in a David-vs-Goliath battle. Medina, who homeschooled two children, packs a pistol in her car, but does not have a concealed-weapons license

Male DNA test yields clues in Texas criminal cases

HOUSTON (AP) — An advanced type of DNA testing that is male-specific is helping Texas law enforcement solve sexual assaults and other crimes that previously netted inconclusive results.

The Y-chromosome detection analysis is able to extend the evidence collection time from 48 hours on up to 120 hours, experts say. It separates male DNA profiles from those belonging to females and hones in on tiny bits of saliva, skin cells, semen or other biological evidence.

In gang rapes, the male-specific test can determine the number of men involved in the attack. But it falls short in same-sex assaults and can't differentiate between male siblings.

Although the test has existed for at least eight years, some of the state's

larger law enforcement crime labs have only recently become equipped to conduct their own analysis as the courts have become more accepting of newer kinds of technology.

"It's not a common kind of test you use all the time, it takes a considerable amount of work to get those systems up," said John Planz, associate director of the University of North Texas Center for Human Identification in Fort Worth, which has been working to refine the testing kits.

The Texas Department of Public Safety crime lab, which handles forensic testing for a various agencies across the state, including the El Paso Police Department, started conducting its own male-specific DNA tests in the middle of last year, DPS spokesman Tom Vinger said.

The Harris County Medical Examiner's Office biology lab also began using the test around the same time. Since June, it has obtained positive results in 20 sexual assault cases — most involving children — though none of those cases have gone to trial yet.

"Everyone recognizes (this) testing will work when traditional testing doesn't," Dr. Roger Kahn, the Harris County medical examiner's forensic biology director, told the Houston Chronicle. "The number of successes is up. Even we're surprised at some of these."

In the case of a 9-year-old girl who told authorities that a male relative molested her while she slept, there were no witnesses and no semen recovered. Harris County's supervisory forensic investigator Dan Morgan said

testing using traditional DNA tests yielded inconclusive results. But testing using the new analysis found a partial DNA profile on swabs and portions of the girl's clothing that matched the suspect's.

Like a black light that causes white clothes and teeth to glow in the dark, the technology in the new test essentially makes the female DNA profile invisible and amplifies any male DNA, no matter how small, that may not have been seen before.

The male-specific DNA tests can also be used to solve crimes involving people of the opposite sex, such as burglaries or homicides that do not involve rape.

But the advanced tests only work in cases where a suspect has given a DNA sample to investigators looking at a specific crime, Kahn said.

Government health insurance option appears doomed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senior House Democrats have largely abandoned hopes of including a government-run insurance option in the final compromise health care bill taking shape, according to several officials, and are pushing for other measures to rein in private insurers.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and other senior Democrats told President Barack Obama in recent meetings they want the legislation to strip the insurance industry of a long-standing exemption from federal antitrust laws, officials said. That provision is in the House-passed measure, but was omitted from the bill that the Senate passed on Christmas Eve.

They also want the final measure to include a House-passed proposal for a nationwide insurance exchange, to be regulated by the federal government, where consumers could shop for private coverage. The Senate bill calls for a state-based system of exchanges.

Additionally, House Democrats want to require insurers to spend a minimum amount of premium income on benefits, thereby limiting what is available for salaries, bonuses, advertising and other items. The House bill sets the floor at 85 percent; the Senate-passed measure lowers it to 80 percent for policies sold to small

groups and individuals.

The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because the negotiations are private.

The maneuvering comes as the White House and majority Democrats intensify efforts to agree on a final measure, possibly before Obama delivers his State of the Union address late this month or early in February.

Government intervention into the insurance market is one of the most contentious issues to be settled. Others include the fate of a Senate-passed tax on high-cost insurance plans, bitterness opposed by some labor unions; the extent to which abortions could be covered by insurance to be sold in the new exchanges; and the amount of money available to help lower-income families purchase coverage.

Liberals long have pressed to include a government-run insurance option in the legislation, arguing it would create competition for private companies and place a brake on costs.

House Democrats included it in their legislation. In the Senate, it drew opposition from Democratic moderates whose votes are essential to the bill's fate. Even attempts to include an expansion of Medicare for uninsured individuals as young as age 55 — widely viewed as a face-saving proposal for liberals

— had to be jettisoned.

Given the opposition in the Senate, Pelosi, D-Calif., signaled late last year she did not view a public option as a requirement for a final compromise. Asked in an interview Dec. 16 whether she could support legislation without it, she said, "It depends what else is in the bill."

More recently, she listed her goals for a House-Senate compromise without mentioning the provision she long has backed.

"We are optimistic that there is much that we have in common in both of our bills and that we will resolve or reconcile this legislation in a way that is a triple A rating: affordability for the middle class, accountability for the insurance companies, and accessibility to many more people in our country to quality, affordable health care," she said.

While Obama favors a government option, he has said repeatedly it is only a small part of his overall effort to remake the health

care system, and is not essential.

Pelosi and Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., have expressed optimism about chances for a swift agreement, but there appears to be relatively little maneuvering room. That is particularly true in the Senate, where 60 votes will be needed to overcome a Republican filibuster, and any change carries the risk of alienating a Democrat whose vote is crucial.

The bill's future is further complicated by a scheduled Jan. 19 election in Massachusetts. Some polls show Democrat Martha Coakley in a closer-than-expected race against Republican Scott Brown and an independent contender. The winner will replace Sen. Paul Kirk, who became the 60th member of the Democratic caucus when he was named to his seat as successor to the late Sen. Edward M. Kennedy.

A Republican upset would deprive Democrats of their 60th vote.

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

Less crime for less money

Public safety is job one, but recent improvements in Texas parole outcomes demonstrate that we can be safer while saving money.

In 2008, 1,016 fewer Texas parolees were alleged to have committed a new crime than in 2007. Net savings may exceed \$96 million. These gains continued in 2009, though scaling back parole supervision could reverse this progress.

Why are so many fewer parolees committing crimes? For starters, substance abuse treatment resumed in 2005. Prior to 2007, drug tests were sent to a laboratory, creating a delay of a few weeks. Now, results are instant and most parolees with a drug problem admit to it before being tested. Violators who do not pose a public safety risk are immediately referred to outpatient treatment.

Graduated sanctions such as curfews and increased reporting have been enhanced, ensuring a swift but commensurate response to each rule violation. Parolees who repeatedly violate the rules or commit a misdemeanor are often sent to an Intermediate Sanctions Facility (ISF) for approximately 90 days, in lieu of being revoked to prison. Some parolees at ISF's receive drug treatment along with follow-up

counseling upon release. Literacy, GED, and workforce preparation programming are available at some facilities.

Parole officers have increasingly been oriented towards helping parolees succeed while some states are known for simply "trail'em, nail'em, and jail'em." Funding for parole chaplains was restored in 2007. Parole resource centers emphasize decision-making based on concern for others and the victim. Texas also has smaller caseloads than many states, ranging from 15 to 75.

Employed ex-offenders are far less likely to re-offend and most Texas parolees are working. Job placement and training for parolees has been enhanced since 2007 through closer ties between parole offices and local workforce centers. Some 65 percent of Texas parolees are employed. In contrast, 80 percent of California parolees are unemployed.

Decisions on granting or revoking parole are appropriately based on public safety. Mississippi Parole Board member Betty Lou Jones recently noted, "we do not consider what the prison census is."

Similarly, in Texas parole is a privilege, not a right. Inmates demonstrate their commitment to change through good behavior and completion

of work, education, and treatment programs. Each case is reviewed based on individualized factors and the severity of the offense.

Furthermore, the most dangerous Texas sex offenders are ineligible for parole. The most seriously violent inmates serve 87.5 percent of their sentences, with serious sex offenders serving 97.5 percent. Yet two-thirds of offenders enter prison for a nonviolent offense.

Prosecutors recognize the value of strong parole policies. The National District Attorneys Association notes that low-risk offenders can be released without jeopardizing public safety if they are properly supervised. Without parole, they would subsequently be released without any supervision.

While the primary benefit of reducing crime by parolees is the averted human and economic toll on victims, preventing crime also saves money. Incarcerating an additional 1,016 parolees would have cost \$20.8 million. Moreover, building 1,582 prison beds would have

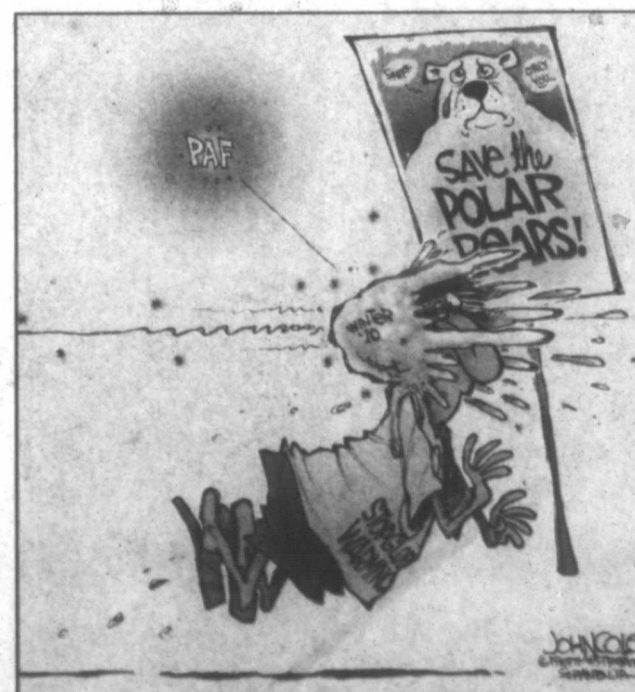
cost \$76.2 million.

Prison costs 13 times more than parole, but if supervision, treatment, workforce development, and chaplaincy for parolees are scaled back, more parolees may commit new crimes and be revoked to prison. The result: more crime and higher costs to taxpayers.

Instead, we must continue to break the cycle of crime. Since prisons consume 85 percent of the corrections budget, the best way to save money is to prevent crime so fewer lockups are needed.

Texas remains tough, but is also smart on crime. As policymakers face budget pressures, they must remember that a strong parole system is vital for public safety and taxpayers.



Cops Corner

According to the Texas state law a driver involved in a traffic accident is required to stop their vehicle in the safest location, and furnish information such as driver's name, address, vehicle registration number, and liability insurance carrier and policy number.

Failure to meet these requirements could result in a fine up to \$2000.00 and up to six months in jail. Upon a conviction for failing to do this, a person's driver license could be suspended in addition to the fine and jail time.

The same requirements must be met even if the other vehicle is unattended at the time of the accident.

If the accident results in injury, death or the vehicle is damage to the extent that it cannot be normally and safely driven a person shall quickly notify the appropriate law enforcement agency.

If you witness an accident please notify the Police as quickly as you can; also be prepared to be asked for a license plate number, color of vehicle and type of vehicle. We ask the community to please be courteous and do what is right when you are involved in an accident.

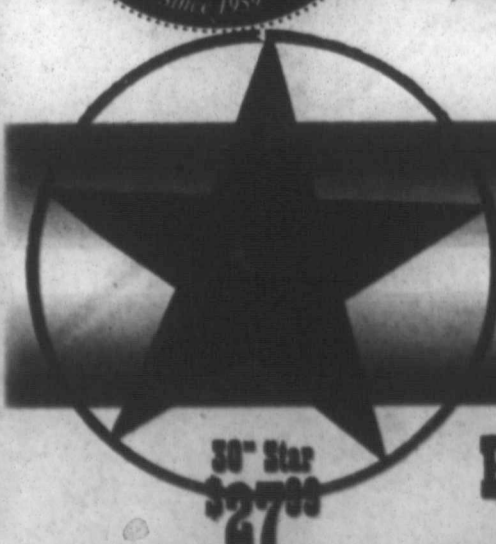

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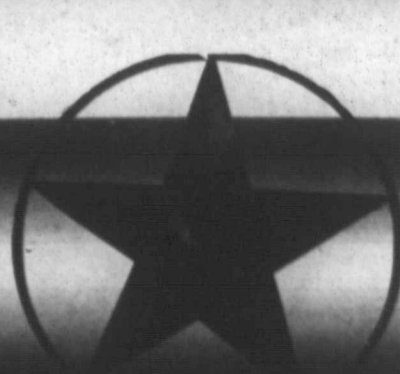

New Year's Resolutions

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: I'm a 15-year-old girl whose parents treat me like an 8-year-old. They not only refuse to let me see any movie that isn't G-rated, but they still cut my meat for me! Once a week we go to the park, and they still push me on the swings.

I don't want to tell them it's embarrassing because I'm afraid I'll hurt their feelings. Please tell me how to convey to my parents that I'm not a child anymore. -- OLD ENOUGH IN VIRGINIA

DEAR OLD ENOUGH: Your parents mean well, but children who are over-protected to the extent you have been often become stunted in their development. Teens do not learn social skills and how to make appropriate choices when they are "supervised" to the extent you are.

Tell your parents that you love them, but in three years you will be 18 and an adult. Explain that you know they love you, but if you are not allowed some freedom now, then you will be behind your peers because of your inexperience when you have reached an age when you'll be expected to make wise choices. Remind them that even children half your age are sufficiently coordinated that they can cut the food on their plates, and you would appreciate their allowing you to get some practice.

If this doesn't help them let go, then ask another adult to help you deliver the message.

DEAR ABBY: Two family members passed away, and because we live several states from our family, we were not informed of their deaths until many weeks after the funerals. Whose responsibility is it to notify us of a death in the family? --

LEFT IN THE DARK

DEAR LEFT IN THE DARK: There is no designated person who makes the call. Often it is a family member conveying the sad news, or a close family friend if the family is too devastated or too busy making funeral arrangements to reach out. That you were not notified until weeks after the funeral -- not once but twice -- implies that there may have been some sort of estrangement. And if that's the case, you have my sympathy.

DEAR ABBY: An old friend from high school came to visit. While she was here I couldn't help but notice that her teeth and gums were in awful shape. Her gums were red and swollen, with dark plaque around the gum lines.

I feel terrible for her. I'd hate to see her lose her teeth. She's only 30, but it's clear she'll be in trouble if she doesn't see a dentist ASAP. How can I let her know that she really, really needs to do this? -- CONCERNED IN L.A.

DEAR CONCERNED: Have a heart-to-heart talk with your friend and ask her why she hasn't been seeing a dentist. Tell her you are worried about her because diseases of the mouth can cause problems in other areas of the body or be a sign of illness.

If her problem is a fear of dentists, she should know that there are dentists who specialize in treating patients like her who can administer anti-anxiety meds to help her. And if her problem is money, that she should contact dental schools in her state to see if she could be treated as part of their supervised training for dental students. You are right to be concerned about your friend, so don't put off talking to her.

Lady Harvesters hook Horns for district win streak

The last time the Pampa Lady Harvesters basketball team had a winning streak during district play was three years ago when Britteni Rice was finishing up her career. Friday night at McNeely Field house The Lady Harvesters won their second consecu-

tive district game 49-46 over the Caprock Lady Longhorns. Head Coach Gene Valentine said this game was just like Tuesday's triple overtime victory over Dumas. "We would get up on somebody then we allow those runs," Valentine said. "Now we are learning to withstand them and force

people to play catch up to us. It's been our advantage." In the first quarter the Pampa jumped out to an early lead. The Lady Harvesters scored the first eight points of the game and forced three turnovers. The Lady Longhorns didn't score until they hit a three-pointer with less than two minutes left in

the quarter. Pampa led 9-6 after the first. The second quarter started like the first for Pampa. After allowing a basket to Caprock, the Lady Harvesters scored the next nine points to expand their lead to 18-10. But momentum would shift as Pampa was held scoreless the rest of the quarter. The Lady Longhorns ended the quarter on a 7-0 run helped by four Pampa turnovers, cutting the Lady Harvesters lead to 18-17 at halftime.

In the third quarter it was a back and forth battle. After Pampa made two free throws, Caprock scored two baskets to take their first lead of the game at 21-20. In the third quarter there was five ties and seven lead changes. Pampa scored the last seven points of the quarter to lead 36-31. The fourth quarter started as a back and forth battle. With Pampa leading 38-36, Caprock went on a 6-0 run to take a 42-38 lead. On the Lady Harvesters ensuing possession Taryn Eubank was fouled and she made both free throws. Then she stole the in bounds pass and got an easy layup to tie the game at 42.

The Lady Longhorns took the lead again and increased it to 46-42. Kirsten Kuhn scored the next three points for the Lady Harvesters on a two-pointer and a free throw to cut the lead to one. With around 30 seconds left in the game Cori Cook hit a jumper to give Pampa the lead for good at 47-46. Valentine said when they fell behind in the second half they kept attacking the basket.

Longhorns graze on Harvesters' home court

The Pampa Harvesters basketball team fell behind early but unlike Tuesday, they couldn't overcome the early deficit in a 68-44 loss to the Caprock Longhorns Friday at McNeely Field house.

In the Harvesters three games against district opponents they have been outscored by a combined total of 68-44 in the first quarter. For the second time in three games, the Harvesters failed to get a lead. Head Coach Dustin Miller said turnovers and transition is what hurt his team Friday.

"The turnovers lead to easy baskets," Miller said. "That's what we try to create is turnovers and some transition baskets. That's what makes the basket bigger and easier to shoot the ball. We didn't create anything. They (Caprock) did a good job handling the ball."

The Longhorns took control from the get go outscoring Pampa 6-1 to start the game. After the Harvesters cut their lead in half with a put back from Alex Clendening, Caprock scored the next five points to expand their advantage to 11-3. Pampa again pulled with in three at 11-8 but the Longhorns scored the last four points of the quarter to lead 15-8. In the second quarter, Caprock continued their run scoring the first seven points of the quarter holding a commanding 22-8 lead. Latigo Collins cut the lead to 12 but the Longhorns expanded it to 16 points and led 30-12 at halftime. Pampa was outscored 15-4 in the second quarter and turned the ball over eight times.

The junior varsity lost to Dumas Tuesday 50-41 being outscored 15-2 in the third quarter. The Harvesters (9-9, 1-1) travel to Hereford Tuesday to face the Whitefaces. Coach Miller said his team better be ready to take care of business. "Hereford is just like everyone else," Miller said. "You're going to have to play really well to leave Hereford with a win. Somehow in the next two or three days we have to figure out how to get that done."

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The Longhorns took control early in the third expanding their lead to 22 with the score at 35-13. The closest Pampa would get to Caprock was within 13 points, trailing 40-27 towards the end of the quarter. Both teams scored

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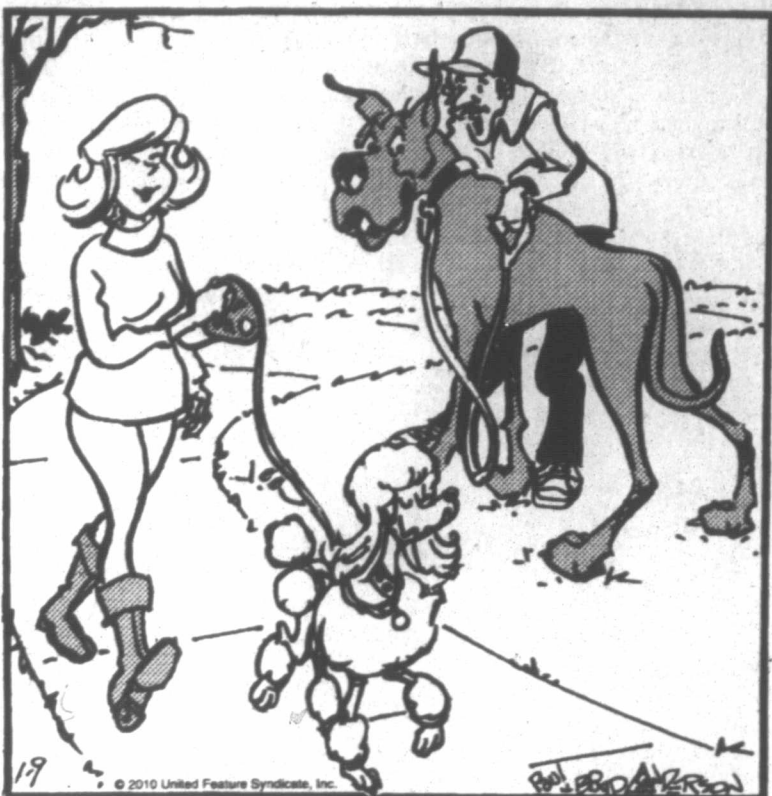

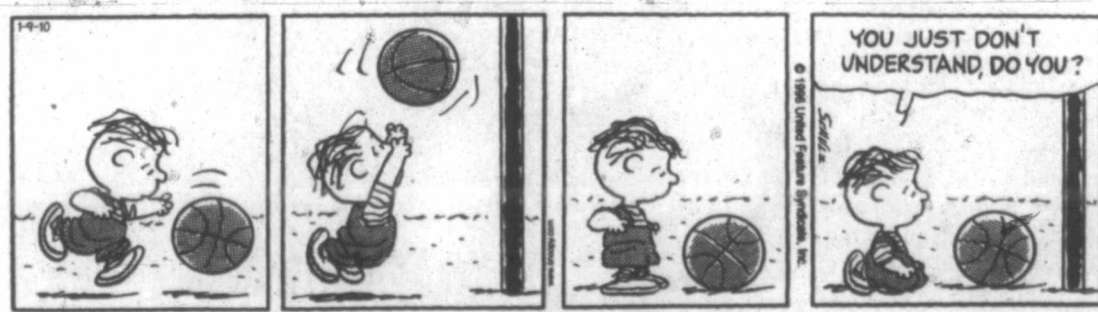

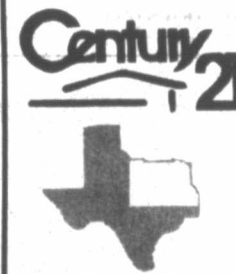

29: 11, Ecclesiastes 10: 14

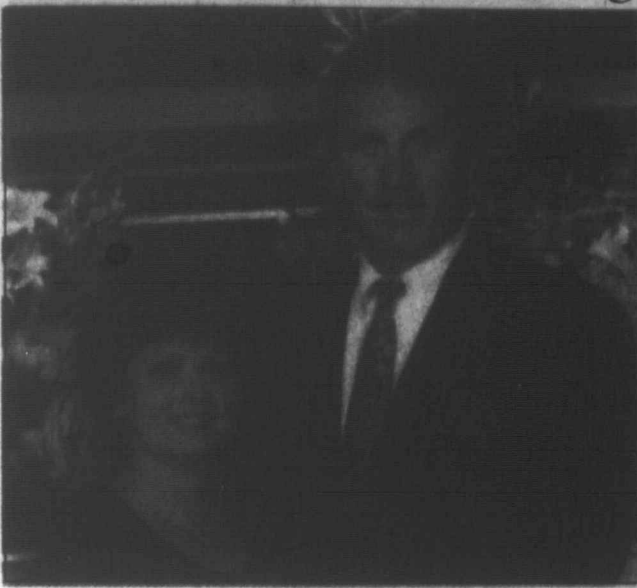
II- I shall esteem others and not think that I am the best member of this church. Philippians 2:3

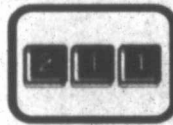

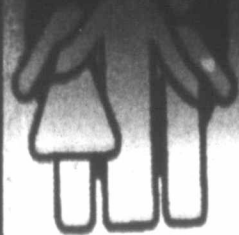
